ASIATIC DIVISION:

The committee on Asiatic Division affairs, appointed at a previous meeting, reported, the report being adopted as follows:--

THE CHINESE FIELD:

1. We approve of the division of the China field into five independent missions, --

Northern, Central, Eastern, Western, Southern, each with a superintendent, and each field directly related to the Asiatic Division, provinces within the missions being under directors.

- 2. We approve the articles of organization and operating of these local missions under the Asiatic Division, the superintendent, secretary, and treasurer of each mission to be appointed by the General Conference.
- 3. We appoint the officers nominated by the Division committee at the Shanghai council, as follows:—

<u>Fast China</u>, — Supterintendent, Dr. A.C. Selmon; Secretary and Treasurer, W.F. Gillis.

Central China, -- Superintendent, F.F. Cottrell; Secretary and Treasurer, Dr. A.G. Larson.

South China, -- Superintendent, George Harlow; Secretary and Treasurer, S.A. Nagel.

ASIATIC DIVISION:

- Asiatic Division, providing for quadrennial delegate meetings—
 the voters being all accredited foreign workers in the employ
 of the denomination within the Division, and such native workers
 as may be electede by the respective mission fields, on the
 basis of one native voter from each field, and such other persons
 as the delegates in session may appoint as voters; providing
 also that the officers of the Division—superintendent, secretary
 and treasurer—shall be appointed by the General Conference;
 providing also that rate of wage of foreign workers shall be
 fixed by the General Conference Executive Committee, native
 salaries in the respective mission fields to be audited by the
 mission committee and the superintendent of the Asiatic Division.
- 5. We recommend that the treasury of the Asiatic Division be a sub-treasury of the General Conference, the treasurer to be a sub-treasurer of the General Conference; if possible the General Conference treasurer to supply the sub-treasury so that there shall be funds to send each local mission the month's remittance in advance.
- 6. C.N. Woodward is hereby appointed secretary and treasurer of the Asiatic Division.
- 7. Pents accruing from mission homes to go to the Asiatic Division treasury, to be used for necessary repairs and construction of gadditional homes, the rental charge to be further considered at the time of the General Conference.
- 8. The General Conference Committee to name an auditor for the books of the Asiatic Division treasurer, or to delegate to others the naming of this auditor.
- 9. We advise the Asiatic Division officers to place insurance upon office building and equipment and mission owned residences, at least to half the value of the property.
- 10. We advise that the rate of payment of the medical workers in China ve continued as at present, in harmony with rates established in all mission fields, leaving the question of change in rating to be considered at the time of the coming General Conference, when all the fields will be represented.

ll. We leave to Brethren Peterson and Grundset, of the Foreign Mission Seminary, and their fiances, the decision as to whether they go at once to China or plan to sail the latter part of July.

12. We invite Merritt C. Warren, of the Foreign Mission Seminary, to proceed at once to China, being married in California before sailing.

13. The Division officers are authorized to make adjustment wiping out shortage of about \$135 in the China mission treasury accounts, created before the books were taken over by the regularly appointed treasurer, C.N. Woodward, being assured in our minds that the shortage is sholly due to confusion in accounts while volunteer helpers were endeavoring to fill in the gaps while waiting for the coming of an experienced accountant.

FINANCIAL SITUATION:

The chairman gave an outline of the development of systems of supporting the work at home and in mission fields from the early days of the work until the working out of the present systematic plan of support of missions by tithes and offerings. Six unions have this year reached the fifteen-cents-a-week for missions. Then all reach the full fifteen-cents-a-week, it will mean \$676,000 a year for missions.

Plans have also been worked out for the support of the aged or sick ministers and their dependent widows or orphans.

Thus the evangelical work has a systematic plan of financial support which is working satisfactorily.

But there has been as yet no systematic plan as to institutional finance. This is the problem the council has met to give special study to. The experience in respect of establishing and maintaining institutions seemed to him to indicate that we are working in this department with no plan. It therefore seemed essential to meet to consider some plan of putting out institutional work on a systematic basis, as to financial conditions and provision in launching and maintaining.

P.T.Knox presented from large wall charts, reproduced from the statistical secretary's report, a comparative statement of assets and liabilities of institutions between the years 1906 and 1911.

One twenty-one educational institutions the totals showed as follows:--

1906 assets \$ 665,131 liabilit&es \$139,276 1911 " 1163,655 " 509,429

On thirteen sanitariums the report showed:

1906 assets \$.727,729 liabilities \$.496,753 1911 " 1227,178 " 1019,662

The lesson of the figures, he stated, was that first of all the denomination must stop making new debts.

The chairman then stated the general plan contemplated bringing first relief to institutions with indebtedness equaling 50% of the investment. The plan proposed is to add to the fifteen-cent-a-week fund an additional five cents a week, \$173,000 a year, this additional amount going to the reduction of institutional liabilities,—on condition that institutions receiving help do not increase their obligations. The institution receiving help is to reduce its operating expense and meet current deficits by local means as an essnatial feature of this relief, so that all relief from the general fund shall actually cut down liabilities.

The proposition was discussed at length and questions asked.

SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

On request that consideration be given the adjustment of educational institutions, it was—

VOTED, That the chair be authorized to appoint a temporary committee of eight, to take up the work assigned to a permanent committee on our schools at the last council, that permanent committee itself being scattered and unable to meet here; this temporary committee to pass on its work to the permanent committee.

Named: E.E.Andross, B.G.Wilkinson, C.T.Irwin, M.E.Cady, E.C.Kellogg, M.C.Wilcox, W.B.White, C.S.Longacre.

Recess to 2 P.M.

On resuming at 2 P.M., prayer was offered by H.W.Decker and E.WFarnsworth.

The plan of institutional relact was further discussed, and it was-

VOTED, That a committee of five be appointed to bring in definite recommendations on the subject.

EUROPEAN DIVISION ORGANIZATION:

We recommend, -

- Conference the constitution be so changed as to provide for the creation of a conference to be known as the European Division of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.
- 2. That the territory be Europe, Asiatic Russia, Asiatic Turkey, Pers ia, Arabia, Africa, and the adjacent islands.
- 3. This conference shall connect the General Conference and the denominational organizations and departments of work in the designated territory.
- 4. That it shall have full administrative power for the carrying forward of its work, it being understood that this conference shall furnish the means for the support of the work throughout its field.
- 5. That the president of this division conference shall be one of the vice-presidents of the General Conference.

After recess the report of the committee on institutional relief was presented and discussed.

While question was pending, it was-

VOTED, That item 2 of the report be referred back to the sub-committee for more definite recommendation as to what institutions shall benefit by the relief fund, particularly as regards intermediate schools.

It was also, --

voted, That the report be referred back to the committee for reconsideration of the first resolution, and item 10.

Recess taken to 7:30 P.M.

On resuming, prayer was off ered by F.M. Wilcox.

RELIEF OF FINANCIAL SITUATION:

The sub-committee on the plan of relief for institutions made a report on items referred back to them from their report under consideration. The report as re-reported was discussed and adopted as follows:—

Recommendations to the General Conference in Session

4 6

Whereas, It is more clearly revealed, with each passing year, that schools, sanitariums, and publishing houses are most helpful and necessary facilities for the rapid and efficient carrying forward of the work of God throughout the world; and—

Whereas, These institutions can accomplish their purpose only to the extent that they are understood, appreciated, and supported, by our people; and—

Realizing, That in the establishment and maintenance of the institutions we now have, there has not been given the careful study, the efficient management, and the proper financial support, they should have had; therefore, be it—

Resolved, That we take these institutions, with their workers and their great interests and needs, more fully upon our hearts and into our plans and fostering care than heretofore; and, further,—

That we commend to the study, the interest, and the support, of our people everywhere, the schools, sanitariums, and publishing houses among us.

Resolved, That we adopt the following arrangement for removing the present liabilities of these institutions, and for maintaining them without creating further indebtedness:

The standard of offerings to missions to be raised from 15 cents to 20 cents a week per member in the United States and Canada, and that 25 per cent of the total amount thus raised be devoted to the liquidation of the liabilities of all training schools, and those academies, intermediate schools, and sanitariums whose liabilities equal or exceed 25 per cent of their assets.

We further -

Recommend, That the carrying out of this plan be governed by the following provisions:

- 1. That the entire amount received on the 20 cents per week fund be kept intact, and remitted to the General Conference Treasury.
- 2. That the 25 per cent to be devoted to the liquidation of the liabilities of the schools and sanitariums shall be divided annually, by the General Conference Committee, among the institutions, on the prorata basis of their indebtedness.
 - 3. That in the apportionment, due con-

sideration be given to the conditions prevailing in each institution as to their financial situation, earnings, available assets that can be realized upon without detriment to the work, annuity contracts, etc., etc., a complete report and financial statement being rendered each year to the General Conference by the institutions.

- 4. In case the total amount raised falls short of the 20 cents per member, so as to interfere with the operations of our foreign mission enterprises, the shortage shall be deducted from the relief fund rather than the foreign funds.
- 5. That each institution receiving appropriations from this fund shall apply the full amount it shall receive to the liquidation of its liabilities.
- 6. That an institution sharing the benefits of this fund shall not by any means add to its present indebtedness either by buildings, equipment, or in its operations.
- 7. That for the enlargement, repairs, equipment, or loss in operating, the needed funds shall be raised by direct gifts from the people.
- 8. Where it is demonstrated that an institution can not maintain itself without increasing its liabilities or encroaching upon the proposed relief fund, such institution shall, upon the advice of the General Conference Committee and the union conference in which it is located, be closed, and its assets be disposed of to the best advantage, or diverted to other denominational use.
- 9. That failure on the part of any institution to comply with these provisions shall debar it from receiving the benefits of this plan.
- 10. That there be appointed a finance commission of three members, men having experience that will enable them to give council regarding training schools, sanitariums, and publishing house enterprises, to counsel with the management of each institution regarding its affairs, and to make recommendations as to plans of operation, this commission to report to the General Conference Committee, this commission to take the place of the recently appointed committee on institutional finance, its members to devote their whole time to the work, the salary and expense of the members to be met with the 25 per cent institutional fund before its distribution.
- 11. That this plan go into effect July 1, 1913.

FORMER GEN. CONF. PRES.

VOTED, That invitations be extended to expresidents of the General Conference and Elder J.N.Loughborough to attend the next General Conference as guests of the Conference.

SCHOOLS:

The temporary committee on schools made a report, which was discussed and adopted as follows:—

l. We recommend, That the General Conference at the next session reaffirm the action passed by the last General Conference, as follows:—

"Whereas, Experience has shown that the schools conducted by local conferences should seldom carry work beyond the tenth grade; and,—

"Whereas, Several of these local schools are now called academies, though not doing, or equipped to do, full academic work, for lack of libraries, labratories, and sufficient teaching force; and,—

"Whereas, We have the following instruction from the spirit of prophecy: 'It is not wise for a new school to lift its banner, and promise a high grade of work before it has proved that it is fully able to do preparatory work as it should be gone. It should be the great aim of every intermediate school to do most thorough work in the common branches. It would be a sad mistake for us to fail to consider thoroughly the purpose for which each of our schools is established. This is a matter that should be faithfully considered by our responsible men in each union conference. All the different educational interests should be given careful consideration, and then each school should place its work on a proper basis; therefore,—

onferences, in counsel with their union conference committee, adapt the name and grade of work of these local schools to the intermediate school stand and, except where the General Conference Educational Commission and Union Conference Committee may decide otherwise.

"(b) That the union conference training schools do not draw intermediate or academic students from the territory within the jurisdiction of these schools without previous arrangement with the local conference president.

"(c] That in each union conference there be created a board of visitors, consisting of the union conference president, the union conference educational secretary, and one member of the training-school faculty, to counsel with the individual conferences or schools, in order to unify and grade the work of the intermediate schools and academies of the union conference."

3. Whereas, There are now in the United States so many colleges and union conference training schools attempting in whole or in part, to do collegiate work, which number we deem too large for our constituency; and,—

Whereas, This situation ddmands from twenty-five to thirty more teachers trained to do collegiate work than the supply offers, thus cheapening the grade of work done and the efficiency of those who graduate from these schools; and—

whereas, This situation further causes all these schools to labor in a greater or less digree under heavy financial embarrasament, and so leaves the school without the full and proper laboratory and library facilities, not to mention other necessary equipment and convensances, which condition we consider should be remedied at the earliest possible moment; therefore,—

Resolved, That we recommend to the General Conference, --

- (a) That for the serribory of the United States we reduce the schools doing collegiate work to such a number as may receive a strong financial support and be provided withat well trained faculty.
- (b) That we recommend the committee on adjustment of schools, appointed by the General Conference Council of October, 1912, to collect such facts and to begin such correspondence with the unions and the schools within their territory as will make effective the plan of the foregoing resolution.
- (c) That the future policy of those schools whose work shall be affected by the operation of the foregoing recommendations be given special consideration by the General Conference Educational Commission together with the union conference committees in whose union the schools are located.

Whereas, All our schools—intermediate, academic, and collegiate—feel the need of some board or committee qualified in educational matters as well as in educational finance, with whom they may counsel and work for the improvement of our educational situation; therefore,—

We recommend, The creation by the Educational Department, of an Educational Commission, composed of three members, acting with powers delegated by the General Conference, whose duty it shall be to cooperate with the union and local authorities in counseling, advising, and bringing about plansof improvement, not only for the individual school, but also where necessary to properly relate each institution to all the schools, and to adjust between individual schools.

Adjourned to 8 A.M., January 23.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT:

The chairman called attention to the need of earnest preparation for the medical department meetings at the General Conference, and to the fact that the office of medical secretary is at present vacant, L.A. Hansen, the assistant in the department, being acting secretary.

VOTED, That we appoint a committee of three, Dr. W.A.Ruble, Dr. H.W.Miller, Dr. D.D.Comstock, to make preparation, with the acting secretary of the depart ment, L.AHHansen, for the work of the Medical Department at the General Confesence, Dr. W.A.Ruble to act as chairman.

DENOMINATIONAL HISTORY:

The chairman read a letter from M.E. Olsen, outlining progress he is making in the writing of the denominational history on which he has been engaged for several years, and asking for an extension of time, the Committee having requested that the book be published by the time of the General Conference. He asked that the time for preparation of the manuscript might be extended to the end of 1913.

VOTED, That the general plan be approved and the extension of time be granted.

NASHVILLE SANITARIUM:

Consideration was given to the report of the Institutional Finance Committee's investigation of the Nashville Sanitarium affairs (the report appearing in the minutes of the General Conference Committee of a few weeks ago). The minority committee had referred the report to this council, as also a request from the Nashville Sanitarium for a donation of \$1000 to add to \$4000 the Southern Union brethren are planning to raise, to keep the institution going until success may come, or until the place can be sold to better advantage.

W.T.Knox and S.E.Wight explained the situation, and the latter read a letter just received from the business manager, expressing his opinion that the institution could not be self-sustaining even were it filled to its capacity. It was—

VOTED, That the matter be left for final decision to the Sanitarium Board in Nashville, on the occasion of the visit of Elder W.T.Knox on his way eastward; and that in case it is found advisable to close the institution, we advise that steps be taken to notify oreditors with reference to the transfer of liabilities to the Southern Union Conference Association, and that the General Conference Corporation be instructed to advance money to meet demands that cannot be transferred, it being understood that this institution shall be listed as one of the first to receive aid from the new plan of relief, the amounts advanced by the General Conference Corporation to be returned from the proceeds of the Institutional Relief Fund.

WASHINGTON INSTITUTIONS:

W.T.Knox introduced for couusel the question of the relationship of the Washington Sanitarium and the Foreign Mission Seminary to the general work, one difficulty in the practical handling of these institutions being met in the fact that they have no territory of their own, and no specific field such as conference or union conference institutions have. It was Washington give the status of the Washington institutions study in relation to the field of their operation, giving consideration to the practicability of their transfer either to the Columbia Union Conference or to the General Conference, any negotiations looking toward such transfer not to be terminated before submission of the matter to the full Committee at the General Conference session.

BLIND WORK:

VOTED, That we ask the local board of the Christian Record to consider the name of Chas. N. Miller as a worker in the publishing house for the blind.

BIBLE TEACHERS:

VOTED, That the presidents of union conferences present be a committee to make recommendations regarding the supplying of Bible teachers for the schools, W.B. White to act as chairman of the committee;

T.H.OKOHIRA:

VOTED, That we assure the Asiatic Committee of the Willingness of this Committee to see T.H.Okohira, of Japan, come to the General Conference as a delegate, if thought best.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S DAY:

VOTED, That the request of the Young People's Department for the naming of the first Sabbath in May as Young People's Day be granted.

PAUD STRATTON-CHINA:

VOTED, That, provided the medical examination proves satisfactory, Paul Stratton and wife, of Minnesota, be invited to make China their field of labor, Brother Stratton to take charge of the circulation of literature.

Adjourned.

We recommend, I That immediate steps be taken to publish "Great Controversy" in Russian; "Patriarchs and Prophets" in Portuguese; and "Coming King? in Italian.

2. That plans be made for bringing out at a later date "Patriarchs and Prophets" in Polish, "Coming King" in French, and "Great Controversy" in Portuguese.

- 3. That the Brazilian Publishing House and the Pacific Press Publishing Association unite in the translation and publication of "Patriarchs and Prophets" and "Great Controversy" in the Portuguese language, as follows:—
- (a) The Brazilian Publishing House to arrange for the translating and proof reading;
- (b) The Pacific Press to do the type-setting and plate-making;
- (c) The Pacific Press to furnish the Brazilian Publishing House with a set of plates at cost, plus a proper share of the initial expense; or the Brazilian House to use the translation in the preparation of a typeset edition if they prefer to do so.
- (d) If the Brazilian Publishing House desires to purchase from the Pacific Press for a time, they be given lowest wholesale rates on books in bound or unbound form.
- 4. That investigation be made in regard to the needs on the Bohemian and Finnish languages in North America, and the possibilities of book sales among these nationalities.

VOTED, That the treasury be authorized to meet any unexpired house rent in case Brother Keslake can proceed at once to the field; and that \$50 for outfitting expenses be allowed him.

H.H.COBBAN-FURLOUGH:

It was agreed that the following plan of reports should be recommended:—

General: Reports of the president, secretary, and treasurer.

European Evision: L.R.Conradi for the European Division, with ten-minute reports from union conference presidents.

Asiatic Division: I.H.Evans, general report. Reports from heads of local missions, ten minutes each.

Other Fields: For the South African, South American, Brazilian, West Indian, Australasian Unions, etc., the president of the union to present a general report, requiring fifteen or twenty minutes, followed by ten-minute reports from heads of local conferences or mission field divisions.

of the General Conference Departments: The secretaries of the General Conference departments to plan to present fifteen minute reports for the department in general.

In the case of the North American Foreign Department, it was agreed that besides the secretary's report, the superintendents of the different nationalities should plan to give ten-minute reports. American Union Conferences: It was agreed that union conference presidents in the North American Division should be asked to present reports requiring ten minutes for the reading, reviewing union progress during the four years.

It was understood that the fields and interests represented would not be restricted to these reports, but that these written reports should give a brief and concise review of the whole world-wide w ork, to be supplemented by such special presentations of the fields and of experiences as may be found possible during the whole course of the Conference.

MEXICAN PRINTER:

Word was received from H E Meyer, of Topeka, Kansas, accepting the call to Mexico, to take charge of the tract society and printing office.

In view of the disturbed condition along the northern border just at present, it was--

VOTED, That we urge Brother Howard Peebles, now acting as Mexican printer, to extend his time in the office for another month or two, in order to make sure that we can safely move Brother Meyer and family to Mexico City without danger of finding reallway communications interrupted.

VOTED, That the salary of H E Meyer as tract society secretary and printer in Mexico City be placed at \$15 per week.

J WIBBENS:

A letter was presented from Mrs J Wibbens, of Indiana, wife of Elder J Wibbens, of Holland, enclosing also a letter she had received from her husband.

It was agreed that the correspondence should be forwarded to Europe, with the suggestion to the brethren in Europe that the Committee here is not favorably impressed with the tone of this correspondence, and that we urge serious consideration to the question whether Elder Wibbens ought to be continued in the ministry in Europe under the circumstances, unless better conditions may be brought about.

CHANDLER HARRIS:

On report from the Asiatic Division that Chandler Harris, nurse, did not give promise of learning the language and doing the work required in China, it was—

VOTED, To authorize the Division to return

H R SALISBURY REPORTS:

Professor H R Salisbury gave to the Committee a report of his visit to the various centers of our work in Europe, India, Burma, China, Korea, and Japan, especially dealing with the Endia Union Mission work and plans, as it was to meet with the India bienntal session that the recent trip was undertaken.

The report was an encouraging one, and Professor Salisbury stated that he felt greatly strengthened to see how the work was really spreading and rooting itself into the soil of those oriential fields.

MRS. J.H.REAGAN--INDIA:

A communication was received from Mrs. J.H.Reagan, an American nurse who went out to India in the early days of the work and married in the country. She desired to return on furlough, with her children.

Inasmuch as the Committee felt that if she came her husband ought also to come; and inasmuch as the transportation of these workers, with the five children, would be a great expense; and Inasmuch as India is Brother Reagan's homeland, he having been born in that country of Anglo-Indian parentage, it was felt that the secretary should endeavor, if possible, to dissuade Sister Reagan from the idea of coming to this country, but rather to remain in India, where Brother Reagan's services in treatment room work are very much desired by the India Mission.

It was agreed that it would be impossible under the circumstances to grant a furlough, and that if they were to come to this country it would have to be with the idea of permanently leaving India and settling here, so far as the judgment of the Committee is concerned.

I.J.BURGESS AND WIFE:

Report was received from J.L.Shaw, of India, that medical sounsel from the government surgeon had ordered Mrs. L.J.Burgess to leave India for a time, inasmuch as she had contracted a difficulty in the hills which was rarely recovered from in India. KARL SNOW--HONDURAS:

Word had been received from Miss Ruby Oven, of the Seminary, through her parents in Tennessee, that Karl J Snow and wife, of Siguatepeque, Honduras, had been thrown into perplexity regarding their work by the return of Herbert Owen, who had turned over the school to them, and they had made preparation to go forward operating it and endeavoring to retrieve the situation. H.A.Owen's plans for other work, however, had fallen through, and he had returned to take the school. This made it impossible for Brother and Sister Snow to continue, and with a revolution threatening to tie up things generally, the young people felt it time to leave the field, if they could secure funds for this purpose. Inasmuch as they have labored in good faith and in full harmony with the denomination in Honduras, it was-

VOTED, To authorize the treasurer to send on at once \$100 as a special appropriation to cover the transportation of Karl J Snow and wife to New Orleans, these workers being advised to remain there until counsel can be given as to the next move.

CABLE FROM PERU:

A cable was received from Mrs. F.A.Stahl, of Puno, saying: "Send nurse Bolivia; husband ill." This was understood to mean that Brother Stahl(s illness had called Sister Stahl away from Bolivia to Peru, leaving the calls for nursing help among the people of La Paz unanswered.

Inasmuch, however, as only one of the nurses for Bolivia is ready to go forward, and it does not seem to the Committee wise to send young women alone into those fields, it was decided to maintain the plan of deferring action until the General Conference, when the second nurse will is available, and these helpers can be sent forward to the Bolivian field.

REPORT ON LOWA LINDA ENTERPRISES

To the members of the General Conference Committee of Seventh-day Adventists, Washington, D.C., and the members of the Board of the Loma Linda College of Medical Evangelists:

The commission appointed by the General Conference Committee to investigate the financial condition of the Loma Linda College and Sanitarium, having completed its investigation, herewith submits the results of its work.

Careful investigation has been made of the operations of all departments and their relationship to the general institution. Interviews have been held with managers and heads of departments. Access has been had to the books of the institution and recent reports prepared by the business offices.

Inasmuch as quite a full financial report of the institution has been recently submitted to you, summaries only of this statement will be incorporated in this report, and appear on sheets appended, numbered 1, 2, 3, and 4.

It will be nocited from sheets numbered 4 and 5 that the investments at Loma Linda have increased rapidly during the past 18 months. Since the operating income has not been sufficient to meet expenses, these improvements and investments have all been made from either borrowed funds or donations.

The capacity of the Sanitarium is taxed only a portion of the year in meeting the demands made upon it. Eighty-four rooms are now used as guest chambers.

The maximum earning power for board, room and treatment according to the present rate schedule is \$90,064.00 per annum. This sum is the full rate for one person to a room. To this should be added for nursing, \$22,250.00, and for examinations, operations, throat and special treatments, \$11,000.00, which when added to the board, room and treatment encome totals \$123,314.00, and represents the gross earning power of a full house twelve months in a year, according to the present relation of department to department. When this desired full patronage is maintained twelve months in the year, it will be found, if the proper economy has been practised in each department, that the income above all expenses will be more than enough to meet the operating losses that may come in through the conducting of the Medical College. To bring about such results every employee must labor unceasingly. Managers, physicians, teachers, nurses, students and helpers should practice rigid economy in using of the supplies and in faithfulness in labor.

The lighting expense bill of such a large institution as the College of Medical Evangelists is a large item of itself, and a great saving may be realized if care if taken to shut off the current on every unnecessary light. Soon the institution will be making its own electric current for both power and lights. Under such conditions many will reason that economy in the use of the electric current is now unnecessary, as the engine must run. Such a condition of things should be most carefully anticipated by a strong and continual educational campaign.

The auxiliary departments as a whole during the past six months have not been productive. We believe, however, that this situation should be greatly improved so that all of them will contribute a reasonable gain after providing for taxes, insurance and interest on investment.

The present note indebtedness of the institution on December 31, 1912, amounted to \$257,360.00, more than half of which is drawing 6% a year. This rate is two per cent higher than the rate on term deposits at our savings banks in this part of the state. It appears to us that some saving may be made in seeking lower rates of interest. The monthly interest amounts to \$1,429.75 and the annuities to \$187.05, or a total of \$1,616.80. The outstanding annuity bonds amount to \$52,778.42, the annuity rates on which are not excessive. On account of the large amount of current accounts due and payable, it has been necessary for the treasurer, in order to make settlements, to secure additional funds by borrowing on the caporation note.

ECONOMY IN HELP

As an institution grows in size, it is well understood that its family of helpers must be increased accordingly, yet it is an easy matter for the employees to become so numerous and so fully absorbed with their duties that they keep busy waiting upon one another. In an institution where the hours of labor are short, as is the case with the student body, care must be taken to see that such a condition does not exist. To avoid this there must be a careful and frequent survey of the work that is required to be done in each department, and of the efficiency of the employees that are called upon to perform the same.

ORGANIZATION

The present form of organization is very unsatisfactory; departmental organization being carried to an extent that does not seem warranted, and in some instances the departments are headed by men who are not leaders and who a pear to be in need of supervision themselves, wasting their time and that of other workers. There seem to be some instances where the heads of departments might carry additional work without overtaxing themselves.

The departments appear to be lacking in cooperation, standing as separate units rather than as parts of
some great whole; a number of them evidently able to discern the
short-comings in other departments, but failing to see their own
deficiencies, or making the short-comings of others an excuse
for their lack.

The Sanitarium organization has been weak in that it has not appeared to be able to give to the various departments the supervision required to produce unity of effort and efficiency of labor. While these conditions are especially noticeable in some of the outside departments, they are altogether too evident in the Sanitarium proper, where direct contact is had with guests of the institution.

We recommend regular meetings for members of departments, in which the interests of the general work and of the individual departments will receive proper consideration, and where study will be given to the production of a much higher standard of efficiency in all the family of helpers. A central labor committee is also recommended to deal with the interchange of help in departments, and with the discipline as relating to their departmental work.

The printing department, which we find is carefully managed, furnishes the printed supplies that are wanted by the various departments of the institution. There have also been issued a number of small publications which have had some sale.

At the present time the department is engaged in printing an edition of Hydrotherapy for circulation among nedical students as a text book and also among physicians as a reference book. This publication will contain between five and six hundred pages. Three thousand copies will be printed, and the investment will exceed \$2,000.00. This is a large undertaking, and means the tying up of funds. When we came to seek for the authority for such a large undertaking in the printing department we were unable to locate it, notwithstanding many interviews. We believe that undertakings of this size should be placed with our regular publishing houses that are equipped for such work.

SANITARIUM

This department appears to be deplorably overmanned both in the main institution and in departments that are directly contributary to it, there being used on an average two and one half employees for each patient, while one physician cares for only ten patients.

The condition in the Sanitarium building is not all that could be desired. There is in many of the rooms a rather dilapidated appearance that could be remedied with but little effort: radiators, exposed pipes left unpainted or unbronzed, and much of the furniture appears old and in need of repair, while in the treatment rooms there is evidence of a curtailed efficiency caused by a lack of attention to repairs and needed facilities.

Uncompleted improvements and repairs are in evidence in many places, and complaints are offered concerning frequent and long delays in securing much needed repairs and improvements. These conditions seem especially aggravated, being in connection with that part of the institution upon which we are dependent for financial results. There is necessity for the closest attention to this department, and for the highest degree of efficiency, as its object is first to minister in its special work to men and women brought in contact with it, and to yield support for the entire institution. To neglect it, therefore, will simply be to injure the work in its entirety.

We feel to appeal in a special manner to those connected with the college department for the closest cooperation, in order that the real object of the Sanitarium may be attained. We would suggest that regular helpers neetings be held, in order to bring about a better understanding of the work and closer cooperation, inviting suggestions from all helpers looking toward the improvement of the service.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT

In this department we find there are employed on an average of four and three fourths physicians; the volume of work accomplished bying represented by an average patronage of fifty-seven for the past ourrent year.

In this department we would again attempt to emphasize the necessity of cooperation and assistance coming from the physicians connected with the College. It would seem, under the conditions prevailing in the entire institution, that the Sanitarium could be operated with two physicians without any injury to its work and patronage.

The books and records reveal what appears to be a lack in earning capacity of this department. For the six months ending December 31, 1912, the total fees earned from examinations were \$588, from operations, \$1,394, from special treatments, \$553, and from tests, \$304. By going back through

the preceding | year these figures seem to give a fair average of the earnings of the department, and seem to be altogether too low, the operation charges ranging from \$5.00 to \$100. Only in one instance did the fee charged for operations exceed \$100.

The gain in nursing for the twelve months of the past current year was \$4,066. We believe that this rate of gain is altogether too small, and would suggest that the charges for nursing be advanced as soon as consistent with other changes now being inaugurated. We fail to see why the other features of the medical department, previously mentioned, should not be made more remunerative.

TREATMENT ROOMS

The men's department of the Treatment Rooms appears to be on a fairly economical basis; the average cost of treatments, including labor, laundry, and supplies, being 44 cents; the average time per treatment being 2 1-10 hours; and the average cost of laundry per treatment 5 cents.

In the ladies' department the expense appears to be excessive; the average cost per treatment, including labor, laundry, and supplies being 63 1-3 cents; the average time per treatment 3 4-10 hours; and the average cost of laundry per treatment 13 cents.

The average time in both departments seems excessive. The cost of lanuary for the ladies! department is excessive, exceeding, according to the adundry lists supplied us, the entire charge of laundry in the Domestic Department.

MEDICAL COLLEGE

There is invested in the College itself, furnishing, and various supplies, about \$40,000. We are warranted in saying that everything about this feature of the institution is of an excellent character, the College building being of good construction, conveniently arranged for the work to be done in it, and as far as laymen can judge, it appears to the committee as though the equipment was ample to meet all the requirements of the College.

We look, however, with considerable apprehension on a number of features of this department, such as the Laboratory Treatment Rooms, from which some expense might have been spared and still produce model treatment rooms. As it is, the present outfit being installed far outclasses most of our sanitariums. We seriously question whether the policy that produces such an equipment for the College will be helpful in developing physicians who must adapt themselves to the meager squipment and facilities of the mission fields. The expenditure in some of the departments

of the College become especially pronounced in contrast with some of the meager facilities and the run-down condition of the Sanitarium. It appears as though some of the needs of the College could have been supplied in such a manner as to contribute to the betterment of the Sanitarium, and still meet the requirements of the College.

Thile perhaps nothing can now be done to remedy these features, we strongly urge that in the development of the Hospital care shall be taken to avoid similar mistakes, and recommend that the building and its equipment shall be in the hands of a representative committee who shall guard against all extravagant expenditures.

BUSINESS OFFICE

The aggregate of help employed in the various business offices appears to be excessive. We believe that the number of helpers might be reduced if there existed a closer cooperation between the departments, and by a modification of the requisition system now in vogue. We believe that the offices should be so readjusted as to permit of a curtailment of the number of helpers, or the placing of additional work upon them to the relief of other departments.

CULINARY DEPARTMENT

In this department there are twenty-one helpers employed ten hours per day, including four cooks, costing \$877.70 per month. This is considered excessive by the domittee and should be reduced by at least four or five helpers.

After making the allocance of \$187.73 per month for services in the helpers' dining room, there is left an average weekly cost for service of \$3.00 per patient. Receipts from the helpers' dining room for six months, after taking allocance for inventories, amounted to \$7,277.28, or an average of 15.7-9 cents per meal, the allowance granted helpers being 10.5-7 cents per meal; leaving the expense for the patients' dining room for the same period \$9,202.07, or 30 ½ cents per meal, not taking into account the apparent profit in the helpers' dining room. This gives an apparent weekly cost for the patients' dining room of \$6.30 per patient, without allowance for the general or overhead expense.

In the helpers' dining room the price charged per dish should only cover the cost of raw material to the department. There should be a marked economy in both dining rooms in the purchase of material. An examination of the store room, and

interview with the chef and store-keeper, show that much of the steple goods are purchased in the expensive form of cartons, small packages and small cans, when equally acceptable goods can be secured in bulk or in larger packages at greatly reduced prices and still guard against depreciation of goods by weavel, etc. It also appears that in many particulars there is no distinction made in the goods served in the two dining rooms, while in many instances a marked saving can be made without giving any room for complaint.

THE FARM

The farm shows a gain in the past eighteen months of \$402.73. This showing is made without any allowance for interest, taxes, depreciation, etc. The interest on the Lall investment and farm furnishing amounts to \$4,320, depreciation, \$143, or a total of \$4,462.

There are at present eleven men and twenty horses in connection with the farm. In addition to the usual farm work all hauling for the institution is performed by this force. The force of workers does not seem to be as efficient as could be desired, a considerable portion of them being well advanced in years. The department sustains some loss by the practice of in vogue of all teamsters caring for their teams during the ten hours constituting the day's work. The custom generally prevaing on farms on the Pacific Coast requires this work to be done outside the hours of the regular day.

The most serious loss, without doubt, is that due to a lack of sufficient water, some portions of the farm losing last year three or four cuttings of alfalfa on this account. It is apparent that a good portion of the farm might be made more productive if projectly irrigated and cared for.

THE GARDEN

The garden shows a loss during the past eighteen months of \$1,041.81, or \$58 per month, this without any allowance for general expense, etc. This department shows a low standard of efficiency. We fail to see why it should not do much more in supplying the necessary produce required by the Sanitarium and store. We recommend thorough and decided improvement in the production of this department, and its utilization by the Sanitarium and store rather than purchasing elsewhere, or if this cannot be done, the abandonment of the department.

GROUNDS

During the past eighteen months the grounds were cared for at an expense of \$3,528.14, ithout, of course, any returns. At present there are three men giving their entire time to this department, besides some student help. An economy of labor could be affected by furnishing help with implements suitable for the work to be done, such as large rakes, brooms, etc., and by securing for it a more aggressive foreman. We believe that this department could be operated at a saving of one helper.

ORCHARD

This department operating during the year 1911-12 shows a gain of \$182.50, without allowance for interest or taxes. There can, without doubt, be made some improvements in this showing by a proper fertilization and cultivation of the grounds.

DAIRY

There is invested in the dairy department about \$7,462.23. Without making allowance for interest or depreciation, there is shown a gain for the past eighteen months of \$1,825, of which \$1,705 was for the year ending June 36, 1912, while for the six months ending December 31, there is shown a gain of only \$120.48. If this showing is correct, we fear the department is now operated at a loss. The monthly outlay for labor is about \$135. We would suggest that the work be simplified, as there is considerable loss of time in operating. The herd should be at aonce greatly improved.

POULTRY

This department is abandoned. We believe the existing conditions and the needs of the Sanitarium make the operating of this department desirable, and that with proper care it would be remundative to the institution.

LAUNDRY

This department, "ith an investment of \$4,459, appears to be hardly holding its own, after making an allowance for interest, depreciation, etc. Its output is confined to the domestic and plain work of the institution and helpers, no effort being made to secure other patronage, nor is the department prepared to do any other class of work. This, however, could be remedied by a comparatively small added investment. The

committee is of the opinion that with some few additional facilities the department might develop a profitable business both within the institution and in the surrounding country.

TELEPHONE

The telephone net loss for the last six months of 1912 was \$535.56. There are reported 90 telephones included in the system, of which only three are paid for by the parties served. With the amount invested in this system, and the cost of maintenance, there should be an adequate revenue from at least a portion of the users, free service being granted only where the needs of the institution demand the installation of instruments.

PHOTO-ENGRAVING

There is invested in this department about \$2,000. It showed a gain of \$104.18 for the current year 1911-12, without any allowance for interest, taxes, or other general charges. For the six months ending December 31, a loss of \$136.75 was sustained. During this time the department business for the institution was about \$31.99 out of a total business of \$539.60. From the fact that the departmentis evidently not an essential factor in the development of either the College or the Sanitarium, and is a drain upon the finances of the institution, we would recommend its abandonment and the disposal of its equipment.

The cost of labor being greater than all other expenses combined in the operation of the institution, we recommend for departmental use a system of time-reporting, involving the daily marking by the head of each department of all time served under his direction, exercising as great care as if he were to pay for it from his own locket.

For physicians, managers, teachers, leaders of departments, and some general workers, we believe that flat weekly rates, rather than the hourly basis, is preferable, the time actually served to be reported eekly, all loss of time to be reported at the end of each year to the full Board for adjustment, taking into consideration the character of service rendered by the individual as regards efficiency, loyalty to the work, the amount of overtime required of him in the discharge of his duties.

We recommend the establishment of the store, to serve not only as a means of supplying in a retail way the requirements of the families living in the vicinity of the institution, but as a general purchasing and supply department of

the institution, and believe it will better serve this purpose if more generally utilized. We see with few exceptions no need of direct ordering by departments. Special orders for departments to be delivered to them intact, the proper charge therefor to be indicated on face of the bill before passing to office for payment. When one invoice includes items for more than one department, a proper distribution may be made, the store to issue and charge upon requisitions only such materials and supplies as may be issued from its regular stock.

We recommend the selection of a suitable purchasing committee (not too large, suggest three) whose duty it shall be to pass upon all extraordinary orders for supplies, materials, and equipment.

We recommend, That in future the Australasian Publishing House be charged only one sixteenth of the original cost of book plates, the remaining one sixteenth to be distributed as may be arranged mutually by the other publishing houses.

VOTED, That we recommend that the Australasian Publishing House pay one sixteenth of the cost of book plates, the other sixteenth formerly allotted to Australas being distributed over the three American publishing houses.

VOTED, That in view of the fact that arrangements have been made for Elder Daniells to visit Australia next year, we do not feel it necessary to advise that Elder Corliss make a visit to that field this year.

VOTED, That in response to the request of the Australasian delegation, we take steps to secure a German-and English-speaking missionary for the Samoan Islands, to be placed in the field by arrangement with the Australasian Union.

VOTED, That in response to the request of Australasia we endeavor to secure a German worker for Australia, and that we consider their request for Elder D N Wall, of New York, on condition that his health will admit.

VOTED, That a loan of \$500 be made from the General Conference to J B Stuyvesant, to finish his house in Guatemals City, the loan to be without interest, repayable in two years time.

VOTED, That appropriation be made to cancel the debt of A N Durrant, of West Pennsylmania, left owing in Jamaica.

Recess was taken to 3 P.M.

VOTED, That N.S.Miller, of the Foreign Mission Seminary, be asked to go to the East Caribbean Mission.

H. DIRKSEN:

VOTED, That we grant Henry Dirksen, formerly of Persia, his transportation to Portland, Oregon.

TAKOMA PARK CHURCH:

VOTED, That the General Conference Corporation be authorized to increase its investment in the Takoma Park church by \$2,100, making the full investment \$5,100, the Corporation to hold the property.

FURLOUGH RATES:

VOTED, That the furlough rate of L.V.Finster, of the Philippines, be \$16.

VOTED, That furlough rates for workers just more rived on furlough be left to a committee of three, to be named by the Chair.

Named: W T Knox, W A Spicer, G B Thompson.

O K BUTLER:

VOTED, That O K Butler, under appointment to South Africa, be allowed transportation to Oregon, for a final interview with his people.

DR OLLIE O TORNBLAD:

VOTED, That we allow Dr Ollie O Tornblad, who has returned at her own expense from Burma after years of service, \$150 on account of traveling expenses.

F BURTON JEWELL:

VOTED, That we invite F Burton Jewell, of Nebraska, to South Africa, with a view to joining Elder Sturdevant at the Tsungwesi Mission.

J C ROGERS:

VOTED, To recommend J C Rogers and wife to the South African Union for service in South Africa, to be located with care so as to utilize their services to the best possible advantage.

VOTED, That W A Spicer, R C Porter, and M E Kern be a committee to talk with Brother and Sister Rogers regarding their work and relation to the South African Union.

W'R BEATTY:

VOTED, That we invite W R Beatty, of the North Pacific Union, to go to India to take charge of the book work in place of C E Weaks, compelled to return on account of his wife's health.

C E WEAKS:

VOTED, That the secretary of the publishing department be instructed to correspond with Brother C E Weaks, with a view to securing him for the work in South Africa, if it seems possible to so arrange.

W B WHITE'S TIME:

VOTED, That W B White's time begin July 1 with the South African Union Conference:

ASIATIC DIVISION APPOINTMENTS:

The appointments made by the General Conference to the Asiatic Division were reviewed. Information had led to the elimination of V O Punches' name from the list on account of his wife's uncertain medical certificate.

John Z Hottel's appointment was rescinded owing to the fact that he was unable to arrange to proceed to the field at the present time.

Otherwise the Asiatic Division appointments were confirmed, lists being submitted showing amount of transportation and particulars as to estimated salary rate and time at which salary is to begin.

INDIA APPOINTMENTS:

India appointments were reviewed and confirmed, including Brethren Kellar, Morris, Wyman, Menkel and their wives, also Miss Rose Boose, Bible worker.

Voted, That Dr H C Menkel's furlough pay be continued as at present while he takes post-graduate work, and that \$100 be allowed him for fees.

VOTED, That \$300 be allowed R A Beckner on the transportation of himself and wife to America and return, his friends paying the balance; but that he be held to the six months' allowance of time voted by the India Maion Mission under special furlough arrangement.

VOTED, That we counsel J S James to locate his family at the Pacific Union College for his furlough time, where he desires to leave his boys after the return of himself and wife to India.

In addition to the appointments made by the Conference, actions were taken concerning India as follows:--

VOTED, That Jas I Rubison and wife, teachers of Loma Linda, be invited to make India their field of labor.

VOTED, That we endeavor to arrange for Sister M M Quantock, of India, to unite with Sister White's staff of workers at St Helena, Cal., as accountant and helper.

VOTED, That J L Shaw be asked to visit Miss Anna Peterson, of Nebraska, on his way West, and arrange if possible for her to take Mrs Quantock's work in India.

VOTED, That as soon as it is found appropr iations will warrant it, three young ministers be secured for evangelistic work in India.

A N ALLEN:

VOTED, That we invite A N Allen to make Cuba his field of labor, to take the superintendency of the field on the retirement of G M Brown, whose health demands release.

Recess was taken to 7:30 P M.

JESSIE BUTLER -- HILIPPINES:

VOTED, That we endeavor to secure Miss Jessie Butler, of Scottsville, Virgimia, graduate nurse of Melrose, for the Philippine Islands.

BRAZIL APPOINTMENTS:

The appointments made by the General Conference for Brazil were reviewed.

It had been learned that C F Neumann, of Walla Walla, could probably not be secured, hence his appointment was not confir med.

The appointment of J H Wiertz and wife was canceled on account of unsatisfactory medical certificate for Mrs. Wiertz, and financial obligations owed by Brother Wiertz.

Ity was voted to add to the Braz il appointments as follows:--

J H Wiertz.

Carl Reidt and wife, of New Jersey, in place of

Miss Corinne Hoy, Bible worker, of Massachusetts. Carl C Specht and wife, teachers. Jazob Peters and wife, teachers. Henry Haefft and wife.

Also a nurse, to be selected.

The appointments of Brethren Carter and Steinert were confirmed.

A rough estimate fixed the amount to be added to the appropriations for Brazil by these additions at \$3,500. J.500 SOUTH AMERICAN UNION:

Appointments to the South American Union made by the Conference were confirmed as follows:--

FOURTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

June 10,1913

SOUTH AMERICAN UNION:

VOTED, That we approve of the arrangement of the South American Union delegation for the transfer of O H Maxson, of Peru, to Argentine, and of Arthur Westphal, of Argentine, to the office work in Peru.

J W Westphal made request for Elder J W Christian to act as president of the Argentine Conference. The matter was left undecided.

VOTED, That we authorize the South American Union Committee to organize Peru, Ecuador, and Bolivia as a Northwest Union Mission field of the South American Union Conference.

VOTED, That a man be secured to act as superintendent of this new union mission field.

VOTED, That we approve of the plan of securing a location in Bolivia for an industrial farm mission, in connection with the Indian work, at such an altitude as to provide a change for the workers in the high altitudes of the Peruvian and Bolivian plateaus, and that we request the South American Union to secure more definite information as to the cost of this enterprise, reporting later to the General Conference.

VOTED, That efforts be made to secure a physician to take the examinations in Argentine, the South American Union agreeing to pay \$18 per week for the services of such a physician while taking the examinations.

The names of Drs. Symonds and Keil, of New York, were mentioned.

VOTED, That we express our conviction as to the desirability of securing permanent meeting places in the great cities of South America, and ask the South American Union to take this matter under earnest consideration from this time forward; and that so far as General Conference counsel is concerned, that the representative next visiting South America be asked to join the South American brethren in investigation of this matter.

VOTED, That we advise the South American Union to plan for a light delegation at the coming biennial session next February, with a view to having a larger delegation of workers at the following session, when it is expected that a General Conference representative will meet with them.

VOTED, That C D Lude be granted his time and expenses from date of sailing from South America to Colorado.

VOTED, That the matter of securing J T Chr istian as president of the Argentine Conference be referred to the executive of the General Conference and the North American Division Conference, with Elder J W Westphal.

J N ANDERSON:

VOTED, That it is our judgment that J N Anderson and family should plan to remain in this country until such time as we may feel clear that Sister Anderson's health is so thoroughly restored that they may plan to spend their lives in the Chinese field, the Committee not feeling this assumance at the present time.

COMMITTEE ON REPORT BLANK:

VOTED, That I H Evans, W T Knox, and H E Rogers be a committee on revision of the report blank, in harmony with the action of the General Conference in session.

WEEK OF PRAYER--TIME:

WOTED, That the week of prayer be set for December 13 to 20;

FLORENCE WHITE:

VOTED, That Miss Florence White be recommended to the European Division Conference, for work in Persia, and that she be placed in the meantime under provisional appointment in the Foreign Mission Seminary, for special work at the Washington Dispensary.

ANNA HOFFMAN:

VOTED, That Miss Anna Hoffman, of the General Conference office, be recommended to Jamaica.

Recess was taken to 3 P.M.

R HYDER--INDIA:

The West Indian Union reported that R Hyder, East Indian, had grown old and feeble in the service in British Guiana. Under government arrangement, he is entitled to return to India at government expense, and desires to spend his latter days in India. The brethren recommend him for small sustentation allowance such as would be necessary for his support.

VOTED, That R Hyder, of British Guiana, be recommended to India, for support from the India Mission at such rate as may be necessary in that field.

INDIA SANITARIUM:

VOTED, That we advise the India Union Mission Committee to defer the erection of a sanitarium for a time, in the meanwhile pushing on in the medical branch with treatment room and dispensary work.

VOTED, That we request J L Shaw to select a murse for India.

VOTED, That the treasurer, secretary and J L Shaw endeavor to secure a young man as accountant and stenographer for the India Mission.

J C ROGERS:

A detailed estimate from J C Rogers showed that he should have in hand a larger amount than the \$1000 appropriated for the current year on the new mission enterprise that he plans to open in the Tanganyika Plateau.

VOTED, That the total appropriation for J C Rogers and wife for the new mission enterprise be increased to \$2,000.

PLUMSTEAD REST HOME:

R C Porter presented the need of a home for missionaries coming down from the interior. Estimates had been secured and such a home could be established at Plumbstead, near the sanitarium, for the sume of \$3,500

VOTED, That the call for \$3,500 for a rest home at Plumstead for African missionaries on furlough be deferred a little, until the treasurer is able to report on the total expense incurred by the many additions to the fields made during the Conference.

Adjourned to 9 A M , following date.

FIFTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

June 11, 1913.

Prayer by A J Haysmer.

MRS J H REAGAN:

Mrs J H Reagan, of India, was present at the Conference, having returned from India without furlough permission, with three children, leaving her husband and two children in India. Inasmuch as she had married an Anglo-Indian in the field, whose home was not in America, the Committee had not felt free to make award of furlough, but had entered into correspondence with her, she in the meantime having borrowed the money and come on to America.

After a committee had counseled with Mrs. Reagan over the situation, it was the report of the committee that a proposition should be made looking toward the return of Brother Reagan and the other children as the most favorable arrangement.

VOTED, That, in consideration of the fact that some misunderstandings occurred in the matter of the request of Mrs I H Reagan for furlough from India, we place on record our conviction that a wrong course was pursued by her in refusing to accept the assurances given before she left India that no furlough had been granted; but under the circumstances we suggest to her if it would not be better for Brother Reagan and the two children in India to come on to America also, to engage in work as Brother and Sister Reagan may themselves decide, in which case the Committee agrees to bear the fares of the family to America.

VOTED, That we allow Mrs Reagan \$8 per week for four months, for current needs of hersif and three children here, with the understanding that if the family returns, the amount of this weekly allowance will be deducted from the expenses of the total return passages.

W C JOHN:

VOTED, That W C John, returned from South America, be authorized to report his time from the date of sailing to June 15, and that his transportation be paid to Chicago.

SUSTENTATION FUND EXTENSION:

VOTED, That the following named persons act as a committee on working out a plan for applying the Sustentation Fund to physicians and teachers: W T Knox, I H Evans, Dr H W Miller, H R Salisbury, E R Palmer, W W Prescott, W A Spicer.

E C WOOD-CALIFORNIA:

VOTED, That E C Wood and wife, returning from Jamaica, be recommended to the Pacific Union for service in industrial school lines, if they have a demand for his services, he wishing to locate on the Pacific Coast; and that two or three months' furlough time be granted him in Ontario at \$14 per week, his transportation being paid to the Pacific Coast.

I J HANKINS:

VOTED, That we invite I J Hankins to make Bermuda his field of labor.

Adjourned.

SIXTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

June 12, 1913

Prayer by J L Shaw.

C D M WILLIAMS:

WOTED, That C D M Williams, present from Honolulu, be granted a furlough of some months at the rate of \$14 per week, in the meantime efforts being made to find a place for him in the work, and that we request the North American Division Conference to take up the matter of placing him, with the understanding that the General Conference will share in the payment of his salary.

R W MUNSON:

VOTED, That R W Munson, on account of his wife's condition of health, be advised to locate in California, preferably at Pacific Union College, and that we invite the Pacific Union Conference to unite with us in arranging for his work to be of the greatest possible service to the cause, the Pacific Union Conference to utilize his services in the field and in teaching lines, allowing him to do some translating work as may be ordered by the Malaysian Union committee; and we propose that the Pacific Union Conference and the General Conference share alike in his support, Elder Munson being fully able to do strong work in the conferences and training centers

VOTED, That the General Conference allow the return expenses of Melvin Munson and Albert Munson, amounting to 1 16 each.

VOTED, That Melvin Munson be recommended to Arizona, for service with that conference, the General Conference paying his transportation from California to Arizona.

W EHLERS:

The South American brethren presented the case of Elder W Ehlers, president of one of the Brazilian conferences, a delegate to the General Conference, whose family is in Europe, his physical condition being such that it was considered be should not return to the Brazilian field.

VOTED, That the General Conference accept the account of the return expenses of W Ehlers' family from Brazil to Europe, amounting to \$203.79.

VOTED, That we ask the European Division Conference to arrange to place Elder W Ehlers in the work in Europe, from which field he was taken for the work in Brazil.

I J HANKINS:

Report having been received that I J Hankins and wife did not feel that the work in Bermuda was such that they could undertake, it was-

VOTED. To recommend Elder I J Hankins as chaplain and Bible teacher at the Melrose Sanitarium, and failing this, that he be recommended to some of our schools or other sanitariums requiring a Bible teacher, Elder Hankins being well fitt ed for this kind of work, while the condition of his voice is felt to preclude his engaging in public ministerial effort.

MISSIONARIES' CHILDREN:

An informal committee of heads of the various mission fields having been asked to canvass the question of equalizing salaries of missionary families in the fields, made a report on which action was taken as follows:—

VOTED, That, in order to equalize the rate of salary for missionary families, varying in size as they do, the following plan be adopted:—

- 1. That no special allowance for children be made in case of one child only in the family.
- g. That missionary families laboring in heathen mission fields having more than one child be granted an allowance of \$35 a year for each child in addition to the one, under the age of six years, and that this allowance be increased to \$50 per year for each child above the one, from the ages of six to eighteen years.
- 3. That n o allowance be made for children adopted after appointment to the field.

OUTFITTING EXPENSE:

VOTED, 1. That when considered necessary, an outfitting allowance not exceeding \$150 be granted missionary families when going to their appointed fields of labor, and that freight and duty be paid on a small amount of furniture, including a bed, chairs, and a table, when going to fields where furniture cannot be purchased at reasonable prices.

2. That freight and duty be paid on a musical instrument and books to missionaries when changing their field of labor.

FOREIGN BOOK ROYALTIES:

VOTED, That N Z Town, E R Palmer, W W Prescott, F M Wilcox, A G Daniells, W C White, C C Crisler, W T Knox, be a committee on reconsideration of royalties on foreign books.

SELECTIONS FROM TESTIMONIES:

VOTED, That, in harmony with the action of the General Conference, the following named brethren act with Sister White's workers in making selections from the Testimonies for use in translating into other languages: R W Munson, L J Burgess, J S James, Mrs I H Evens.

d L BENSON--YOUNG PEOPLE'S DEPT:

VOTED, That for the present we request C L Benson to act as assistant secretary of the Young People's Department, and that he be recommended to the North American Division for such portion of the time as may seem necessary for him to devote to the Division work.

Recess was taken to 3 P M

MIDSUMER OFFERING:

VOTED, That the time of the midsummer offering be set for the fourth Sabbath in July.

HARVEST INGATHERING:

VOTED, That we ask T E Bowen to again take charge of promoting the Harvest Ingathering Campaign until the point is reached when the Review and Herald Circulation Department takes charge of the promotion work.

SUMATRA:

VOTED, That the officers of the General Conference be requested to secure a man to take charge of the work in Sumatra, East Indies, releasing Brother B Judge, whose health is failing.

C E KNIGHT-ARGENTINE:

Elder C E Knight having informed the Committee that he feels that he should leave the service of the South American Union, it was—

VOTED, That we return reply to Elder C E Knight that beyond the sugg estion of work in the Northwest Union Mission nothing seems to suggest itself to us in Spanish fields, but that if he still feels that he shojld return from the South American Union, the General Conference will pay the return fare of himself and wife to America, leaving the place of service in this country for him to arrange with conferences here.

E L MAXWELL:

VOTED, That we recommend E L Maxwell as superintendent of the Northwest Union Mission of South America, to act also as superintendent of Peru.

ARGENTINE PRESIDENCY:

VOTED, That we request A G Daniells to endeavor to secure a man in Europe for the Argentine presidency, and failing this, that efforts be made to secure a man who could take up German evangelistic work in New York City, with a view to releasing Elder B E Miller if he consents to take the presidency of the Argentine Conference, the man for Argentine being required in the field by October 1:

H MANGOLD:

VOTED, That we invite Henry Mangold, of Germany, to return to South America, to engage in the book work in Ecuador, the General Conference appropriating \$150 to pay transportation.

JAMES THOMPSON:

recommended to Uruguay, the General Conference being liable for transportation only.

NURSES FOR SOUTH AMERICA:

That we approve of the selection of two nurses, one for Peru, one for Chile, the General Conference to pay transportation and appropriate \$100 each for wages on first entering the field:

B E BEDDOE:

VOTED, That we recommend B E Beddoe, of California, to India, for evengelistic work in the vernacular.

RATES OF PHYSICIANS IN MISSION FIELDS:

The question of the rating of medical workers in the mission fields was considered. The general practice in other societies seems to be to call into the mission fields only such medical workers as go as missionaries, and they are rated generally the same as other missionaries. In our own practice it has been customary to rate the physician in the mission field slightly higher, \$20 a week for the physician as a family rate being the general practice with us-

VOTED, That we continue to pay physicians in the mission fields at the missionary rate, this being not above \$20 per week as a family rate.

VOTED, That all medical fees earned by medical workers in mission fields be counted as receipts to the mission, to be reported the same as all evangelistic workers report receipts.

VOTED, That mission committees be instructed to include in their estimates calls for the necessary medical supplies and literature for medical workers in the mission, these to be the property of the mission.

RENT ON MISSION HOMES:

The question of rent on mission homes being built in the Asiatic Division was considered, and it was-

VOTED, That we make the rent on mission homes in the Asiatic Division ten per cent on the cost of the house and its improvements, not including land of fencing, the tenant to pay municipal tax.

Adjourned.

VOTED, That we continue furlough pay to A Grundset to July 1, and that we ask him to allow L H Christian to arrange to place him in the Danish-Norwegian work, the General Conference allowing transportation from Washington to Moline, Ill., and from Moline to the field of his labor.

THIRTEENTH SABBATH OFFERING:

VOTED, That we ask the Sabbath-school Department to set as the object of the thirteenth Sabbath off ering in September the moving of the new recruits to the field this autumn.

PHILIPPINES:

It was reported that L V Finster had collected \$500 for printing outfit in the Philippines, and that the Pacific Press was willing to provide a \$500 press for the islands.

WOTED, That \$1000 be added to the Philippines appropriations for printing office and equipment, provided that the \$500 raised by Brother Finster is available to apply on appropriations.

VOTED, That we ask the Pacific Press to respond to the request of the Philippine Islands for a printing press.

VOTED, To add to the Philippines appropriations \$1,500 for a house for E M Adams, and \$100 for dispensary supplies.

INDIA PRESS:

VOTED, That we ask the Pacific Press to supply a lithographic press for use in India.

SOUTH CHINA PHYSICIAN:

Inasmuch as the China delegation left a call for a doctor for South China, and the Mission Board has a fund given especially to provide a doctor for that region, with assurance of salary support for some time at least, it was--

WOTED, That the officers be instructed to select a missionary physician for South China, and that \$500 be added to the China appropriation for transportation.

PUA SCHOOL, CHILE:

VOTED, That efforts be made to secure a teacher to take charge of the Pua (Chile) school, and that \$500 be added to the appropriations for transportation, and \$400 on account of salary.

TOTAL APPROPRIATIONS:

The treasurer called att ention to the fact that the items just added amounted to \$3,000. The rough estimate of previous votes by the General Conference was by the Committee was over \$71,000. Thus the total additional appropriations for the current year are brought roughly to the point of \$75,000.

Recess was taken to 3 P.M.

After recess, H R Saliabury offered prayer.

C E BOYNTON:

E C Boger reported that C E Boynton had failed to receive unqualified medical certificate for work in British Guiana.

VOTED, That we release C E Boynton from appointment to British Guiana on account of failure to ascure medical certificate:

G A ROBERTS:

VOTED, That, on request of E C Boger, we invite G A Roberts, of Arizona, to make British Guiana his field of labor, provided he can be secured.

J H SMITH:

Communication was received from J H Smith, of Virginia, invited to Sumatra, East Indies, reporting his willingness to go, but reporting also that he and his family seem particularly susceptible to malaria, having suffered from this in Virginia.

VOTED, That we release J H Smith from appointment to Sumatra, East India, and that he be invited to make the Bahama Islands his field of labor.

W R HANSEN--SUMATRA:

VOTED, That we invite W R Hansen, of Oklahoma, to make Sumatra, East Indies, his field of labor.

DR GREGORY'S EXPENSES:

An account of between \$200 and \$300 was reported by Dr Gregory, wovering his expense and freight from Mexico a year ago when he retired from that field to Florida. Under the circumstances it was felt that the Mission Board should not pay the full expense of his removal from the field, and it was-

Dr A L Gregory \$100 on account of removal expenses from Mexico.

NURSES---PORTO RICO:

VOTED, That the General Conference appropriate the transportation of two nurses to Porto Rico, and that the medical department be asked to secure these nurses, the General Conference to assume no responsibility for support.

went to the European Division for Spanish work, be allowed \$100 to cover transportation in allowing them to bid their people good-by, Mrs Hancock not having seen her people in the West since her missionary appointment seven years ago.

VOTED, That Miss Anna Hoffman, going to Jamaica to be married in the field, be granted \$75 outfitting expense, the arrangement being equivalent to the sending of a married couple to the field, her intended husband having preceded her to the field last year.

MISSIONARY APPOINTEES:

VOTED, That M E Kern, T T Knox, E R Palmer be a committee to decide what candidates for mission fields shall be placed under provisional appointment at the Seminary in such cases as come up while the Committ ee is scatt ered.

H R SALISBURY:

For some days discussion had been under way regarding the seeming necessity of releasing J L Shaw from India on account of his health, and the necessity of providing strong help for that difficult mission field. No action had been taken although agreement had been reached.

It was felt that Professor Salisbury and wife were really meded in a field like India, and Professor Salisbury brought word that notwithstanding the interest that he felt in the plans of the Educational Department just under way, he and his wife felt that they should leave the matter to the decision of the brethren. It was therefore—

VOTED, That it is the conviction of the Committee that Professor and Mrs H R Salisbury should be invited to make India their field of labor, Brother Salisbury to take the superintendency of the India Union Mission.

J L SHAW--EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT:

VOTED, That Professor J L Shaw, formerly of the India Union Mission, be invited to take the secretaryship of the Educational Department of the General Conference, made vacant by the call of Professor Salisbury to the mission field.

Adjourned.

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

June 17, 1913

Prayer by J L Shaw.

BRITISH GUIANA:

Dr Menkel was present, with Elder Boger, and the appointment of C E Boynton to British Guiana, held up by the medical certificate, was again gone into. Under the circumstances of the work described by Brother Boger, Dr Menkel felt that the physical condition of Elder Boynton need not necessarily stand in the way, though he would not think it wise for him to go into a decidedly tropical climate. It was therefore,—

VOTED, That we rescind the invitation to G A Roberts, of Arizona, not having heard from him, and that C E Boynton be again placed under appointment for British Guiana, if he is willing, -as reported, to assume responsibility healthwise.

HARVEST INGATHERING:

It was agreed that the Harvest Ingathering Review should be dated October 4, and that the first period of the Ingathering Campaign should be set for October 6 to 10, it being understood that this would fit the arrangements of the North American Division Committee.

W W PRESCOTT'S WORK:

A joint committee informally appointed some time ago, representing the General Conference, the North American Division Conference, and the Review and Herald, reported concerning W W Prescott 's future work, in view of the discontinuance of the General Conference Religious Liberty Department.

The committee reported a line of work in connection with the Protestant Magazine and the Protestant campaign calls, including also general and institute work in the North American Division and the general Conference, and it was--

VOTED, To approve of the recommendation of the joint committee as regards the work of W W Prescott, the Review and Herald to bear one half the salary rate, the General Conference and the North American Division to bear one quarter each, this arrangement being accepted so far as the General Conference is concerned.

PROFESSOR LEON CAVINESS! WORK:

VOTED, That W T Knox, M E Kern, G B Thompson, and E R Palmer be a committee to make recommendation concerning the work of Professor Leon Caviness in connection with the Protestant Magazine and other lines of work.

D C BABCOCK'S RETURN:

It having been agreed early in the year that D C Babcock should be allowed to come from West Africa to the General Conference by way of British Guiana, in order that his wife might visit her own people, it was--

VOTED, That on the return of D C Babcock to the Canary Islands to join Elder Conradi toward the end of the year in Africa, he be allowed to make the journey by way of British Guiana and the Canary Islands.

VOTED, That we advise the General Conference Corporation to loan the Southern Union Conference Association \$2,500, needed in meeting obligations due on account of the Nashville Sanitarium, with the understanding that in the disbursement of the five per cent income for institutions from the twenty-cent-a-week fund, the Corporation be reimbursed.

TWENTY-CENT-A-WEEK FUND:

VOTED, That A G Daniells and W T Knox be a committee to prepare a strong appeal urging the neces sity for early and united action an the part of all union conferences composing the North American Division Conference in raising the mission fund to the proposed average of twenty cents a week per member for 1913.

ANOL GRUNDBET:

POTED, That we allow a furlough rate of \$14 per week to Anol Grundset, for two months following the close of the General Conference:

H HANSEN:

VOTED, That \$100 be appropriated out of the special appropriation to the North American Foreign Department for the transportation of H Hansen from Utah to Deaver, Colo.

KOREA:

Request was made for assistance to provide a suitable library for the Korean Publishing House. Similar requests having been received from other mission fields, they were referred to W T Knox, N Z Town, and E R Palmer as a committee to give the question further study and bring in a recommendation.

HORSE AND BUGGY FOR MISS BURROWAY:

VOTED, That we approve of an appeal being made by the dritor of the Youth's Instructor for the children to unite in providing a horse and buggy for Miss Della Burroway, such conveyance being greated needed in carrying forward her work among the schools in East Bengal, India.

LEON W CAVINESS:

The committee appointed to arrange for Professor Leon W Caviness' work submitted the following:--

That Professor Caviness give half his time to the Foreign Mission Seminary, and that the expense be divided on the same proportion as Professor Prescott's time.

WOTED, To accept the report of the committee with this change in the division of the expenses, namely, that one hald be assumed by the Seminary, one fourth by the Review and Herald, and one fourth by the North American Division Conference.

HOME MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT:

The committee appointed to draft recommendation providing for the work of the Home Missionary department, in harmony with an action of the recent General Conference, submitted the following:--

- 1. That Miss Edith Graham be appointed secretary of this department.
- 2: That the tithe of the Review and Herald Publishing Association, which is paid to the General Conference, be appropriated for the support of this department.

- 3. That the Home Missionary department be associated with the General Conference Publishing department, as a branch of its work
- 4. That a general Home Missionary Campaign be inaugurated as soon as proper literature can be selected or provided for that purpose, in order to give form and impetus to the work of this department from its very beginning.

SPECIAL LITERATURE FOR HOME MISSIONARY CAMPAIGN:

- We recommend, 1. That the Berrien Library be enlarged to include a greater range of subjects dealing directly with the third angel's message, including such books as "Our Paradise Home," "Steps to Christ," "His Glorious Appearing," "Capital and Labor," etc.
- 2. That these numbers, bound in paper only, be sold at 10 cents, 15 cents, and 25 cents per copy, and that they be handled on the same discounts as Home Workers' books, except that they will be provided in any quantity to all our people at the net prices, 40% below the retail prices.
- 3. That a series of four-page leaflets be issued for free distribution, to be sold, if possible, at \$1.00 per thousand, with a wholesale discount of 30%, one half of the discount being allowed to the publishing houses and their branches, and the other half to conference tract societies.
- 4. That a movement be organized to distribute a series of message-filled leaflets simultaneously in many languages, and in all parts of the world, on the following general plan:--
- (a) Arrange a series of about twelve important subjects covering the leading points of our faith.
- (b) Issue one leaflet a month from our principal publishing centers, as may be arr anged.
- (c) Have a plan thoroughly organized and developed so that orders will be received from tract socities and individuals before the date of going to press.
- (d) Secure the cooperation of all churches and desolated members in giving this document a free distribution in all communities where our people live.

- (e) Publish this document in a four-page sheet about the size of the Youth's Instructor.
- (f) Have it entered as a periodical, if possible, so as to save expense and time in shipping.
- (g) Produce at the lowest possible cost, and furnish at about thirty cents a hundred, with 20% discount, one half being allowed to branch houses, and the other half to conference tract societies.
- (h) That the Review and Herald Publishing Association be asked to produce the series of literature above mentioned, but that all other publishers be given full opportunity to republish or secure plates.

Adjourned.

HARVEST INGATHERING:

The question of plans for the next year's Ingathering number was introduced. First, E R Palmer reported the encouraging flow of orders for the present number. A half million copies had been printed, and only 16,000 copies are now on hand. A new edition is on the press, of 70,000 copies.

A communication was presented from the Pacific Press Publishing Association, making request that the medium for the 1914 campaign be either the monthly or the weekly <u>Signs</u>.

E.R.Palmer, for the Review and Herald, stated that this house had put in no special request in the matter, but felt that whatever was deemed best in the interests of the campaign itself should be the plan.

R.D.Quinn spoke of the educational value of the work, both as regards spreading information before the public and the development of missionary activity among our own people.

Allen Moon reported much interest in the campaign in the Lake Union, and he believed greater results would come from the effort this year.

O. Montgomery, of the Southeastern Union, urged that yet greater effort be made to press the campaign. He believed its possibilities in the raising of funds to be very great. He had found among his workers rather an impression that the Review, as the church paper, was the most appropriate organ for presenting our mission work before the people.

R.A.Underwood spoke of plans in the Columbia Union for pushing the campaign by use of a printed collecting envelope, inviting gifts, to be left in the homes with the paper, the worker to call a second time. He felt that the medium itself mattered little, good results having come from the use of both Review and Signs.

The chairman urged that now was the time to plan for a great effort in 1914, suggesting that a goal be set for a million copies of the Ingathering number in 1914. For the sake of letting the world know how God is working in this movement, we should plan for a larger undertaking.

I.H.Evans suggested that we set our stakes also to get a far larger amount. This year we have set \$100,000 as the mark. He urged that union and state workers watch plans in use locally that prove to be of spec ial service, reporting these plans at headquarters, so that they may be put into effect generally if desirable, so that another year the campaign might be entered into with more definite aim. It might be that \$200,000 for missions could be reached in the course of two or three years, with definite policies and united effort.

R.T.Dowsett, of the Columbia Union, read the printing on the envelope prepared by the Comumbia Union Committee, as follows:--

ONE MILLION DOLLARS FOR MISSIONS

AFreely ye have received, freely give. "

The fall of 1913 presents another opportunity to share our abundant blessings with those less fortunate and who have never heard of the Saviour.

W.T.Knox expressed his appreciation of the work of the Pacific Press in promoting the 1912 campaign. He was of greater courage than ever over the outlook for the campaign this year, in view of the action of the Conferences in placing conference workers among the churches to organize the effort. He believed a million copies of a number might be so placed as to bring even larger returns than had been suggested. He suggested that workers take the same territory from year to year so that a measure of acquaintanceship might be developed in meeting the people.

Allen Moon said, in illustration of the advantage of working over the same territory, that Elder Covert had been visiting the same people year after year and last year he galitered about \$250. At the beginning of his visiting this year some people would meet him with the question, "Well, how much do you want this year?"

E.K. Slade approved of the remarks that had been made as to greater efficiency in the use of the papers. He urged the preparation of a pamphlet of instructions.

R T.Baar reported excellent results in the Chesapeake Conference at the opening of this year's campaign.

Chas Thompson urged that provision be made to supply a missions number for use by the German and Scandinavian communities.

It was suggested that the regular journals being issued in these tongues plan a special missions number to come out at the same season.

E E Andross reported efforts in the Pacific Union to reach larger returns this year than ever before, one conference aiming at an average of \$50 for each laborer and \$5 for each member.

R. Hook, of the Southern Publishing Association, stated that if the magazine form was acceptable, the <u>Watchman</u> <u>Magazine</u> would be glad to be considered.

Various brethren spoke of the medium to be used, and it was-

VOTED, That the Chair appoint a committee of seven to take the matter of the Ingathering Campaign for 1914 under consideration, and to report.

voted, That W.Ehlers be considered as on furlough from Brazil, and contemplating a return as soon as able, his furlough rate be put on the Brazil Union estimates.

T M FRENCH-WEST AFRICA:

T M French having suggested leaving the West African school work to enter evangelistic work elsewhere, in view of L R Conradi's approaching visit to West Africa, it was-

The fifth meeting of the Council was called at 9:30, October 19. A G Daniells in the chair.

ADDITIONAL PRESENT:

Prayer by R A Underwood; and minutes were read.

ACTION OF WASHINGTON SANITARIUM BOARD:

W T Knox presented a request which had come from the Washington Sanitarium Board. Explaining the efforts of the local board to work its way out of their financial difficult ies, Elder Knox stated that request was made as follows:--

That the Review and Herald Board and the Pacific Press Board be invited to undertake to provide by appropriation for the interest account of the Washington Sanitarium, amounting to about \$7,000 per year, this assistance to be continued a series of years, a peridd of five years being suggested.

On motion that this request be made of the publishing houses named, the matter was discussed by various members, E R Palmer and C H Jones favoring the idea of institutions giving such assistance to sister institutions, but feeling that the publishing boards which they represented would be obliged to make any vote in aid year by year, not pledging themselves onconditionally for a five-year period.

The chairman spoke of the great work the Hamburg Pyblishing House has done in aiding other needy institutions.

The motion carried.

MISSIONARY VOLUNTEER DEPARTMENT:

Missionary Volunteer Department matters were taken up, M.E Kern, the secretary, introducing the topics. First was the importance of training workers for effectual leadership, in order that the youth may be saved from drifting out of the

truth and into the world. The department appealed for secretaries in the conferences who are fitted to do the work and who may be continued in the service, without such frequent changes as in the past.

Miss Exickson stated that at present most union secretaries had other work taking so much time that little special attention can be given to this department. The speaker illustrated by statistical reports the advantages of having permanent leaders engaged in the work.

C L Benson also spoke, emphasizing the value of the young people's work in saving souls and accomplishing service. Since 1905 the young people's organizations have raised over \$100,000 for missions. He urged the holding of institutes for the training of leaders in this work.

Miss Graham presented a report of Australia's young people's work, showing that the plan of assigning a worker definitely and solely to this work brings large returns in converting the youth and bringing them into church membership, as well as in work done by the youth's organization.

I H Evans urged that most earnest attention be given to the saving of the young people to the cause through this department.

The chairman stated that as to being compelled to choose between going on after new converts and neglecting our own children, the choise should be to save the children who have first claims upon us.

VOTED, That a committee of three be appointed to study this matt er and bring in a report.

EDUCATION OF CANDIDATES FOR MINISTRY:

The Educational Department Committee appointed at the General Conference to prepare recommendations regarding training of candidates for the ministry made a report, which was adopted as follows:--

For the purpose of encouraging young men to study for the gospel ministry, and in order that our evangelical work may be strengthened,—

We recommend, 1. That our conferences and schools urge young men who are looking toward the ministry to finish either a ministerial or literary course in one of our denominational schools.

- 2. That conferences in licensing young men to the ministry require at least the completion of an academic course of twelve grades in one of our schools, or its equivalent.
- 3. That young men who are now licensed ministers who have not completed the academic course be urged to pursue studies in our training schools, or in the Fireside Correspondence School, with a view to reaching this educational standard before ordination.
- 4. That a reading course for ministers be prepared each year by the General Conference Department of Education, in counsel with the General and North American Division Conference Committees, and that the course shall be conducted by the General Conference Department of Education.

Your committee to report on the Harvest Ingathering Campaign for 1914 would respectfully submit the following:

- 1. That the Review and Herald be the publication to be used in the 1914 campaign.

- 3. That we undertake to raise during the campaign the sum of \$250,000 for foreign mission work.
- Scandinavian periodicals publish a special for their respective nationals, containing such portions of the reading matter and cuts from the English campaign number as seems advisable, and that the foreign churches be encouraged to use these special during the harvest ingathering.

THIRTIETH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

Oct. 21, 1913, 9:30 A.M.

The eighth meeting of the Council was called at 9:30 A M, October 21, with A G Daniells in the chair.

Prayer by F M Wilcox and A G Daniells. Minutes of two previous sessions were read.

STATISTICAL:

The committee appointed to report on the manner of reporting members and isolated Sabbath-keepers in our statistical reports made a report, which was adopted as follows:--

- 1. That Sabbath-keepers not received into church fellowship be carefully looked after and their names recorded for local use, but that these do not appear in the General Conference statistical reports.
- 2. That in our General Conference statistics we eliminate columns 6 -- 9, known as "companies," company "member-ship," "isolated Sabbath-keepers," and "total Sabbath-keepers."
- 3. That we advise that the scattered baptized believers, whether isolated or in company groups, be organized into a conference or mission field church.

VOTED, That in making up our statistics the per capita tithe be reckoned on the basis of church membership.

VOTED, That we recommend that the money raised for Sabbath-school expenses in our churches be reported as a part of the local church expense.

VOTED, That we eliminate from the statistical report column 27 (total Sabbath-school contributions), the same figures appearing, as the schools now operate, in column 28 ("Contributions to foreign missions.")

HOME MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT:

Miss Graham presented an outline of work done to encourage home missionary activity in the churches. She presented

a series of "Lessons for Home Missionary Institutes," prepared by the department, and asked counsel as to how to bring these lessons before the churches.

The Council reviewed the first lessons in the series, and asked Miss Graham to give a summary of the topics studied.

The chairman stated his belief that if the rank and file are to be set working, it can be done only by training elders and leaders in the local churches; and only by getting these together in institutes can this training be done.

F M Wilcox referred to the instruction that what is needed is not so much mere preaching to the churches as the training of the churches in service.

W J Stone told of efforts made in this work in Virginia. He longed to see the fulfillment of the description—"thousands of our people going everywhere."

C W Flaiz suggested that an army must be trained in detail practice. Just so it must be in the church missionary work. He believed these institute lessons would be a great help.

N Z Town believed that with the organization of this work and instruction of members the same results would be seen in this that have been brought about in the book work.

E R Palmer said that every advance step in work has been by organization, consecration, and detailed instruction and training.

R D Quinn felt that the greatest proposition before us was to launch this campaign for organizing all the churches for active work.

Chas Thompson felt that the provision of work for young people was an important feature—to keep new converts and others busy in the work as a means of keeping up spiritual life.

E T Russell said that all recognized that the churches were languishing from inactivity. While we are circulating more literature than ever before, this is mainly done by a few. He believed the outline presented the instruction needed to call into action latent forces everywhere.

L H Christian said that four years ago the Danish department organized a Danish Tract and Missionary Society, and it has stimulated new activity among the Danish believers.

Dr Kress expressed appreciation of the outline, and said he believed it a most important enterprise.

W W Eastman said it encouraged the publishing men to see such a movement inaugurated. He felt the load cry of the message was the people.

VOTED, That these outlines be adopted as the basis for an instruction booklet, subject to such revision as may be made by a committee to be appointed by the General Conference Committee.

PLAN FOR TRAINING SECRETARIES:

Miss Graham presented a plan for training conference tract and missionary secretaries (including also Missionary Volunteer secretaries), as follows:--

The General Conference has from time to time recommended that secretaries be trained to fill the various places of responsibility in our conference offices. While something has been done to carry out the recommendations, no very general or definite effort has been made.

To effectively train secretaries for the conference tract society, and Missionary Volunteer departments, the following plan is submitted for your consideration:--

- 1. That in the tract societies in our large conference, from one to three persons be employed, in addition to the regular staff. These persons to be promising young men and women, from twenty-one years of age upward, or old enough to carry responsibility after two or three years' training. That preferably they be selected from those who have graduated from the business courses in our academies and colleges and have had experience in the canvassing field.
- 2. That these persons be very definitely informed that they are to be trained to carry responsibilities, and that their promotion will depend entirely on the way they develop and adapt themselves to the work. They should distinctly understand that they are on probation, and that if it is found that they are not suited to the work, they will not be kept in it.
- 3. That a small wage be paid them, sufficient for them to live on, but on the basis that they are apprentices, receiving training, and not regularly employed workers.

4. That they put half time in the field, selling periodicals and "Home Worker's Books," all profits on the sales going to the organization which pays their wages.

That territory be reserved for them in the territory where the tract society office is located. That they receive instruction in this work from the field missionary agent, and that it be regarded as part of their training.

- 5. That the other half of each day be spent in the conference office, each worker to be taught in turn bookkeeping, typewriting, the detail work of the conference tract society, and missionary volunteer department, the tract society secretary and the missionary volunteer secretary acting as instructors.
- 6. That the tract society and Missionary volunteer secretaries use their time saved by the employment of these persons on their detail work, in field work with our people.
- 7. That as far as possible provision be made for vacancies in the conference offices to be filled by persons so trained.
- 8. That when possible these persons act as assistant missionary leaders, or assistant missionary secretaries, and in other church offices, in the churches near the office, in order that they may have practical experience in church work.

This plan would not be expensive to a tract society if carefully managed. The sale of twenty magazines a day for five days in the week would bring in a profit of \$6 to the society. The expenses would be small, merely local car fares. It would not be always necessary that one half of each day should be spent in the field. In some cases alternate days might suit better, or the first half of the week. This would be immaterial, so long as the average of half time each week was maintained.

When the "Home Workers" Books" were used, saled amounting to \$15 for five days' work would give a profit of \$6. These sales would not be high, and they should reach to more than what is here suggested. If rightly managed, this work should be a source of profit to the tract society offices in actual cash returns, as well as by giving time to the tract society secretaries to go to the field to work up business.

This plan would turn out all-round workers, trained in field work, and in all details of office work, and having knowledge of church work. Such training would test their real love and ability for the work.

There are graduated from the business courses of our colleges and academies, year by year, a large number of well educated, intelligent, consecrated young people. They have mastered the theory of bookkeeping, shorthand, typewriting, and business forms. But they need the practical training that can be given only in actually doing the work in some office. Consequently many of them take up other lines of work, and very many drift into worldly occupation. If, through this plan, such young people could be taken into our conference offices, and their theoretical knowledge developed into practical efficiency, there would be no lack of well qualified workers to fill vacancies in any place that calls for trained business ability. There is a gapt between the education in our schools and practical efficiency in service that can only be bridged by training in practical work.

Our conferences plan for training young men for the ministry, and young men and women for the Bible work. Would it not be an advantage to the cause for them, through their tract society offices to also plan for training young men and women for positions which require business ability, combined with a know-ledge of field and church work.

The plan was spoken to by Erethren Bourdeau, MacGuire, Palmer, Eastman, Olsen, Underwood, McElhaney, Andross, C H Jones, J J Ireland, N Z Town, Dr Kress, Miss Erickson.

VOTED, That we approve of the plan in general, and that we encourage union conferences to arrange to put it into operation in local conferences where proper instruction can be given.

SUSTENTATION FUND:

VOTED, That the Chair appoint a committee of three persons to review the Sustention list and rates as at present operating.

THIRTY-FIRST MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

Oct. 22, 1913, 8:30 A.M.

The ninth meeting of the Council was held at 8:30 A.M., October 22, with A G Daniells in the chair.

HARVESTING INGATHERING REVIEW:

The treasurer reported that orders for the Ingathering Review were coming in rapidly, and that more papers would be needed.

VOTED, That a third edition of 50,000 copies be ordered.

EQUALIZATION OF WAGES:

The committee on equalization of wage made a report, which after discussion and amendment was adopted as follows:-

REPORT ON BASIS OF EQUALIZATION OF WAGE:

Your committee appointed to study the problem of placing on a just, equitable, and uniform basis the remuneration of all our people employed in the organized work, submit the following report:--

First, Our Findings: From the information we have been able to gather, we find that the cost of living for the same standard of personal and household expenditure, is about the same thoughtout the world. That is to say, in every country, the necessities of life such as food, clothing, rents, fuel, etc., can be secured at approximately the same cost. The same is true regarding luxuries. This uniformity is no doubt brought about by railway and steamship service, governmental legislation, trades unions, manufacturer's combinations and trusts, etc.

Second, Our Convictions: 1. We believe that the remuneration of all who are employed in our organizations and institutions should be placed on a missionary basis. By missionary basis, we mean remuneration sufficient to provide a fair, reasonable support without regard to the remuneration that might be secured from the world.

- 2. We believe that the remuneration of all should be equitable and just to all; that there should be no discrimination in favor of a certain class, nor against those whose line of work does not yield large direct returns in money. Faithful, painstaking, efficient workers in every part of the world, and in every line of work should receive a remuneration that will be fair and equitable as between man and man.
- 3. We believe that men of the same length of service, degree of efficiency, and bearing responsibilities of equal importance in any line of work in our cause, should be rewarded alike, due regard being paid to varying local conditions.

We advise that a sliding scale of remuneration be adopted fixing a general minimum for those just entering upon their lines of work, the increase to be made on the basis of length of service, faithfulness, efficiency and responsibilities borne.

We suggest the following rates:-Licensed Bible workers, from \$6.00 to \$12.00.
Licensed ministers, from \$8.00 to \$13.00.
Ordained ministers, from \$14.00 to \$18.00.

We recognize the fact that in exceptional cases the requirements of city work may call for the employment in a conference of an evangelist who is expected to take responsibilities and bear burdens of a special nature, in which case the rate of wage might rightly be equal to that of the president of the conference.

Presidents of local conferences, from \$15 to \$20.

Presidents of Union conferences, from \$18 to \$22.

Presidents of Division conferences, \$22 ro \$24.

President of General Conference, \$23 to \$25.

Secretary and Treasurer of General Conference, \$21 to 23

Secretary and Treasurer and Vice-president Division
Conference, \$20 to \$22.

Heads of 14 and 16 grade schools, from \$16 to \$22.

Assistant physicians, from \$12 to \$20.

Medical superintendents, from \$18 to \$22.

The institution to meet expenses for such post-graduate work, medical fees, and medical literature as may be agreed upon.

Business manager publishing houses, from \$18 to \$22.

Business manager Sanitariums, from \$15 to \$22.

Business manager colleges, from \$15 to \$20.

Heads of college departments, (men), \$14 to \$18.

Heads of college departments (women), \$10 to \$15.

Principals 10 and 12 grade schools, \$12 to \$18.

We recommend that our college boards and union conference committees provide summer employment for the heads of college departments, and other experienced teachers.

We believe that the remuneration in every branch of the cause should be the same as for laborers bearing equal responsibilities. We believe that the time and means devoted by our believing young people to getting a qualification for service in this cause, whether in higher educational, medical, or evangelistica lines, is properly to be considered a gift on their part to the cause of God for the sake of being of the greater service, and not as an investment from which a higher rate of mage is to be drawn.

We counsel union and local conference committees and institutional boards to take up this matter in counsel with the workers, in cases where present rates paid would place any institution or organization out of line with other departments of the cause. We believe that the blessing of God will be upon

those, who, at sacrifice of whatever the professional standards of the world may offer, devote their gifts to the interests of this closing message with the same disregard of worldly standards that continually moves men and women in every profession to come to us year by year from the world asking only how their lives and their service may best advance the cause of truth.

We believe that the experienced union conference president, the experienced college president, the experienced medical superintendent of a leading sanitarium, the experienced manager of a leading publishing house, and the experienced manager of a leading sanitarium, rank equally as to responsibilities borne in the denominational work.

In recognition, however, of the time and expense involved in taking the medical course—the regular practitioner being compelled as a condition to entering upon work to meet the legal standards set by states and governments—we advise that 10 % be added to the wage schedules set for regularly employed physicians. It is understood that these rates do not apply to interns.

On Commissions and Family Fates: Since the schedule of remuneration of workers is based on the necessaries of life, time of service and efficiency, we recommend,—

- 1. That a flat wage rate be paid all physicians, and that we consider the payment of fees and commissions, and the privilege of part time for private practice to physicians, is out of harmony with the missionary basis of remuneration.
- 2. That commissions and fees received by all persons employed be reported as receipts on wage, with cash donations and payments for private tuition, such receipts to be reported and credited to the respective conferences or institutions.
- That where a man and wife are engaged in any department of our organized work, whether in the same institution or organization or otherwise, their united wage scale should be on the same missionary basis, and not equivalent to two full; salary rates.

Various Items: It is understood that these rates are fixed on the basis of no allowances for traveling, save transportation expenses and the cost of room and bed in hotel or elsewhere, no allowance being made for food expenses.

We recommend that our sanitariums do not arrange for the medical work of an institution to be done by a physician from without, having a private business of his own, but that the medical work be in the hands of a physician wholly in the employ of the sanitarium.

The study of the basis of remuneration in this work having led to consideration of the matter of author's remuneration for books published by the denomination, we recommend that the General Conference Committee appoint a commission to give study to this question and to report at a later council.

On Auditing: In harmony with the plan to secure greater uniformity in fixing the basis of remuneration of workers in the cause, we recommend:—

- 1. That the General Conference Committee work out a uniform basis for adjusting wages to apply to workers employed by the Committee, and in General Conference mission fields, and to be recommended to other fields not included in Division conferences.
- 2. That the General Conference Committee appoint representatives to meet in council with the Division auditing committees in their work, so that the Division may keep fully in touch with the general plan and standards.
- 3. That, for the same reason, it be advised that the Division Conferences appoint representatives to meet with the union auditing boards.
- 4. That the union conferences be advised to make provision for representatives of the union to meet with local conference auditing committees in order to help to secure the desired general uniformity.
- 5. That institutional boards be advised to call local or union conference committees to meet with them for counsel in adjusting rates in harmony with the plan to secure a uniform basis of wage, Divisional representatives also being called in counsel wherever possible.

On Applying the Schedule: Having given the matter assigned us as thomgugh investigation and as careful, extended counsel as our time and circumstances have made possible, we submit this report as an expression of our best judgment regarding a fair, just, equitable remuneration for all who are giving their lives to this work. We believe that the scale here recommended is a close approximate to the standard that should be adopted throughout the field. Time, care, and good judgment should be exercised in making the adjustments necessary to conform to this scale, these actions, like all other actions in our work, being recommendatory and not arbitrary in their nature.

The tenth meeting of the council was called at 10 A.M., October 23. A G Dabiells in the chair. Prayer by E T Russell. Minutes were read.

MISSIONARY VOLUNTEER DEPARTMENT:

The report of the committee on Missionary Volunteer work was presented and adopted as follows:--

Whereas, The work for our young people is of the utmost importance to their salvation, and to the development of workers for the cause; and,—

Whereas, The success of this work depends very largely on the strength of our Missionary Volunteer leadership; therefore, --

Resolved, 1. (a) That all our conferences put forth special efforts to secure persons of high qualifications to act as Missionary Volunteer secretaries,—persons who are strong spiritual leaders, and who have a special adaptability for dealing with the youth.

- (b) That such secretaries who have reasonable success in their work be retained in office long enough to put the missionary work on a solid footing.
- (c) That Missionary Volunteer secretaries and those who contemplate entering this work be encouraged to take the course of study to be given for them through the Fireside Correspondence School.
- We recommend, 2. (a) That in the union conference, one person act as Educational and Missionary Volunteer secretary, and that the work be so arranged that half time will be given to each department.
- (b) That conferences with a membership of 1500 or more endeavor to provide a Missionary Volunteer secretary. Who shall give his entire time to the work.

- (c) That conferences with a membership of less that 1500 elect one person who shall divide his time equally between the Eeducational and the Missionary Volunteer work.
- 3. That special attention be given to our young people's work at our union conference sessions this season,--
- (a) By the presence of a representative from the General or North American Division Conference Missionary Volunteer Defartments.
 - (b) By encouraging the local conferences to send their Missionary Volunteer secretaries as delegates to the union conferences, and that they spend an hour each day with the General or North American Division Missionary Volunteer secretary in institute work.
- 4. That we encourage the holding of Missionary Volunteer institutes this winter at such times and places as can be suitably arranged, and that as far as possible, the conference presidents and nearby workers attend these meetings.

Whereas, The plan of publishing lessons for our Missionary Volunteer and Junior society meetings in the Youth's Instructor and Little Friend has proved unsatisfactory, inasmuch as all members have the same matter in hand a week before the meeting; therefore,—

<u>Resolved</u>. 5. That the General and North American Division Conference Committees provide some means of getting these lessons into the hands of Missionary Volunteer leaders and Missionary Volunteer secretaries.

We recommend, G. That our union and local conferences send their Missionary Volunteer secretaries to the Educational and Missionary Volunteer Convention to be held in the summer of 1914.

Adjourned.

Some time was devoted to the plan of work of the Commission and the manner in which the report of the Commission is to be ac ted upon by the institutional board.

VOTED, That the question of the first institution to be visited following the council be left to the decision of the members of the Commission and the North American Division Conference Committee.

W T Knox was asked to formulate the suggestions as to the Commission's duties and relations in a statement for adoption as a matter of record.

VOTED, That we instruct the General Conference Corporation to make a loan of \$10,000 to Mrs E G White, on such terms as may be arranged as to time of passing the money, and the taking of securities on book royalties accruing at the Review and Herald Publishing Office.

F G LANE:

A lett er was received from Elder F G Lane, from Barbados, saying that the serious illness of his wife on the boat and in Barbados, while on the return journey to Venezuela, had tall the medical advisers to insist that Sister Lane should be taken out of the tropics for at least two years. He was therefore compelled regretfully to return to this country.

VOTED, That we ask the North American Division to find a place for Brother Lane, of Venezuela, among some of the conferences in America.

J S JAMES:

The Committee had before it the matter of Elder J S James! efforts to provide some way to leave his two boys in this country to attend school, while he and Mrs. James return to India. Under the general regulation for children, an allowance of \$50 would be granted him in the field on account of the second child. It was—

VOTED, That, considering the special circumstances further help be given in this case, granting the \$50 allowance for the other child as well.

AUSTRALIAN CANDIDATES FOR CHINA:

A lett er was received from Elder F A Allum, reporting that he had secured two workers for China, one an experienced book man, the other an evangelist. The Publishing Department had asked Elder Allum to watch for some good men in Australia, and evidently Brother Allum from the letter had understood this to be authorization to arrange for the help to go forward. Excellent selections had been made, without a doubt, and Australasia in its desire to help China had agreed to take up a special Sabbath offering to provide the transportation of the two couples to the China field.

In view of the financial pressure upon the mission treasury, it was felt, however, that even with this assistance, only one of these couples could be sent forward at this time, unless Australasia could step into the breach and provide salary for one of the workers for a year. It was—

VOTED, That we express our appreciation and thanks to the Australasian Union for the release of two strong workers with their wives for China, and for the arrangement made to raise the money to pay their transportation to the field. But in view of the heavy pressure upon the Mission Board, making the support of two new workers in China a seeming impossibility, we invite the Australasian Union to supply the salary of the second worker for the first year.

C E MOON:

VOTED, That in view of the report of two workers for China being secured in Australia, we rescind the action appointing C E Moon and wife, of the Foreign Seminary, to China.

J P ANDERSON'S ACCOUNT:

VOTED, That we authorize the treasurer to allow the account of J P and Mrs Anderson for traveling expenses in this country while on furlough, and that the treasurer be asked to give instruction in future cases as to traveling expenses of workers on furlough from foreign fields, so that the same may be arr anged for in counsel with the Committee.

MISS E M GRAHAM'S TRANSPORTATION:

VOTED, That the treasurer be authorized to allow the transportation expenses of Miss E M Graham, of the Home Missionary Department, from Australia to the United States.

F B JEWELL -- SOUTH AFRICA:

VOTED, That F B Jewell, accompanying M C Sturdevant to the Tsungwesi Mission, be granted \$150 outfitting allowance.

BRAZIL TENT:

VOTED, That the appropriation to Brazil be increased by \$100, on account of a tent for the East Brazil Mission for which money is being raised by the young people in California

"Steps to Christ," if called upon to do so, to furnish cuts at cost of production, for use in editions for the native vernaculars of Africa.

MRS W S AND MISS HELEN HYATT:

Elder W B White reported that after eighteen years in the field, Elder Hyatt's wife, and Miss Helen Hyatt, for eight or nine years teacher in the South African Union training-school, greatly desired a change and furlough for a visit to the home land

VOTED, That we grant transportation for Mrs. W S Hyatt and Miss Helen Hyatt from South Africa to the United States and return, in order that they may secure a change and furlough.

NAOMI ANDERSON'S TRANSPORTATION:

The treasurer presented an item of L 30, being the account of transportation expense of Naomi Anderson, daughter of W H Anderson, of Barotseland, South Africa, who returned to this country at the time of the last General Conference to live with her people and to att end school in the United States.

VOTEX, That the treasurer be authorized to allow the account.

DR HAYTON'S QUALIFICATION EXPENSES:

The treasurer informed the Committee that the account of Dr C H Hayton's expenses and family allowance while qualifying for British practice in Edinburgh amounted to about \$3,000. In accordance with the plan adopted by the General Conference, this amount is held as a debit against Dr Hayton, but the action provides for the field which secures the services of such workers to take over the account, refunding a certain portion each year so long as the laborer is engaged in denominational work at missionary rate.

VOTED, That we ask the British Union to accept the transfer of the account of funds advanced to Dr Hayton in order for him to secure qualification for British practice, in accordance with the plan outlined in such cases.

FUNERAL EXPENSE -- EVELYN LOTHROP:

VOTED, That the General Conference treasurer be authorized to refund to the Washington Sanitarium \$143, on account of the funeral expense of Sister Evelyn Lothrop, of the Foreign Seminary, who at the time of her death last summer was under appointment to the Philippine Islands.

HOSPITAL FOR CHINA:

The following letter was presented, having been addressed to the treasurer after conferences of the writer with J W Christian and J L Shaw during the latter's visit to College View: ---

"College View, Neb., Nov. 9, 1913.

"Elder W T Knox, Takoma Park, D.C.

Dear Brother:-

"I am in favor of the proposition to put up a hospital in Shanghai, China, to cost \$5000. I am agreeable to financing the same under the following conditions: \$1000 is to be paid by the General Conference to offset the \$1000 which I gave last year; \$1000 I am giving now; \$1000 in July of next year; \$1000 in July, 1915; and \$1000 in July 1916, the understanding being that money be advanced in some way by the General Conference so that the hospital can be built without waiting for my two final payments.

"Yours sincerely, (Signed) James Schee.

VOTED, That we agree to the proposition submitted by Brother J L Shaw in behalf of Brother James Scheel and that we instruct the General Conference Corporation to advance the amount named as its portion, and that the Asiatic Division be authorized to lay plans for the carrying forward of a hospital building enterprise in connection with the headquarters at Shanghai, the hospital to be known as the "Schee Hospital." This arrangement is entered into with the understanding that the hospital be ready for occupancy before the end of 1914.

CHURCH OFFICERS! PERIODICAL:

A report was received from the committee appointed in harmony with the action of the autumn council, to consider the question of a periodical for church officers. The report was adopted as follows:—

- We recommend, 1. That a monthly periodical be established, to bring before the officers in our churches the weekly programs of the Missionary Volunteer Society and the monthly programs of the Home Missionary Society, together with such instruction as the North American Divsion and the General Conference officers may wish to place before the local church officers, including matter heretofore sent to the church officers in circular letters from the departments, so far as it may be practicable to send this out through this medium.
- 2. That the subject matter for this paper be strictly limited to instruction to church officers.
- 3. That our general papers continue carrying for the various departments of work the subject matter which has been provided heretofore for the instruction and encouragement of the general church membership.
- 4. That the circulation be limited to church clubs or individual subscriptions for officers and isolated members, this journal in the nature of the case being not intended for general circulation.
- 5. That the officers of the various departments of the General and the North American Division Conference take the responsibility of building up the circulation of the periodical.
- 6. That the Review and Herald Publishing Asdociation be asked to handle the mechanical work, and to assume the financial responsibility in the publishing of the journal.
- 7. That the price of the paper be 50 cents single subscription, and 35 cents in clubs of two or more to one address.
- 8. That the office editors be Miss E M Graham and Miss Matilda Erickson, and that the department sections be conducted by the respective department officers and the general church department by the North American Division officers.
- 9. That the Division, union, and local conferences endeavor to place clubs in their churches or companies by securing subscriptions from the various church officers or from the church for its officers.

and the Missionary Volunteer Departments give special attention to keeping up the subscription list.

ll. That the name of the periodical be "The Church Officers' Gazette."

12. That if arrangements can be made the first issue be for January, 1914, containing the January programs.

13. That the North American Division and General Conferences provide \$250 for promoting t he initial circulation.

STUDENT VOLUNTEER CONVENTION:

VOTED, That wh advise that the Young People's Missionary Volunteer secretaries attend the Kansas City Student Volunteer Convention.

H F BENSON:

A communication was received from F H Devinney, of Japan, reporting that the Japan Committee had consented to extend H F Benson's furlough a few months, in order to allow him to complete his college course at Mt Vernon.

VOTED, That, in harmony with the action of the Japan Committee, this extension of furlough time be granted to Elder H F Benson.

F A DETAMORE:

Letter was received from F A Detamore, superintendent of the Malaysian Mission, reporting his desire to return to this country to be married and to return to his field with his family, he having left his children in this country on the death of their mother.

VOTED, That Elder F A Detamore be authorized to return for this purpose at the expense of the mission treasury, and that we invite him to plan his trip so as to get the advantage so far as possible of a portion of the winter season in America, suggesting that he plan to attend also the North Pacific Union Conference and institute for workers, opening February 25.

FLORENCE SHULL:

A communication was received from C H Jones, of the Pacific Press, relating to a call which had come from China for Miss Florence Shull to engage in school and stenographic work at Shanghai.

The Pacific Press brethren felt that while it might be possible to consider such a call a year later, the circumstances of their work were such that it was very undesirable to release Miss Shull at this time, though not refusing to do so.

Understanding the readiness which the Pacific Press has always shown to make any reasonable saarifice in order to release workers needed in the mission fields, it was felt that the statement of the situation by the Press should be given weight.

VOTED, That we withdraw the suggestion of inviting Miss Florence Shull to China at this time.

B C HAAK--ARGENTINA:

A letter was received from B C Haak, making reply for himself and wife, regarding the possibility of a call to South America. After the reading of the letter, it was—

VOTED, That we recommend Elder B C Haak, of Minnesota, to the South American Union, for the presidency of the Argentine Conference, with the request that after receiving our communication, including that of Elder Haak, the Union reply by cable, so that the matter may be settled within the shortest time practicable.

GEO W CASEBEER--FURLOUGH:

A letter was received from Elder Geo W Casebeer, now in Idaho on furlough with his family from Chile, South America. He reported that he and Sister Casebeer were willing to count their furlough terminated in January, and to return to the South America: field.

VOTED, That we recommend Elder Geo W Casebeer and wife to terminate their furlough in January, returning to South American by way of the West Coast, their future field of labor being subject to appointment by the South American Union Committee.

W S CONNOLLY -- GRAND CAYMAN:

West Indies, met with the Committee for counsel. He has been spending years in this country securing an education, having last year graduated from Howard University in Washington. Propositions had been made him looking toward his engaging in the work among the colored people in this country. He had felt, however, the burden on his heart to do something in educational lines for the people of Grand Cayman. Furthermore, he felt that this northern climate was rather severe upon his health, and that he would be able to do better work in the West Indian field.

Under the circumstances of Brother Connolly's long effort to prepare for efficient work, and the years he has spent at his own expense, it seemed to the Committee desirable to allow him to return at once to the islands, without having to spend the winter in this country.

In view of the impossibility in this case of communicating with the West Indian Union, it was-

VOTED, That W S Connolly be advised to return to the island of Grand Cayman, working under the direction of the Conference having supervision of that field, the General Conference paying his transportation to the islands and reimbursing the Jamaica Conference for the salary allowance made on this account for a period of six months, the rate to be fixed by the Jamaica Conference in accordance with the wage paid its laborers, it being understood that the receipts accruing from the school works hall be applied on this special appropriation for salary.

It was understood that the salary allowance might have to be continued to the Jamaica Conference longer than the six months named, unless as is hoped, the income from the school work may be such as to make the school self; supporting.

It was further understood that after the lapse of one year of service with the Jamaica Conference, the General Conference will cancel an account of about \$100 owing by Brother Connolly, on account of advances in the last year of his college work.

Adjourned.

VOTED, That in view of the fact that the General Conference received benefit from the Gargett Estate in Virginia, we accede to the request of the Virginia Conference that one third of the bequest be returned to Virginia for the educational work in that conference.

VOTED, That, in response to the call from Honolulu for a medical man, the General Conference concur in the invitation to Dr P S Kellogg, of St Helena, Calif., to make Honolulu his field of labor, provided in his investigation he feels that he can undertake this work on a self-supporting basis, the General Conference paying transportation to the field.

TRANSPORTATION OF DR W A RUBLE:

VOTED, To allow the transportation of Dr W A Ruble from California to Washington and return, to attend the last General Conference as secretary of the Medical Department.

LOMA LINDA--REQUEST FOR LOAN:

A request was received from Loma Linda, asking for an immediate loan of \$10,000, to meet accounts that were pressing. After discussion of the matt er, the following action was taken:--

VOTED, That the treasurer be asked to reply to the letter from Loma Linda, stating the inability of the General Conference to make the loan requested, giving the reasons as found in the financial situation of the General Conference Corporation itself, and recommending to the Loma Linda Board that they secure the funds from some other source, suggesting as a possible resort the sale of a portion of the farm lands constituting a part of the Loma Linda property.

NORTHERN UNION--FINANCE COMMISSION:

A request was received from the president of the Northern Union, asking that if possible arrangements be made for the Finance Commission to visit the Iowa Sanitarium. In the discussion of the matter, it was felt that with arrangements already made, it would be impossible to take the appointments of the Commission in the South.

SOUTH INDIA:

A letter was received from J S James, reporting a candidate for India in California, whom Brother James desired assigned to the South India field.

It was agreed by the Committee that answer would have to be returned that for the present it seems impossible to give hope of immediate further recruits for India.

PERU REQUESTS:

Letters were received from E L Maxwell, superintendent of the Northwest (South America) Mission Field, urging the need of further laborers in Psru.

VOTED, That this request be referred to the South American Union, with the suggestion that at present it seems impossible to give hope of adding anything further to the South American appropriations.

HONOLULU SCHOOL TEACHER:

Consideration was given to a request from Honolulu for a school teacher.

It was agreed that counsel should be given to Honolulu to move with care in taking up school work, so as to be sure of local ability to give financial support.

VOTED, That in case Honolulu is prepared to go forward with its school project and can support a teacher, the General Conference will meet the transportation of a teacher from the Pacific Coast, assuming no furt her responsibility.

HAROLD BLUNDON-CHINA:

A letter was received from F A Allum, reporting Australasia's willingness, in view of China's need, to release Harold Blundon, one of their most successful book men and a young man, who is willing to go to China.

In view of the long-continued effort to secure a general leader for the development of the China book work, it was felt that this brother should be secured.

Japan that C N Lake, of the publishing department, had felt compelled to plan to return to this country, under medical advice on account of Sister Lake's health. Japan appealed earnestly for a leader for their book work, feeling this essential more than ever.

It was therefore decided to recommend that the three workers from Australasia be accepted, one of them, H Stacey, to fill this call from Japan.

VOTED, That wh cable Australia as follows: "Stacey, Japan; Blundon, Mountain, China."

MRS HELEN WILLIAMS -- SOUTH ABRICA:

A letter was presented from W B White, stating that Sister Williams, widow of Elder E R Williams, who died several years ago in South Africa, had been working away to keep the children in school, engaging herself in Bible and evangelistic work. The three older boys will complete their South African school work this year. The family feel that they should return to America, and the South African Union Committee report that in view of the desire of some of the boys to come to this country for further school work and to find their place in the work, it would be better for the family to return all together. They therefore asked counsel.

VOTED, That the General Conference appropriate the funds necessary for the return of Mrs Helen Williams and family, if they feel that this is for the best.

J WIBBENS AND WIFE:

Correspondence was read from J Wibbens, of Holland, reporting the return of Sister Wibbens to this country, she feeling it impossible to live in Holland. Brother Wibbens reported that his wife desired him to return to this country also. However, he himself felt that there was little chance for him as a Holland worker here, and proposed rather that he respond to calls that he has received from the Dutch East Indies, suggesting that as a part of the financial arrangement in his transfer from the Holland field, his wife's fare to this country be paid, and his own to the East Indies, he desiring to pay her from his own salary allowance which might be voted a weekly rate of three or four dollars.

Discussing the matter, it seemed to the Committee impracticable to send Elder Wibbens to the East Indies, leaving his wife in this country.

A lett er was received from O A Olsen, expressing his conviction that if arrangements could be made to handle the financial end, there was a decided call in this country at several points for a Holland worker, and expressing his wish that Brother Wibbens might be the man to really take hold of the work among the Holland people and build it up.

In view of these considerations, it was-

WOTED, That we return reply to Elder Wibbens that we do not favor the proposition for him to respond to the call from the East Indies, inasmuch as it seems essential that a worker in those fields should have his wife with him, whereas Sister Wibbens' health would preclude her going to the tropics. Further, that we suggest to Elder Wibbens and the European Division, if it would not be bett er for him to return to America, to join his wife and to labor among the Holland people, as soon as arrangements can be made with the North American Division to undertake the maintenance of this work.

It was further voted that we allow the \$100 on the return expense of Sister Wibbens to America.

Conference to use its utmost endeavors to find an opening for Elder J. Wibbens in the Holland work in America.

YEAR BOOK:

The statistical secretary asked counsel from the Committee as to listing private institutions in the forthcoming Year Book.

VOTED, That I H Evans, W T Knox, and WW.W.Prescott be a committee to take this matter under consideration.

FLORENCE SHULL-CHINA:

A letter was presented from C H Jones, of the Pacific Press, stating that in further counsels with Miss Shull, who had been invited to China, it developed that she herself really felt that there was a providence in this call for her to go to Shgnahai. She had received a medical examination, with the report that while not very strong, there seemed no reason why she might not do good service in China. Altogether, the brethren of the Pacific Press felt that notwithstanding the excellent service rendered in the editorial rooms, they ought to relinquish her to the field toward which she feels strongly led. After considering the matter, it was—

VOTED, That we renew the invitation to Miss Florence Shull, of the Pacific Press, to go to China, to engage in the work at the Shanghai headquarters, preparing to go forward August next, with the suggestion that she take further medical examination next spring.

We further recommend that in case some arrangement is made for remitting direct to the several divisions of the Asiatic field, C N Woodward, the Division treasurer, be requested to act as our additor, visiting all the institutions and missions in the field, to assist and advise the secretaries and treasurers, and report to the Mission Board treasurer any inefficiencies or inaccuracies in the conduct of business in any division of that field, with such other helpful suggestions as he may be able to make.

H N GEMON--WEST INDIES:

A letter was received from Graysville, asking that arrangements be made, if possible, for H N Gemon, of the Negro Department, in the South, to go on to the West Indies, inasmuch as the department is having to cut down its force of laborers, and as Brother Gemon is only waiting for the West Indies to be able to receive him. It was stated that he had received a letter from the East Caribbean field, saying that they would be able to support him.

VOTED, That, in case this information is confirmed, appropriation be made for the transportation of Brother Gemon, and that he be sent forward at an early date.

S A OBERG--VENEZUELA:

A letter was received from A J Haysmer, reporting his suggestion that & A Oberg, of Porto Rico, be transferred to Venezuela, to take the place made vacant by the return of F G Lane on account of Mrs Lane's health.

The Committee were unable to make any suggestion, and it was agreed that effort should be made to supply further help for Porto Rico.

J E ANDERSON--CUBA:

A lett er was presented from A N Allen, superintendent of Cuba, sugg esting his conviction that J E Anderson, of Cuba, ought to have a few months at the Seminary in special study, and urging that the Cuba Mission be allowed to continue his salary rate to Brother Anderson for these few months, feeling that the mission would be the gainer by the arrangement.

It was agreed that the request of the Cuba Mission be concurred in, no appropriations being allowed other than salary allowance.

INDIA'S CALLS:

A letter was received from H R Salisbury, reporting the decisions of the recent Lucknow annual council of the India Mission, and making calls for a number of workers urgent ly needed at various points. Five couples were called for.

It was agreed in the Committee that all the requests were urgent and reasonable, but it was felt that in view of the fact that appropriations have been made up to the limit of what

the autumn council considered a most hopeful estimate of receipts, it would not be safe to encourage India to hope that these additional appointments could be made this current year.

DR P S KELLOGG:

Dr P S Kellogg, of the St Helena Sanitarium, reported that he was considering the call from Honolulu for medical worker, the General Conference having agreed to pay the transportation. He inquired if the Committee would be willing to make the same arrangement if he should go to the Philippines, where formerly he served under the government, and where he felt he would be able to do self-supporting work and be a help to the missionary enterprise.

WOTED, That the Committee return reply that it will be willing to appropriate for the transportation of Dr and Mrs P S Kellogg to the Philippines, he to take all further financial responsibility in planning medical work there, the Committee being unable to make further appropriations for the work in either the Philippines or Honolulu at the present time.

MAMIE YARNELL-SINGAPORE:

Word was received from F A Detamore, of the Malaysian Mission, that a dady teacher was greatly needed to conduct their school at Singapore, which in a way in their work stands for much more than an ordinary church school.

VOTED, That we invite Miss Mamie Yarnell, of Southern California, now at the Foreign Seminary, to respond to this call from Singapore.

a.f. STEINERT AND BLANCHE DAVIS-BRAZIL:

Word was received from Brazil to the effect that that field could take Miss Blanche Davis, who was formerly under appointment, and also S Steinert, who was appointed at the last General Conference and was not able to respond at that time:

VOTED, That we renew the invitation to Brother Steinert to go to Brazil, and that we also invite Miss Davis to go forward to that field.
