VOTED, That one or two representatives from the General Conference, with one or two from the Review and Herald, and representatives of the Lake Union, be requested to go to Milwaukee at an early date, to make a careful survey of committee rooms and halls in the Milwaukee Auditorium, having in mind the utilization of same for departmental and committee meetings, etc.

It was suggested that this committee study the advisability of utilizing the basement as a reception hall and general exhibit room.

It was the consensus of opinion that the morning Bible studies and testimony service following, the morning session of the Conference, the afternoon session, the Sabbath morning sermon and afternoon symposiums, and all other sermons be stenographically reported for condensation by the editors preparatory to publication. VOTED, That in harmony with the general counsel of 1921, we concur in the action of the Lake Union Committee, looki with favor upon the proposal of uniting the North and South Wisconsin Conferences, of course understanding that the union would be effected by the approval of the constituencies of these conferences.

UNION OF NORTH AND WEST MICHIGAN:

Study was given to the proposal that the North and West Michigan Conferences be united. With a declining population in North Michigan, and considering that one academy serves these two conferences at the present time, a union of these conferences would make for reduction of administrative expense and greater strength in evangelistic work. In harmony with the Autumn Counci action of 1921,—

We recommend, That we concur in the action of the Lake Union Committee, looking with favor upon the union of the North and West Michigan Conferences.

CLINTON COMEBACK:

The Lake Union Conference made request that in addition to the debt-paying Comeback now being paid to the Broadview College, the debt-paying Comeback formerly paid to the Clinton Seminary be made available to Broadview for the reduction of its obligations.

The attendance included brethren who were in Washington to attend the constituency meetings of the Review and Herald, Washington Sanitarium, and Washington Missionary College, and a number of brethren from the Pacific Union who had come in for counsel relative to the future conduct of the Arizona Academy and Spanish-American Training School.

ARIZONA ACADEMY AND SPANISH-AMERICAN TRAINING SCHOOL:

Study was given to the question of relationships and conduct of the joint school in Arizona, and growing out of this discussion the following definite recommendations were adopted for the current year and the year 1926-27, subject thereafter to the action of the Autumn Council:

1. That we continue to operate these schools in the present plant, with the elminiation of the boarding department, placing both on the day school basis, each department assuming its respective operating expense; and that the principal be jointly the principal of the Arizona non-boarding Academy and the principal of the Spanish-American Training School, each department bearing one half of his salary for the entire year, and any expense incurred by him in the interests of the combined school be shared equally, or by the department benefitting by same.

2. That the girls attending the Spanish-American Training School be cared for on the present basis by placing them in properly selected homes, they to be under the care of a supervising matron. And further, that the young men attending this school who are unmarried, be cared for on the same basis or arrangements be made for their board with the married students who occupy the student school cottages, it being understood that in carrying out the above arrangement these students are to be at all times under school supervision and discipline.

3. That no industries are to be established without the funds are in hand for the same, and then only on the authorization of the Board, in counsel with the General Conference Committee.

4. (a) That the Board of Management of the Spanish-American Training School consist of seven members to be appointed by the General Conference, representing the fields concerned; specifically, Pacific Union Conference, Southwestern Union Conference and the General Conference. (b) That the Board of Management of the Arizona Academ be appointed by the Arizona Conference.

(c) That the Principal be elected at a joint meeting of these two Boards.

5. That we recommend to the Autumn Council where appropriations are made, that the General Conference and the Pacifi Union Conference share equally in assuming the indebtedness, approximately \$20,700, and the operating loss of the current school year of 1925-26.

6. That the Spanish-American Training School be operated on the budget basis, and that an adequate subsidy be provided as follows: two fifths by the General Conference; two fifths by the Pacific Union Conference; one fifth by the Southwestern Union Conference, the budget to be submitted annually to the Autumn Council for approval.

7. In the event the Spanish-American Training School should in the future need both the present dormitories, we agree to set over to the Arizona Academy the rear 250 feet of the present site, the Principal's cottage, the administration building, the carpenter shop, the furnishings and equipment being used by the Arizona Academy, and \$8,000 in cash.

8. That in case the part taken over by the Spanish-American Training School is ultimately sold, the proceeds of the sale, Arizona's need having been provided for by the previous resolution, shall be divided equally between the General and the Pacific Union Conferences.

9. That representatives of the General Conference and Pacific Union Conference Educational Departments be asked to make a careful survey of the Spanish-American Training School with a view to simplifying its courses of study as will be suited to the meds of the Spanish-speaking students, making such eliminations or changes as will be conducive to greater economy and simplicity in operating.

10. That this policy governing the future operation of the Spanish-American Training School, as adopted by the General Conference Committee, be inserted in the records of the Pacific Union and the Arizona Conference.

SCHOOL FOR COLORED YOUTH IN NORTH:

5. That we recognize the possibility of using our northern white colleges on a proper basis of distribution for the accommodation of colored college students until later development, and that where necessary separate facilities for rooming and board ing be provided.



VOTED, To close this World Conference with the Saturday evening service, inviting Elder W A Spicer to speak. COLLEGE OF MEDICAL EVANGELISTS:

The following matters relating to the College of Medical Evangelists were presented by Brethren W C White, W T Knox, P T Magan and F E Corson, after conferring with the officers, and were adopted:

We request that a Committee of Survey be appointed to visit the College of Medical Evangelists, to study its problems in the plants at Loma Linda and the White Memorial, and also its operating income and expenses.

Whereas, The cost of operating the College of Medical Evangelists is greatly in excess of the amount of tuition required of the students; and,--

Whereas, A number of the graduates of the institution devote their lives to private practice of a lucrative kind; therefore,--

Resolved, That the present tuition be raised by the amount of \$25 cash each year, and by the signing of a note on the part of each student in the amount of \$125 per annum, said notes to be payable in a reasonable time after graduation, provided that the student does not enter the organized work of the denomination in which case said notes are to be canceled if thegraduate goes to a foreign field, or paid by the medical institution employing him in the homeland.

We recommend, That the maximum number of students which may be accepted in any freshman class of the College of Medical Evangelists shall never exceed 100.

W hereas, It seems wise on account of conditions existing in the plants of the Loma Linda Sanitarium to replace a portion of the present room space for patients by new facilities; therefore, ---

Resolved, That the Board of the College of Medical Evangelists be authorized to construct a second story on the new hospital building and to make alterations in the present Sanitarium building including the removal of the third and fourth stories of the original portion of the structure and the strengthening of its foundations, the entire program to cost approximately \$65,000.

It is further understood that the funds for the purpose are to be derived from building depreciations and the sale of certain properties, and that the project will not bring about any additional institutional indebtedness.

And whereas, There is imperative need of more space at the White Memorial Hospital for the Dispensary; and crying need for a proper hydrotherapy department and further bed space for the institution; therefore, ---

We recommend, That the Board of the College of Medical Evangelists be authorized to erect a building on the White Memorial Hospital block at a cost of approximately \$130,000, for the above named purposes.

It is understood and agreed that the above described building will be financed entirely by donations, building depreciation funds, and the sale of a parcel of property owned by the institution in the city of Los Angeles, and without any increase of the indebtedness of the institution.

Resolutions from the Missions Round Table, and recommendations from the Publishing and Medical Departments were read, and passed on to the Conference in session.

VOTED, That in order to qualify for offering premedical work, the Canadian Junior College be exempt from the usual restrictions placed on junior colleges in this respect.

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FIFTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

Milwaukee, Wis., June 11, 1926, 1:45 P M

W A Spicer in the chair. Prayer by William Guthrie.

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P E BRODERSEN__RESIGNATION:

P E Brodersen reported that medical advice concerning his wife and his older boy made it impossible for him to return to S outh America. He therefore felt compelled to tender his resignation as vice-president for the South American Division.

The South American delegates expressed themselves on the loss that South America would sustain in Brother Brodersen's retirement from the field.

VOTED, That we accept with regret P E Brodersen's resignation from the vice-presidency for the South American Division.

BROADVIEW COLLEGE:

The Finance Committee presented a report on the proposed sale of the Broadview College property. This report was adopted as follows:

In view of the prospect of being able to sell the Broadview property at unusually good advantage, and with a view to placing the school on a more advantageous basis for its future development,--

We recommend, 1. That the Broadview College Board sell the College property provided the suggested sale price of \$5000 per acre can be realized, and that reservation of the use of the College buildings and grounds on which they stand can be arranged with the purchaser for at least one year after date of sale. The terms shall be at least one half cash and one half of the balance to be paid before the buildings shall be vacated, the remainder as may be mutually agreed. Any variation of this plan to be by action of the General Conference Committee.

2. That the General Conference Committee appoint a strong representative committee which shall be authorized:

(a) To select a location that will best serve the interests of the young people, and be convenient and suited to the prosecution of a training school for foreign languages.

(b) To secure plans and specifications for the necessary buildings to provide for a school of 350 students, not more than 200 of whom shall be provided for in the dormitories. Kitchen and dining room service for at least 200 students shall be provided for in the basement of one of the dormitories.

(c) To give study to the class and style of buildings to be constructed, avoiding expensive class of construction, choosing rather those suited to the message we preach.

(d) To make earnest effort to save at least 20% of the sale price of the present plant, and at the same time to provide suitable, substantial, and attractive, but plain quarters for the school.

(e) To study the need of and present plans for such dwellings as the committee may deem needful to care for teachers, helpers and married students.

(f) The recommendations of this committee shall be the rule of procedure when confirmed by the college board and the General Conference Committee.

3. That these buildings be so arranged as to be most economically served by a central heating plant which shall be installed after the most efficient plans.

4. That earnest and careful efforts be put forth at all times to conserve the interest of the original purpose of this school, namely, to provide an institution for the training of Swedish workers and now including German and miscellaneous languages departments, and so develop the newplant as to make it most useful to the great work in which we are engaged, also to foster the love and unity of all nationalities concerned.

5. That when the sale of the school has been accomplished, a fund of \$10,000 shall be set aside as an operating fund for the school, in view of the financial difficulties usually incident to such a move.

6. That the net savings in excess of all needs above provided for be placed in the hands of the General Conference for educational work in foreign lands or for foreign work in the homeland, as the General Conference Committee Adecide in counsel with the Board of Trustees.

COLORED SCHOOL IN NORTH:

VOTED, That the question of establishing a colored school in the North be referred to the Minority Committee to study, with such members of the committee previously appointed on this matter as are available, and that a joint meeting of the Minority Committee and this committee be held, with a view to preparing a report to present at the next Autumn Council.

LONDON AND BUENOS AIRES CHURCHES:

In view of the need of church buildings in foreign fields, especially in London and Buenos Aires, the North A merican union presidents freely agreed to withhold all North American requests for church extension in 1927, and it was, therefore,--

VOTED, That North America's share of the 1927 Church Extension Fund be applied in favor of the cities of London and Buenos Aires.

ADDITION TO GENERAL CONFERENCE BUILDING:

VOTED, That the Minority Committee be authorized to make the necessary addition to the General Conference Building with a view to properly housing the General Conference staff, such provision to be made as economically as possible.

QAKWOOD SCHOOL:

VOTED, That we set apart the colored offering to be taken in the autumn of 1926 for the raising of the balance of the money needed to provide a dormitory at the Oakwood School, and that the treasurer be authorized to advance funds to the amount of \$15,000 if necessary, for the erection of this building; and that in the event of the offering falling short of the said amount, that the treasury be authorized to ask the Oakwood Board to dispose of such portion of the Oakwood land as may be necessary.

W G WIRTH__EMMANUEL MISSIONARY COLLEGE:

VOTED, That the call from the Lake Union, for W G Wirth to connect with Emmanuel Missionary College, be passed on to the Board of the College of Medical Evangelists.

NORTH DAKOTA-\$5.000:

Request was made by the North Dakota Conference for a special appropriation of \$5,000 for a school dormitory, with the understanding that the General Conference would be reimbursed by an equal amount from the Dammen Estate. Should the \$5,000 not be provided in the Dammen Estate, the North Dakota Conference agrees to make up the balance to the amount of \$5000

VOTED; That on the conditions specified above, the treasurer be authorized to advance \$5,000 to the North Dakota Conference, to be reimbursed from the Dammen Estate within the next two years, and failing this the North Dakota Conference make up any shortage.

POLYGAMY AND MARRIAGE RELATIONSHIPS:

VOTED, To adopt the resolutions on polygamy and marriage relationships, formulated as a result of discussions in the Missions Round Table during the Conference session, as follows:

<u>W hereas</u>, The practice of polygamy on the part of many races for whom we are laboring is in itself a challenge to Christian principles, and constitutes a ground of compromise if permitted in the Christian church; therefore, --

We recommend, 1. That great care be used in the examination of peoples in heathen lands for entrance into the church, and as this examination relates to this practice, we would advise the following:

(a) That in no case should a man living in polygamy be admitted into the fellowship of the church.

(b) That preceding his entrance into the church a sufficient time of probation be given him to test out his sincerity in separating himself from this practice.

Whereas, The marriage ordinance is instituted by God. for the good of society and for the protection of the home; therefore,--

We recommend, 2. That where parties are living together as husband and wife, that they be not baptized nor received into church fellowship until they have been legally married; however,--

Inasmuch as we find many parties whose matrimonial alliances became badly tangled before they accepted the truth, and as the laws of some of our countries are such that it is impossible for them to become legally married; and as some of these pesire to obey the truth when it comes to them, to be baptized and unite with the church; and in many cases, after careful investigation, we can not advise them to separate and thus break up their home and present relationship, for this would only make conditions worse, and knowing that the gospel truth does not come to people to make conditions worse, but better, and that God receives a sinner where he is found and saves him when he repents and turns to Him: therefore.--- We recommend, 2. That in countries where the laws are such as to make impossible legal marriage of certain persons whose matrimonial alliances have become badly tangled on account of these laws; and when such persons have given real evidence that they are truly converted and are in harmony with the truth and desire to unite with us, all such cases shall be presented to the conference or mission committee of the field in which they reside; and if, after careful investigation, this committee is clear in the case, then the parties may be recommended to church fellowship; with the understanding, however, that if the time ever comes when such persons can be legally married, they do so, and that until so married, they be not/eligible to hold any office in the church which requires ordination.

(f) That provision be made so that at the request or suggestion of the General Conference Committee the offerings taken in society meetings may be applied on some special project or special field selected from the budget.

There followed agitation, started by Koreans and Japanese, after a solatium was given to the family of the boy. Proceedings against Dr Haysmer were instituted on July 12, according to the American Embassy." Also the following cable was received from E J Urquhart, the superintendent of the Chosen Mission:

> "July 15,1926 Heinanjunan.

"Adventist, Evans.

Newspaper reports exaggerated. Public opinion adverse. Following Shanghai advice, Haysmer dismissed. Trial soon. Outcome uncertain."

In view of this word feeeived by cable, stating that the missionary in Korea who had marked the word "thief" on the face of a Korean boy has, on the advice of the Far Eastern Division, been dismissed, it was--

The fourth meeting of the Council convened at 7:30 P M, Thursday, September 30, with J L McElhany in the: chair. E E Andross offered prayer, after the opening hymn.

The chairman called for reports from committees, and the Committee on Plans submitted a partial report, as follows:

AN EXPRESSION OF GRATITUDE TO GOD:

For God's manifest leading of this movement since last we assembled in Autumn Council, for the prosperity that has attended its advance, and for our Heavenly Father's protecting care over the lives of His messengers throughout the world field, we humbly acknowledge our gratitude and our dependence upon our Unseen Leader, and unitedly pledge anew our lives, our service, and our all to the finishing of the work.

The chairman expressed the desire that we might not vote on this part of the report as a merematter of form, but that the sentiment of this first resolution might find a response in all hearts. The delegates voted the adoption of the resolution by rising to their feet.

The remainder of the report was presented item by item, and after discussion was adopted as follows:

PUBLISHING DEPARTMENT

WEEK OF PRAYER IN PUBLISHING HOUSES:

Our publishing houses have been established in the purpose of God as vital factors in giving the gospel to the nations. In order that they may meet and fulfil this holy purpose, it is essential that the spiritual life of the workers should be nurtured and kept strong. Every opportunity should be improved to meet this demand. We therefore, --

Recommend, That in the Week of Prayer for 1926 arrangements be made, so far as local conditions warrant, for special daily services for our publishing house workers, supplemented by personal work as may be indicated in individual cases. We believe also that in arranging for this special help, it would be advantageous to call in some worker from out side the office to take charge of this effort.

BIBLE HOUSE SECRETARY-TREASURERS:

Whereas, There is an urgent demand in our cause for trained and efficient young men as Bible House secretarytreasurers, who in addition to being competent bookkeepers know how to promote the sale of our various classes of literature; therefore,--

We recommend, That such men be given the following opportunities for training while employed:

a. Intensive training in our publishing houses where experience can be obtained particularly in the circulation and accounting departments.

b. As assistants in Bible Houses and branch houses.

c. Where men have been given the responsibility of Bible House work without the privilege of such training, every consistent effort be made by branch managers and circulation men to render them such help in their offices.

PUBLISHING CONVENTIONS:

We recommend, That the Publishing Department conventions for 1927 be held on the following dates:

For the Southern Publishing Association territory, January 21 - 28.

> Pacific Press territory, February 2 - 9. Review and Herald territory, February 23 - March 2.

> Canadian Watchman Press territory, March 8 - 15.

We would further request the General Conference Committee to arrange, if possible, for J L McElhany to attend these meetings.

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HOME MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

UNION SECRETARIES' COUNCIL:

In consideration of the heavy program confronting the union home missionary secretaries, --

We endorse the recommendation of the General Conference Home Missionary Department, that a council for the union secretaries and such local conference home missionary secretaries as may be sent from nearby conferences, be held at some centrally located point during December, 1926, the exact date to be arranged by the Minority Committee; it being understood that officers of the General Conference will attend together with such publishing house representatives as may be delegated to attend.

MISSIONS EXTENSION--BIG WEEK:

Whereas, The Missions Extension Fund, raised through the Big Week plan is now shared equally by the Publishing, Educational and Medical Departments for the extension and development of these phases of our work in mission lands, at the same time exerting a tremendous soul-winning influence through the literature circulated; therefore,--

We recommend, 1. That church members be asked to sell at least \$4.00 worth of our literature, either books or periodicals, during Big Week; all the profits to be turned over to the church treasurer, to be applied on the Missions Extension Fund.

2. That colporteurs be invited to continue to share in the Missions Extension Fund plan by giving the profits of their biggest day's sales during the Big Week.

3. That all conference and institutional workers be requested to join in the Missions Extension plan by selling literature during the Big Week, devoting the entire profits to the fund, in addition to giving their personal income for one day, or its equivalent in the sale of additional literature.

4. That where conference or institutional workers can not share in the sale of literature, they be encouraged to give an amount the Missions Extension Fund equivalent to their personal income for one day.

5. That one or more field days be held by all our churches, sanitariums, publishing houses, schools and conference offices during the Big Week. 6. That the regulations relative to special gifts, institutional earnings, etc., adopted at the 1924 Des Moines Autumn Council, govern the 1927 Big Week campaign.

FORTY-THIRD MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 1, 1926, 10:30 A M

Fifth meeting of the Council, Friday, October 1, 10:30 A M. O Montgomery in the chair. After the singing of a hymn, P E Brodersen offered prayer. Minutes of the third and fourth meetings were read and accepted.

The Committee on Plans presented further recommendations, which after full and sympathetic discussion, were adopted as follows:

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT

CONDUCT OF MEDICAL WORK:

Recognizing that in the conduct of our medical work, in sanitariums, nurses' training schools, treatment rooms and all other phases, we should ever seek to make it primarily a soul-saving work,--

We recommend, That while we encourage the study and adoption of methods that will make for the highest efficiency and most successful management, we strongly urge that careful study be given the principles which have been given us, as underlying this work in its gospel character. We counsel those in charge of our medical institutions to make definite provision for the study by their workers, of the instruction contained in the writings of the spirit of prophecy, covering the development and conduct of this work, seeking to encourage, as fully as possible a spiritual conception of its possibilities and privileges as a definite means of evangelism.

LOCATING SELF-SUPPORTING PHYSICIANS:

We recommend, That in order to encourage as much as possible the location of our physicians in our various conferences, to engage in self-supporting work, our conference officials do what they can in planning with these doctors for the securing of financial assistance to aid in such location, possibly by putting them in touch with persons who can make the necessary loans, or otherwise give assistance.

LOCAL CONFERENCE MEDICAL SECRETARIES:

We recommend, once more, that most serious consideration be given to the value and importance of appointing local conference medical secretaries or conference nurses, to take the direct oversight of home nursing classes, school health inspection, church health education and such other features of conference health work as should be promoted and strengthened.

SPECIAL TRAINING FOR NURSES:

We recommend, That our sanitarium schools of nursing give attention to making their education of nurses such as to especially qualify them as conference medical secretaries or conference nurses and for other denominational health work in order that we may be prepared to meet calls for such workers.

EVANGELISTIC HEALTH WORK:

We recommend, That our evangelistic workers plan definitely to utilize the material and facilities available for use in the public presentation of health subjects through lectures, lessons and literature.

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY DEPARTMENT

SUNDAY OBSERVANCE BILLS:

Whereas, There are more than twenty religious denominations and societies campaigning in every state in favor of the passage of a compulsory Sunday observance bill for the District of Columbia; and,-- Whereas, There is a strong religious lobby at Washington, claiming to be the official mouth piece and agency for twenty-two Protestant denominations and asserting it will go "the limit" to secure the passage of one of the two Lankford Sunday bills during the short session of Congress; therefore,--

We recommend, That a vigorous campaign be inaugurated in every conference in the United States, early in the coming winter, setting before the public by means of lectures to sound religious liberty principles and true American ideals of separation of church and state, and that our people everywhere be encouraged to scatter religious liberty literature, write letters to Congressmen and secure as many signatures to petitions as possible, protesting against compulsory Sunday observance, sending said petitions to the Congressmen representing their respective districts.

Whereas, More than forty State legislatures will be in session after the first week in January of next year (1927), with a large number of new legislators, and since the Lord's Day Alliance and the National Reform Association are planning to secure the introduction of drastic Sunday observes ance bills in practically all of these State legislatures during the coming winter, as well as other religious measures requiring the teaching of religion in the public schools and the giving of such instruction on school time; therefore, --

We recommend, That our conference presidents be urged to keep a vigilant eye upon all such measures at their State capitals this winter, while the State kgislatures are in session; and where such religious bills are pending, hearings be secured, petitions be circulated, and our people be encouraged to write letters to the State legislators, and to circulate religious liberty literature freely among the people.

We further recommend, That suitable persons be encouraged to write for the newspapers in every State where these religious measures are pending.

BIENNIAL LOCAL CONFERENCE SESSIONS:

Whereas, The plan of holding conference sessions every two years has proved to be most satisfactory in the large majority of the local conferences in North America; therefore,--

We recommend, That the plan be made uniform throughout the North American field. It was agreed that the afternoon should be left ; free for sub-committee work, and adjournment was taken to 9:45 Sunday morning.

VOTED, That we approve of the following itinerary for H T Elliott, of the Missionary Volunteer Department: Union College, October 8 to 16; Pacific Union College, October 22 to 31; Pacific Union Missionary olunteer Secretaries' Council, November 1 to 4; Southwestern Union Missionary Volunteer Secretaries' Council, and field work in the Southwestern Union, November 8 to 22.

F C GILBERT--ITINERARY:

VOTED, That we approve of the following itinerary for F C Gilbert: Detroit, October 8 to 14; South Lancaster, October 16 to 26; Florida, October 28 to November 7; Columbia Union, November 10 to 28; home, November 29 to December 8; Denver, December 10 to 19; North Pacific Union, December 22 to February 1; Pacific Press, February 2 to 5; Columbia Union, February 11 to 20; Review and Herald, February 23 to 26; Columbia Union, February 27 to March 3.

FORTY-FIFTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 3,1926, 3 P M

Seventh meeting of the Council, Sunday, October 3, 3 P M. W A Spicer in the chair. Prayer by H W Miller, one of the pioneer workers in Michigan. The minutes of the fifth meeting were read and approved.

The chairman then called for reports from committees. The committee which had been appointed on the Colored School in the North brought in a report, which was adopted as follows:

COLORED SCHOOL WORK IN THE NORTH:

After considering carefully the present status and needs of our colored work in the North, we desire to submit the following statement and recommendations; 1. We look with keen sympathy upon the educational needs of our colored membership in the North. We believe the time has come when definite, constructive effort should be made to strengthen and extend our school facilities for giving a Christian education to the large number of boys and girls in our growing colored churches.

2. We appreciate the faithfulness and zeal with which church school work has been conducted in many of our colored churches in the North, and we recommend that due consideration be given to the development of the church school in some of our larger church centers to a ten-grade school, where found advisable after wide and careful counsel.

3. We recommend that one or two General men, together with one or two from the union concerned, visit our larger colored churches with a view to studying the advisability of developing the church school into a ten-grade day school, where conditions seem to call for it.

4. We recommend that, in harmony with the assurance already given our colored brethren, we look forward to the development of a boarding academy when the time seems ripe for it from the viewpoint of the foundation laid in these stronger day schools, and when such an enterprise can be adequately financed without debt.

5.We recommend that our colored people in the North be urged to enter actively into the Institutional Relief campaign, and that the proceeds from this work be held as a reserve fund in the General Conference treasury, for the purpose of establishing a central school when the proper time comes.

6. We recommend that while we view with sympathy the need of providing higher education for our colored youth, we do not advise the development of a boarding institution for them to be carried further than the twelve grades, but that when these grades are completed the colored youth attend the Oakwood Junior College or our regular colleges in the North.

THE BUDGET:

Elder Shaw, the treasurer, presented a report from the Budget Committee, which was adopted as follows:

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We recommend, That the following appropriations be made to division conferences:

We recommend, That the 1927 base appropriation to all divisions, except Europe, be increased 5% to form a new base for 1928, making the 1928 base as follows:

We recommend, That from the increased appropriation to Europe, \$12,500 be devoted to the work in Russia and a like amount to the work in Constantinople.

We recommend, That from the increased appropriation to the Far Eastern Division, \$18,000 be devoted to the erection of an administration building for that field.

We recommend, That from the increased appropriation to the African Division, \$7,500 be applied toward the liquidation of publishing house indebtedness; and to the Inter-American Division, \$7,500 be applied toward the liquidation of the indebtedness of the tract societies within its territory.

We recommend, The following appropriations:

Note.-- It is understood that of the amount appropriated to Europe, \$563,810.72 is to be raised within the European Division territory, the difference of \$175,000 to be sent from the General Conference treasury to them.

A spirit of courage prevailed in the Council as brethren realized that it was the special blessing of God that had made such appropriations and special help for the needy mission fields possible. A number of the division presidents expressed their gratitude, and spoke of the new impetus this would give to the work in the field. The delegates voted the budget unanimously by rising to their feet, and united in singing, "Praise God from Whom all Blessings Flow."

The Finance Committee then presented a partial report, which was adopted as follows:

DEBT-LIFTING PLAN FOR SCHOOLS:

Whereas, Our conference leaders and school managers in North America have been making determined efforts to improve the financial operation of our colleges and academies by better management, by working the budget plan, by reducing the teaching force where possible, by simplifying the curriculum, and by effecting other economies,--

We recommend, That in order to cooperate in this good work, which is so essential to maintaining strong bases of supplies for the mission fields, and in order to assist further in relieving the schools of indebtedness, a reserve fund of \$100,000.00 be set aside by the General Conference from surplus funds in such a way as not to reduce the gifts of our people to missions, this fund to be disbursed on the basis of \$1.00 to every \$2.00 raised in the field, the disbursement of this fund to be subject to the following conditions:

1. That the usual debt-paying portion of the bomeback be applied on school indebtedness and interest, on the plan provided for in previous council actions. 2. That each school benefiting from this reserve fund operate within its own earned income plus the subsidy provided within the standard set by the General Conference, it being understood that in such case the interest is cared for from the comeback.

3. That in qualifying to receive the benefit from this reserve fund, none of the comeback be reckoned as part of the \$2.00 portion to be raised in the field.

4. That the apportionment of this fund be made only on the basis of audited financial statements of the schools at the end of the fiscal year, and on the added basis of a statement from the union conference treasurer of the amount raised in the field (exclusive of the comeback) and applied on school indebtedness, or held in trust for that purpose.

5. That payments from this fund, when conditions have been complied with, be made through the union conference treasury, to be applied only to the indebtedness of schools that are eligible under this plan.

6. That where special conditions of indebtedness in a union make it advisable to apply this fund to a sanitarium rather than a school, this fund be made available for the purpose on condition that the benefiting institution operate without increasing liabilities.

7. That while promoting this plan, every effort be made to raise the full quota of mission funds.

8. That the bulk of debt-paying funds raised on this plan, be raised through the Institutional Relief campaign

9. That the date of the Institutional Relief campaign begin not earlier than the first of the year, and close February 26, and that the apportionment of this fund be made at the end of the present fiscal year, ending not later than June 30, 1927, by which date all offerings shall be brought in.

10. That each union conference be asked to set its own per capita goal in the Relief Campaign according to its needs and the conditions of the field.

11. That each union conference may draw on this fund on a pro rata membership basis on which mission funds are computed, and that the amount not claimed by any union conference for its portion be made available for other unions that may qualify to receive more than their pro rata portion. 12. That the treasurer of the General Conference be and is hereby authorized to transfer from the Sustentation Fund to regular mission funds an amount up to \$75,000.

After the treasurer had made some remarks about the make-up of the debt-paying fund, which is to aid the conferences in their school debt-lifting campaign, and after he had again pointed out that the budget as just voted was by far the largest ever voted in the history of the denomination, the union and local conference presidents were ready to help the General Conference in the above plan by pledging from their surplus funds amounts as follows:

Other unions by special arrangement, and also at the time of the General Conference had already pledged large amounts of their tithe.

News had come of terrible persecution being suffered by our brethren in Bolivia, and the chairman called on Elder C B Haynes the new president of the South American Division to lead the Council in prayer to God in behalf of our work and workers in that difficult field.

FORTY-SIXTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 4, 1926, 9:45 A M

Eighth meeting of the Council, Monday, October 4, 9:45 A.M. J L McElhany in the chair.

After the opening song and prayer, Elder Spicer read a statement from the Testimonies, Vol. 8, page 298, as an admonition to all workers to proclaim the straight, full third angel's message, with the love of Christ in it.

The chairman then introduced the important topic on the Agenda, "Helping the Churches," which was discussed fully and freely.

Reports of committees being called for, the Finance Committee presented recommendations which were adopted as follows:

WEEK OF SACRIFICE:

Whereas, At the present Council the representatives from foreign fields have pressed upon our hearts the unprecedented need of pushing our work rapidly into the many opening providences for saving souls, and in view of this we have committed ourselves by Council action to the largest appropriation for carrying on the work in the history of this people; and,--

Whereas, The spirit of prophecy exhorts us to still greater sacrifice in the support and extension of our work, in the following statement:

"It is impossible to carry it [the work] forward except by constant sacrifice. From all parts of the world the calls are coming in for men and means to carry forward the work. Shall we be compelled to say 'you must wait; we have no money in the treasury?' Some of the men of experience and piety who led out in this work, who denied self, and did not hesitate to sacrifice for its success, are now sleeping in the grave. . Our institutions were characterized by the spirit of self-sacrifice. . The believers who in the early history of the cause sacrificed for the upbuilding of the work were imbued with the same spirit. They felt that God demanded of all connected with His cause an unreserved consecration of body, soul, and spirit, of all their energies and capabilities to make the work a success." --Vol.7, pp. 216,217. "Great sacrifices have been made and privations endured to place the truth in a clear light before you. Now God calls upon you, in your turn, to make great efforts and to sacrifice in order to place the truth before those who are in darkness."- Yol. 1, p. 192.

In view of these statements and in view of the pressing need of securing at least \$200,000 in addition to the amount of money now in sight to enable the Mission Board to provide the additional appropriations promised for the current year to make possible the entering of new territory where providence has marvelously opened the way,--

We recommend, 1. That the plan for the observance of self-denial week for 1926 be carried out as heretofore, and that the date be November 14 to 20 as appointed at the General Conference, the offering to be brought in on Sabbath, November 20.

2. That we earnestly invite our conference workers, our publishing house employees, the physicians, nurses, and employees in our sanitariums, and all other institutional workers to set an example in sacrifice by giving one week's salary.

3. That we request each church to unite earnestly in prayer that every member, old and young and little children, may be helped and blessed in joining the workers in making the sacrifice which the love of Jesus may prompt us to make for Him.

4. For our schools and educational workers, we recommend the following special plan:

Whereas, It is fitting that we cultivate the spirit of sacrifice among the young people and prospective workers in our schools, --

We recommend the following plan for the teachers and students in our schools and the educational workers in the field, in North America, for helping swell the gifts to missions during the Week of Sacrifice:

a. That we assign to our educators and students as a special project for Sacrifice Week in 1926, the requests for the educational work among the Indians of the Inca Union Mission field, as listed in the regular budget and amounting approximately to \$20,000, as a goal for the raising of funds by personal sacrifice for this needy field. b. That the teachers and employees in all our schools, and our secretaries and superintendents in the field, be invited to donate one week's salary to this fund.

c. That the individual goal for students be one dollar for the colleges, fifty cents for the academies, and twenty-five cents for church schools.

d. That these offerings be passed in through the regular channels in the church, in envelopes specially provided for the purpose, and that these funds be designated by the church treasurer as "Educational Sacrifice" and be passed on in the usual way.

e. That any overflow above the goal of \$20,000 be applied on new school work among the Indians of the Inca Union.

f. That it be understood that gifts made to this fund during Bacrifice Week are not to take the place of the regular weekly offerings to missions, but are to be an addition to them by sacrifice, and to apply on the Sixty-cent-aweek Fund.

FORTY-SEVENTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 4, 1926, 3 P M

Ninth meeting of the Council, October 4, 3 P M. W A Spicer in the chair. Prayer by W A Young, of the Wabash Valley Sanitarium.

The Committee on Plans presented a further report, which after thorough discussion, was adopted as follows:

RECRUITING FOR THE MINISTRY:

Whereas, There is a constant retirement of ministers in the home bases, because of failing health, advancing age and other contingents; and.--

Whereas, There is a constant outflow to mission fields of ministers in the early prime of life, with every assurance of increasing drafts, keeping pace with this growing world movement; and,--

Whereas, The call of the hour is for an intensified evangelism, a "strengthening of the stakes" in the American base, commensurate with the "lengthening of the cords" in regions beyond; we therefore, --

<u>Recommend</u>, That each conference of North America consider itself a training camp for the training of one or more ministerial recruits each year, setting apart in their annual budget a definite portion of their operating funds for this specific purpose.

"BIGNS OF THE TIMES" CAMPAIGN:

Whereas, The Signs of the Times has for more than half a century proved its value as a soul-winning agency; we therefore, --

<u>Recommend</u>, That the plans of the General Conference Home Missionary Department for the annual effort in behalf of the <u>Signs</u> distribution, November 21 to December 4, 1926, be enthusiastically indorsed, and that our ministers and conference workers encourage every church to take a club of <u>Signs</u> for missionary endeavor.

FIRESIDE CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL:

<u>Resolved</u>, That we approve the Fireside Correspondence School plan of organizing and conducting classes of students in our churches for the systematic study of the courses in Bible Readings and Christian Salesmanship, and that we invite church officers, pastors, and conference workers to cooperate with the Fireside in making a success of this effort to impart to our lay members knowledge and skill in soul winning.

J L Shaw, the treasurer, spoke of the development of our sanitarium work, and called upon different ones to speak who are in charge of sanitariums, or who are in charge of the work in territory where these institutions are located. The reports were a story of wonderful financial growth, and of strenuous effort to reduce the debts on these institutions. The chairman then read a letter from Elder E R Palmer, detained in Washington by Sister Palmer's ill health. In the letter Brother Palmer reviewed his study of the financial report which the Council had had under consideration. He sent the cheering message that he believed a systematic, earnest debt-paying campaign would see the whole indebtedness wiped out within a few years.

The closing prayer was offered by Elder W T Knox.

FORTY-EIGHTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 4, 1926, 7:30 P M

The tenth meeting of the Council was called at 7:30 P M, Monday, October 4. W A Spicer in the chair. Prayer by C L Butterfield.

Reports of committees were called for, and the Committee on Plans presented a further series of recommendations which were adopted as follows:

CHRISTIAN STANDARDS AND SPIRITUAL WORK:

1. Recognizing that a knowledge of the fundamentals of the message is essential to the upbuilding of this movement to growth in grace and to a stable Christian experience,--

We recommend, That an earnest effort be made by our ministers and church elders to instruct our church membership in such subjects as the coming of the Lord, the Sabbath, the Sanctuary and Christ's priestly ministry, the prophecies relating to our time, the nature and destiny of man, Bible finance, Christian dress and deportment, health and temperance, spiritual gifts, etc., with Christ and His righteousness as the central, permeating idea in the presentation of these subjects.

2. We urge our ministers and church elders to enlist every church to express spiritual life in a definite missionary campaign in behalf of the people of their community:

> For the circulation of denominational literaa.

ture.

b. By holding family Bible studies. By conducting cottage meetings and public

services.

C.

d. By carrying on Christian help work.

By personal missionary labor. e.

3. We believe that special consideration should be given to the development of the talent of our youth in such labor as may be indicated by their special adaptability. Work suited to the children should also be arranged, and special consideration should be given this class by the minister or church elder in the instruction of the Sabbath service, and further that the children be encouraged to sit with their parents during the Sabbath service.

4. Believing that the preaching of the fundamental principles of the gospel message constitutes the foundation of successful gospel ministry, we urge that, as far as possible all young men entering upon gospel labor be encouraged to begin their ministry in new fields in work for those outside the church.

We recommend, That our ministers carefully avoid 5. in their preaching the affected mannerisms and sensational methods so popular with certain classes of public speakers, and to present the great, inspiring, ennobling and dignified truths of the gospel in a manner befitting the representatives of Him who spake not as the scribes and Pharisees, but as one having authority.

6. We urge that, just so far as possible, the re-sponsibility of feeding the flock of God be placed upon local church leaders, thus releasing our ministers for the work of evangelism in new fields. We recognize that special conditions in some of our churches may require regular pastoral labor on the part of our ministers. Every minister, we believe; as far as consistent, should conduct yearly a series of evangelistic services for those outside the faith.

Whereas, The spiritual condition of the church 7. is influenced materially by the local leadership, --

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We urge that special care be exercised in selecting men and women for offices in the various departments of the local church, choosing those sound in the faith, who by well ordered lives, godly conversation and deportment, and Christian attire, proprly represent the cause of the meek and lowly Master.

Recognizing the responsibility of feeding and 8. nurturing the flock of God, we urge that every regular Sabbath service be so arranged and conducted that it shall prove a spiritual feast and uplift to the church and to strangers who may be present. If it is necessary to make appeal for some specific missionary objectives, this should either be so spiritualized that it will afford food for spiritual inspiration and growth or be confined to such part of the public service as shall not crowd out the spiritual instruction. We believe our public services would be made more effective if some of our ministers were to give special study to preaching more concisely and briefly in harmony with the instruction contained in the spirit of prophecy. Particular attention should be given to simplifying the character and minimizing the time of church announcements and exercises preliminary to the preaching service.

9. We urge that our ministers and church officers give special attention to personal labor for the individual members of the church, visiting them in their homes, accepting of their hospitality when consistent, writing the absent ones and bringing so far as possible the entire church membership under personal observation and labor as needed.

10. We urge our ministers and church officers by example and admonition to elevate the standard of Christian conduct, educating our church members as to consistent, godly living, and that where ^Bible standards are persistently violated after proper labor according to the Scriptures, that appropriate Christian discipline be enforced in order that the church shall not share in the responsibility of the sins of its members.

11. We urge our ministers and church officers to be prompt in reporting for the Review and union conference papers, giving missionary incidents and experiences as incentive and encouragement to Christian ministry on the part of the entire church.

The Finance Committee presented further recommendations, which were adopted as follows:

PUBLISHING HOUSE INDEBTEDNESS:

We recommend, 1. That a vigorous campaign be entered upon by the Bible Houses and publishing institutions throughout the world, for the payment of all their interest-bearing debts and bills payable accounts above those representing current business, by the close of 1928.

2. That the following methods of attaining this end be employed:

a. Earnest endeavor to increase income through larger sales.

b. The maintenance of proper prices,

c. Rigid economies and prompt collections.

d. By reducing raw stock to a minimum, closing out edition-ends of books and magazines, keeping current inventories of printed stock as low as consistent with prompt service, and by the conversion into cash of unused or unnecessary machinery or property of any kind.

e. Appropriations from local conference or mission, and if necessary from union and division conferences.

f. Where the foregoing sources are insufficient, special gifts be made from publishing house earnings, such gifts being conditioned on the needy institution or its constiuency raising a like amount.

3. In view of this proposed emergency use of publishing house earnings, which is to be confined to the budgets of 1927 and 1928, our mission divisions be asked to limit their 1928 requests for buildings and machinery to the minimum, thus making available for debt-paying purposes the largest possible amount.

4. It is understood and agreed that these debtpaying grants will be made only to institutions whose past records and future policies are such as to assure the General Conference that they would maintain their freedom from debt after having been relieved from it.

FORTY-NINTH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 5, 1926, 10 A M

Eleventh meeting of the Council October 5, 10 A.M. W A Spicer in the chair. D U Hale offered prayer.

After a short devotional meeting, led by F C Gilbert the chairman read a cheering message from the brethren in Newfoundland, expressing their hearty cooperation with us in all lines of missionary endeavor.

The Committee on Plans presented a further report, which was amended and adopted as follows:

ORPHANS AND AGED:

In the care of orphans and aged persons of our church, we recognize as sound these principles enunciated in the spirit of prophecy:

1. That the private home is a better place for their reception and care than an institution.

2. That the responsibility for their care rests first upon their relatives, next upon their local church, and last upon the church as a whole.

3. That in the case of orphans who because of peculiar circumstances seem to require special oversight and training, any institution intended for them should follow as closely as possible the model of the ideal home: small in size, in a country environment, giving industrial, intellectual, and spiritual training, and being conducted by Christian men and women in an atmosphere of genuine interest and love.

In accordance with these principles, we--

<u>Recommend</u>, 1. That thorough instruction be given our people in regard to principles of caring for our orphans and aged persons and the maintenance of conditions within private homes which will make such care a benefit and blessing not only to the dependent but to those who thus care for them.

2. That each of our local conferences seek to give aid in the placing of needy orphans and aged persons in Christian homes; and that to this end a survey be made in each conference to discover suitable private homes for either orphans or aged persons, that an up-to-date file be maintained in the conference office for reference as needed, and that this work be under the charge of the conference president unlless other provision is made.

3. That the General Conference be asked to appoint a representative committee to give study to the question of establishing small homes for special classes of needy children, and to the problem of coordinating and systematizing this whole philanthropic work throughout the conferences, this committee to report to the next Autumn Council.

4. In harmony with the instruction in the Testimonies, Vol. 5, page 150, we recommend that our churches be encouraged to give more liberally to the "Poor Fund" for the poor, the needy aged, and orphans, and that thankofferings be received for this fund weekly or monthly as circumstances may indicate.

5. That we request the Minority Committee to arrange for a small leaflet clearly setting forth these principles to our people.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES FOR CAMP MEETINGS:

In an endeaworto make our camp meetings of the greatest possible spiritual uplift to all who attend, --

We recommend, That those in charge of such meetings give careful attention to the following contributing factors:

1. That all work of camp preparation be completed early enough to enable conference workers to assist and visit with the campers as soon as they reach the grounds.

2. That the dates of the camp meetings in the union be so arranged, as far as possible, as not to double up, thus enabling General and union workers to spend time enough at each meeting to do progressive and constructive work.

3. That the daily program be so arranged as to allow time for personal prayer and work in behalf of the campers.

4. That the sermons preached be reasonably brief, and that an endeavor be made to begin and close meetings on time. 5. That all conference business be taken care of as early as possible, thus clearing the way for undivided attention and effort in soul winning work.

6. That all local workers be encouraged to join heartily with visiting ministers in doing thorough work for the spiritual welfare of the campers.

7. That as far as consistent the evening services be devoted to the presentation of the truths of the third angel's message in their proper spiritual setting with Jesus Christ presented as the central theme of every doctrine.

8. That provision be made whereby efficient and careful attention be given to the spiritual needs and instruction of parents, youth and children, each in their group.

9. That each department be given at least one hour during the camp meeting, when a full attendance of all campers may be expected.

10. That large attendance be secured for early morning meetings, and that such meetings be devoted largely to prayer and testimonies rather than to preaching.

11. That the responsibilities connected with the work of the camp be distributed among duly appointed committees thus having all work well organized and cared for without over burdening any one worker. And, further, that a daily workers' devotional meeting be held in connection with the pitching of the camp, and continuing throughout the camp meeting.

THE "REVIEW AND HERALD":

Our general church paper the "Review and Herald" occupies a unique place in our denominational literature, in that it is the one periodical which represents the progress of the world-wide message. Weekly it brings messages of instruction and inspiration as relate to doctrinal truth, practical Christian experience, and missionary activity. It sounds a definite call to consecration and increasing devotion to the great work committed to us as a people. We believe its regular and continuous reading will safeguard our people against the delusions of the last days, and prepare them to stand in the closing crisis loyal to God and His truth. We therefore,--

Recommend, 1. That each leader in this cause do everything in his power by precept and example, to bring prominently before our people the spiritual value of the Review and Herald. 2. That ministers and church elders be encouraged to keep the admonitions, warnings and spiritual lessons of the <u>Review</u> before their congregations by public use of mission reports and other timely matter appearing in its columns.

3. That our academy and college teachers be encouraged to use the <u>Review and Herald</u> as reference material on missions and denominational progress, and that some planebe devised so that as far as consistent each room occupied by students in these schools shall be supplied weekly during the school year with a copy of the Review.

4. That we ask our church officers to make a systematic yearly canvass of their churches for the purpose of placing a copy of the <u>Review</u> in the home of every English reading Seventh-day Adventist.

In addition to the above recommendations the Council took the following action;

"Voted, That in order to strengthen the Home Missionary Department in its work of increasing the subscription list of the <u>Review and Herald</u>, thus lifting the spiritual life in our churches, we request the Southern New England Conference to release A.E.Sanderson temporarily, to connect with the General Conference Home Missionary Department for temporary service and support as may be worked out by the Minority Committee.

APPRECIATION AND THANKS:

The delegates to this Autumn Council hereby take occasion to convey their deep appreciation to the officers and members of the Battle Creek Tabernacle for the use of their new edifice for the Autumn Council sessions, and for the hospitality offered in their homes in the entertainment of many of the delegates.

Furthermore, the Council extends its thanks to the newspapers of Battle Creek and other cities for the liberal space they have given in publishing the proceedings of the Council.

INVITATIONS FOR 1927 COUNCIL:

The following union presidents extended hearty invitations to the General Conference Committee to hold the next Autumn Council in their unions: S E Wight for the Central, to hold the Council in Omaha; M B Van Kirk, to meet in one of the cities in the Southwestern Union; W H Heckman, to Chattanooga, in the Southeastern Union.

PACIFIC UNION--PERCENTAGE OF TITHE:

The secretary of the Pacific Union read the following action which had been taken by the Pacific Union Conference Committee concerning the percentage of tithe coming from that union to the General Conference treasury:

"<u>Whereas</u>, It is the desire of the Pacific Union Conference to join the other conferences in North America, at the time of the Autumn Councils, in making gifts of surplus tithe to the General Conference Missions Fund; and,--

"Whereas, The arrangement entered into by the Pacific Union Conference Committee at the Autumn Council of 1925, increasing the percentage division of tithe to the mission funds of the General Conference is not satisfactory to us; therefore,--

"The Pacific Union Conference Committee has, by vote, unanimously rescinded the action which increased the percentage division of tithe; this change to become effective with the close of the 1926 business.

"In lieu of this plan, we the representatives of the Pacific Union Conference, pledge our continued support and liberality, and will forward such amounts of surplus tithe from time to time as a policy of strict economy in operating our fields will permit, thus placing us on the same basis with other conferences."

The Council voted approval of this action.

AUDITING COMMITTEE:

FIFTIETH MEETING

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 5, 1926, 4 P M

Twelfth meeting of the Council, Tuesday, October 5, 4 P M. W A Spicer in the chair. After the opening hymn, J E Cox offered prayer.

WORKING POLICY:

VOTED, To refer the revision of the Working Policy to the officers, leaving it to them to incorporate such changes as may be necessary and in harmony with the latest actions of the Committee and the Conference in session.

REVISIONS IN WAGE SCALE:

The Committee on Finance recommended the following revisions in the Wage Scale, which were adopted:

That paragraphs 1, 2, and 3, together with the preamble be stricken out, making the Wage Scale tabulation paragraph 1. Change number 4 to 2, 5 to 3, and insert the following as number 4:

4. We recommend that this Wage Scale be strictly adhered to, and that no bonuses, special holiday allowances, year-end or other special appropriations of any kind be made, except in cases of extreme emergency or serious illness.

Change number 7 to 5 and strike out number 8. Number 9 then becomes number 6. In number 6a strike out the words: "That under ordinary circumstances." For 6b substitute the following:

b. We recommend the mileage plan as an equitable basis of operating automobiles, with four cents as the minimum and six cents as the maximum, according to the purchase price of cars and the expense of operating in any one territory. That no charge be made for carrying conference workers, and no other allowances or appropriations be made to apply on the purchase price or operation of cars, except sharing reasonably in liability insurance. The above assistance in operating cars shall be given only where the worker has first secured approval of the conference committee. Each conference committee shall set a mileage limit for each individual worker, according to the situation in each field and the duties required of the worker. This recommendation to become effective January 1, 1927 Change the minimum rate for local conference presidents, etc. from \$25.00 to \$30.00. Change the minimum rate for ordained ministers, etc., from \$25.00 to \$28.00. Change the minimum rate for local conference treasurers from \$18.00 to \$20.00.

We recommend, That the General Conference Committee appoint a committee of nine, who shall give study to the rate of wages paid to physicians connected with denominational institutions, or employed by conferences or missions; also to the wages paid to husband and wife when both are employed; such committee to report to this body at a later session.

With the foregoing revisions, the Wage Scale will be as follows:

2. That this wage scale apply in principle in all the world, it being understood that the committee of each division field will make a wage scale for its territory in terms of local currency, and in harmony with the living costs and standards of the people of their respective territories.

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3. That in placing the wage of officers and other leaders at a low rate, we recognize our inability, in justice to the rank and file of workers, to give more than nominal reward in remuneration to those who carry responsibility of leadership.

4. We recommend, That this wage scale be strictly adhered to, and that no bonuses, special holiday allowances, year-end or other special appropriations of any kind be made, except in cases of extreme emergency or serious illness.

SUBSIDIES FOR RENT

5.a. That where, in the opinion of the conference committee, conditions require a worker to pay as rent, exclusive of gas, water, light, and heat, more than 20 per cent of his monthly salary, he may be subsidized by the conference on the basis of a flat rate not to exceed \$30 per month; if additional amount is required, such amount shall be divided between the conference and the worker on a fifty-fifty basis.

b. That no subsidies for rent be given when the monthly rental is not in excess of 20 per cent of the laborer's monthly wage. Any subrenting of apartments to be deducted from the total rental allowed.

c. That no allowance be made for rental on property to which the worker holds title.

EXCESSIVE AUTOMOBILE EXPENSE

6. In order to safeguard the cause against excessive or unnecessary automobile expense, --

we recommend, a. That we advise against conference ownership of automobiles for the use of conference workers.

We recommend, b. The mileage plan as an equitable basis of operating automobiles, with four cents a mile as the minimum and six cents as the maximum, according to the purchase price of cars and the expense of operating in any one territory. That no charge be made for carrying conference workers, and no other allowances or appropriations be made to apply on the purchase price or operation of cars, except sharing reasonably in liability insurance. The above assistance in operating cars shall be given only where the worker has first secured approval of the conference committee. Each conference committee shall set a mileage limit for each individual worker, according to the situation in each field and the duties required of the worker. This recommendation to become effective January 1, 1927. 7

7. That in view of the wide range of experience of men in many of the classes of workers listed in this schedule, and inasmuch as minimum and maximum rates have been stated for these various classes, --

We recommend, That men of long experience and tried service be rated at or near the maximum, while those of lesser experience receive, during their earlier terms of service, more nearly the minimum rates stated in the report.

SUPPLEMENTARY RATE TO PHYSICIANS

8. That in view of the heavy expense incurred in their education, and of the necessity of keeping in touch with latest methods of operating practice, the rate for sanitarium superintendents and assistant physicians be supplemented, according to the experience and service of the physician, by an amount not less than 10 per cent and not more than 30 per cent of the rate named in the wage scale for their respective classes

BOARD AND HOTEL ALLOWANCE

9. That hotel room rates be allowed our workers when traveling.

10. That a traveling allowance of \$1.00 a day be made to General Conference, division conference, and General and division institutional workers, whenever a laborer is on his personal expense.

11. That Nos. 9 and 10 apply in union and local conferences as their respective committees may deem just.

12. That the wages of young men starting in the work as secretaries of departments be audited the same as young men starting in the ministry, and that they be advanced according to their development, about equally.

The Committee on Finance submitted further recommendations, which were adopted as follows:

REPAIR EXPENSE:

Whereas, It would tend to stabilize the expense of an institution if each year's operation could bear its proportionate share of the repair expense, -- We recommend, That each institution open a repair reserve account, and that an amount sifficient to cover the repair expense be charged to operating, and credited to this account, at the end of each month or six-weeks period, it being understood that repairs will be charged against this account as completed, and that any balance remaining at the close of the year shall be carried forward to the succeeding year.

Further, That the rate to be credited to this reserve account be determined by the auditor in counsel with the management of the institution.

ACCOUNTANTS:

Whereas, The importance of regular and complete financial statements, together with information for proper budget control, has been demonstrated, thus requiring a highgrade of accountants; and,--

Whereas, We have no established plan for the selected ion and maintenance of suitable account in our secondary schools, --

We recommend, The following as a working basis for the selection and employment of secondary school accountants:

a. That we make it our aim that the accountant meet the General Conference standard in education required of teachers in such schools, and that where the work can be so arranged, he teach the classes in bookkeeping.

b. That in case he does not teach, his employment be based on his technical knowledge and experience in this this work.

c. That he be employed only after counsel with and by the advice of the principal or manager of the school, the union conference auditor, and the union secretary of education.

EXTENSION FUNDS:

Whereas, Several mission publishing institutions greatly need help in translating and meeting the initial expense of subscription books for limited language areas, and it is becoming more and more essential that the instruction and information contained in some of our trade books be made available to the leading language groups in mission lands; therefore, -- We recommend, That Publishing Extension Funds be used during 1927 for translations and initial expenses of the subscription books and for the translation of the trade books described above, when properly budgeted and approved by union and division committees.

The Committee on the Budget presented the following further report, which was adopted:

SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS:

We Recommend, 1. That the following special appropriations be made:

To the Ohio Conference toward the rebuilding of the Mt. Vernon Academy power plant and printing office \$2,000.00

To the Ohio Conference to assist the Columbus, Ohio, Colored church 1,000.00 (Both of the above from 1926 Emergency Fund).

To the Arizona Academy Spanish School on the one half of its indebtedness to be assumed by the General Conference 10,840.60

That the treasurer be authorized to meet two fifths of the operating subsidy of the Arizona Academy Spanish School, the amount of such sibsidy to be determined after a careful survey of the school has been made.

That an appropriation of \$500.00 be made to the Arizona Academy Spanish School to apply on the portion of the subsidy assumed by the Southwestern Union Conference

To the South American Division Conference for opening up work in the upper Amazon region, the amount to be supplied from the 1927 Emergency Fund 5,000.00

To the Atlantic Union Conference for the Southern New England Conference in view of the heavy loss in tithe left in the conference as a result of the uniting of the Massachusetts and the Southern New England Conferences which have a population of more than 5,000,000

MEXICAN SCHOOL:

3. That we authorize the Inter-American Division to transfer the \$4000 formerly voted for a church in Mexico City for use in paying for the school property at Tacubaya, which is their first need, allowing any recuests for the Mexico City church to come up at some future time.

PHYSIOTHERAPY-HYDROTHERAPY BUILDING:

Whereas, At the last constituency meeting of the College of Medical Evangelists study was given to the building program of that institution, resulting in a decision to provide a Physiotherapy-Hydrotherapy Building at Los Angeles instead of a dormitory as previously planned; and,--

Whereas, Approval of this plan was given by the General Conference in its session at Milwaukee; and,--

Whereas, The \$10,000 appropriated from the comeback at the last Autumn Council toward the building of a dormitory has been transferred to apply on the Physiotherapy-Hydrotherapy Building enter.prise; and,-- Whereas, The \$10,000 appropriated one year ago was predicated upon the idea that a similar amount would be reguired in 1927; therefore, --

We recommend, 4. That the treasurer be authorized to appropriate a further amount of \$10,000 from the comeback toward the building of a Physiotherapy-Hydrotherapy Building at the White Memorial Hospital in Los Angeles.

AFRICAN DIVISION--COMEBACK:

Whereas, The African Division has heretofore been dealt with on a different basis than other mission fields relative to the comeback, this field having received its comeback as a portion of the annual appropriation, and in the interests of unification, --

We recommend, 5. (a) That the plan of the African Division retaining its comeback be discontinued.

(b) That adjustment be made on the base rate of appropriation to the African Division equal to the amount of their comeback for the year 1925.

PREPARATION OF THE BUDGET:

Whereas, The purpose of the annual budget is to re-

flect both the actual operating expenses of the various fields as well as an estimate of the funds required for new work, and since appropriations made by the General Conference must be proportional to its receipts, and increases in appropriations can be made only in proportion to the normal increase of funds at the home base and in the mission field;

We recommend, 1. That the budget sent to the General Conference be classified under two general heads:

- A. Present Work
- B. New Work

2. That Present Work, otherwise known as Class 1, be shown in two columns to be known as Class 1 A and Class 1 B.

3. That Class 1 A represent the actual cost of present work as shown in the working sheets of the various sections of the field for the current year, this to include salary and expense of all regularly employed workers, furlough expense, replacements, administrative expense, exchange, and any other actual operating expense aside from contemplated new work. 4. That Class 1 B represent increased expenses of carrying on present work, such as increases in salaries, increase in transportation costs, etc.

5. That Class 1 A be not more than the combined receipts from the field the previous year and the appropriation from the General Conference the present year.

6. That New Work be classified under three heads, namely, Class II, New Workers, and transportation and outfitting expense of the same; Class III, New Expenses aside from land and buildings; Class IV, Land and Buildings.

7. That notwithstanding the great need of funds for the extension of the work in every land, the combined requests for New Work in various classes be not more than 10 or 15 percent above the appropriation for the previous year.

8. That to avoid the possibility of cuts in appropriation for Present Work, due consideration be given to the base appropriations of the General Conference, so that the repeating expenses in Class 1 A be not more than the base appropriations of the General Conference plus the receipts available in the field, estimated on the previous year.

ADJUSTMENT OF WAGE RATES IN INTER-AMERICA AND SOUTH AMERICA:

A committee which had been appointed at the time of the General Conference session in Milwaukee, on living conditions and the wage rate paid in the Inter-American and South American Divisions, made a report, which was adopted as follows:

Your committee appointed by the Minority Committee, in harmony with the action of the General Conference, to make an investigation of living conditions existing, and the rate of wage paid in Inter-America and South America, offer the following:

First: The committee are of the opinion that living expenses on the average in countries outside the United States are about on an equality with living expenses in this country.

Second: As to Inter-America. After studying the budget of Inter-American workers, we concur in the opinion expressed by their division committee, that the lower paid workers are the ones who are in need of rate adjustment, and we advise that such workers as are receiving a wage far below the standard rate be advanced as, in the judgment of the committees concerned, conditions in the field may require. However, we advise that these adjustments be made within the regular appropriation received by the field for its operating, and we further advise that these adjustments be made before calling additional workers from the United States. In the opinion of this committee such an adjustment of wages will be of greater value in improving the morale of workers in the field than the bringing in of new workers.

Since the adjustments of payroll and the placing of workers are strictly division matters, the questions referred to above must be worked out by the Inter-American Division Committee.

Third: As to South America. The problem of actually setting a living wage for workers in South America is complex. Sectional conditions are marked with more or less constant fluctuations in money exchanges which influence the purchasing power of money. Adding to this confusion, some South American governments have actually changed the parity relationship of their currency as compared to the American dollar. For these reasons your committee is of the opinion it would be cuite impracticable, at so great a distance, to make a proper study of conditions having a bearing upon wages with the expectation of bringing to the Council definite recommendations. We would rather suggest that responsibility in this matter be left primarily with the South American Division, remembering that within a few months one of the officers of the home Board will probably be with them and could join the Division in study and counsel.

SUSTENTATION FUND:

The Committee on Sustentation presented a report, which was amended and adopted as follows:

The benefits of the Sustentation Fund are designed for those who have devoted their lives to continuous service in the work, and those who have entered the work in their declining years should not be understood as having given lifetime service to the cause, and consequently eligible to sustentation benefits. In view of this:

We recommend, 1. That those who have given less than ten years of service to the cause be not considered eligible to the benefits of the Sustentation Fund, and that such service shall have been continuous, except as a worker may for some very special reason, such as poor health, have dropped his work for a time, such discontinuance having been

by arrangement with, and the consent of the organization employing him.

2. That regular colporteurs, bearing papers from the conference, who have put in ten years of continuous service, such period reaching up to the time the laborer is incapacitated for active work, shall be eligible to the benefits of the Sustentation Fund. 3. That special care be exercised in bringing men into the service of this cause who have already reached the age of forty, or women who have reached the age of thirtyfive; however, where conditions seem to warrant employment after men and women have passed these ages, that they be not regarded as eligible to support from the Sustentation Fund except after having served fifteen continuous years.

4. That in order that the Sustentation Fund be not overburdened, it is understood that disabled workers who have so far regained their health as to be able to take up physical or other labor, be expected to do so until such time as they can engage again in denominational service.

5. That care be taken that workers who are able to do practically full work in conferences or churches be not continued on the Sustentation Fund longer than is necessary.

An item which had passed through one of the sub-committees, on attendance of Home Missionary Secretaries at bookmen's conventions, was presented, and it was--

VOTED, That the Home Missionary Secretaries join the bookmen in joint conventions in the various publishing house territories in the early part of 1927.

The committee which had been appointed on the readjustment of the Mexican-American border, brought in the following report:

Your committee has given study to communications from the Aztec Union Mission, the Southwestern Union Conference, and the Secretary of the Spanish Department of the Bureau of Home Missions, relative to the working of border cities along the frontier between Mexico and the United States.

In view of the unusual political situation in Mexico, which makes it difficult for American-Mexican workers to labor in that republic, and the advantage that it will be, therefore, to the work in Mexico to maintain contact points with the work in that field from the American border, we would recommend to the various organizations concerned the following adjustment as the working policy for the Spanish work along the Mexican-American border:

Tia Juana and vicinity to be operated by the Southeastern California Conference.

Calexico, Mexicali, Nogales, Naco, and Douglass, to be worked by the Sonora Mission. El Paso, Ciudad Juarez, to be worked by the Texico Conference.

field. Presidio and Eagle Pass to be worked by the Mexican

Nuevo Laredo and Laredo to be worked by the South Texas Conference.

Brownsville and Matamoras to be worked by the Mexican Mission.

Outside of these contact points we recommend that the other communities and villages be worked by the respective fields to which they territorially belong.

VOTED, To adopt the report, and pass it on as a suggestion to the organizations concerned.

INSTITUTIONAL RELIEF:

Plans for the Institutional Relief Campaign of 1927 were presented and adopted as follows:

We recommend, 1. That in harmony with the action of the Autumn Council, the field goal for the 1927 Institutional Relief effort be \$200,000, not including any appropriations from the General Conference for institutional relief.

2. That the funds to be raised in this Institutional Relief plan be secured through gifts from our church members, and also by the sale of relief books.

3. That all our church members be asked to make gifts to the Institutional Relief Fund, and where outright gifts can not be made, short-time pledges be given to be paid if possible on or before February 26,1927, but not later than June 30.

4. That careful attention be given to the instruction of the spirit of prophecy relative to the sale of the two relief books, i.e. "Christ's Object Lessons" and "Ministry of Healing," and that all our members and workers be urged to share in the relief effort in accordance with this plan.

5. That in accordance with the General Conference working policy, the Home Missionary Department promote this relief effort under the general direction of the Treasury Department of the General Conference.

6. That each union conference arrange for the promotion of the relief work within its territory, arranging for special days for the presentation of the effort to the churches and any other plans for the success of the campaign.

7. That beginning the first week in January, the Review and Herald carry articles concerning the Relief Effort, and that Elders Shaw, Spicer, McElhany and Beddoe contribute articles, and that each union conference president and the presidents of the colleges furnish articles. Also that Claude Conard write on the results of the budget system in our schools, and C W Irwin furnish articles outlining the permanence of the "no debt" policy.

8. That promotion literature consist of an envelope-size leaflet featuring the general plans for the Relief Effort, brief history of the relief work thus far, etc.

9. That two four-page leaflets be prepared, one to contain a canvass for "Christ's Object Lessons" with simple instructions as to how to present the books, and a similar one for the presentation of "Ministry of Healing."

10. That Home Missionary and Field Missionary Secretaries in the local conferences endeavor to hold meetings in all of the larger centers in each conference, giving instructions as to the best way to present the books, and that our colporteurs be asked to do their share in this campaign. Further, whenever it does not interfere with their regular work, the conferences be urged to make available the experience of our colporteurs in salesmanship in promotion meetings as an encouragement to our church members to approach their neighbors with the Relief books.

11. That the Educational Department, through its secretaries and through the schools, cooperate with the Home Missionary Department to promote the relief effort and encourage faculties and students to make a gift to the Relief Fund and actively take up the sale of relief books for the benefit it will be to them as well as to the school.

12. That the Medical Department promote the relief plan: (a) through our sanitariums by encouraging doctors, nurses, and helpers to make a donation to the Relief Fund and also devote some time to the sale of relief books; (b) by promoting the plan among doctors and nurses in private practice

13. That opportunity be taken in church officers' or elders' meetings to give careful study to raising every member's share of the Institutional Relief Fund.

14. That in order to arrive at a definite understanding of the results of the Institutional Relief effort for 1927, all funds, including short-time pledges, be in the hands of the union treasurers not later than June 30.

15. That conferences bill relief books to churches and isolated members at wholesale, plus carriage, the business being conducted through the tract society and church missionary secretary as usual.

Institutional Relief for Colored Believers

16. That our colored believers in the three Southern unions be asked to raise money in the Institutional Relief campaign for the Oakwood Junior College. 17. That the money raised in the Institutional Relief campaign by colored believers in the Atlantic, Columbia, Central and Lake Unions, in 1927, be placed with the General Conference treasurer, it being understood that this money shall be sent to him through the regular channels of the local and union conferences, to be held in a fund to be used for the establishment of a school for colored youth in the North.

18. That the other unions in which there are colored believers be left to decide as to whether their colored constituencies will devote their energies in the Institutional Relief campaign to raising money for the school for colored youth in the North or the union Relief Fund.

SCUTHWESTERN UNION-- 1000:

VOTED, That the treasurer be authorized to make a special appropriation of \$1000 to the Southwestern Union, to assist in meeting an emergency that has come to them in connection with their Indian work.

This special session of the Minority Committee was called to give opportunity to Elders William Guthrie and W A Westworth, who had made a special trip to Washington, to present some of their problems to the Committee.

\$5,000 FOR W E M O:

Elders Guthrie and Westworth presented to the Committee the growing needs of the radio station at Berrien Springs. A request for \$5,000 was presented at the General Conference in session in Milwaukee, and was referred to the Autumn Council, at which time, however, no consideration was given to the requested appropriation as it was hoped the Lake Union would be able to handle this without assistance. The work is growing so rapidly and the expenditures are so large that the Lake Union is now unable to carry forward the work without assistance.

VOTED, That to meet this emergency the General Conference appropriate \$5,000, with the understanding that this establishes no precedent for any future appropriation for this work.

MISSION TALKS FOR RADIO:

After hearing of the extraordinary possibilities of the work that might be accomplished through the W E M C radio broadcasting station at Berrien Springs, not only in disseminating this message, but in presenting facts regarding missionary work, thus securing gifts from "listeners-in" for missions, it was

VOTED, That we ask the General Conference secretaries to compile material for an eight to ten minute mission talk to be broadcast from the W E M C station on each Monday evening.

WEST MICHIGAN--PER CENT OF TITHE:

Eilliam Guthrie, president of the Lake Union, explained to the Committee that the West Michigan Conference as now constituted is embarrassed in its operation for the coming year due to the fact that the North Michigan Conference has been united with West Michigan, and the consolidation of the tithe of the two conferences, according to the General Conference policy, calls for an additional percent of the combined tithe to be sent to the General Conference. It was explained that more time is needed by the West Michigan Conference to enable it to adjust its budget to this changed situation. It was-- VOTED, That these united conferences continue on the old basis of division of tithe to the General Conference up to July 1, 1927, with the understanding that beginning on that date the West Michigan Conference will go on the same basis of division of tithe to the General Conference as other local conferences in North America.

B G WILKINSON--PACIFIC UNION COLLEGE:

VOTED, To pass on to the Columbia Union and the Washington Missionary College the call from the Pacific Union for Dr B G Wilkinson to connect with Pacific Union College as head of the Bible Department.

GEORGE CARTER--BERMUDA:

VOTED, To pass on to the Columbia Union and the Ohio Conference the call from the Atlantic Union for George Carter to take charge of the colporteur work in Bernuda.

M E KERN--ITINERARY:

VOTED, That we approve of the itinerary of M E Kern, which includes Missionary Volunteer councils in the Pacific Union Conference commencing in February, 1927.

C A RUSSELL:

VOTED, That we request C A Russell to attend meetings in New Jersey over the coming week end.

MEDICAL EXPENSES:

VOTED, To refer the question of assistance on medical expense in the case of Mrs Ernest Ayars, on furlough from South America, to the committee on adjustment.

VOTED, To refer to the committee on adjustment the question of assistance on medical expense in the case of M A Ackley, returned from China.

Adjourned.

R W SMITH:

Correspondence was read to inform the Committee of the permanent return of R W Smith from the Tongan Mission, Brother Smith feeling it necessary to return to America for the sake of his children. He will probably be landing in San Francisco in March.

FREE TUITION:

An action of the African Division was brought to the attention of the Committee, dealing with the question of granting free tuition to students coming to the United States for the purpose of completing their education.

It was agreed to instruct the General Conference Educational Department to inform Africa that we shrink from generally and officially encouraging any young people to come to the United States for their education, in view of the number of difficulties that might possibly result from such a course, while at the same time we leave every individual free to carry out his own convictions and plans, without giving him any monetary enducement. Further, that this whole question will be more fully discussed at the next Autumn Council.

TUITION RATES--MISSIONARIES' CHILDREN:

The question of tuition rates for the children of our missionaries was also studied, and it was--

VOTED, To ask the Educational Department to study further the cuestion of free tuition for the children of our missionaries who are in the mission field, and to lay the facts before the next Autumn Council.

B L HOUSE--WALLA WALLA COLLEGE:

VOTED, To pass on to the Pacific Union Conference and Pacific Union College the call from the North Pacific Union for B L House to connect with Walla Walla Jollege as Bible teacher.

EDUCATIONAL COUNCILS:

The secretaries of the Educational Department reported the good experiences and results from the School Homes and Bible Teachers Councils, and spoke of the desirability of following such a program of sectional institutes, rather than to hold a general educational convention in 1927, and it was--

VOTED, That we approve of the Educational Department continuing their plans for educational institutes in different sections, subject to the consent of the respective unions.

J C THOMPSON--ITINERARY:

The following itinerary for J C Thompson was presented and approved: To spend the month of January in the Atlantic Union Conference, and February in West Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Kentucky.

N Z TOWN:

VOTED, That N Z Town attend the colporteurs' institute in Ohio, commencing January 1.

HONAN SCHOOL:

In view of the terrible situation prevailing in some sections of the Far Eastern Division as a result of present war conditions, and in view of the importance of the Honan school, it was--

VOTED, That we comply with the earnest request of the Far Eastern Division, and grant them an emergency appropriation of \$7,000, to enable them to rebuild the Honan school, recently destroyed by fire.
