That N.F.Brewer's itinerary be extended to include attendance at the Panama Conference session, January 3-18.

Paul Wickman to the Southern Asia Division, February and March, in the interests of the radio work.

G.E. Vandeman, Southern Asia Division, May, June and July, and part of August if necessary, for evangelistic councils and ministerial meetings.

W.H.Bergherm, Southern, Central and Northern Europe, beginning January 15.

A.L.White, Southern Europe, March through July, including attendance at Youth's Congress in Paris.

VOTED, That the representative of each of the General Conference Departments, including the Ministerial Association, the Auditing Department, the International Temperance Association, who is to be a member of the Committee on Administration for North America according to the action of the 1950 Autumn Council, shall be the head of the respective departments, it being understood that if the head of the department is away from the office, he shall designate another representative of the department to serve in his stead.

VOTED, That J.I.Robison be appointed the associate secretary of the North American Committee on Administration for North America.

H.C.KEPHART--RESIGNATION:

H.C.Kephart, who is now the secretary of the Southwestern Union Conference, having tendered his resignation as one of the elective members of the General Conference Committee, it was

VOTED, That the resignation of H.C.Kephart be accepted.

H.P.EVENS--MEMBER GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE:

VOTED, That H.P.Evens, manager of the Southern Publishing Association, be appointed a member of the General Conference Committee, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of H.C. Kephart.

DIVISION OF FOREIGN MISSIONS-COMMITTEES:

VOTED, That the following named persons be our representatives to serve on special committees of the Division of Foreign Missions of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States of America:

JOHN C.THOMPSON:

The chairman reported that during the time he and Elder Torrey were in Europe they had had a visit with Major John C. Thompson, who is in Government employ with the Occupation Forces in Germany. He stated that Brother Thompson is resigning from Government service and is returning to America.

VOTED, That the name of John C. Thompson be placed before the union and local conference administrators in North America, with the thought of an opportunity being offered for him to reenter the organized work.

ARNOLD D.JOHNSON, M.D. --- SOUTH AFRICA:

VOTED, To invite Arnold D.Johnson, M.D., of Seattle, Washington, to respond to the call from the Southern African Division for a doctor to come to that field for one or two years, to relieve doctors who are due furloughs; salary and transportation to be met by the division, but that outfitting and rehabilitation allowance be not provided unless the Doctor should

decide to remain in the field in a self-supporting capacity, when the regular provisions for self-supporting physicians in mission fields shall apply.

C.B.GUILD OR C.S.COOPER--CHINA DIVISION:

VOTED, To pass on to the Southern Asia Division the call from the China Division for C.B.Guild or C.S.Cooper to return to China, for evangelistic service in Formosa.

AUSTRALASIA -- E.R. GANE PUBLISHING SECRETARY:

VOTED, That, on recommendation of the Australasian Inter-Union Conference Committee, E.R.Gane be appointed publishing department secretary of the Inter-Union Conference, to take the place of H.G.Moulds, who has been elected president of the Trans-Commonwealth Union Conference.

M.V.TUCKER---SOUTH AMERICAN DIVISION:

VOTED, To request the North Pacific Union to release M.V.Tucker, to connect with the South American Division as secretary of the division.

ELDEN FORD--EXTENSION OF FURLOUGH:

VOTED, That on recommendation of the Inter-American Division Committee, Elden Ford, of the Honduras Industrial Academy, be granted a four months' extension of his furlough.

J.L.SHULER:

- VOTED, 1. That J.L.Shuler be under the direction of the General Conference Committee, his salary, transportation and other allowances to be met by the General Conference.
- 2. That when engaged in general field work, such as conducting ministerial institutes, etc., all his expenses be borne by the General Conference, but when engaged in a public effort all expenses incidental to the effort, such as rent allowance, travel expense, etc., be cared for by the field or fields concerned.

TRANSFER OF PROPERTIES IN CHINA:

VOTED, That we recommend to the General Conference Corporation that they transfer to the China Division of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists all the properties in China now being held by the Corporation, this in harmony with the agreement reached with the China Division representatives at the time of the General Conference session in San Francisco, in July, 1950.

FLEET ARRANGEMENTS:

VOTED, That the Fleet Arrangements as adopted in our meeting of November 16, 1950, be amended to read as follows:

Recommendations from the General Conference officers and the ESDÁ Sales and Service Committee were submitted, and being amended, were adopted as follows:

We recommend, 1. The following Fleet arrangements:

- That national contracts be maintained by ESDA Sales and Service with General Motors and the Studebaker Company.
- That with Chrysler, Ford, and Kaiser-Frazer contracts be maintained, but that separate contracts be authorized with these companies for the Pacific, North Pacific, and Southern Unions.
- That unions participating in these fleet contracts shall recognize the standards for eligibility to participate in fleet benefits as hereinafter set forth. (See "Regulations" below.)
 - That export orders be processed only by ESDA.
- That all fleet allotments except in cases where unions have signed fleet contracts as above provided shall be processed through ESDA Sales and Service.
- That the General Motors and the Studebaker Companies be asked to recognize as chargeable to our fleet allocation only such orders as are placed by ESDA.
- 2. That the working out of these arrangements and the allocation of fleet quotas to the respective unions be assigned to the Committee on Fleet Arrangements.
- That the Fleet Committee be asked to work out a contract form to be used by workers throughout the United States.

Regulations Governing Eligibility and Ownership for a Fleet Motor Vehicle

Standards of Eligibility for Fleet Cars:

Eligibility for the purchase of a fleet car will be de-

termined by the following points:

- That the motor vehicle is primarily needed by the employee for use in connection with the work of his employing Seventh-day Adventist organization.
- That eligibility shall be limited to full-time, permanent payroll employees (including full-time, year-round colporteurs, and sustentation beneficiaries not employed in nondenominational organizations).

- 3. That the purchaser agrees not to resell the car for a minimum of _____ months, or until after ____ miles of operation, as may be required by the manufacturers or dealers selling the cars.
- It is further understood that non-profit self-supporting institutions which have individually been approved by the General Conference Committee for the purchase of fleet cars together with their full-time permanent payroll employees who meet the conditions outlined above may qualify for fleet cars wherever the manufacturers fleet contract permits.

It is further understood that holding of title and ownership will be in harmony with the fleet contract requirement with the manufacturer concerned.

It is further understood that the acceptance of a fleet motor vehicle application is not a contract to deliver or a guarantee as to price. Cars can only be delivered as they become available and at prices in effect at the time of delivery.

LOMA LINDA FOOD COMPANY TO BORROW:

Request was presented from the Pacific Union on behalf of the Loma Linda Food Company for authorization to borrow \$125,000, in connection with the purchase from Dr. H.W.Miller of the International Nutrition Laboratories at Mt. Vernon, Ohio, for the purpose of establishing a branch of the Food Company in the East.

VOTED, That we give authorization to the Loma Linda Food Company to borrow \$125,000 in connection with acquiring the International Nutrition Laboratories, it being understood that the Pacific Union Conference is underwriting the proposition, and that the obligation will be liquidated from earnings of the Company at the rate of \$12,500 a year.

LITERATURE FOR MEN IN THE ARMED SERVICES:

VOTED, To appropriate from the Contingency Fund \$6,000 for literarure for our men in the armed services, \$4,000 for use by the North American War Service Commission, and \$2,000 by the International Commission; it being understood that any requests for further appropriations shall be lodged with the treasurer for consideration at the time of the Autumn Council.

- 2. Experience has shown that it is well for committees and workers to study each situation locally, consulting with consular officials as well as other missionaries as to the best steps to be taken.
- 3. That when the division has completed the planning suggested above, it is requested that the General Conference be furnished with a report of steps taken and understandings reached regarding personal safety of such workers and the arrangements for carrying on the work in their absence, so that intelligent cooperation of the General Conference can be assured when crises arrive, and also in order that assurances can be given to relatives of workers who are exposed to possible danger.
