DEVOTIONAL SERVICE:

<u>M. S. Nigri</u>, Chairman, read for our meditation 1 Kings 19: 19-21, in which Inspiration introduces Elisha as a prophet of the Lord. We desire to speak about Elisha. Usually we are inclined to think and speak more about Elijah. Elijah was a tremendous prophet and reformer, the greatest since the days of Moses. He is the precursor of John the Baptist, and of the Advent Movement. Our Church is that modern religious segment with the spirit of Elijah. We are committed today to do the gigantic work that Elijah did in his day: A work of reformation, a work of condemnation of sin, a work of restoration of God's law, and the work of preparing a people to meet the Lord.

Very few of us can be an Elijah today and do great exploits for God; but all can be like Elisha and humbly and quietly do faithfully the simple and routine daily work God asks us to do. As leaders of the remnant Church of God we can learn many lessons from the life of Elisha. In <u>Prophets and Kings</u>, Sister White points out many aspects of the life of Elisha and calls our attention to them. On page 219 she states that success depends not so much on talent as on energy and willingness, and emphasizes <u>the conscientious performance of daily duties</u>. On page 221 it is stated "It is the consecration of the life and all its interests <u>that is necessary</u>." Let us be humble and consecrated, "For God is at work in you, both to will and to work for His good pleasure."

INTRODUCTION:

Arthur L. White stated that the White Trustees requested F. D. Nichol to prepare a biography of Ellen G. White. Elder Nichol died in 1966, and in turn he, Arthur White, was requested to prepare such a work. Because of the pressure of other duties, he has been unable to give adequate attention to such an assignment. The General Conference Officers, therefore, agreed to arrange for

Ronald Graybill, a graduate of the SDA Theological Seminary, with a B.D. degree, to assist in the preparation of the biography. Ronald Graybill has been working for the past two years in the Northern California Conference. Elder White requested Ronald Graybill to stand, and introduced him to the Committee. He is to assist in the research and preparation of the biography.

REPORTS:

<u>M. E. Kemmerer</u>, Undertreasurer, just returned from Beirut, Lebanon, told of the inspirational meetings in the Afro-Mideast Division. It was interesting as we met together to sense a new spirit of courage and advance. We were especially encouraged to have brethren from the African fields with us. This brought a new quality into the discussions. They organized a Middle East Union, and elected R. C. Darnell as President; Manoug Nazirian as Secretary; and Rafic Issa as Treasurer. It is felt the new Division is off to a very good beginning.

E. E. Cleveland, Associate Secretary in the Ministerial Association, reported news from Jamaica that the first half of the year they had 3,312 baptisms. 1,212 of these were baptized in the second quarter alone. Ten men baptized over a hundred souls. The objective is 500 a week from the middle of the year to the end.

In the Bahamas Conference campaign, 50 people were out for the first Sabbath, and they baptized 36 of them.

<u>V. W. Schoen</u>, Secretary of the Lay Activities Department, brought greetings from the Seventh-day Adventist workers and believers in Germany, and spoke of the privilege he had in visiting the Central European Division, where three great congresses and four leadership training courses were held. The new leadership in the Division is heading for great things in the cause of God. The members are responding to our challenge to greater soul winning and personal work and dedication. The folk in Germany are not different from those in the Inter-American Division. They are about to go and do greater exploits for God. The leadership, dedication, and planning indicate our people in Germany are ready for mighty things for God.

Continuing the study of the Biblical record concerning Elisha, <u>M. S.</u> <u>Nigri</u>, as Chairman, presented another phase of his life. He read the conversation which took place, as given in 2 Kings 2, in which Elisha said he would not leave Elijah, and they went down to Bethel. This conversation was repeated on the way to Jericho and also to the Jordan. Guiding the plow on his father's farm, Elisha had learned not to fail or to become discouraged, and now he would not be diverted from his purpose. Elisha realized that he himself could receive a great blessing by walking close to Elijah.

If we were as strongly bound to Christ as Elisha was bound to Elijah, we would have more power in our lives, and we could see more marvelous things done for the cause of God. Let us note the results of this walking together. When they had crossed the Jordan River, Elisha asked for a double share of the spirit of Elijah. He asked not for a worldly honor or a high place, but for a large measure of the Spirit of God. Elisha's God is still here with us, His people and His leaders. Our need is faith in God. We cannot <u>see</u> Him, but we can <u>feel</u>, and have the assurance that He is with us as He stood with Elisha. Elder Nigri closed with a quotation from <u>Prophets and Kings</u>, page 228, paragraph 3, and this exhortation--Let us have a real walk daily with our Lord.

DEVOTIONAL SERVICE:

<u>M. S. Nigri</u>, Chairman, referred to 2 Kings 4 where we find the people calling Elisha "the man of God." Crudén's <u>Concordance</u> quotes this expression 52 times in the Old Testament only, and of these 22 refer to Elisha. What does "man of God" mean? I think that it is an equivalent for the word "saint." Elisha was a "saint of God." Sister White wrote: "The world needs evidences of sincere Christianity. The poison of sin is at work at the heart of society. Cities and towns are steeped in sin and moral corruption." (Prophets and Kings, 232, 233.)

We hear that the United States is confronted with the biggest epidemic of venereal disease since the last war. Sister White continues--"Through sin, the whole human organism is deranged, the mind is perverted, the imagination corrupted; the faculties of the soul are degraded. There is an absence of pure religion, of heart holiness. ... The soul is weak and, for want of moral force to overcome, is polluted and debased." Those were the conditions during the days of Elisha, and still he could live as a "holy man of God." More and more each one of us needs to be that "holy man of God," to be a blessing to the Church and to the world. Personal influence is a power. Today the Lord needs other "men of God" who, like Elisha, can be salutary influences in leading sinners to Christ.

Opening prayer by M. Carol Hetzell.

REPORTS:

Edwin Gibb, Associate Secretary, read a cable received from O. W. Lange, President of the Pakistan Union, stating with reference to the recent cyclone and tidal wave, one church was affected, but that the workers and believers are

safe. Throughout the coastal area there was devastation and a total loss of homes and crops. They requested the General Conference to send medical teams for inoculations, medical aid; and maximum financial help.

<u>C. E. Guenther</u>, Lay Activities Department Associate Secretary, read a cable from C. B. Guild, Secretary of the Southern Asia Division, stating that due to the colossal East Pakistan disaster the Division were authorizing equivalent to five thousand dollars; and requesting the General Conference to make twenty thousand available.

An emergency meeting of the Relief Committee was called this morning. Among the actions taken it was voted to appropriate \$20,000 relief funds, \$10,000 to be made available to the Southern Asia Division, and another \$10,000 to be held in reserve, for purchase of supplies to be sent over to Pakistan; with the suggestion that some of this money might be used to purchase materials over there--clothing, metal roofing, food, etc. The General Conference Officers have authorized us to inform our members in North America who desire to help that they can do so by cash donation. There will be a notice in the <u>Review and Herald</u>, on the back page, regarding this, and letters will be sent from this office to the North American Division administrators.

<u>C. C. Weis</u>, Lay Activities Department Associate Secretary, stated that thousands of our people are now going from door to door in connection with the Ingathering Crusade. He hopes we will remember them in our prayers, that they may have not only success in gathering in necessary dollars, but also souls.

\$2,005,801.02 was the total for the first week, a bit less than last year in the first week. Nevertheless, five unions raised more during the first week. The Alabama-Mississippi Conference has already reached the Silver Vanguard goal. Sixteen churches in the Potomac Conference have already reached and gone beyond the goal. We have made a very fine start. Our courage is good. We think this will be the greatest Ingathering Crusade in the history of the Church.

<u>M. S. Nigri</u>, Chairman, said tomorrow will be Thanksgiving Day. Let us each in our hearts express thankfulness one to another and to our God for the precious gift of salvation through His Son, Jesus Christ. In Elisha's day also they had many reasons to thank the Lord. It is from the miracle of the widow's oil that we wish to draw a lesson for us in this Thanksgiving devotional. The oil only stayed when she said, "There is not a vessel more." More vessels could give her more oil. God does not stop. It is man who limits the Lord's blessings. God is anxious to bless us.

Let us look back to the day of December 21, 1620, when the Pilgrim Fathers arrived in this country. What did they possess? Not much. What did they see around them? A new and undiscovered country; an uncultivated, virgin land with big forests; hard work, perplexities and fears; a challenge to their capacity and faith. But they had the presence of God. God does not fail if we keep our confidence in Him, and act as He directs us.
