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# Courage and Perseverance in the Ministry.

# (Concluded.)

WHAT we need now is untiring energy and perseverance, so that we will not be broken off from the work by difficulties and home perplexities. If we do allow our interest to be thus separated, the enemy will understand it, and he will make trouble right in our families to draw us away from the work. But if we firmly take our stand as God's workmen, saying, "The Lord has given us a message, and we cannot be faithful watchmen unless we stand at our post of duty; we will carry the work through at all hazards," then we shall find that angels of God will minister to our households at home, and will say to the enemy, "Stand back." It is a great and solemn work in which we are engaged, and God will help us to carry it forward, if we learn to rely wholly upon Him.

Oh, my brethren, put on the whole armor of God, and move with wisdom and intelligence. Do not work weeks and months to bring around a condition of things that will bind you hand and foot so that you cannot engage in the warfare as bold soldiers of Jesus Christ, and then mourn and complain because your circumstances are such that you cannot give yourselves wholly to the work. It is not God who lays upon you this burden. He has given you reason, and He wants you to use it. He would not have you arrange things at home so that when you go out to labor your minds will be continually upon your families. Before you make any move with reference to your families, He would have you consider carefully whether you are piling up burdens that will hinder you from engaging in His work. I have felt sad as I have heard different individuals tell how difficult it was for them to give themselves to the work of God. They do not like to consider the steps that they have taken to place themselves in this position. If God should work a miracle to bring them out of this position, they would go right to work to bring about another similar state of things. Such do not feel the necessity of counselling with God; they prefer to follow their own inclination and judgment.

Some have made it a point never to let temporal matters come between them and the work of God, and they have lost much in consequence of this. But what of that? What are temporal things when compared with the eternal? We have enlisted in the army of the Lord, and now let none of us create such a condition of things that we shall have to desert it.

I appeal to you, my brethren in the ministry. Connect yourselves more closely with the work of God. Many souls that might be saved, will be lost, unless you strive more earnestly to make your work as perfect as possible. There is a great work to be done in Australia. It may seem to move slowly and hard, but God will work mightily through you if you will only make an entire surrender to Him. Much of the time you will have to walk by faith, not by feeling.

All may have infirmities of some kind upon them. If so, do not gratify the enemy by standing in the desk and telling of those infirmities; but talk of the mighty power of Christ to bless all who come unto Him. Jesus lives. Move out by faith, and claim the promises of God. Do you not remember the woman that came behind Jesus and touched the hem of His garment, and was made whole? Hers is the kind of faith that you need. Many have the casual touch, but there are few who are closely connected with Christ by living faith.

Wherever you are, however trying your circumstances, do not talk discouragement. The Bible is full of rich promises. Can you not believe them? When we go out to labor for souls, God does not want us to go a warfare at our own charges. What does this mean? It means that we need not go in our own strength, for God has pledged His word that He will go with us.

As workers, let us seek the Lord together. Of our own selves we can do nothing; but through Christ we can do all things. God intends that we shall be a help and blessing to one another, and that we shall be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. In the hour of our deepest trial, Jesus will be our "bright and morning star." There is in life much sorrow of our own creating. Satan works up distrust and discouragement. But God lives and reigns; and He will give us all the help we need. It is our privilege at all times to draw strength and encouragement from His blessed promise, "My grace is sufficient for you."

#### Wills and Donations.

In the plan of salvation, God in love and mercy to fallen humanity has so arranged it that man may cooperate with 11im in the salvation of his fellow man. In no way is this co-operation more clearly shown to the world and recognised by our heavenly Father, than by a cheerful and liberal giving of the means with which He has blessed us, to carry forward His work in the earth. If our hearts are right toward God in this matter, we receive a double blessing at His hands: first, in the obtaining, "for it is He who gives us power to get wealth;" and, second, in giving it back to Him to be used in spreading a knowledge of His truth in the earth.

But while this is true, on the other hand, a wrong use or careless handling of the means entrusted to us, is a great sin. In our Saviour's teachings, He kept this thought prominently before His disciples: "Take heed, and beware of covetousness;" and in His warnings for the last days, He makes it quite clear that covetousness will be one of the prominent sins that His people must be careful to avoid. Luke 21:34. Satan knows humanity's weakness in this direction, so he says to his angels,—

"Go, make the possessors of lands and money drunk with cares. If you can make them place their affections upon these things, we will have them yet. . We must keep in our ranks all the means of which we can gain control. The more means the followers of Christ devote to His service, the more will they injure our kingdom by getting our subjects."—"Early Writings," p. 128. In order to save us from ignorantly falling into

In order to save us from ignorantly falling into Satan's trap, the Lord has revealed to us His plan, and forewarned us of the danger; yet notwithstanding all this the following statement is made in "Testimonies for the Church," Vol. 1, p. 199:—

"I was shown the awful fact that Satan and his angels have more to do with the management of the property of God's professed people than the Lord has."

In searching further to see how this is accomplished, I find the following: "Going security for unbelievers;" "loaning money to dishonest borrowers;" "holding on to our property, intending before we die to make a will, but are suddenly taken away, leaving our affairs in a tangled condition, to be consumed in a course of law;" "to save a little expense and trouble, have wills drawn up by incompetent parties, so that after death they are easily broken."

These are some of the ways by which the devil accomplishes his purpose; but it is more particularly to the last that I wish to call attention at this time.

It would be too strong a statement to make, as some do, that "a will is not worth the paper that it is written on," for there are a few instances where children regard the good name and wishes of their parents more than a few paltry pounds; but it is a fact that a large majority of the wills that are made in these days can be, and are, broken. Especially is this so when the bequests go to a religious organisation. "Not competent," "mentally incapacitated," "unduly influenced," "overpersuaded," etc., etc., are the reasons usually adduced why the will should be set aside. In addition to this, technical questions of law arise because the legator has failed to give the exact corporate name by which the society is known and can be identified.

In cases where it seems clear that no other manner of securing means to the cause should be adopted, no pains should be spared to obtain legal advice, and have wills drawn up in a manner to stand the test. When contemplating making a will, the first and most important thing is to find out the exact legal name of the society or organisation, and State, county, and city where its headquarters are and its principal business transacted, that you wish to assist. The names by which we know and speak of our organisations and institutions are, in only a few cases, the names by which they are known in the eyes of the law. It is the duty of the minister to call attention to these matters, and instruct the people. I quote a few lines from "Testimonies for the Church," Vol. 4, pp. 478, 479:—

"Many manifest a needless delicacy on this point. They feel that they are stepping upon forbidden ground when they introduce the subject of property to the aged or to invalids in order to learn what disposition they design to make of it. But this duty is just as sacred as the duty to preach the Word to save souls." "There are aged ones among us who are nearing the close of their probation; but for the want of wide-awake men to secure to the cause of God the means in their possession, it passes into the hands of those who are serving Satan."

But how much safer and better it would be for every one to act as executor of the means entrusted to him as steward. I quote again from the same article:—

"Dying legacies are a miserable substitute for living benevolence. The servants of God should be making their wills every day, in good works and liberal offerings to God."—Idem, p. 481.

"The Lord would have His followers dispense their means while they can do it themselves. Some may inquire, 'Must we actually dispossess ourselves of every-thing which we call our own?' We may not be required to do this now; but we must be willing to do so for Christ's sake. We must acknowledge that our possessions are absolutely His, by using of them freely whenever means is needed to advance His cause. Some close their ears to the calls made for money to be used in sending missionaries to foreign countries, and in publishing the truth and scattering it like autumn leaves all over the world. Such excuse their covetousness by informing you that they have made arrangements to be charitable at death. They have considered the cause of God in their wills. Therefore they live a life of avarice, robbing God in tithes and offerings, and in their wills return to God but a small portion of that which He has lent them, while a very large proportion is appropriated to relatives who have no interest in the truth. This is the worst kind of robbery. They rob God of His just dues, not only all through life, but also at death.

"It is utter folly to defer to make a preparation for the future life until nearly the last hour of the present life. It is also a great mistake to defer to answer the claims of God for liberality to His cause until the time comes when you are to shift your stewardship upon others. Those to whom you intrust your talents of means may not do as well with them as you have done. How dare rich men run so great risks! Those who wait till death before they make a disposition of their property, surrender it to death rather than to God. In so doing, many are acting directly contrary to the plan of God plainly stated in His Word. If they would do good, they must seize the present golden moments, and labor with all their might, as if fearful that they may lose the favorable opportunity.

"Those who neglect known duty by not answering

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to God's claims upon them in this life, and who soothe their consciences by calculating on making their bequests at death, will receive no words of commendation from the Master, nor will they receive a reward. They practised no solf-denial, but selfishly retained their means as long as they could, yielding it up only when death claimed them. That which many propose to defer until they are about to die, if they were Christians indeed they would do while they have a strong hold on life. They would devote themselves and their property to God, and, while acting as His stewards, they would have the satisfaction of doing their duty. By becoming their own executors, they could meet the claims of God themselves, instead of shifting the responsibility upon others."—Idem, pp. 479, 480.

"The call for means to advance the cause of truth will never be more urgent than now. Our money will never do a greater amount of good than at the present time. Every day of delay in rightly appropriating it, is limiting the period in which it will do good in saving souls."—Idem, p. 81. G. A. IRWIN.

# Take Heed How You See.

"AND He took the blind man by the hand and led him out of the town, and when He had put His hands upon him, He asked him if he saw aught. And he looked up, and said, I see men as trees walking. After that He put His hands again upon his eyes, and made him look up, and he was restored, and saw every man clearly."

What we see depends upon how we see. Some are constantly seeing difficulties and trials as insurmountable obstacles. They see only the giants and high walls; they see men as trees walking. The cry is, We are not able to overcome these great obstacles, not able to go up and possess the land. Others see differently. Of them it is said, "The mountains [the same mountains] break forth before them into singing, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands." Anciently, while some saw only the red sea and complained and fainted for fear, Moses endured as seeing Him who is invisible. They both saw, but did not see alike. One saw the Red Sea, and the other saw God. One sees a lion in the way, but does not see the divine hand that has shut the lion's mouth. It was not until the Saviour had placed His hand upon the blind man the second time that he was able to see clearly, or able to see things as they really were. Many of us have had but one anointing of the eyes, but one touch. We see, and find fault with God's work, workers, and institutions. We see and criticise every little defect. We see, but see only in part. We need a second touch in order to be able to see clearly, and to see things as they really are. What we see depends upon how we see, and how we see depends upon what we are. "Happy [not wretched or miserable] are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." They see God where others see the devil. They see success where others see defeat, roses where others see thorns, the stars where others see mud.

At one time in reply to the taunt, "Doth Job fear God for naught?" the Lord said to Satan, "All that he hath is in thy power." Satan at once went from the presence of the Lord on his work of destruction. Job's sons, daughters, and property were destroyed in one day. But Job said, "The Lord gave, and *the Lord* [not the devil] hath taken away. Blessed be the name of the

Lord. In all this Job sinned not." Joseph, after he was sold by his brothers, carried to Egypt, and thrown into prison, afterward was placed next to Pharaoh on the throne. When his brothers came to Egypt for food, he said to them, "Be not grieved and angry with yourselves that ye sold me hither, for God did send me before you to preserve life. So now it was not you that sent me hither, but God. Ye meant evil, but God meant it for good." Has not the time fully come for every believer in present truth to have the second touch that he may see aright, that he may see no man save "Jesus only?" For it is said, "Thy watchmen shall lift up their voice; with the voice together shall they sing; for they shall see eye to eye when the Lord returneth to Zion." The time has come when we should no longer see through a glass darkly, but face to face, when we should behold the king in His beauty, and see the land afar off. "They shall be like Him, for they shall see Him as He is." When they see Him as He is, they will see Him everywhere, in every human being. #### Our Message.

JOHN the Baptist came as the voice of one crying in the wilderness, saying, "Prepare ye the way of the Lord." His message was definite, and the messenger well knew the importance of his work. When questioned concerning his identity, he immediately repeated the prediction made by the prophet respecting the forerunner of the Messiah. Without ostentation, arrogance, or any boastful assumption whatever, he declared simply and earnestly, "I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness . . . as said the prophet Isaiah."

John went forth in the spirit and power of Elijah to proclaim the first advent of the Messiah (Luke I: 17), but a second proclamation is to be given in the spirit and power of Elijah to prepare a people for the second coming of Christ. Malachi 4: 5, 6. The people by whom this second advent message is to be given must know their work and their message just as Elijah and John knew their work and their message.

Christendom to-day has a great number of teachers, exhorters, and pulpit orators. Voices that speak in many tongues tell of many doctrines, but there is only the imagination of human thought behind them. You will search in vain amid all this Babel of voices to find messengers who proclaim the message of Revelation 14.

In that Scripture we have the second coming of Christ pictured in plan and positive language. But before this great event takes place, angels fly through the midst of heaven with a gospel that tells of judgment "come," of Babylon being weighed and found wanting, and of Satan's final effort to enforce the mark of apostasy on the inhabitants of the earth.

Do you understand these things? If you do not, then you cannot join with the angels in carrying a message that must prepare a people for the coming of the Lord. If you do understand these things, and yet fail to make them known, then God will have to reveal them to humbler minds, so that they may become His messengers, but you will lose your crown.

John realised that his message was the all important question for that time. He made it his life work, and this devotion to his message gave him a place second to none among those born of women. With a very few of his followers John was found watching for the Messiah, and when He appeared, they received the divine approbation.

Thus it may be with those who now take part in the message concerning Christ's second coming. But so it will be only with those who regard the message as the most important of all considerations.

God has designed that this message shall carry the Sabbath to all parts of the earth. It quotes from the fourth commandment, Worship Him who "made heaven and earth and the sea." Ex. 20:11; Rev. 14: 7. It warns against all false forms of worship received through the Babylon of confusion, and also against the character obtained through obedience to earthly powers who set forth the counterfeit Sabbath. It means, "Jehovah against the world of modern idolatry," and those who carry this message must stand against all that is false, just as Elijah stood for Jehovah against the world of ancient idolatry.

The Seventh-day Adventists are the only body of people in the world who profess to carry this message. As a result of this work there will be a people gathered out, of whom it will be said, "Here are they that keep the commandments of God, and have the faith of Jesus." Rev. 14: 12.

Jehovah has first committed this work to angel hands so that the human may join with the divine in carrying out God's great design. Have you joined with the angels who carry this message? "A BROTHER, seventy-three years old, who is suffering with paralysis, and who could scarcely be expected to take any books, as he was poor and afflicted, felt that he must try to do something in this good work. He went out, and the first afternoon, in about three hours, sold four books,—one to a banker, another to a timber dealer, another to an implement dealer, another to a merchant. He received cash for three of them, and felt so happy over his success that he went out again the next morning, and sold two more copies, sent in the money, and ordered six more books."

"A BROTHER who is a painter and paper hanger, and is very busy all the time, became responsible for ten books. For two or three weeks after taking the books, he kept looking forward to a time when he would have a little leisure, when he could "dress up," as he said, "and go out canvassing." He finally decided that if the books were sold, he would have to make the opportunity instead of waiting for it; so one morning as he started to work, he put one of the books in his tool chest, and during the dinner hour took one order. After he stopped work at night, he took the book and went to work, and in a short time secured six more orders."

ONE of our canvassers in New Zealand writes,---

And as our Mission Committee furnished £60 from funds donated by the Australasian Sabbath schools to aid in getting out this pamphlet, our Sabbath-school scholars everywhere will undoubtedly feel a deep interest in the prosperity of the new publication."

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# Items of General Interest.

A GOOD interest followed the camp-meeting in Adelaide, and over thirty have begun keeping the Sabbath. The interest still continues.

THE Victorian camp-meeting was held according to appointment at Footscray, a suburb of Melbourne. The terrific dust storm of November 12 did considerable damage to the tents and delayed the opening of the meeting one day. During the meeting, however, the weather was very favorable. The large pavilion was filled every night, and sometimes to overflowing. The interest was good throughout, and it is hoped that a good-sized church will be brought into the truth. There was an especial interest developed on the part of our own people in all lines of the message; such as, medical, educational, religious liberty, "Christ's Object Lessons' canvassing, etc. Enough money was pledged to buy a new pavilion for camp-meeting purposes. The same officers were re-elected, and a very encouraging financial report was given, showing a large decrease in conference and tract society indebtedness. Several unfaithful laborers and members have been dropped, and others have been added, showing an increase in the membership. The work in Victoria is in a very encouraging condition, and the camp-meeting was productive of much good.

#### "WONDERS IN THE HEAVENS."

CENTURIES ago Joel wrote of them; now mortals are beholding them. The *Daily Telegraph* gives the following account of the meteorological disturbance of Victoria:—

At Boort, great balls of fire fell in the paddocks and in the streets, throwing up showers of sparks as they struck the earth. Wycheproof had a trying experience. The whole air appeared to be on fire. Lanterns had to be used during the day time. Trees

and buildings were blown down in all directions, and boughs of trees were blown about in the air like feathers.

At Langdale a house was set on fire by the fire balls and destroyed. The Scalake Presbyterian Church was so injured by the wind that it will have to be pulled down.

Balls of fire burst on the poppet-heads of the New Barambogie mine, at Chiltern, and the fire which resulted spread to the timber in the shaft, and was with great difficulty extinguished. Bush fires spread in every district. The extent of the damage cannot be learned at present, as nearly all the telegraph lines are down.

Almost every station heard from makes the same report; gales, dust, lightning, balls of fire, and darkness in the day time, so intense that fowls went to roost in the afternoon, while the people were stumbling around trying to find their way by the aid of lanterns.

People thought the world had come to an end.

#### PILING UP MONEY.

JAMES (chapter five) calls it heaping up treasure. As an instance of this, take the United States Steel Cor-When the companies that form it were poration. merged, it was felt necessary to guarantee it by a syndicate, and J. P. Morgan & Co. formed the syndicate of guarantors, some 200 bankers and capitalists. The guarantors agreed to advance to these merged interests any sum not to exceed  $\pounds$ 40,000,000 within fifteen months. They only advanced £5,000,000 for eight months. "For this service," the New York *World* tells us, "the syndicate's profits up to this time have been £6,000,000, and its ultimate total profits can not be less than  $f_{11,300,000}$ . This is at the rate of 220 per cent. on the actual money invested. Morgan & Co's own share of the total profits will be  $f_{2,260,000}$  were modest sum indeed, considering that Mr. Morgan was the chief engineer of the whole enterprise. Never before in the history of the world has money been made so fast and in such vast sums in any country as in ours to-day. The anti-trust laws plainly say, 'Thou shalt not combine in a trust, or in any other way, to control production and prices.' But the mergermakers, coining money by the millions, blithely say, 'We care not who makes the laws of a nation, if we can underwrite its monopolies."
