

Nineteenth Session of the Natal-Transvaal Conference

(Extracts from President's Address)

It is with great pleasure that we welcome the delegates to this, the nineteenth session of the Natal-Transvaal Conference. We also welcome our believers and friends from the city.

Each successive conference brings home the consciousness of our great dependence on God. The God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob is in our midst finishing His work in the earth, and these constituency meetings grow more significant each successive year. For all that He has done for us since our last meeting, our hearts magnify His great and holy name, and we rejoice in God.

Within our territory, there is a population of 780,221 Europeans, 2,535,673 Bantu, 43,398 mixed, and 157,640 Indians, making a total of 3,516,914.

Our conference constituency now numbers 589 Europeans and 373 in the Mission Department, a total of 962. There has been a gain this year in the Mission Department of 150.

Our European working staff numbers twenty-six. In the Mission Department, there are three ordained European ministers, and eleven natives who hold credentials.

EVANGELISTIC ACTIVITIES

A review of the evangelistic work in our field is most encouraging. It is my pleasure to call to mind the work of our faithful men and women who are at the front of the battle.

In view of the plans for evangelising the Johannesburg district, it has been arranged for a well organised corps of workers to enter this metropolis, following this conference.

Since Pastor Moffitt has accepted the call to the presidency of the Cape Conference, Pastor Hyatt has taken his place in Johannesburg. Pastor and Mrs.

Edwards have been called to connect with the Cape Conference.

Brother and Sister D. F. Tarr have been located in Durban since last September, and they are in touch with a large number of families, who are interested in the Truth. Several will be baptised at this conference. Sister Leonie de Beer has been associated with the interests in Durban since the close of the tent meetings.

Following the Durban city campaign. Brother Hurlow and family moved to Maritzburg to conduct a series of meetings in a tent. Associated with him were Sister Flemming and Brother and Sister Le Butt. From the start this campaign was a success. There are about twenty-five in the baptismal class at the present time. We rejoice in seeing this successful effort in Maritzburg. The church building has been filled on Sunday nights since the tent was taken down.

Pastor Carey has been faithfully labouring in Pretoria. That church is very zealous in advancing the Truth, and was the first to reach its goals in the last two campaigns.

Pastor de Beer has been faithfully looking after the interests of our work in Potchefstroom. There is great opposition to our work in that centre, but the cause of truth has always triumphed and it seems that nothing can be done against the truth but for it in this seat of learning.

Pastor Walston has been working for the Indians in Durban. The greatest need in Durban at this time is a church building. Twenty-one Indians have been baptised during the past nine months.

Pastor Hodgson's work among the natives has been very successful during the past year. He has inter-

ests in no less than a dozen centres. It has been his privilege to baptise 150 since our last conference.

It was my privilege to conduct a series of sixty meetings in Durban during a part of July, August and September. From the first night, the public became interested. Conference administrative duties made it imperative for me to leave the field of activity sooner than desired. Sixteen were baptised at the close, and several are awaiting baptism at conference time. On the last night, 125 who wished to keep in close touch with our work and Message, handed in their names. We hope to again see a strong public effort in this important centre.

HOME MISSIONARY DEPARTMENT

I am glad to report that our faithful members believe that of equal importance with special public efforts, is house to house work in the homes of the people. There is an awakening in our field among the rank and file of lay-members, and it is encouraging to find that 59,465 periodicals have been sold, lent or given away during the past year. The local missionary spirit has been responsible for the success of the two recent campaigns. To carry on this house to house work among our friends and neighbours is the great ambition of our faithful people, and as workers in the Natal-Transvaal field we expect to keep in the lead in this great layman's movement.

HARVEST INGATHERING AND BIG WEEK

The churches going over their goals in these campaigns were, Dundee, Hlobane, Durban, Maritzburg, Johannesburg, Fretoria, Potchefstroom and Spion Kop. The amount gathered was £1,200. Our goal was £1,150. The Big Week effort followed the Ingathering campaign. Our entire quota of books was distributed and a zealous spirit was seen all along the line. In both of the campaigns, our workers and people met with many providences of God. We hope to

have our workers tell of their experiences at this conference. We found the general public responsive, and we have kept many of the names and addresses of the donors, hoping to solicit from them in 1926.

BOOK AND BIBLE WORK

The Book and Bible Society sales for 1924 amounted to £5,035-17-10. In 1925, our sales amounted to £6,070-18-9. There is an organised opposition to our book work in the field, and it is a struggle, but God is on our side and men can do nothing against the truth but for it. We have sixteen colporteurs in the field and the prospects are bright.

EDUCATIONAL AND MISSIONARY VOLUNTEER DEPARTMENTS

If we had the teachers, we could establish church schools in Maritzburg, Johannesburg, and Potchefstroom. Our big problem is the lack of teachers. The Durban church school has grown, and in

1926 they will have two teachers. Spion Kop is a monument to Christian education, and we are doing everything possible to encourage our young people to enter our training school. Our conference has lately voted to financially assist at least a half dozen of our young people to enter Spion Kop this year.

SABBATH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

There has been a gradual increase in Sabbath school offerings during the past year. In 1924, the sixteen schools gave £1,142-1-7, while in 1925 the offerings amounted to £1,217-3-10.



The prospects are bright for a successful campaign, beginning Sunday, March 14.
