

Our Annual Effort in Behalf of the "Signs of the Times"

READERS of the OUTLOOK are so well acquainted with the general plans for our annual Signs rally that it is almost unnecessary to go into the details of the campaign. During the week, February 12 to 19, special attention will be given by the members in all the churches to the Signs work.

At the close of 1926, the Publishing House was printing 9,000 copies per issue as compared with 8,429 at the end of 1925. We are glad that the circulation of

our missionary paper has been increased by about 500 copies per issue during the past year. The goal we are working to is 15,000 Signs of the Times circulated in the African Division every month. In order to reach this goal, 6,000 new subscriptions are required. Based on membership a fair distribution of this goal would

be—Natal-Transvaal Conference, 2,250; Cape Conference, 2,250; Orange River Conference, 1,000; union mission fields, 500.

The following table shows how many *Signs* are being used at the present time in each of the fields:

It is interesting to note that in the Natal-Transvaal Conference, the church members are taking an average of just a little more than seven copies each, per issue. In the Cape Conference, the average is a little less than five copies per member. In the Orange River Conference, the average is much lower—being only about one and a half copies per member per issue.

HOW CAN WE REACH OUR GOAL

How can we reach our goal of 15,000 copies of the *Signs* every issue is a question which may come to the minds of some as they plan for this campaign. It is not necessarily the church with the largest membership that is going to succeed in reaching its goal

The Signs of the Times is our missionary paper. Every issue is just brim-full of articles containing the important truths

for this time. As the servant of God wrote many years ago, "there are many starving for the bread of The Signs laden with the rich food, is a feast life. to many of these who are not of our faith. . . . The silent preacher, enriched with the precious matter, should go forth on wings of prayer, mingled with faith, that it may do its appointed work in shedding the light of truth upon those who are in the darkness of error.

With just a small effort, practically every member could secure six new subscriptions to the Signs. Is it not a fact that we all have friends whom we would like to see getting the Message? Take a copy of the paper to them and ask them to subscribe to it for a year. Then, when your trades-people call to sell their goods you have a splendid opportunity to present the paper and secure a subscription. What about the neighbours in your street? Should the Lord come tomorrow could we all say, "I have finished the work, Thou gavest me to do," or would some of the people around our homes point to us in their despair and say—"you knew this was coming, why did you not tell us?" Brethren and sisters, shall we not all put forth an effort during the Signs rally week—February 12 to 19 to co-operate with the officers of our church in giving the Truth to as many as possible by securing at least six new subscribers. Instructions will be given as to how to secure subscriptions, as well as how to carry on different lines of missionary work with the papers. Suggestions will also be made regarding follow-up work where the Signs has created an interest. Our brethren in arranging the programme are doing their utmost to make it helpful.

Therefore, we take this opportunity to appeal to all church elders and officers to receive kindly the matter sent on to the churches pertaining to the campaign, and we likewise sincerely request that you do your best to follow instructions. Begin now to lay your plans for a stirring programme in behalf of the Signs.

The paper is adapted to the needs of Africa and is our own "Prophetic Monthly." At present, it has a circulation of 9,000. We are anxious that this shall be increased to at least 15,000 copies per month for the present year. This can be accomplished if all will enter heartily into the spirit of the programme and do a full part. We believe that you will co-operate with us in making this campaign a success, because of your splendid response to other campaigns in the past. How many people in South Africa appreciate our missionary paper as much as one of our believers in America, who for two successive years now has sent a cheque for \$50 to be used in circulating the Signs of the Times? This is what Bröther W. D. Salisbury, of California, has done. In sending his cheque this year, he writes: "It has been about a year since I sent you a small donation to your missionary paper so that you can supply some of your workers with the paper for free distribution. The Lord has blessed during the past year, and I feel like sending another remittance of \$50 to be used in the same way for 1927. I have read with much interest your paper (the OUTLOOK) that tells of the work being done in your country. It is wonderful how the Lord's spirit is going out before the workers and preparing the way for them. This same Spirit is working in all parts of the world in the same way. We seem slow in comprehending it. I well remember my visit to your country in 1900, on my way to the General Conference from Australia. The work has grown rapidly since that time. I trust it is prospering at the present time."

The Signs of the Times is a wonderful evangelising agency, and money and time spent in its distribution will surely bring in a harvest of souls. We may not actually see the results in every instance, but the Lord has promised to water the seed that we sow for Him. As the Signs Campaign is presented this year, let us each resolve to increase his activities along this line.

We may not all be able to set aside $\pounds 10$ to be spent in circulating the Signs of the Times during the year, but what if each church member in the African Division should put aside £1 this year to be spent in this way; can we estimate the results? . The Signs list would be materially increased, and we believe many souls would be won to the Truth as a direct result. We know that many of our church members are investing much more than £1 a year in this way, and we wish to encourage those who have not done anything in the past, to respond to the call to subscribe to, and circulate a good-sized club this year.

Where a church club of not less than 500 is taken, individual members in that church can get papers in any size club they desire from the church home missionary secretary at 1d per copy. We know of some individuals who are taking a club each month of 500 copies. Surely all can take a club of 100, or at the least, 50 copies.

Our goal for a printing list of 15,000 each month is not high, provided all will take part in this good work. It will be a big task if only a few take part, but if each church member will do his part then the individual task will be comparatively small. We are counting on YOU doing your part this year.

Is God's Word Dependable?

WE are living in a day of much Bible controversy, in a day when scepticism has become well nigh universal. Every young person must meet this condition and decide for himself if the Bible is in truth the veritable Word of God. Many are saying today, that the diction of the Bible is obsolete and should be changed; but my friends, the Bible does not need to be *rewritten*, it needs to be *reread*; its precepts need to be believed and its example practised in every day life.

The Bible is the only book in the world that is, and always has been, up-to-date. It is an historical fact that the Bible has never once been revised to meet the advance of scientific knowledge and history; while on the other hand, history and science have often been revised to meet the Bible. Many illustrations of this might be given; space will permit but one. Some years ago, there was a controversy in England over the statement in the 20th chapter of Isaiah about Sargon, King of Assyria. It is the only place he is ever mentioned. No historian had ever written about this Sargon. Infidels and Bible critics said he never existed, and the Bible evidently was mistaken, and therefore could not be the divine revelation of God.

But God always has a witness for the truth. At that time, a professor connected with the British Museum arranged an expedition to go up the old Tigris River and find the city of Nineveh. After careful search and months of work, the ancient city was exposed, and one of the first things taken out was a very large cylinder of stone, engraved in the Assyrian language, which when deciphered proved to be the life account of this Sargon, King of Assyria, and his exploits as a warrior.

Many such testimonies could be given, every one of which has proved the truthfulness of God's Word, and never once has such a discovery proved the Bible to be false. A visitor to the British Museum in London some years ago said to the old superintendent, "Show me some curios or other evidence that the Bible is not true," and the superintendent answered, "Sir, I can show you ten thousand curios that demonstrate the Bible is true beyond the peradventure of a doubt, but there isn't a thing in this establishment that can contradict that truth.''

Dear young friends, in this short article it is impossible to give a tithe of the evidence that could be given to show that the Bible is dependable, and is in truth the Word of the living God. But do not take my word for it, or the testimony of any man either for or against the Book; but study it for yourself, read it from Genesis to Revelation. You will find it promotes the Christian graces and virtues such as love, peace. gentleness, goodness, and faith; while it denounces every evil word and work. You will find that it treats on the questions of eternal import, such as the judgment, the future life, and the end of the wicked, and it is the only book in the world that claims to be an authority on these important questions. You will find that the Bible alone can answer that quest of the soul: "If a man die, shall he live again?" and it alone sheds light on the pathway that the soul must tread from time to eternity. "Search the Scriptures" and then answer the question, Is the Bible dependable? for vourself before God. J. I. ROBISON.

Appreciation

As we close our records for the year and take note of the results that have been attained, we would extend our hearty appreciation to every worker and member in the South African Union Conference. We do not believe that during any previous year has there been a more loyal spirit of service, a more enthusiastic spirit of liberality than has been evident during the year just closed. In the gifts to missions especially has this liberality been most marked. Mission offerings for 1926 have exceeded the mission offerings for all previous years on record. The three local conferences and the Transvaal-Delagoa Mission Field have contributed $\pounds 8,247-17-5$. As compared with former years this amount will be of interest:

The special campaigns during 1926 have assisted materially in raising the total offerings received. In both the Big Week and Harvest Ingathering Campaigns, the goals that were set were considerably exceeded. The Big Week Campaign contributed £383-12-10 on a goal of £350-0-0, or £33-12-10 in excess of the goal. The result of the Harvest Ingathering Campaign, as compared with the goal set, was as follows:

We feel sure all will be particularly grateful for the wonderful results that attended our Harvest Ingathering Campaign during 1926. Our Union alone has raised £21-0-2 more than the goal that was set for the African Division. It may be of interest to know the results of the past six years' Harvest Ingathering Campaigns:

Two statements of mission offerings are being published in this issue. In the first of these is shown a comparison between the goal for the year and the actual amount that has been received. Separate figures are given for each of the local conferences, and also for the departments as a whole. The Cape Conference in all departments has raised 81% of its goal for the year. The Natal-Transvaal Conference has raised 98%, and the Orange River Conference 59%. We believe that the Natal-Transvaal Conference is to be congratulated on having so nearly reached its goal for the year. Taking the departments of the Union separately, the European constituency has contributed 85% of its goal, the coloured 86%, and the native 41%. The Union Conference as a whole has contributed 83%.

Statement No. 2 gives the details of the offerings comprising our total contribution. In the last column to the right we give the percentage relationship of each offering to the total. The Sabbath School Department, as will be noticed, has contributed 39% of all mission offerings received. Harvest Ingathering is responsible for 36%, and Big Week for $4\frac{1}{2}$ %. Other offerings are as shown.

In the mission offerings campaign during 1926 our Union has taken a definite step forward, and our hearts are made happy at the advance that has been made. But we cannot rest satisfied. 1927 must see greater progress still. We are nearing the close of this work, yet much remains to be done. Conditions in the earth demand that it be finished quickly. Shall we not during 1927 "look on the fields" more intently than ever before, and as we see in the seriousness of conditions the fulfilment of prophecy, allow our more intelligent vision to impel us to a deeper consecration, both of ourselves and of our means. The union treasurer is placing in the OUTLOOK some figures, which we hope all will study with care.

First, you will note that our campaigns to raise mission funds have been very successful. The Big Week and Harvest Ingathering Campaigns, go down in our records as the best ever obtained in the history of the work here in Africa. The writer anticipated that we would exceed the Ingathering goal for the union by a good margin, but never did he think that we would go as far as the figures show. Not only did we go $\pounds 546$ above the goal for the union, but we exceeded the goal set for the entire Division by $\pounds 21$. Surely this is a splendid achievement and the Lord has blessed. To Him be all the praise.

Never have we seen such a spirit of loyalty and earnestness on your part as has been seen during 1926. In a noble manner you have responded well to the calls. We know that you will rejoice to see what the record reveals in mission funds as we close the year.

The Lord has blessed our soul-winning campaigns. A good number have taken their stand with us. We are pleased to note that all of our workers are anxious to press the work of soul-winning right to the front. We pray that this spirit of evangelism will continue to grow and strengthen in our midst as the work makes progress.

Now we face 1927! What will the record be? We sincerely trust that we shall not take a backward step, but that we will choose as our slogan for the year, the message of God to Israel when He spoke to Moses, commanding that they "Go FORWARD." We must advance in all lines of Christian endeavour. We must not remain satisfied with simply accomplishing the same as for 1926. Therefore, at this time we send forth this word, asking that you will, with us, throw your all into the service of God for 1927, as you never have in the past. Let us labour to win more souls to

God. Let us enter with the spirit of zeal into all the campaigns set before us. Let us seek to raise our full quota in the 2/6 per week fund. In just a word,—"LET US GIVE OF OUR BEST TO THE MASTER."

As we start off the new year, the prospects are very bright. We are planning several soulwinning efforts. All three conferences are arranging for tent or hall efforts. Let us pray that God will wonderfully bless each of these. Now that we have the native work organised under local superintendents, the native department is taking on new life. We hope to open two new mission stations this year. This will mean an advance step into

new territory. At present, a splendid summer school and institute is being conducted at Bethel mission. Our native evangelists and teachers are there under strong instruction, and we feel that they will return to their fields to do a much larger work than has been their experience for 1926. So, a good word of cheer and promise sounds all along the line as we face the burdens and task of 1927.

May we appeal to you to "Be strong in the Lord and the power of His might." Let us put on the whole armour of God. Let us take some time everyday for the study of God's Word. Forget not to feed your soul upon the Word, the bread of heaven. Let not a day pass without taking counsel of your dear heavenly Father in the chamber of prayer. We most earnestly appeal for the family altar, the prayer circle to be strengthened in every home. Then pray for the workers, those who bear heavy responsibilities. The conference officers need your prayers as they undertake the tasks that fall to them. Thus altogether, may we put our shoulders to the wheel and press onward and upward, to make this present year what heaven desires it should be, and above all may we each live the life which is "well pleasing unto Him." God grant it for His name's sake.

Giving God a Chance

MUCH of our past failure in reaching the higher levels of Christian experience, I fear, has been due to our own self-sufficiency. We have trusted too much in self; not enough in God. We have failed to fall on the Rock and be broken. We have not been contrite enough; not humble enough. We have not recognised our daily, our momentary dependence upon God. We have not sat long enough at His feet. We have been 'careful and troubled about many things.'' And all too often have we forgotten or neglected the one thing needful,—'' that good part'' which we have times without number permitted to be taken away from us by that evil one, who ever seeks to obstruct the way to the Mercy Seat.

We have been too restless. Like Ahimaaz, we have wanted to run. And we have run. And all too frequently we have run without a definite message. "I saw a great tumult, but I knew not what it was." There has been altogether too much of tumult and tempest in our lives; not enough of heaven's calm. How often, like God's people of old, we have "limited the Holy One of Israel." Some may have limited the Lord by their sloth, but many have hindered Him by their incessant but misguided activity.

It is time to call a halt in this mad rush that sweeps us past the hour of prayer and quiet meditation. As Samuel said to Saul, "Stand thou still awhile, that I may shew thee the word of God." 1 Sam. 9:27. Like Saul, some of us may have been engaged in a zealous but fruitless search for our Father's "asses." The asses, perhaps, have been found by others less honoured than we, and our Father may have "left the care of the asses" in sorrowful concern for us, saying, "What shall I do for my son?"

But if we will "Stand still awhile"—long enough for us to hear our Father speak—He will not only tell us where to find the lost "asses," but if we will linger in His presence we may also experience the oil of a kingly anointing poured upon our heads. And as we turn to go from that Divine intercourse, it may be said of us as it was said of Saul, "God gave him another heart." It is from such experiences as these that we shall find the way to the forward and the upper life,—to the Spirit-filled life. "Then shalt thou go on forward from thence. After that thou shalt come to the hill of God, and the Spirit of the Lord will come upon thee." And some who have known us beforetime may wonder, "What is this that is come upon the son of Kish?"

Dear brethren and sisters, let us during 1927 give God a chance in our lives. "Take time to be holy." May we learn to "love to steal awhile away from every cumbering care." The servant of the Lord tells us to, "Educate your mind to love the Bible, . . . to love the hour of meditation, above all the hour when the soul communes with God." Make a daily appointment with God, and keep the appointment. An hour with God each morning is the best day-light-saving scheme this world will ever know.

"Christ never asks of us such busy labour As leaves no time for resting at His feet; The waiting attitude of expectation He offtimes counts a service most complete.

He sometimes wants our ear, our rapt attention, That He some sweetest secret may impart; 'Tis often in the time of deepest silence, That heart finds deepest fellowship with heart.''

And if our dear members of the Seventh-day Adventist churches in the Natal-Transvaal Conference fall short in 1927, it will be a most serious thing as we come up to the end of the year. Will you not look over your accounts and turn into the Cause your tenth as God has prospered you? All our soul-winning activities depend upon your faithfulness. We must not be idle. There is not a lazy worker in the field, but we cannot carry on campaigns unless we are sustained at the base of supply. God blessed the efforts held in 1926. Many souls were won to the Truth, but we had a £600 surplus to work upon. This was voted into our operating fund at the Durban camp-meeting. This, we no longer have. What is done in 1927 will depend upon how faithful you are in giving your tenth. What can we

say or do to help you to see the absolute importance of giving the tenth of your increase? We pray that God will give you no rest until you are in harmony with Mal. 3: 10. We need to have our consciences stirred as never before. But, remember, God will prosper you abundantly if you will be faithful in tithing. Try Him.

The work in Pretoria is progressing very well. Plans are on foot for building a new church in the Capital. Continue to pray that God will go before His people. A great victory was gained the night of January 16, when it was our privilege to answer before a large audience the attack made upon us by one of the local ministers. The reply will be published.
