WHO SOLD THAT "GREAT CONTROVERSY?"

The following interesting letters were placed in our hands during the late camp-meeting by Bro. Rogers, who is one of the elders of the Adelaide church. It seems that the writer of the letter thought that the headquarters of Seventh-day Adventists was in Adelaide, and so he addressed his letter there.

The first letter reads as follows:-

To the Pastor, Seventh-day Adventists,

Adelaide, South Australia.

Dear Sir,—I desire to keep the seventh-day Sabbath (Saturday) instead of the false Sabbath (Sunday). I have read a book called "The Great Controversy between Christ and Satan" which teaches a lot about the seventh-day Sabbath. Are there any books published by the Adventists referring to the Sabbath and prophecies of the Bible? If so, what are the prices? Yours truly,

The above letter fell into Bro. Rogers' hands, and he replied to it. The following letter was soon received in answer to his:—

Mr. A. H. Rogers,

DEAR SIR,—I have received your letter of May 3rd, and I am well pleased with the information you sent me concerning the seventh day Sabbath (Saturday).

You asked how I came to write to Adelaide, and how I came by the book "Great Controversy." There was an agent travelling around selling these books, and a neighbour of ours bought one from him, and lent it to me. So this is how I came by the book, "Great Controversy." After reading it I took a desire to observe the seventh day (Saturday).

One day I was reading a newspaper named the Australian Star, and I noticed in it a little about the Seventh-day Adventists at the Ashfield camp, so I wrote to the editor of the Town and Country Journal, asking about the Seventh-day Adventists, and he wrote up and told me that he understood that the camp had broken up long ago, and that the leaders had returned to Adelaide, and this is how I came to write to Adelaide.

I am sorry that I cannot observe the seventh day

yet, but I trust I shall be able soon by the help of God. I am at present helping my father plough, and if I were to observe the Sabbath now, he would, I think prevent me, and perhaps think me mad. Of course he is a man that takes no interest in the Bible.

I live over 200 miles from Sydney in a westerly direction on the Lachlan River. I am nearly twenty-two years of age. Have you any prayer books and hymn books? I wish you to tell me the price of the church prayer book, a hymn book, and also a church catechism of the Old and New Testaments." Could you supply me with the book, "Thoughts on Daniel and the Revelation?" My brothers and sisters would like to keep the Sabbath. By my doing so first it would set them an example, and not only them, but many others.

I shall write to you as often as I can, as I have many things to write, and I trust by the next time you get a letter from me, I shall be observing the seventh-day Sabbath. Before reading the book "Great Controversy," I was a faithful attendant of the Church of England at Canowindra, where I had to walk a distance of four miles and back nearly every Sunday. Of course I have since left the church.

I shall now finish my letter by asking you to pray for me that I may keep the Sabbath, and that I may teach others to do the same

We pray that this dear family may be richly blessed in their efforts to sow the seed in Townsville, and that the ambition of the writer of this letter to attend our school may one day be realised.

Pastor E. W. Farnsworth and wife, and Pastor S. N. Haskell left Sydney on the 18th inst. for Auckland, New Zealand, where they will attend a general meeting. From there they expect to go to Napier to attend a session of the New Zealand Conference.

A SERIES of Sunday evening meetings is in progress in the North Fitzroy church. Last Sunday evening Pastor Daniells spoke on the Eastern Question to a large and very attentive congregation. We trust that many will esteem it a privilege to pray for these meetings.

PASTOR WILSON writes from Adelaide, November 10, in a private letter: "Our attendance averages each night from sixty-five to seventy-five, and on Sunday night the tent was packed, with fifty or more outside, while Pastor McCullagh talked on the Mark of the Beast. He had a free time, and the Lord blessed the word spoken. I spoke in the afternoon on the Early Fathers and the Lord's Day. Pastor Hawkins gave a very telling discourse on Sabbath morning on being Filled with the Spirit. We had a good missionary meeting in the afternoon at three o'clock, with a good attendance, and the congregation voted to hold another next Sabbath afternoon."

Pastor Daniells has kindly furnished us with an extract from a private letter received from Pastor Starr, in which he gives some information with reference to the interest in Brisbane. He says: "You will be glad to learn that four of Bro. Pallant's readers have begun to observe the Sabbath. They are most excellent people. One has held the office of superintendent in the Wesleyan Sunday-school for fifteen years. His wife and family are of the real godly sort. Mrs.—and her daughter are very nice people, and members of the same church as the gentleman previously mentioned. They are quite an addition to our meetings which are held at Sister Hughes' home. Last Sabbath we numbered twenty-seven. Many more are convinced,

and we have reason to hope that some will obey. In social meeting one said, 'For over twenty years I supposed I was serving God and keeping His Sabbath holy. But the fact is, I have only kept two. I bless God for sending me the light, and can say I experienced a scripture often read, "I thought on my ways, and turned my feet into Thy testimonies. I made haste and delayed not to keep Thy commandments," and my first Sabbath was one of the happiest and most blessed days of my life.'"
