A WEEK OF PRAYER.

SEPTEMBER 4th to 12th has been set apart as a special season for seeking the Lord by all our people in Australasia. We are taught to "pray without ceasing," for prayer is the vital breath of the soul. The Christian needs a constant communion with God; but frequently there have been times in the history of the church when some great work or crisis has made it most fitting and necessary that the people of God should, in a special manner, lay hold of the source of their strength. Such occasions are more frequent and important as the final conflict thickens about us.

Since the opening of the work in Australia there has not been a more opportune time for a week of prayer than this which has been appointed. The present religious liberty crisis is giving us one of the greatest privileges we have ever had to get the truth before the people, and at the very time of the week of prayer, the Federal Convention, at its second sitting, will be putting the finishing touches to the Draft Constitutional Bill, and the religious amendment will come up for final decision. It will be our privilege to pray that God will put it into the hearts of some of these men to stand for the right.

The school enterprise also needs our prayers, and while we pray we can be truly grateful for the providences that are attending it. The buildings are full to overflowing, and the work is prospering in a most gratifying manner. But before another school year begins, another building must be erected. The management greatly needs both wisdom and means.

A physician and nurses are now on their way from America to open up our health work in Melbourne. This will be a great blessing, but will be an undertaking of such importance as to demand the earnest prayers of all God's people.

The tent and camp-meeting seasons are also just upon us, when the Union Conference, the several local Conferences, and other organisations, will hold their meetings. These will be important occasions for counsel and devotion. We greatly need more labourers. All about us the fields are white for the harvest, and there are but few to thrust in the sickle. "Let us pray the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth labourers into the harvest." Above all we need to pray that God will give all His people a heart to consecrate themselves and their means to Him.

Suitable readings for the week of prayer will be furnished to all our churches. We greatly desire that all will make this a season of earnest devotion, and we pray that the showers of His grace may be abundant.

NEW SOUTH WALES TRACT DEPARTMENT.

NEARLY two years ago a Conference was organised in New South Wales. Since then the Tract Department of the Conference has managed the tract and periodical business of that colony, but by request the Australian Tract Society has managed the subscription book business. That Conference has now decided to take over this department, and manage all its Tract Society work.

Pastor W. L. H. Baker has rented a convenient house at 82 Douglass St., Stanmore, a part of which he will occupy, and the remainder will be used for offices.

Miss Lizzie Gregg, who has been employed in our Melbourne office for the past year, has gone to Sydney

to act as secretary, and all Tract Society business, including the subscription book work, should be addressed to the New South Wales Tract Society at the above address. All accounts of agents working in the colony will be turned over to New South Wales, and hereafter they will order all books and supplies from that office. All business will be conducted on about the same basis as before, and if all agents will note the transfer, and send all reports, and direct all communications to the Sydney office from now on, there will be no difficulty occasioned by the transfer.

Brother R. S. Bell, who has been in our canvassing work for many years, has gone to New South Wales to canvass, and, for the present at least, will assign territory, and assist the agents generally. All applications for agency or territory should be addressed to him at the Sydney office. If any matters in this arrangement are not clear to agents or others, full particulars can be obtained by writing to the Sydney office.

We are confident that this is a move in the right direction, and trust that the time is not far distant when a society will be organised in every colony of Australasia.

TASMANIA.

During the past month it has been my privilege for the first time to visit Tasmania. This trip, for several reasons, was one of the most pleasant I have made in the colonies. It was almost like a visit to my native land, to be greeted by snow-capped mountains and rugged hills at every turn. It was very pleasant to meet the hospitable people, among whom were our own brethren in particular.

The most of my time was spent in Hobart, engaged in religious liberty work. Nine meetings were held with the church, and the good Spirit of the Lord was present to assist in the studies. About 1,000 signatures were obtained, and presented to the Assembly and Council.

The proposed religious amendment was debated in the House by Members nearly every day, and some of the leading men took good, clear positions on the question, among whom were two Ministers of the Gospel. No Member refused to present our petitions. When I called upon the acting Premier, and asked him to present a petition for us, he said, "Most certainly I will, and I am heartily glad that there are people in this colony who have sense enough to get up a petition like yours." He is a Christian man, yet he sees the danger and inconsistency of such a clause.

After two weeks spent mostly in Hobart, I returned to Melbourne cheered and encouraged by the active work in the field afforded by this trip, and trusting that the time may not be far distant when I can return and become better acquainted with other parts of that very pleasant island.


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

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
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NOTES.

The boys also have some meetings among themselves. Every Friday evening we have some good meetings in the girls' study, with all the home students present, and often nearly all in the room bear their testimony. Last Friday evening the meeting was especially good. Sister White has come over several times of late and talked to the students, which they seem to appreciate very much."

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
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
