THE HOLY SPIRIT

CHRIST declared that after His ascension, He would send to His church,

as His crowning gift, the Comforter, who was to take His place. This Comforter is the Holy Spirit,—the soul of His life, the efficacy of His church, the light and life of the world. With His Spirit Christ sends a reconciling influence and a power that takes away sin.

In the gift of the Spirit, Jesus gave to man the highest good that heaven could bestow. The Saviour looked on humanity, and saw that it was under the power of the prince of darkness; but He saw also that there was hope for human beings because there was power in the divine nature successfully to contend with evil agencies. With glad assurance He said, "Now is the judgment of this world: now shall the prince of this world be cast out. And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me,"

The Spirit was given as a regenerating agency, and without this the sacrifice of Christ would have been of no avail. The power of evil had been strengthening for centuries, and the submission of man to this satanic captivity was amazing. Sin could be resisted and overcome only through the mighty agency of the third person of the Godhead, who would come with no modified energy, but in the fulness of divine power. GUIDANCE OF THE PIONEERS

J. N. LOUGHBOROUGH A S previously stated in former articles, the work of presenting the third angel's message in the early days of our cause was confined almost exclusively to those who had been in the first and second messages, and who still held fast their hope of the Lord's speedy coming.

Elder Bates on hearing of these would immediately begin to plan and study how to reach them with the message. In case there was a lack of information as to where these companies could be found, or how reached, he would pray earnestly to the Lord to guide him to the place and to the people where an interest in the truths of the Bible he was burdened to present might be awakened. Many a time was he instructed in the night by dreams as to the direction he should go.

It is frequently the case that in a dream there are symbols introduced corresponding to the nature of the occupation followed by the individual. As Elder Bates had been a sea faring man for fifty years of his life, the s tiling of a ship, in his dreams, would give him his direction. In these dreams he would be instructed to give particular attention to the course the ship was taking. And thus was he guided from state to state and from place to place where precious s uls were found every time who were ready for the truth and who gladly accepted the third angel's message.

It was Elder Bates who first introduced the message into the States of Ohio, Michigan, Illinois, and Wisconsin, as well as in different localities in the New England States. On hearing of a company of forty

First-day Adventists at Jackson, Mich., he at once visited them and as a result of this visit thirty-nine of the number accepted the message, and though these are nearly all now with the silent dead, they were faithful to the very last-only three having apostatized. After establishing the company at Jackson, he sought for light as to where he should go next. In his dreams he again saw his ship. In the morning he made this inquiry of Brother Dan Palmer, "Do you know of any Adventists off to the Southwest of here?" "Yes," said Brother Palmer, "There is a Brother Catlin and some others at Kingsbury, Ind." "Well," said Elder Bates, "I must go there, for I saw my ship pointed in that direction last night." He continued to inquire, "Is there a place on the way to Kingsbury by the name of Battle Creek? I dreamed that my ship should make a stop on the way at a place called Battle Creek, Mich." "Yes," replied Brother Palmer, " You will pass through a place on the way named Battle Creek about forty miles west from here." " Are there any Aaventists in that place?" inquired Elder Bates. "No," was the reply, "There are none."

Elder Bates started on his trip to Kingsbury, deciding to stop off at Battle Creek, which was then (1852) a little country village of less than one thousand inhabitants. He prayed much on the way to know how he could do anything in that place. Finally it occurred to him to go to the postmaster and inquire for the most honest man in the place. This he did, and the postmaster at once said, "The most honest man in this place is David Hewitt, a Presbyterian deacon. He lives on Van Buren Street, in the west end of the village. His occupation is peddling thread, needles and such notions through the country. He is so straight in his deal that if he can not make the exact change with his customers he pays them the next time he comes, even to a cent. He is the most honest man in all this country." With this information, Bates called on Mr. Hewitt and introduced himself by saying, "I have been directed to you as the most honest man in Battle Creek, and if you are I have some very important truth I want to present to you." "Come in," said Mr. Hewitt. Elder Bates spent the whole day with the family, and with open Bible they investigated the message. At the close of the day, Mr. Hewitt and his wife had accepted the light presented, Sabbath truth and all. Their best room was the meeting room-the place of worship-for the few who first accepted the message in Battle Creek. It continued to be so used until the autumn of 1855, when the first Seventhday Adventists' meeting house in Battle Creek was erected-a little structure 18 x 24 ft. in size.

Suffice it to say here that Elder Bates' visit to Kingsbury resulted in Mr. Catlin and others accepting the message, all of which verifies the Lord's promise, "Commit thy way unto the Lord, and He will guide thy paths."

THE WORK OF THE SPIRIT

A^T the cost of infinite sacrifice and suffering, Christ has provided for us every essential to success in the Christian warfare. The Holy Spirit brings power that enables man to overcome. It is through the agency of the Spirit that the government of Satan is to be subdued. It is the Spirit that convinces of sin, and with the consent of the human being, expels sin from the heart. The mind is then brought under a new law,—the royal law of liberty.

The Spirit works in us by bringing to mind, vividly and often, the precious truths of the plan of redemption. We would forget these truths, and for us God's 'rich promises would lose their efficiency, were it not for the Spirit, who takes of the things of God, and shows them to us. Our hearts

WHO IS MELCHISEDEC?

S. N. HASKELL

MANY speculations have been circulated in answer to this question; but

the only sure way to arrive at right conclusions is to carefully study what the Lord has written of Him.

Melchisedec occurs eleven times in the Bible; eight of the instances refer to the priesthood of Christ, as follows :----

Psa, 110:4. Heb. 5:6 Heb. 7:17 Heb. 7:21 Thou art a priest forever after the order of Melchisedec.

Heb. 5:10. Called of God an high priest after the order of Melchisedec.

- Heb. 6:20. Jesus made an high priest forever after the order of Melchisedec.
- Heb. 7:11. Priest should arise after the order of Melchisedec.

Heb. 7:15. After the similitude of Melchisedec there ariseth another priest.

The three remaining passages that speak of Melchisedec are descriptive of His character and work. In Gen. 14: 18-20 we have the first mention of Melchisedec and in Heb. 7: 1-10, we have a further description of Him, the name Melchisedec occurring in the first and tenth verses. A careful reading of these last texts will give us the following facts in regard to the work and character of Melchisedec.

- 1. King of Salem.
- 2. King of righteousness.
- 3. King of peace.
- 4. Priest of the most high God,
- 5. Blessed Abraham.
- 6. Received tithes from Abraham.
- 7. Without father.
- 8. Without mother.
- 9. Without descent (margin, without pedigree).
- Having neither beginning of days, nor end of life.
- 11. Made like unto the Son of God.
- 12. Abideth a priest continually.
- Descent is not counted from them (Abraham or Levi).

14. Greater than Abraham.

Who is Melchisedec ?—The one who fulfils ALL these characteristics given by inspiration.

Is it Christ?—No, for Christ has a Father and also had a mother, and His geneology is traced in the Bible. He has a descent. Melchisedec is "made like unto the Son of God," and therefore could not be the Son of God.

Is it the Angel Gabriel ?—No, for the angels are created beings and therefore had beginning of days. The whole of the first chapter of Hebrews is given to show that Christ is far above the angels and that they in no way compare with Him, therefore Melchisedec who is "made like unto the Son of Man" could not be any one of the angels. Gabriel is not a king. Angels are messengers sent to minister.

The Holy Spirit, "the third person of the Godhead" the soul of Christ's life, and the light and life of the world is the only one to whom *all of* the above specifications will apply. The Holy Spirit is the third person of the Godhead, and therefore is "King of righteousness, and after that also King of Salem, which is King of peace."

The "Spirit itself-maketh intercession for us with groanings which can not be uttered, and He that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit, because He maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God." Rom. 8:26, 27. Therefore the Spirit "abideth a priest continually," and is a "priest of the most high God."

The Spirit is the "third person of the Godhead," and therefore has no more beginning of days nor end of life" than God Himself. There is no record of father, mother, or pedigree given of the Holy Spirit. As the third person of the Godhead, it is greater than Abraham and could bless him.

The Spirit comes to the world as a representative of Christ and thus is made like

unto Christ. The Holy Spirit has visibly appeared to man under different forms. The Holy Ghost descended in a bodily shape like a dove upon Christ. Luke 3: 22. It came as cloven tongues of fire upon the disciples on the day of Pentecost. To Abraham it appeared as a King, Priest. To-day It comes as a blessed Comforter to every one who will open his heart to receive it.

CHRIST THE HUMAN EXAMPLE CHAS. THOMPSON

IN the earthly life of Christ we have a perfect human life exemplified. Paul, in Rom. 8:3, declares that Christ's life in the flesh condemns 'sin in the flesh. Hence we find in Him a perfect human being. And Peter declares that He left us an example that we should follow his steps. 1 Pet. 2:21. Therefore in studying His child life, we find a perfect example for children, and their relation to their parents outlined.

When He was a child, in order to escape the decree of Herod, that all male children two years old and under, in Bethlehem should be slain, His parents were directed by an angel to flee into Egypt and there to remain until the death of Herod, thus showing that God places the responsbility of caring for the children upon the parents. After Herod died, Jesus went to Nazareth and was subject to his parents. Luke 2:-51. From this record we find that when Jesus was a child He was taught obedience to his parents. Indeed He could not have been a commandment-keeper and done otherwise; for the commandment says," Honor thy father and mother." And no one can honor his parents who does not obey them,

Paul speaking of Him in Heb. 5:8, says, "Though He was a son, yet learned He obedience by the things He suffered." These texts show that it was necessary for Him to learn obedience, even at the cost of some suffering. What a lesson for parents to-day! So often we see them yielding to the demands of their children, and by so doing, encourage acts of disobedience in them, when the real Christian thing would be to teach obedience, even at the cost of a little temporary suffering.

The writer well remembers in his own experience that there was far less suffering in early life to behave in church than to have his parents be compelled to take him out during services. And I honor them today that they taught me to live with them, rather than they with me.

The results of this sort of training is seen in the after life of Jesus. For when you follow Him to the close of His earthly life, when he was enduring the agonies of the cross, in His expiring moments. He saw His mother standing by the cross, and as He glanced into that face that had so earnestly taught Him during childhood, He said unto John, "Behold thy mother," John 19:27. And John from that hour shared his home with her. Thus we see Jesus' last act was to provide a home for His mother in the decline of life, The record then says, "After this Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished." Verse 28. So in the Christ example we learn that no young man has accomplished all things, until he has provided for the comfort of his parents. And no parents have done their duty unless they have taught their children obedience. And we can be assured from the example, that the child so taught will not be neglectful of his parents when the responsibility of life comes upon them. May God help us all to do our duty.

THE BOOK OF ESTHER

HE book of Esther is one of the most important books in the Bible, and yet few give it more than a casual reading. It contains a record of one of the greates schemes the devil ever laid to destroy the people of God, It also records one of the greatest victories, when instead of destruction, glorious deliverance came to the people of God. All who closely follow these studies on the book of Esther will be richly repaid.

The Rich King

- Dan. 10:21. Gabriel promised to show Daniel things noted in the Scriptures of truth.
- Dan. 10:1. He was speaking to Daniel during the third year of Cyrus' reign.
- Dan, 11:1, 2. The angel proceded to give a list of the kings of Persia to the sixth king, not mentioning Cyrus who was then reigning. These kings and the length of their reigns were as follows : Darius 2 years, Cyrus 7 years, Cambyses 71/2 years, Smerdis 6 months, Darius Hystaspes 36 years, and Xerxes the great 21 * years.
- Dan, 11:2. The fourth was noted for his riches. The angel said in Dan. 10:21, we would find these things in the Scripture of truth, then somewhere in the Bible we will find a record of the riches of this fourth king of Persia. The first chapter of Esther contains the record of the wealth of this king.
- Esther 1:1. Ahasuerus is his Bible name, his kingdom extended over one hundred and twenty-seven provinces.
- Esther 1:2. Shushan was the capital of the kingdom.
- Esther 1:3. In the third year of his reign he called in all his princes, nobles, and servants to a great exposition.
- Esther 1:4. The object of the gathering was to " show the riches of his glorious kingdom and the honor of his excellent majesty."
- Esther 1:4. The vastness of his wealth may be estimated by the fact that it required six months or 180 days, to display it.
- Esther 1:5. At the end of the six months the king made a great feast, and opened the court of the royal garden to all the people of Shushan.
- Esther 1:6. [margin] In this court were fine linen draperies of white, green, and violet sus-

pended by silver rings to marble pillars. The pavement was of porphyre, and marble, and alabaster, and stones of blue color. The beds or couches upon which they reclined while feasting, were of gold and silver. Imagine the wealth necessary to furnish the courts of the garden in this manner.

- Esther 1:7. This vast throng of people were all given wine in cups of gold, and no two cups were alike.
- Esther 1:8. One important feature of the feast was that none were urged to drink, if they did not wish it.
- Esther 1:9. The queen was entertaining the women at the same time.

No one can study the details of this great world's fair without recognizing in Ahasuerus of Esther the fourth Persian king who would be "far richer than they all." In other words Xerxes the Great is the Ahasuerus of Esther.

The King's Mistake

- Esther 1:10, 11. When the king and his princes were drunken, the king sent for the queen to come in and display her beauty before the drunken princes.
- Prov. 31:4, 5. The king's judgment was perverted by the wine.
- Esther 1:12. Vashti was a noble woman and she chose to give up her crown and royal estate rather than sacrifice her womanly modesty.
- Esther 1:13. The king when sober showed wisdom in counciling with those who were wise and understood law and judgment.
- Esther 1:14, 15. Seven of the most noted of these composed his council, and were called upon to consider the case of the queen.
- Esther 1:16-18. It was shown that some would take advantage of the example of the queen, and pursue a course that would bring discord in many homes.
- Gen. 3:16. The original decree that the husband should rule over the wife was well understood by these men.
- Eph. 5:25. Being heathens they did not understand that with this decree was also the command, "Husbands love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it." If Ahasuerus had understood this command he would never have sent for Vashti.
- Esther 1:19-20. As the laws of the Medes and the Persians could not be changed, Vashti must suffer for the drunken folly of the king,

or the harmony of many homes would be broken.

- Esther 1:22. A proclamation was sent forth that "every man should bear rule in his own house."
- Eph. 5:22-25. The true husband is to be the head of the family and love and cherish the wife as Christ loves the church and gave himself for it. Such love always makes a happy home. It excludes selfishness and abuse of authority.
- Esther 2:8. In the search for beautiful women the palace itself was not overlooked, and Esther was gathered with many other beautiful maidens, who were placed under the care of Hegai, keeper of the women.
- Esther 2:9. Hegai was pleased with Esther, and he at once gave her the best apartment in the house of the women, and also gave her all she needed for her purification, and furnished seven maidens to serve her.

Esther Made Oueen

- Esther 2:1. The king remembered Vashti.
- Esther 2:2-4. His counselors advised him to select another queen. From all parts of the kingdom beautiful young women were gathered and from these the king was to choose a queen.
- Esther 2:5. Mordecai, a Jew of the tribe of Benjamin, was connected with the household of the king, and lived in the palace.
- Esther 2:6. About eighty years before this he had come from Jerusalem with Jeconiah or Jehoichin, king of Judah, whom Nebuchadnezzar had brought to Babylon.
- Esther 2:7. Mordecai's uncle had died and left an orphan by the name of Esther, whom Mordecai adopted for his own child, and she had now grown to womanhood.

- Esther 2:10. No one knew that Esther was a Jewess, for Mordecai instructed her not to reveal her nationality.
- Esther 2:11. Mordecai came every day to inquire of Esther's welfare.
- Esther 2:12. Each of the maidens was kept a whole year before they went in before the king.
- Esther 2:13, 14. They were furnished with all they required when they went in to the king. The one that pleased the king was to be queen, the others were kept as concubines.
- Esther 2:15. When Esther's turn came she made no requests, simply took what Hegai gave her. Her beauty and graceful manners won the favor of all that saw her.
- Esther 2:16; 1:3. Four years had passed since Vashti had been put away.
 - Esther 2:17. The record states that the king loved Esther, and he set the royal crown upon her head and made her queen.

A Plot Discovered

- Esther 2:18. The king made a great feast in honor of Esther and distributed gifts.
- Esther 2:19. Mordecai held a position of honor, he sat in the king's gate.
- Esther 2:20. The secret of Esther's life is given in these verses. She had been taught to obey her parents while a child, and she still honored and respected them.
- Esther 2:21. Two of the king's door-keepers formed a plot to murder the king.
- Esther 2:22. Mordecai discovered the plot and revealed it to Esther who notified the king in Mordecai's name:
- Esther 2:23. Upon investigation it was found to be true, and the two men were hanged. An account of the whole proceeding was written in the chronicles of the king.

Simple as this record appears yet in it is revealed a strong point in Mordecai's character. We do not read that the king even thanked him for saving his life, yet Mordecai does not murmur nor complain. He did right because he honored God, and did not lose his peace of mind because man did not recognize his merits. Such a man God can greatly honor in His own time.

AHITHOPHEL

A HITHOPHEL was king David's counsellor. 1 Chron. 27:33. David had such confidence in him that he considered him as his own familiar friend (Psa. 41:9), his equal and guide (Psa. 55: 12–14), in company they walked to the house of God together, and took sweet counsel on the way. David trusted and delighted in the counsel of Ahithophel, for it was as if a man had inquired at the oracle

of God. 2 Sam. 16:23.

When David and Ahithophel were such intimate friends we are led to wonder why Ahithophel joined the conspiracy with Absalom. 2 Sam. 15:12. We will find the reason for this in the fact that Bathsheba was his granddaughter (2 Sam. 23:34; 11:3), so in joining the conspiracy he was avenging himself for the disgrace David brought upon his family.

The first thing that Absalom did was to send for Ahithophel. 2 Sam. 15:10-12. When this was told to David he prayed the Lord to turn his counsel into foolishness.

[&]quot;Lord, lift me up and let me stand, By faith, on heaven's table land; A higher plane than I have found, Lord, plant my feet on higher ground."

2 Sam. 15:31. To help answer this prayer he sent Hushai (2 Sam. 15:32-37; 1 Chron. 27:33) his friend and companion.

As soon as Absalom arrived in Jerusalem, he called a council, and there Ahithophel proposed that he be allowed to choose out 12,000 men, " And I will arise and pursue after David this night. And I will come upon him while he is weary and weak handed, and will make him afraid : and all the people that are with him shall flee, and I will smite the king only." Hushai knew that if this counsel was followed David would be lost, and so when his advice was asked he told Absalom that it was not good and gave such excellent reasons for it that Absalom followed him instead of Ahithophel. 2 Sam, 17:7-14. "For the Lord had appointed to defeat the good counsel of Ahithophel, to the extent that the Lord might bring evil upon Absalom."

Ahithophel was not deceived by Hushai's counsel. He knew that in following it Absalom's cause would be lost. Absalom being the beloved son of David might in the end be forgiven, but Ahithophel knew that no such reconciliation would come to him, for he was the one that encouraged Absalom in rebellion, counselled him to dishonor his father, and above all he had planned the killing of the king, so he did for himself what he knew would come in the end anyway: "Went to his house, to his city, and put his household in order, and hanged himself, and died. 2 Sam. 17:23.

Ahithophel learned too late that, "There is no wisdom nor understanding nor counsel against the Lord." Prov. 21: 30.

A NEW NAME

I N Bible times a name was not chosen on account of its beauty, but because of its fitness for the individual to whom it was given.

The companion given Adam was called "wo-man" because she was taken out of

man. Noah meant rest or comfort. Gen. 5:29. It must surely have been a comfort to the Lord to find one godly man when all the world was corrupt.

Abraham signified a father of many nations. Esau's name was changed to Edom or Red, because he sold his birthright for a meal of red lentile pottage. Gen. 25: 30-34. While Jacob's name, which meant a supplanter Gen. 27:36, was changed to Israel which signified a prince or one that prevailed with God and man. Gen. 32:28.

In the New Testament we have Simon changed to Peter, John 1:42 [margin], Joses who gave liberally of his goods to supply the needs of his brethren, was given the name of Barnabas or son of consolation. Acts 4:36.

Whenever God names an individual, He gives a character name, a name representing the person bearing the name. Every one saved will be given a new name by Christ, and no one will know that name but the individual that receives it. Rev. 2:17. No one but Jacob who did the wrestling and clung helpless to the angel can know the *real* significance of the name of "Israel." We may speak the name, but we can never appreciate the heart anguish and deathly struggle that could change Jacob, the supplanter into a "prince."

Christ receives a name that none can know save Christ Himself, Rev. 19:12.

Each one of the redeemed host will receive a name that will represent their inward victories over the great enemy of their souls, and the *real* meaning of the name will be known only by themselves and the Lord. Throughout eternity these names will be a connecting link binding them more closely to the heart of the Master. They will ever be memorials of the victories gained in secret prayer, when the heart was laid bare before the Saviour and sin was exchanged for righteousness.



BIBLE READER'S CLASS Sanctuary

THE sanctuary of the Bible is the center of all religious worship. The sanctuary built by Moses, and the services connected therewith are an illustration of the plan of salvation by Jesus Christ in the heavenly courts. This is plainly stated in Heb. 8:1-5.

Heavenly Sanctuary

- Heb. 8:2. Christ is the "minister of heavenly things, of the true tabernacle which the Lord pitched and not man."
- Psa. 102:19. The Lord looked down from the height of His sanctuary, from heaven did the Lord behold the earth.
- Psa. 33:13, 14. This is God's habitation in heaven from which he sees all mankind.
- 2 Chron. 6:39, 40. It is his dwelling place from which he forgives sins.
- 2 Chron. 6:24. The condition of pardon was a recognition of the earthly temple which was an object lesson of the heavenly. See Solomon's prayer in 1 Kings 8:27-61, and 2 Chron. 6:20-42.

Several points in the above are worthy of special notice. 1. Tabernacle, sanctuary, habitation, and dwelling place are the same. 2. Each is said to be in heaven, from which God looketh down upon the earth. 3. Forgiveness and help cometh alone from God, and His dwelling place which is in heaven. 4. One condition was absolutely necessary, namely, a recognition of the earthly sanctuary or the temple Solomon built, which was a figure of the heavenly. Heb. 9:1-9. The prophets understood this and the most wonderful answers of prayer were at times when this was recognized, and plead before the Lord. 2 Chron. 20:5-34. Dan. 6. The impression made upon their minds would be, there was a personal God in heaven who heard and answered prayer. Let these points be well studied and they will form a basis of assurance of God's hearing and answering prayer.

God's Throne

- Heb. 8:1. Christ is on the right hand of the Majesty in the heavens.
- Heb. 4:16. This throne is called the throne of grace.
- 1 Sam. 2:8. God raiseth up the poor and maketh them inherit this throne of gl ry.
- 1 Kings 22:19; 2 Chron. 18:18. The prophet saw the Lord sitting on His throne and all the host of heaven standing before Him.

Psa. 47:8. It is called the throne of His holiness.

Psa. 89:14. Justice and judgment are the habitation of God's throne.

Jer. 14:21. It is the throne of God's glory.

- Eze. 1. It is described as composed of angels, therefore a living throne.
- Psa. 11:4. It is in heaven in the temple.
- Psa. 9:7, 8. It was prepared for judgment.

Psa. 80:1. It is between the cherubim.

Psa. 89:29, 36. It will continue as the days of heaven.

Jer. 17:12. It is in the sanctuary from the beginning.

John 1:1,2. The beginning is coexistent with God. Eze. 34:25-27; Rev. 21:1-4. It will continue on the easth made new forever and ever.

The above reveals several important considerations. 1. There is a real throne of God as there is a real Christ. 2. This throne is in heaven. 3. It is called a throne of mercy, of glory, of justice and judgment, a throne of grace and a throne of His holiness. Because that from God on His throne in heaven cometh all of these things.

God's Throne (Continued.)

- Eze. 1. It is a living, moving throne composed of angels.
- Ex. 29:42, 43. It is represented in the law as being in the first apartment of the sanctuary when the morning and evening service was conducted.
- Ex. 29:43. It sanctified those who ministered in the sanctuary.

Rev. 4:2. The real throne is in heaven.

- Rev. 4:3. The appearance of Him who sits upon it is described.
- Rev. 4:4. There are four and twenty elders siting around it.
- Rev. 4:5. Before the throne were seven lamps of fire.
- Rev. 4:6. In the midst of this living throne were four living creatures.
- Rev. 5:8, 9. These elders and living creatures were immortal saints.

These saints or holy ones were raised when Christ was raised (Matt. 27:50-53), for Christ was raised among them. Rom. 8:29. They were the antitypical wave sheaf. Lev. 23:10-12. A sample of the harvest, the first fruits of them that slept. 1 Cor. 15:20-21. Christ led these representatives captive to heaven, as a trophy of redemption. Eph. 4:8. It therefore follows that God, Christ, angels which surround the throne, and the throne itself are as real as those who are translated to heaven. And the ministry of Christ in the heavenly courts is a real work, for the salvation of the human family.

The Ministration of the Sanctuary

Heb. S:1-5. The priests and services of the

earthly were typical of Christ and His work in the heavenly.

- Heb. 3:1. We are to consider Christ as an apostle, and a high priest. That is to consider His work.
- Rom. 5:10. We are reconciled to God by Christ's death, but saved by His life.
- Rom. 5:9. If we are justified by His blood, we shall be saved from wrath through Him.
- Heb. 7:25. His life and death are not sufficient to save without his intercession in our behalf. The fact that he died will not save the sinner without His officiating as a priest.
- Hosea 4:6. Many will be destroyed for lack of knowledge of the work of Christ as a priest and our relation to the law of God.
- 1 John 3:4, 5. Sin is the transgression of the law of God and Christ died to take away our sins.
- 1 John 1:8-10. A knowledge of our sins and a confession of the same, and the intercession of Christ in our behalf are essential to salvation.
- Gen. 3: 8, 10, 22–24. It was sin that separated man from God and deprived him of the tree of life. The entire typical service therefore reveals the knowledge of sin and how to put it away that man can become one with his Maker. This oneness is called the atonement or atone-ment.
- 2 Cor. 5:21. He who grasps these truths and sustains the relation to Christ, as divinely instructed, exchanges his sins for Christ's righteousness.

There are hundreds of trappers in the north of here, even to within the Artic circle who never get as far south as Edmonton, who devote most of their lonely days to reading. Such literature as is sent them is eagerly read. Why should not the "Truth" be sent them as well as catalogues, novels, etc? I can have an abundance of our denominational papers scattered over these thousands of miles north of us free of charge, if I had them to send. About thirty thousand pages have been distributed here in about six months, but as it is an almost entirely new field, it is but a drop in the bucket.
