DANGER OF UNBELIEF

We need to have a correct estimate of the value of our own souls; then we would not be as reckless in our course of action as at present. We would seek most earnestly to know God's way; we would work in an opposite direction from selfishness, and our constant prayer would be that we might have the mind of Christ, that we might be molded and fashioned after His likeness. It is in looking to Jesus and beholding His loveliness, having our eyes fixed steadfastly

upon Him, that we become changed into His image. He will give grace to all that keep His way, and do His will, and walk in the truth. But those who love their own way, who worship their idols of opinion, and do not love God and obey His word, will continue to walk in darkness. O, how terrible is unbelief! As well let light be poured upon the blind, as to present truth to these souls; the one can not see and the other will not.

I beseech you whose names are registered on the church book as worthy members, to be indeed worthy through the virtue of Christ. Mercy and truth and the love of God are promised to the humble and contrite soul. The displeasure and judgments of God are against those who persist in walking in their own ways, loving self, loving the praise of men. They will certainly be swept into the satanic delusions of these last days because they received not the love of the truth. Because the Lord has in former days blessed and honored them, they flatter themselves that they are chosen and true, and do not need warning and instruction and reproof. The True Witness says: "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous, therefore, and repent." The confessed people of God have the charge against them, "Nevertheless, I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love. Remember, therefore, from whence thou are fallen, and repent and do the first works; or else I will come unto thee quickly, and will remove thy candlestick out of his place, except thou repent."

The love of Jesus that once burned upon

the altar of the heart, has become dimmed and nearly extinguished. Spiritual strength has become enfeebled. The displeasure of the Lord is against His people. In their present condition it is impossible for them to represent the character of Christ. when the True Witness has sent them counsel, reproof, and warnings because He loves them, they have refused to receive the message: they have refused to come to the light, lest their deeds should be reproved. Iesus said. "I lay down my life for the sheep. . . . Therefore doth my Father love me." "By taking your sins upon myself, I am opening a channel through which his grace can flow to all who will accept it. In giving myself for the sin of the world, I have prepared a way for the unrepressed tide of his love to flow to men."

All heaven is filled with amazement, that when this love, so broad, so deep, so rich and full, is presented to men who have known the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, they are so indifferent, so cold and unmoved. What does it mean that such amazing grace does not soften our hard hearts? O! it is because of the power of unbelief; because "thou hast left thy first love." This is why the word of God has so little influence. It is a fire, but it can not penetrate nor warm ice-bound hearts that cherish unbelief.

AN EXAMPLE WORTHY OF IMITATION

PAUL had labored over three years in Ephesus when Demetrius, the silver, smith, raised an uproar, because the sale of silver shrines had been reduced by the preaching of the gospel.

The town-clerk, when he quelled the mob, said, "Ye have brought hither these men, which are neither robbers of churches, nor yet blasphemers of your goddess." In all the time Paul and his associates had labored there in Ephesus they had not railed against the goddess Diana. If they had some one would have brought it up against

them at this time. This is worthy of careful thought.

We have a precious truth to proclaim and in proclaiming it we do not need to denounce false systems of religion. If the truth is preached in its simplicity it will of itself condemn all error and false theories. Preach the truth; we never need to fight darkness. Bring in the light, let it shine forth, and the darkness will flee without spending strength to contend with it.

THE NUMERAL THREE

HERE is one case in the Scriptures where the numeral three is used in a typical sense. It is that of Jonah as recorded in the book called by his name, found in chapter one, verse seventeen. It is there stated that " Ionah was in the belly of the fish three days and three nights." Various have been the speculations of cavilers in regard to this case, some claiming that this could not be a true record, "because the throat of a whale is so small that he could not swallow a man." While this is true of the Arctic or bone whale, it is not true of the "Cachalot." the South Sea whale, which the encyclopedists tell us "frequently drift into the Mediterranean Sea." The throat of this whale is very much larger than the body of a man. The Lord "preparing a fish" to swallow Ionah (Jonah 1:17) was probably the bringing of the fish to that point when Jonah was cast into the sea.

The "higher critics," as they call themselves, formerly claimed that they believed in Christ's teachings, but they did not believe the story of Jonah, and some other records of the Old Testament. The query arises, How long would they hold to the teaching of Christ when they came to see that He endorsed the story of Jonah and the whale, for He said, "As Jonas was three days and three nights in the whale's

belly, so shall the Son of man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth." Matt. 12:50; Luke 11:30. From the time of our Saviour's betrayal to the resurrection He was under the ban of earth's powers, as Jonas was carried about by the whale for three days and nights.

The word "earth" is used in the sense of the people of the earth in many scriptures, as the following texts show: Ps. 50:-4; Isa. 1:2; 34:1; Jer. 6:19; 22:29; Micah 6:2. With this understanding of the word earth, the matter of three days and three nights in the case of Christ is all plain. He was betrayed into the hands of earth the same as our Thursday night, condemned and crucified by them on Friday. He was still under their ban Friday, Sabbath and Saturday night; at sunrise, first day, "He is risen," and among the living. Thus according to the Jewish reckoning, we have the three nights, that of the sixth, seventh, and first days, and the first (night part) of the third day, and still rising on the third day from the time he submitted to, and was under the power of the people.

This is in perfect harmony with the prediction made concerning Him, and also His own statement. We read in Hosea 6:1-3, "Come and let us return unto the Lord: for he hath torn and he will heal us: he hath smitten and he will bind us up: after two days will he revive us: in the third day he will raise us up, and we shall live in His To His disciples He said He sight." should "be killed and rise again the third day." Mark 16:21; 17:23. On His way to Emmaus the two disciples said of Him, "And this is the third day since these things were done." Luke 24:21. Peter, when preaching of Christ at the house of Cornelius said, "Whom they slew and hanged on a tree; him hath God raised up the third day, and shewed him openly." Acts 10:-39, 40. Paul, when reasoning with the Corinthians, said, "Christ died for our sins

according to the Scriptures; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the *third* day according to the Scriptures." 1 Cor. 15:3, 4.

We see no necessity for the claim made by some that Christ was crucified on Thursday of our reckoning, in order to have Him three nights in the sepulchre, for with that reckoning His resurrection would be on the fourth day instead of the third, as these scriptures state. So we repeat, the idea that His being "in the heart of the earth," means under the control of earthly people for three days and nights. With this thought in mind all is plain and clear.

AN INVINCIBLE GUARD

F the many beautiful truths contained in the Holy Book, there is one of great beauty and comfort that is often overlooked by Christians. This truth is the ministration of holy angels. angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear Him, and delivereth them," Psa. 34:7, just as truly to-day as when they entered the prison and delivered Peter from the chains that bound him. Acts The angels have lost none of 12:1-11. their power since they "shut the lions' mouths" in the days of Daniel, Dan. 6:22, neither have they lost their interest in the salvation of mankind since the day they took hold of Lot and his family and hurried them out of Sodom. Gen. 19:15, 16. "Are they not all ministering spirits, sent forth to minister for them who shall be heirs of salvation?" Heb. 1:14.

Their forms are not always visible to the natural eye; and yet they have so often appeared as human beings that God admonishes us to "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." Heb. 13:2. The Bible teaches that each child of God has a guardian angel that attends them through life. Matt. 18:10.

WHAT DID JESUS DO?

OOKING unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God." Heb. 12:2.

Jesus is the author of simple faith in God and the Bible—the Word of God. Satan is the author of unbelief in the justice of God, the divinity of Christ, and the authenticity of the Holy Scriptures. He is the author of the criticism of the Word of God emanating from both the "higher" and "lower" critics of to-day. "Understandest thou what thou readest?" "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, to-day, and forever;" and as "the Scripture can not be broken," the plain teaching of the Scripture is still the only safe guide from earth to heaven.

Jesus was with God in heaven before the world was created. "And now, O Father, glorify me with thine own self, with the glory which I had with thee before the world was." John 17:5. He and the Father were one in creation, and are one in redemption. Jesus said, "I and my Father are one." John 10:30. The Father in counsel with the Son said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness." Gen.

1:26. Thus it will be observed that the Father was the great architect. He devised the plan of our formation, and the Son of God spoke the creative word.

It is clearly stated by the Father in Heb. 1:8, that Christ, the Son, is God. "But unto the Son he saith, Thy throne, O God, is forever and ever." The sixth verse may also be read in this connection with profit to the child of simple faith. "And again, when He bringeth the first-begotten into the world, He saith, And let all the angels of God worship Him."

"By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth. . . . He spake, and it was done; He commanded, and it stood fast." Ps. 33:6, 9. Of Jesus it is said, "By Him were all things created, that are in heaven, and that are in earth, . . And He is before all things, and by Him all things consist" (or hold together). Col. 1:16, 17.

In cooperation with the Father, He made the world and all things that are therein in the first six days of time. Each day was bounded about by the terms, "evening and morning." The last four days were doubly guarded as expressed by the words, "the greater light to rule the day." The sun marked the beginning and closing of the day; and it continues thus to do. Hence there can be no mistake as to the length of those days, for they were of the same length as our twenty-four-hour days.

Creation's work thus being completed, the Lord rested on the seventh day, and thus He made that day His Sabbath. All things were made by Christ, and for Him. The Sabbath, therefore, having been made by Christ, is a Christian institution. The seventh day having been made the Sabbath, it is the Christian Sabbath, and is as unalterably the Christian Sabbath for all time to come, as is its Lord the Saviour and only Saviour of mankind, for time and for eter-

nity. He said, "The seventh day," not the first day, "is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God." It is true. He is the same yesterday, and to-day, and forever. His word can not be changed to read thus of another day. Of the Sabbath it is said, it is "the holy of the Lord." We are admonished by Him, "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." Shall we act well our part, or will we place our reliance in the class of "higher" or "lower" critics of God's Word?

The Sabbath, like the Saviour, is for the benefit of man. Mark 2:27, 28. Acts 4:12. The Saviour is for every man who will believe; and the Sabbath is for every man who will receive. Jesus said, "The Sabbath was made for man." Neither races nor nationalities are particularized in the Saviour's language. Wherever man is, the world round, Christ and His memorial, the Sabbath, may be found.

The seventh day, or Saturday, was made the Sabbath twenty-three hundred and fifty years before there was ever a Jew born on the earth; so the scheme to make it Jewish will not meet the situation, will it? Christ came to the Jews, but He was not particularly a Jewish Saviour; but rather a Saviour, like His Sabbath, to all men who will believe and receive.

Jesus gave us an example of thirty-three years in Sabbath-keeping. Luke 4:16. "He that saith he abideth in Him ought himself also so to walk, even as He walked." 1 John 2:6. The great question for every individual to settle with himself and his God, is, What did Jesus do? And when we have settled that question, we will have also settled the query, What would Jesus do? for as He is ever the same, and changeth not, He would do if He were here, as He did do when He was here.

The Saviour's followers joined Him in Sabbath-keeping, as is seen in Mark 16:1, 2, "And when the Sabbath was past, . . .

had bought sweet spices that they might come and anoint Him. And very early in the morning the first day of the week, they came unto the sepulchre at the rising of the sun." Let it be observed that the Sabbath the Christians observed, was Christ's Sabbath, and it came just the day before the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday.

What did Jesus do? What did those Christians do? What should we do?



ARE THERE ANY SAINTS IN HEAVEN?

THE Scriptures recognize the fact that there are at the present time saints in heaven. The apostle wrote to the church, "Ye are come unto Mount Sion, . . . to the general assembly and church of the firstborn which are written in heaven, and to God the Judge of all, and to the spirits of just men made perfect." Heb. 12:23.

John on the isle of Patmos saw four living creatures, and a Lamb as it had been slain; and the elders and the four living creatures sang "a new song, saying, Thou art worthy to take the book, and to open the seals thereof: for thou was slain, and hast redeemed us to God by thy blood out of every kindred, and tongue, and people, and nation." Rev. 5:9. These were certainly in heaven, but how did they get there is a question that is easily answered. apostle Paul says when Christ arose from the dead he became "the firstborn among many brethren." This was a pledge on the part of God that all who believe in Christ will be saved when he comes the second time. When Christ died "the veil of the temple was rent in twain from top to bottom; and the earth did quake and the rocks rent." Then when he came out from the grave, "Many bodies of the saints which slept arose, and came out of the graves after his resurrection." Matt. 27:50-53. When He ascended up on high he led this multitude of captives, and when the Father accepted them as a pledge of all that Christ would deliver, he gave special gifts of the Hely Spirit unto men. Eph. 4:8.

So for the last eighteen hundred years there have been saints in heaven, and they have a part with Christ as He ministers in the outer apartment of the heavenly sanctuary. But when He entered the most holy place, the saints did not go with him, as none minister in that apartment but the High Priest alone. Heb. 9:7. The saints

which are in heaven do not minister in the most holy place, but cooperate with Christ in the outer apartment and offer to Him prayers which ascend from honest and contrite souls here upon the earth, while Christ in his own righteousness presents those prayers to the Father.

THE DEVIL'S REASONING

THE serpent was the medium used by the devil to communicate the first lie to humanity. God had said, "In the day that thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die." Gen. 2:17. The devil said, "Ye shall not surely die." Gen. 3:4. Then the devil proceeded to explain what God meant. This mode of reasoning is Satan's stronghold over the human mind. It is cunning and artful; it is designing and deceitful, and those who follow this reasoning, denying the plain testimony because the mind can not comprehend it, and b gin to explain that it does not mean what it says, shut their minds from the reception of faith that would be their salvation.

The apostle said, "If our gospel be hid, it is hid to them that are lost: in whom the god of this world (which is Satan) hath blinded the minds of them which believe not, lest the light of the glorious gospel of Christ, who is the image of God, should shine unto them." 2 Cor. 4:3, 4.

The serpent was the most subtle beast of any which God had created. It was for this reason that Satan chose him for his mouth-piece. He was originally a beautiful "fiery flying serpent." Isa. 14:29; 30:6. God protected his people in the wilderness from the bite of fiery serpents. Deut. 8:15. But Israel became discouraged because of the way, and spoke against God and against Moses in despising the diet which God had given them, and longing for the flesh pots of Egypt. And for this cause God removed his protection and

they were bitten by these fiery serpents. Num. 21:5, 6. When they repented and confessed their sins, God heard their prayer and removed the serpents from them. Verse 7.

From the time that the serpent was Satan's medium in the garden, God said to him, "Upon thy belly shalt thou go, and dust shalt thou eat all the days of thy life." Gen. 3:14, 15.

He also placed an enmity between humanity and the serpent, and man wou'd ever seek to bruise his head. This has been literally true for six thousand years. From that time it has been God's open lesson book to remind man of the result of this sophistry which originated with the devil. The serpent is afterwards spoken of as containing poison in his bite, as poisonous to the body as evil doctrines are to the soul. Deut. 32:24, 33. Evil and designing men are compared to the poison of the ser-Psalms 58:3-5. The poison is under the lips. Psalms 140:1-3. They will bite without enchantment, and are compared to the babbler who is no better. Eccl. 10:11. An unruly tongue connects a person with hell, and will be as surely destroyed as a person will die from the bite of an adder. James 3:5-9.


THE young man who does not feel called upon to apologize for his Christianity is one for whom Christianity is not likely to be called upon to apologize.

THE MIRACLE OF THE AX 2 Kings 6: 1-7

OD'S power is ever made manifest in I the path of obedience. A school of the prophets had outgrown its surroundings; and so they said, "Behold now, the place where we dwell with thee is too strait for us." The prophet dwelt with them in the school. He was an attraction for the students. So the students said, " Let us go, we pray thee, unto Jordan, and take thence every man a beam, and let us make us a place there, where we may dwell. And he answered, Go ye." They made no important move that would affect their school or those who attended it without first consulting the prophet. He encouraged them to go. They, in reply, said to him, "Go with thy servants." So the prophet said he would.

The students were poor, but they cut

down their own trees. In those days it was not unpopular for students to labor physically; for "a man was famous according as he had lifted up axes upon the thick trees." Psalms 74:5. The students were so poor they were obliged to borrow the ax with which they cut down the trees. "As one was felling a beam, the ax head fell into the water; and he cried, and said, Alas, master! for it was borrowed. And the man of God said, Where fell it? And he shewed him the place. And he cut down a stick, and cast it in thither, and the iron did swim. Therefore said he, Take it up to thee. And he put out his hand and took it."

In every miracle performed by God, when he united divine power with human effort, two things were always necessary; first, a firm confidence that God was in the work in which they were engaged; and second, that they were putting forth an effort to advance the work of God on earth. God does not bless man in idleness, neither does He bless those who say, "Go," and go not. But He does bless those who say, "Come." If, then, accidents happen, if miraculous power is needed, the believer will see the salvation of God.

THE SABBATH A PERPETUAL WEEKLY MEMORIAL

VERILY my Sabbaths ye shall keep; for it is a sign between me and you throughout your generations; that ye may know that I am the Lord that doth sanctify you." "Wherefore the children of Israel shall keep the Sabbath, to observe the Sabbath throughout their generations, for a perpetual covenant."

"It is a sign between me and the children of Israel forever: for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, and on the seventh day he rested." Ex. 31:13-17.

The Sabbath, then, is a sign, or seal, between God and his people forever. It is a perpetual covenant between them. Will

some one show us the end of a perpetual covenant, given for a sign forever? The only reason here given why the Sabbath is a perpetual sign, is "for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, and on the seventh day he rested." This shows that the Sabbath was given for a weekly memorial. The passover was given for a memorial to remind them of their deliverance from bondage, that they should not forget God, who pussed over their houses slaying their first-born, and with strength of hand brought them out of Egypt.

The communion of the body and the blood of Christ was given for a memorial to the Church, that we may not forget the sufferings and death of the Lamb of God,

So the Sabbath was given to man for a weekly memorial, that on the seventh day he might dismiss all servile labor and care, and look back to the creation and holy rest, and thus call to mind, and worship, and adore, the great Jehovah. If man had kept the weekly rest, he would never have forgotten God, who made heaven and earth. "The wicked shall be turned into hell, and all nations that forget God." Ps. 9:17.

This view gives the Sabbath its just weight of importance. How wise and wonderful the plan of Jehovah, laid out in the beginning. Man was to labor six days, and on the seventh day rest from servile labor and care. He was to look to the heavens, the earth, the sea, and all things, even himself, noblest of creation, and thus call to mind the living God.—James White.

HOW GOD ESTABLISHES DATES

EVENTS which establish important dates are like clusters of stars around some great light. They are like the many limbs on a tree, no two alike; yet all testify to the character of the tree. So God has surrounded important dates with many events which are His providences that fill an important link in the prophetic chain of the Scriptures. These dates are surrounded by many historical events.

Luke mentions seven which establish the date of John's preaching in the wilderness.
(1) It was "in the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar. (2) Pontius Pilate being governor of Judea, (3) and Herod being tetrarch of Galilee, (4) and his brother Philip, tetrarch of Iturea of the re-

gion of Trachonitis, (5) and Lysanias, the tetrarch of Abilene, (6) Annas and Caiaphas being the high priests, (7) the word of God came unto John the son of Zacharias in the wilderness. And he came into all the country about Jordan, preaching the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins. As it is written in the book of the words of Esaias the prophet, saying, The voice of one crying in the wilderness, Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make his paths straight." Luke 3:1-4. This was in 26 A. D., see margin. Six months later, Christ was baptized. Three and one half years later He was crucified. Three years and a half more brings us to the time that the gospel went to the Gentiles.

Inspiration mentions these seven events which fix the date of Christ's birth, His baptism, His death, and the gospel's going to the Gentiles, and determines the date of the prophetic periods of the eighth and ninth chapters of Daniel.

Take time to be pleasant. A bright smile and a pleasant word fall like sunbeams upon the hearts of those around us,


Take time to be polite. A gentle "I thank you," "If you please," "Excuse me," etc., even to an inferior is no compromise of dignity, and you know

HEALTH IN THE LEVITICAL LAW

THE Levitical law embraced the health of the body and soul, and is worthy of careful study by all who wish to escape disease.

In Lev. 14:33-45, we find valuable instruction, which, if followed to-day, would prevent much sickness.

When the walls of a house became mouldy and mildewed, it was to be shut up; no one was to live in it in that condition. The mouldy walls were to be scraped and the mouldy mortar was not to be thrown down in the yard where every gust of wind would fill the air with mould germs, and thus they would be breathed by every passer-by; but the mouldy mortar was to be

carried outside the city and thrown in an unclean place. The wall was to be repaired with fresh mortar so that the moisture would not penetrate through the wall. If the mould did not appear again, the house was pronounced fit to live in; but if the walls were still mouldy, after they had been replastered, it would be apparent that the house was built in a damp place and the house was to be torn down and thrown outside the city.

If this rule was carried out to day, some land-lords would lose their rent, for many houses are full of mould and mildew; but there would be far less people suffering with consumption.

While we may not be able to tear down all the mouldy houses, we can keep our families out of them, and always choose bright, sunny homes, free from damp and mould.
