

Further Instruction Concerning the Selling of Property

THE Bible is filled with promises. They are as reliable as God Himself, for He has given them. The Lord has never forsaken His people when they have been obedient to all of His precepts.

In these days of trouble, He says, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you.' Matt. 6:33. Our first business is to seek the kingdom of God, to do those things that are pleasing to Him, to strive day by day to develop a character that will measure up to the character of His son. If we do that, the promise is, "all these things shall be added unto you." The things referred to in this statement, deal with the clothing we wear and the food we eat. God wants us to develop a faith that will be unshaken regardless of what may come to us.

This expression, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God," also teaches us that it is our Christian duty to help carry the gospel of the kingdom to all the world, for he who seeks the kingdom of God, will endeavor to proclaim that kingdom to those who know it not. And so the great commission to the church is, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature." This work can never be accomplished unless there are those who are willing to go, and unless those who stay at home are willing to

give of their means to send those who are to proclaim the truth.

Again we have instructions from the servant of the Lord, revealing our responsibility in the disposing of the surplus property He has placed in our hands. The following quotations bear upon this subject. We shall not comment upon them, but hope as these are read, that the Lord will reveal to us what our relation this time shall be regarding them.

Selling Our Property

"It is utter folly to defer to make a preparation for the future life until nearly the last hour of the present life. It is also a great mistake to defer to answer the claims of God for liberality to His cause until the time comes when you are to shift your stewardship upon others. Those to whom you intrust your talents of means may not do as well with them as you have done. How dare rich men run so great risks! Those who wait till death before they make a disposition of their property, surrender it to death rather than to God. In so doing many are acting directly contrary to the plan of God, plainly stated in His word. If they would do good they must seize the present golden moments, and labor with all their might, as if fearful that they may lose the favorable opportunity."-Vol. 4. page 480.

"We ought now to be heeding the injunction of our Saviour, 'Sell that ye have and give alms; provide yourselves bags which wax not old, a treasure in the heavens that faileth not.' It is now that our brethren should be cutting down their possessions, instead of increasing them. We are about to move to a better country, even a heavenly. 
