But if our work and our dress and our diet have a meager, poverty stricken, retarded appearance we will reach only that class of society. Our image should be attractive, gracious and in good taste. Oh for the wisdom to be progressive in the middle of the road!

Rather than apologizing for our Biblical health practices, let's keep them to the front for they remove prejudice and build confidence. The health ministry properly conducted commends the truth to men of judgment.

The influences that are associated with health reform will commend it to the judgment of all who want light, and they will advance step by step to receive the special truths for this time. *Testimonies*, vol. 6, p. 379

### A Spiritual Ministry

When properly conducted we are not just helping people to stop smoking, cook better, lose weight or build stronger muscles. It must be transparent that we are following the Bible's teachings; not just the latest lab reports, and that our good health is God's will; not just our choice. The following instruction written regarding the restaurant work supplies a principle to underlie all our health ministries, from the physician in private practice to the housewife sharing a recipe or the Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking:

If we cannot conduct our restaurants to God's glory, if we cannot exert through them a strong religious influence, it would be better for us to close them up and use the talents of our youth in other lines of work. But our restaurants can be so conducted that they will be the means of saving souls. *Testimonies*, vol. 2, p. 120

Adventist Health Ministries are not just health services; not secular humanitarianism. This is positively dangerous!

The medical missionary work should be part of the work of every church in our land. Conducted independently, it would not only consume talent and means needed in other lines, but in the very work of helping the helpless apart from the ministry of the word, it would place men where they would scoff at Bible truth. *Testimonies*, vol. 6, p. 289

Nor is the motivation for a change in their health habits to be simply "for the good of their health, their family or society" or "to save money," etc. God and therefore a religious motivation is to be primary and the others secondary.

The church is gearing up for its final ministry that will continue to labor when other means have ceased.



# Not Even a Ball-point Pen!

Church members are of two basic kinds — impulse givers and systematic givers. Impulse givers love the Lord and give generously when they hear a touching mission appeal (if they have money in their wallet or purse). Systematic givers give as a matter of principle, even if they are not especially moved; they set aside a percentage of their income, in addition to tithe, and draw upon it for the numerous offerings received in church and Sabbath School throughout the year. God loves both kinds of givers, for how could the church move ahead in its efforts to carry the gospel to the whole world without the support of God's faithful people!

Some time ago I received the following letter from a member of a college faculty in Africa: "In almost every mail I receive letters from young people who are eager to come to our school to get a Christian education, but they have no money (our scholarship, which includes tuition, room, and board, amounts to \$80 for the whole school year). They are so poor that some of them cannot afford to buy a new ball-point pen. . . . The boys sleep 22 in a room so small that there is no place for a table or closets. They keep their suitcases under their beds. The boys eat standing up because our 'dining room' is a kind of shed with tables but no room for chairs. There are no bathrooms in the dormitories. Up until last fall the boys washed themselves outdoors at a tap. The 'toilets' were farther down, behind a bush. . . . We hope to enlarge the boys' dormitory and install a regular bathroom. And, if it is the Lord's will, perhaps we also can have a dining room and kitchen."

When I read this letter I felt terribly uncomfortable. I thought of the fine buildings and rich appointments I had seen on the campuses of some denominational institutions in affluent countries, and I asked myself why there should be such a wide disparity between facilities in one part of the world and in another? Why should students in some countries not have enough money even to buy a ball-point pen while students in other countries have money not only for necessities but for luxuries?

My mind went to scenes I had witnessed in other lands — homeless people living on the sidewalks of big cities; hungry children holding out bony hands, begging me to share my lunch with them; church congregations meeting outdoors because they had no money with which to build or buy a church; physicians and nurses working long hours under primitive conditions to bring hope and healing to the sick.

As these scenes passed before me, I picked up a letter that had just come from a church member in North America. The letter said: "I am two-thirds blind, wear a hearing aid, have arthritis of the spine, and my right leg is partially paralyzed. But God has blessed me financially, so I have just withdrawn \$23,000 from the bank to put into God's work. . . . I favor foreign missions. . . . I am seeking advice and direction. . . . I want to be a good steward of what money God has entrusted to me. Please let me hear from you soon."

And then a text came to mind: "Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye mete withal it shall be measured to you again." (Luke 6:38).

Giving comes naturally to anyone who possesses the spirit of Christ. Christ gave Himself "that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3:16), and all who follow Jesus will want the entire world to know the good news of the gospel. They will witness verbally and they will give of their means so that others may know "the old, old story" of Jesus and His love.

And by participating in helping to fulfill the Gospel Commission, Christians accomplish at least three things — they are blessed personally by their efforts, they bring blessings to others, and they bring closer the day when Jesus will return, as He promised. "By giving the gospel to the world it is in our power to hasten our Lord's return. We are not only to look for but to hasten the coming of the day of God." *The Desire of Ages*, p.

633.

Today, out of a world population of about four billion, probably not more than half have heard the gospel. Only 20 per cent of the population is Christian, and this percentage soon may sink to about 15 per cent.

Some areas of the world have been closed to Adventist work for years, other countries have been recently closed, while still others are perilously close to closing. At the same time there are countries that have suddenly become receptive to the gospel and where the work is progressing beyond our wildest dreams. There yet remain 28 countries to enter (as of 1975 GC session), and vast areas of entered countries to be reached.

Those who have given to the Missions Extension Offering and then gone to work in the mission field have learned firsthand the importance of such offerings. When a mission committee meets to decide on the area in their territory in which to use the offering to begin new work and which worker to send there, the missionary has a new appreciation of how dollars translate into souls for the kingdom.

This year, when the Missions Extension Offering is received, on Sabbath, September 10, lift your eyes to the total world, for whom Christ died. See the fields, ripe for the harvest. And whether you are an impulse giver or a systematic giver, won't you join me in trying to do more for Christ and missions this year than ever before?

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## Taught of the Lord

"And all thy children shall be taught of the Lord; and great shall be the peace of thy children." Isa. 54:13.

In the days of Isaiah, the Assyrian armies threatened Judah and God's people. There was no safety, no hope, no future except that which was to be found in the Lord. But God's people had, to a great degree, forfeited God's divine protection.

The book *Education*, pages 47, 48 points out that "By unbelief and disregard to the Lord's directions, the Israelites surrounded themselves with temptations that few had power to resist. . . . Fathers and mothers in Israel became indifferent to their obligations to God, indifferent to their obligation to their children. Through unfaithfulness in the home, and idolatrous influences without, many of the Hebrew youth received an education differing widely from that which God had planned for them. They learned the ways of the heathen."

The Lord is a God of hope, of optimism; a God of promises, a God with a

program, not of defeat, but of victory. He is a God that has provided a program of Christian education for the children and youth of this church — a program that stands as a barrier against the widespread corruption evident in these last days of earth's history; a program that provides for the mental, spiritual, and physical welfare of the young of the church; a program that assures the future dynamic growth, missionary programs, and leadership of the church. God has provided church schools, academies, and colleges for the education of the children and youth of the church.

When Isaiah, as a youth, visited the temple, he saw the Lord. He saw what God would do for His people. He also accepted the challenge of being a spokesman for the Lord. In chapter 53 of Isaiah, we read the wonderful promises of hope and redemption through the coming Messiah. Immediately following this great chapter of scripture, the prophet declares, "And all thy children shall be taught of the Lord; and great shall be the peace of

thy children. In righteousness thou shalt be established." Isa. 54:13, 14.

God's program for His church is a complete program. God's people are blessed to the extent that they accept and support His program for the individual and for the church. This program includes Christian education. The object of education is the restoration of the image of God in His children.

When advantage is taken of every opportunity for the spiritual development of the children, whether at home, at school, or at church, God's people can claim His promise as recorded in Isaiah 49:25, "But thus saith the Lord, even the captivity of the mighty shall be taken away, and the prey of the terrible shall be delivered: for I will contend with him that contendeth with thee, and I will save thy children."

Remember Christian education — a soul-saving, evangelistic facet of God's program for His church.

Far better might he lay up his money beside the throne of God, by using it to do good. Death cannot make any man poor who thus devotes himself to seeking eternal riches. But the man who hoards his treasure for self cannot take any of it to heaven. He has proved himself to be an unfaithful steward. During his lifetime he had his good things, but he was forget-

ful of his obligation to God. He failed of securing the heavenly treasure." *Christ's Object Lessons*, page 266.

We are pleased with the way our Seventh-day Adventist members are responding to the Revolving Fund, and in taking out Gift Annuities with the Conferences or with one of our denominational institutions. Also we are pleased with those who have deeded over properties to the church, entering into a life

# The Review and Herald — Seeking Answers to Current Questions

The *Review and Herald* magazine will take note of an important anniversary this year by discussing some thought-provoking questions in a special issue dated December 8. The issue will commemorate the seventy-fifth anniversary of the burning of the *Review and Herald* plant in Battle Creek, Michigan, on December 30, 1902. It will give the historical background of the fire, and will probe into events surrounding it, seeking to discover if there is meaning in it for Adventists today.

In articles and editorials, the *Review*, the denomination's 127-year-old general church paper, will ask and suggest answers to questions such as, What were conditions in the church in Battle Creek at the time of the *Review* fire? Why were Ellen White's warnings of God's displeasure with the church largely unheeded? What was the meaning of the fire? Was it a judgment of God, as some felt sure it was? How did the church relate to the fire? Are conditions in the church today similar to those in Battle Creek in 1902? Does God bring judg-

ments upon His people?

Graphic illustrations, including a black-and-white watercolor painting by Will Robinson, a *Review* artist, on the night of the fire from an on-the-spot sketch, will give readers an "I-was-there" feeling as they ponder why a raging blaze leveled to the ground in just a few hours the church's highly successful printing establishment, one of the largest in the State of Michigan.

In addition to the questions asked in its "fire" special, the *Review* will ask other questions and attempt to find Biblical answers to them during the coming year. Among them will be questions on the Adventist concept of inspiration. In a three-part series by Arthur White, secretary of the Ellen G. White Estate, the author will deal with questions such as How do Seventh-day Adventists understand inspiration? and Is the Seventh-day Adventist concept different from concepts commonly held by other Christians?

What is the socio-political responsibility of the church? is a question to be

discussed in a two-part article by B. B. Beach, secretary of the Northern Europe-West Africa Division. This is a live question today in the evangelical world, as churches swing more and more toward active participation in government.

Still another question to be asked in *Review* articles during the coming year is, Where is God when we suffer? Alf Lohne, a General Conference general vice-president, gives fresh ideas on this question, an old one that is being asked often today.

## New Wing for Rutland Church

On Sunday morning, June 26th, the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Rutland, B.C. held the official groundbreaking ceremony for a new wing to be added to the west side of the church.

Many members attended the inspirational service, and Pastor Edward Teranski turned the first shovel of soil for the project, assisted by first elder Garnett Gardner and Youth Pastor, O. Unruh.

Others participating in the service were: Ivan Abbott (Senior Sabbath School Superintendent) George Koronko (general Sabbath School Superintendent), Joe Loran, (Construction Supervisor), Mrs. Doris Harbuz (Community Services Centre Co-director), and Joe Horniachek (church and project Treasurer).

The new church addition will consist of two stories, with a total floor space of 12,000 sq. ft. and will consist of 8 new

Sabbath School classrooms, pastor's study, more spacious vestibule, Youth Chapel, 4 new washrooms, new Community Services Centre, and a Fellowship Hall. In addition it will contain provision for a chapel for the Ukrainian speaking members.

The cost of this addition will be approximately \$200,000.00, not counting donated labour.

## Rutland Church and Okanagan Academy Celebrate 60th Anniversary

July 1 & 2, 1977, were considered High Days as the Rutland Church and the Okanagan Academy celebrated their 60th Anniversary, (1917 - 1977) with a two-day program entitled: *"The First 60 Years."* This was to commemorate the founding of the church and academy in Rutland, B.C. All ceremonies took place in the Okanagan Academy Auditorium and events were programmed by Elder E. Teranski, Pastor of the Rutland Church.

Elder C. S. Cooper began the ceremonies on Friday, July 1, at 7:30 p.m. with a hearty greeting to all the members and visitors, the alumni, former teachers and principals of the academy. Elder Cooper was a former pastor of the old Rutland Church.

The Sabbath lesson study was given by Dr. E. Stanley Chace, principal of Okanagan Academy, assisted by former alumni: Duane Anderson, '70, Lonni Horniacheck, '74, Cindy Klatt, '76, Alvin Ladner, '53, and a former principal of the academy, Pastor A. W. Matheson from India.

Worship Service was conducted by Elder E. A. Hetke, '55. Assisting him were: Pastor Edward Teranski, '53, Fred Mandziuk, '47, and Norman Duncan, '59.

At 3:30 p.m. Elder A. W. Kaytor, President of the B.C. Conference conveyed congratulations to all, assisted during the ceremony by Pastor E. Teranski, Elder H. Larsen, Secretary of the B.C. Conference, Pastor Brad. Thorp, former graduate, and C. Peters, chairman of the Building Commission.

A fellowship dinner was provided plus a guided tour through the various classrooms of the academy.

The evening program highlighted many unique experiences in the progress of church and school as historical accounts unfolded and testimonies were given. These went back to the time when an

evangelist named E. R. Potter came to the area of Rutland in 1915 (two years before any church or school was formed there), and, on through the years to the building of the present Rutland Church and the Okanagan Academy, with its large auditorium.

Mrs. Elwyn Ritchey (nee Belle Walker) related an interesting account of her journey from a farm in Saskatchewan to Kelowna, B.C. in 1919, only two years after the first school was formed. She told of reading an ad in the 'Canadian Tidings' paper, (now the *Messenger*), while home on a farm near Swift Current, Saskatchewan, advertising that it was possible to attend a private school and work for room and board.

Mrs. Ritchey worked in the kitchen of the school and milked many cows to cover the cost of her tuition. The first teacher was Mr. Robert Clayton, with

only 10 or 12 students in residence in 1919. Later, Miss Eva White (Mrs. C. H. Casey) taught and it was through her effort that Mrs. Ritchey was baptized into the Adventist Church in 1920. Mrs. Ritchey described how she watched as old dismantled lumber was hauled from the wharf under the direction of Mr. Tom Barber and Mr. Gothard Johnson to build the new school and church on Highway 33 and Gertsmar Road.

Mr. & Mrs. Elwyn Ritchey were the first couple married in the church above the school in 1922. They raised seven children and watched three generations of them attend Okanagan Academy.

In 1940 the old church was built next to the school on Highway 33 and in 1952, a portable hall (dis-assembled) was brought from Mission City, B.C. and served as an auditorium.

In 1962 the new Rutland Church (as it now stands) was erected across the street from the school.

The Okanagan Academy was built in

1968 on Hollywood Road (present location) and a large auditorium added adjacent to it in 1974-75.

During the celebrations, several plaques were awarded to former teachers for long and devoted service. Mrs. Bertha Warner, a former French and English teacher was honored 'in absentia'. Other teachers honored with plaques were: Mrs. Harriet Jones, Mr. Emil Edstrom, and Mrs. Helen Hathaway, who served voluntarily (without pay) as librarian at the academy for three years.

The anniversary celebration of the Rutland Church and Okanagan Academy was terminated Sunday morning, July 3, when the first Alumni Association in the history of the academy at Rutland, B.C. was organized. Officers chosen were: President, Edward Teranski, Vice-president, Dr. Jerry Just, Secretary, Claire Ritchey, Treasurer, Donna Schamerhorn.
