Health Ministry — Sugar — Shortening — Flour

Exotic teas, pure extractions, "natural" or "organic", form the hope of health for hundreds looking to "take something" to improve their sense of well being. These do not solve the main problem.

The problem is brief:

Non-Nutrient Consumption

Sugar	17%
Fats - visible	18%
Alcohol	3%
Flour (refined)	18%
	56%

Over half the calories eaten have virtually no vitamins or minerals (empty calories) or fibre. *This is the problem of what is eaten!* (Another serious problem of how and when we eat deserves separate mention.) Correct this one major problem and there is no need for expensive supplements and the risks of mega vitamin dosages which are very "unnatural."

Financial Times, September 19, 1977 reports that "the Quebec government has

begun a ten-year program to improve the eating habits of Quebecers" because "overconsumption of sugar, flour products, and greasy food by Quebecers costs the government nearly \$225,000,000 in annual hospital and treatment costs for sickness directly related to poor eating habits."

"President Carter is being petitioned by experts to give government support to nutritional goals proposed by the Senate Select Committee on Nutrition and Human Needs of a 25% reduction in fat intake, a 40% reduction in sugar consumption, 50% reduction in cholesterol intake and a 50-85% reduction in salt intake". *Medical Tribune*, June 8, 1977.

The Simple Solution

No, it's not bran or vitamins and mineral pills or any special preparation. It is eliminate or drastically reduce sugar, shortening and white flour foods! Use whole grains, very little sugar and measure oil with a mini cup. Oil can

simply be left out of many casseroles and loafs. If "empty calorie" food stuffs are left out the only things left are nutritious foods.

It sounds too simple for avoiding heart disease, cancer of the colon, lack of energy, hypoglycemia, tooth decay and on and on the list goes.

We are conditioned to spend big money and "take something" for our ailments. But that's not the answer for degenerative diseases of the twentieth century.

The value of simple solutions is the danger of being underestimated. All we need to do is leave out the "unfoods" man has made and they will be replaced by the real foods God created.

Believe it or not, but in India, project *Reach*—Render Effective Aid to Children—can provide a starving child with a room, food, clothing, medical attention, and a Christian S.D.A. education for only \$12 a month!

You may be stunned, trying to comprehend the unbelievable things 40 cents per day will do in India at today's inflated prices. Mrs. Jasmine Jacob, President of *Reach*, when asked to make a statement said, "You know, our Indian schools are the best agencies for conversion. We need to invest more time and money in them, so that they might help

the one-third of India's population who are homeless today."

Mrs. Jacob has just completed her Ph.D. in elementary education at Michigan State University and is the Educational Superintendent in the Benton Harbor school district. She is a citizen of Ceylon (Public of Sri Lanka) but has lived in the U.S. since 1964. If you were to talk to Dr. Jacob, she would tell you that she would never forget the scenes of starvation in the Asian subcontinent. She has said that she felt terribly depressed at seeing little children with glazed eyes, just skin and bone, begging on the streets. On

one occasion she bought them some bananas and watched with silent horror as they ate them—peels and all! At night these same children sleep in the streets. One finds it very difficult to walk through the cities without stepping on some of them.

While staying near Puliangudi S.D.A. English School in southern India, however, the Jacobs observed the startling contrast wrought in these same starving children by our dedicated teachers. Fed, clothed, and comfortably housed in dormitories, they joyfully sang gospel songs every evening, making the dormi-

tories ring with their happy voices.

Realizing that the Christian Children's Fund of Richmond, Virginia, with branch offices in some parts of the subcontinent, could not possibly care for all the needy children, Dr. Jacob resolved to start a laymen's project in North America. When the ideas was presented to Elder D. R. Watts, President of the South India Union (who incidentally is a Canadian and a graduate of Kingsway College), he was delighted. He said that this was an answer to his prayers.

So, with eighteen people located in several cities in the U.S. and India, the Jacobs organized *Reach*. Elder and Mrs. Watts sent them case histories of Indian children, ages six to sixteen. Slowly, but with tireless dedication, Jasmine and her staff have been writing scores of letters to find sponsors for the hundreds of children. So far, there are many, many children who still need to be sponsored and anyone in Canada can sponsor a child. Each sponsor receives a picture of the child he chooses to support, personal data on him or her, as well as an annual progress report from the school which the child attends.

All the time and labor involved in project *Reach* is donated. "No one on my staff," Dr. Jacob stressed, "receives one penny of the money given to aid needy Indian children. Every donation is sent to feed, clothe, shelter and educate starving children in Seventh-day Adventist Schools."

Kingsway College Guest Room Policies

Effective November 1, Kingsway College is introducing new guest room policies in the interests of serving the constituency more efficiently.

As the number of guest rooms is limited, arrangements for rooms should be made prior to arrival on campus. This can be done by writing to Dean of Girls, Box 605, Oshawa, Ontario L1H 7M6, or phoning either 416-579-0330, 416-725-0811 or the president's secretary at 416-725-6557. Guests should plan to arrive before 11 p.m. and leave not earlier than 6 a.m. If earlier or later leaving or arriving times are mandatory arrangements should be made with the dean beforehand.

The rate for a couple is \$10.00 per night, \$8.00 single, or \$15.00 for a suite of two rooms (4 beds) with a connecting bathroom. Meal tickets for the cafeteria are available from the business office, or dean's office at a rate of \$2.00 per meal.

Parents of students receive one night's lodging free of charge during each school year, but the regular rates apply for subsequent visits.

A doctor from the west coast was on a journey to the eastern part of the United States. While in Washington, he decided to visit the Review and Herald, and during this visit dropped into my office. His conversation with me began something like this:
