"Acquaint Now Thyself With Him"

Eliphaz falsely accused Job, because he misunderstood the cause of the patriarch's sorrow and suffering. However, his counsel in Job 22:21 is very pertinent. The complete verse reads: "Acquaint now thyself with him, and be at peace: Thereby good shall come unto thee." This is a sublime message for each of us for 1978. Think of it often as you enter the new year.

Acquaint means to know, to understand, to establish a friendship. This is much more than a mere casual or formal acquaintance, and will require continual, that is daily, renewing. To know Him is life eternal (John 17:3) and that is what this life is all about.

Now is the time. This is God's time. It is probationary time. To delay is extremely hazardous. We have no time to lose, for the time will come when it will be too late to know Him. Many will travel "from sea to sea" (Amos 8:11,12) but it will be too late to obtain heavenly knowledge. The urgency of the hour is indicated in Hebrews 3:7,8 "To day if ye will hear his voice, Harden not your hearts. . ."

Thyself makes this a very personal matter. Parents can only introduce Him to their children, for this acquaintanceship is and must be a personal experience. What a blessed privilege to know Him personally!

With Him. We are to know God and Jesus. It is often very helpful to know certain people. Unfortunately, too many live as if God didn't exist. But He is the greatest and most important. He is our heavenly Father. It is vital that we know and love Him.

Here are some methods to be used in making His acquaintance:

1. Bible Study. This is much more than a hasty reading. We should understand, and know. Psalms 119:105 — "Thy word is a lamp". We need light in this dark world. Again this is a personal experience. Jesus said, "Search...". John 5:39.

2. To know and obey God's law. The law reveals the character of Christ. We are to reproduce this character. This law is to be in our hearts and minds. Hebrews 8:10,11. God will put it there if we so desire. What a transformation will then take place! Psalms 19:7.

3. By observing God's providences and nature. "The heavens declare the glory of God." Psalms 19:1. Please read Isaiah 30:26.

4. Prayer is "the opening of the heart to God as to a friend." How we enjoy visiting with our friends! Let us determine to have complete communication with our best Friend. This should include private, family and public (worship) prayer. "Prayer is the key in the hand of faith

5. Witnessing. As we introduce Him to others, we will get to know Him better. Let us determine to tell others what we know about Him. How wonderful if each of us would do this every day in the New Year.

As we become acquainted with Him great good will come to us. First the text says we will be at peace. What security and assurance! The S.D.A. Bible Commentary lists seven blessings as the "good" that shall come as a result of this acquaintanceship:

- 1. Pardon from sin.
- 2. Assurance of salvation.
- 3. Peace of conscience.
- 4. Victory over sin.
- 5. Support in trial.
- 6. Joy of service.
- 7. Citizenship in kingdom of glory. We all need all seven.

It is too late to continue life as usual. We must plan definitely that our accustomed routine be replaced by an accelerated pace of increased activity for God. It is most appropriate for us to ask right now, "What does God expect of us in 1978?" Do we expect to finish God's work this year? Is this the year?

Other questions which are more personal: "Do you expect to finish the year 1978? If so, what do you plan on doing all year? What are your goals for 1978? How much will we do for the Master? Will every neighbor around you know that Jesus is coming very soon? Just how many new members will we win in 1978? How many new churches will be added? How much new territory will we enter?"

The greatest advances in God's church are yet in the future. They could be in 1978.

Canadian Musicians Contribute to New England Youth Ensemble

The New England Youth Ensemble, under the direction of Dr. Virginia-Gene Rittenhouse, was described by a General Conference leader as "fast becoming, to the Seventh-day Adventist Church, what the Mormon Tabernacle Choir is to the Mormons."

Atlantic Union College is alma mater to this group of some forty-five talented young musicians from all over North America. Out of hundreds of entries by high school orchestras, the New England Youth Ensemble was chosen by the Friendship Ambassadors of America, to be first to visit behind the iron curtain, and to appear in leading music centres in Poland and the U.S.S.R. Performances have also been given in Iceland, Vienna and California. In Canada, the Ensemble has teamed up with the Kingsway College Symphonic Choir for graduation exercises in Oshawa and concerts in Montreal.

Canadians are well represented in the Ensemble itself, with four musicians from Ontario, and three from British Columbia. Jeremy Van Dieman of Brantford, is first violinist and concert master. Lori Unger of Oshawa joined the violin section

this fall. John Corban, first trumpet, and Helgi Douay, second trumpet, joined the brass section in September. Both are graduates of Toronto Junior Academy, in Willowdale. Carmen Trenchuk, daughter of Pastor and Mrs. Nick Trenchuk of B.C., is first flutist. In addition to her regular studies at A.U.C., Carmen is studying flute at Julliard School of music in New York. Two Whitney sisters from B.C., complete the Canadian representation.

Trumpeters John and Helgi were further honored by an invitation to join a specially selected group of Seventh-day Adventist professional musicians, "The New Cantata Singers and Players", under the direction of Dr. Francisco de Araujo, of Washington, D.C. The group toured North American colleges and academies October 16 to November 12.

A recent engagement by the New England Youth Ensemble was marred by a highway accident in which Dr. and Mrs. Harvey Rittenhouse, and Virginia-Gene's mother received serious burns and injuries. All three were hospitalized in Billings, Montana. On the insistence of Dr. Virginia-Gene the Ensemble continued without them but with reluctance, and a keen sense of loss.

Those who know Dr. Virginia-Gene realize that as long as she is spared, her talents, time, heart and soul will be fully dedicated to the Youth Ensemble, and to the highest standards of music this side of the earth made new.

Windfalls for Investment

Four years ago Brother and Sister Dorance Flowers moved from the prairies to the fruit-laden Okanagan Valley.

"I was appalled, and still am, by the waste of fruit," Sister Flowers said. Apples, which had been so precious where they came from, lay scattered on the ground under the trees. What could be done about it?

Brother Flowers, having initiative and mechanical ability, set about making a press for these surplus apples. The project started as a source of supply for their own use. But friends and neighbors sampled the delightful juice and asked if some could be made for them.

Then the idea of Investment came to their minds. Here was a project that would benefit the community and furnish funds for God's work. For a nominal sum per box, Brother and Sister Flowers now press juice for a growing number of patrons. If a sizeable number of boxes are ready at one location the equipment is moved to the spot. For small orders, the apples are brought to the spacious grounds of the Okanagan Manor in Kelowna, where Brother and Sister Flowers are the resident managers.

Usually business is so brisk, it is hard for them to fit mealtimes into the crowded schedule. More extractors have been added each year until now there are five running simultaneously. These are cared for by Sister Faye Lawton, their daughter, who has joined the team.

The first year, every penny went into Investment. But as the demand grew, so did the expenses, so these are subtracted and the profits given.

Last year Brother and Sister Flowers divided their Investment between the Sabbath School and Christian Education.

This year a new church building for Kelowna is taking form. The profits will be divided between the Investment and the building fund. Sister Flowers, besides her managerial duties, has a part-time job. She also bakes homemade bread for Investment. Brother Flower's accomplishments are all the more outstanding, considering he is an amputee and all his work is done with his left hand.

When asked how much she thought their project had netted for Investment, Sister Flowers modestly said "I don't remember". But those who have been watching their efforts feel sure that hundreds of dollars have come in from windfalls turned into profits for Investment.

Health Ministry—Fats In the News

Fats are still in the news. Why? Because people are eating too much fat and of the wrong type. But what's wrong with fat?

Fats Are Fattening — A gram of fat yields 9 calories whereas a gram of carbohydrate or of protein yields only 4 calories. Fat is more than twice as fattening as carbohydrate or protein.

Fats Affect Serum Cholesterol — Serum cholesterol (cholesterol in the blood) is associated with coronary heart disease, the greatest killer of the developed countries. The higher the intake of saturated fats, the higher the level of serum cholesterol. But simply replacing saturated with polyunsaturated fats may not lower cholesterol level because total fat intake whether saturated or polyunsaturated also affects serum cholesterol. One should never take excess polyunsaturated oil with the intention of thereby lowering serum cholesterol.

Fat Reduces Muscular Endurances — More oxygen is required to burn fat for energy than for carbohydrate. Fat requires 213 ml. of oxygen versus 198 ml. for carbohydrate. That's enough to significantly reduce muscular work endurance and output. Fatigue occurs earlier on high fat diets.

Delays Digestion — Fats in the diet may delay stomach emptying time by 2—3 hours. This does not mean that fats "stick to your ribs" better than proteins or carbohydrates. Instead, it means that the stomach is not given the amount of resting time between meals that it needs.

Fats Inflame System — Excess fats in the blood irritates the lining of the arteries and simultaneously prevents normal control of atherosclerosis. Fats in food residues lingering in the colon irritate the intestinal lining.

Excess Fats Are The Problem - A normal amount of fat in the diet can be handled by the body but excess fats become

injurious. The average consumption of fats ranges from 40 — 44% of total calories. These should be reduced to between 20 — 30% of calories. It is not recommended that fats be totally eliminated from the diet. An oilless diet is not 100% effective in reversing atherosclerosis.

The following foods are the sources of excessively rich fat in the diet: butter, shortening, cooking oils, margarines, cream, ice cream, mayonnaise, cheese, meat and whole milk. Some of these should be eliminated from the diet. Others should be greatly reduced. Others can be substituted with suitable replacements.

With a little practice you can learn to prepare soy butter as described below: It is not expensive and it is even good for you. Eat more if you like.

Soy Butter

Blend: 1 cup soy concentrate, ¾ tsp. butter salt, Kennedy's preferred, Yellow food coloring or tumeric.

Soak 1 tsp. agar flakes, 1 tsp. pectin crystals in 4T water for at least 2 min.; then cook for 2 full min. stirring. Add while warm to blended concentrate and blend well.

Pour into container, cover and refrigerate. Molds beautifully. Keep refrigerated. Will not melt at room temp. Keeps about 1-2 weeks if refrigerated.

How To Make Thick Soy Concentrate:

- 1. Soak soy beans 24 hours.
- 2. Blend 1½ c soaked soy beans with 1½ c boiling water for 2 full minutes. Pre-heat blender and beans before blending. Hold lid onto blender with several thicknesses of towel.
- Cook in top of double boiler covered for 30 min. stirring once in a while.
- 4. Concentrate should be quite thick when ready.

Seventh-day Adventist young people attending the Universidad Autonoma of Guadalajara have often felt lonely, and as isolated as they have been from their culture, language and home influences.

A pastor-chaplain has been assigned to this post for a number of years and the university Adventist church meets in rented quarters in a centrally located church building. Services are conducted in English, and the church also operates a two-teacher church school.

Recently the student group took the initiative in searching for and obtaining a commodious building which now houses the Student Center and church school. 
