
Medical Missionary Day

The Physician - A Medical Missionary

"Okay Doc, so the lab tests are negative. You can't find anything wrong with me. Therefore, I'm not sick. But I'm not well either! What's wrong with me, Doc?"

And once again the physician is faced with a weighty decision. "Shall I tell him what is wrong with him? Shall I tell him he is not living right? It will probably offend him. He didn't come for a lecture but a diagnosis. He probably won't change his habits anyway. And preventive medicine isn't nearly as glamorous as life-saving surgery. But I remember reading something once, so what choice do I have?"

"When a physician sees that a patient is suffering from an ailment caused by improper eating and drinking, yet neglects to tell him of this and to point out the need of reform, he is doing a fellow being an injury. Are they benevolent and merciful if they do not teach strict temperance as a remedy for disease?" — Testimonies, vol. 7, p. 74, 75.

In that moment on a one-to-one basis, a personal ministry of healing and teaching can be accomplished that is on a parallel with Christ and the infirmed man at the pool of Bethesda. Part of his instructions were, "sin no more, lest a worse thing come upon thee." John 5:14.

"Christ the great medical missionary, is our example. He healed the sick and preached the gospel. In his service, healing and teaching were linked closely together. Today they are not to be separated." — Manuscript, quoted by O. A. Olson, *Review and Herald*, Oct. 29, 1914.

Last-Day Medicine

Today with heart disease in epidemic proportions, post coronary care is receiving unusual attention. Cardiac rehabilitation is really prevention on highly motivated subjects against a recurrence of the disease. Many subjects don't have a second chance because "in about 25% of persons who develop cardio-vascular disease, the first symptom of the illness is sudden death."

"Too little attention is generally given to the preservation of health. It is far better to prevent disease than to know how to treat it when contracted." — Ministry of Healing, p. 128.

The physician motivated by the counsels of God seeks to put himself out of business by making people so healthy that they no longer need his cures. But just as the poor you have with you always so will we always have the sick. And there will always be not only opportunity but a demand for education in healthful living.

In these "last days" when life is characterized with unintended surfeiting and dissipation, degenerative diseases have stolen the show from infectious diseases. It is a result of ignorance of the laws of life. People in developed countries maintain a lamentably small advantage of personal health

knowledge over those in developing countries. Through the Spirit of Prophecy God has given light to this generation appropriate to every culture and counterculture that will lift the quality of life. This grand and noble mission beckons to the heart of every devoted Seventh-day Adventist,

"As he thus instructs the people in the principles of true temperance, and as a guardian of souls gives advice to those who are mentally and physically diseased, the physician is acting his part in the great work of making ready a people prepared for the Lord. This is what medical missionary work is to accomplish in its relation to the third angel's message." — Testimonies, vol. 6, p. 233.

Combined Disciplines

It is not alone to the physical needs that we are to minister.
"The physician who knows that Christ is his personal Saviour, because he himself has been led to the Refuge, knows how to deal with the trembling, guilty, sin-sick souls who turn to him for help.

"Let him learn to repeat the comforting words that Christ spoke during His earthly ministry, when giving His lessons and healing the sick. He should talk of the works of healing wrought by Christ, of His tenderness and love. Never should he neglect to direct the minds of his patients to Christ, the chief Physician." — Ministry of Healing, p. 120, 121.

The minister and the doctor are united in the same work. Each have their separate disciplines but there is much overlap when done properly.

"We shall have success if we work on practical lines. Ministers, do not confine your work to giving Bible instruction. Do practical work. Seek to restore the sick to health. This is true ministry. Remember that the restoration of the body prepares the way for the restoration of the soul." — Medical Ministry, p. 240.

"A minister of the gospel who is also a medical missionary, who can cure physical ailments, is a much more efficient worker than one who cannot do this. His work as a minister of the gospel is much more complete, . . ." — Medical Ministry, p. 245.

Teaching to Teach

But there is a yet higher level of education to be conducted by both the medical worker and gospel worker. It is that of teaching others to teach. It is not enough to simply teach others the laws of their moral and physical being. These educators are responsible for teaching and training fellow believers how to instruct others. To educate, educate is a high and holy calling.

There is no extra pay. There isn't time allowed for it in the schedule. But it is a must if the work is going to be finished along God's lines. . .and it is, by His mercy.

Medical Missionary Day

January 28, 1978

The significance of commemorating this special day, by the General Conference, is indication of the world administration's official recognition of this important date on the church calendar.

In a world church, such as ours, pulsating with a diversity of departmental activities — all conceived and coordinated towards earth's crowning climax — it is administratively difficult to accord special priorities without the risk of invoking the invidious. Suffice it to say that the Adventist family around the globe are enamoured of our medical missionary program, and evocative and enthusiastic regarding this heaven-ordained plan.

And so, today, most appropriately we present this hallowed phase of Christian ministry with its doctors, nurses, and paramedical personnel, in professional profile, and as an indispensible aspect of the Great Second Advent Movement.

When invited by Editor How to write for this special occasion, my mind went back many years. More precisely, to half a century of privileged service in both hemispheres. The "right arm" of the message has consistently made such a compelling and convincing impact for good, through the humanitarian services of Adventist men and women who have given exhaustively, and unremittingly, of themselves in the name, and the service, of Almighty God.

By those unfamiliar with our spiritual motivation, and untutored in our philosophy, the question might well be asked: "Why is it that such brilliant and intelligent young people forsake the ease and affluence and comforts of the homeland, and elect exposure to hardship, pestilential swamp and treacherous jungle? Maybe motivated, and inspirationally influenced, by the intrepid adventures of a David Livingstone! Or maybe some other man!"

In reply, we would say, "Yes, there is another man — Our Hope, our Inspiration: The Man Christ Jesus!" And because of His Divine imperative "Go ye into all the world. . " members of our church communion unhesitatingly penetrate the four corners of the earth in response to the Divine Commission, to take the ministry of healing to. . "every nation, kindred, tongue and people."

The motivational stimuli, in the Goddirection, derives from the Adventist unique system of education, where teachers in classrooms encourage and inspire as they inculcate into hearts and minds, the ethical and the moral standards that inspire great and mighty deeds for God.

From our colleges and universities, year after year, we hear the resounding footsteps of youth on the march, and emblazoned upon each of their escutcheons, . . . "the love of Christ constraineth us".

This magnificent array of Adventist youth is possessed of an irresistible urge. They display their ill-disguised impatience. They are philosophically attuned. They are medically oriented. They are spiritually mature and highly motivated. They are possessed of incandescent zeal, and they loftily aspire to their "high calling in Christ Jesus".

As we momentarily meditate upon Medical Missionary Day, and our universal penetration to earth's remotest bounds, we are convinced that we do not need to confine ourselves to "faraway places with strange-sounding names". Greatly blessed of Providence, and earthencompassing though our health discipline may be, with its triumphs for the cross, and its soul-winning instrumentality, augmented by its alleviation of human suffering, this blessed ministry is not practised, nor is it a proprietorial prerogative, limited to an exotic clime of some foreign shore.

Right here in North America, and more particularly, within our own national jurisdiction, goodly, Godly men and women highly trained and deeply devoted, some generalists, others specialists, some in the sub-specialties are making an outstanding contribution, and with their colleagues overseas, they are dedicated to unified, elaboration and ultimate collaboration, culminating in the finishing of the work.

The year '78, under God, promises to be outstanding. It may well be unprecedented in the annals of the Canadian Union.

Particularly will this be true of the operation of our healthcare facilities administered at conference level and well nigh from coast to coast.

Quite a number of well-contemplated



and institutionally-complementary reassignments have eventuated in '77 with gratifying results accruing throughout this new year. Keith Heinrichs was posted in Swift Current Nursing Home. Ken Reimche is now fitting very well in the institutional setting of his preceptorship in Saskatoon. And our most welcome newcomer, Bill Olson, is settling down very nicely at Park manor.

This re-locating of executive directors reflects the Executive Committee's keen awareness of organizational re-alignment, originating with the funding and directive of government hierarchy, together with a lively and intelligent awareness of local government and community demands for continuing changes and improvements in all health-related disciplines.

Our experienced, and well-qualified Ed Gallant continues to head up that lovely retreat designated, West Park Manor, whilst Allan Fowler magnifies his office and enjoys the affectionate appreciation of "his charges" at Sherwood Park, Edmonton.

A few weeks ago, at Rest Haven, we met with our Administrator Laurie Dunfield, and were well-briefed on his delicate, diplomatic negotiations with the provincial government. He demonstrated a keen awareness of the current situation — with a new community hospital now in operation — and in this connection, some of us had audience with administrative officials of the Ministry of Health. It is our ardent prayer that settlement commensurate with our heavy investment and fifty-six-year operation of Rest Haven will eventually result from our spirited deliberations.

Perhaps the most gratifying and indeed exciting intelligence comes to us from the Board of Branson Hospital, Toronto. According to Administrator Lloyd Bell, it is hoped construction on the multimillion expansion of service and clinical areas, so long overdue, will soon commence so that the hospital can relate more meaningfully and adequately to their growing community. Upon each and everyone may God bestow His richest blessing.

The Health Education Centre Story

Medical missionary work has been the focal point of the Health Education Centre in Victoria, B.C., for more than seven years since its opening, March, 1970.

Whether a physician, a dentist, a teacher, a lawyer, a social worker, and occupational therapist, a builder, an accountant, a secretary, a minister, a housewife, a nurse, a hospital administrator, a retiree, a musician; all of these and more have made health education a very real part of their outreach to the community through the Health Education Centre.

An average of 500 contacts are made every month in the community, hundreds of adults attend classes every year, and several thousand school children have received instruction on healthful living. Thousands of calls a month come through the telephone ministry.

Hundreds of hours of volunteer work are given by the local church members. The workshops and cooking schools, the fairs and telephone evangelism, the television series and stop smoking programs all are made effective by the volunteer personnel. The only regular staff are the two health educators, Ron and Arlene Whitney.

Vegetarian Cooking & Nutrition Classes have been of top interest in Victoria. Sonja Gudwer, Marilyn Melashanko, and Marilyn Pond, have organized and presented the most recent series. Kathy Piper and Dorthea Van Gundy-Jones have previously given a series. Members of our church family from many walks of life with adequate training in nutrition and presentation, and with homemaking skills can present the special message we have for these times. This is so much a part of medical missionary work.

Another service to the community of the Health Education Centre was the hypertension screening program using the B.C. Conference mobile health unit. Carol Dunfield, nurse and Resthaven Hospital administrator's wife, coordinated many nurses and assistants, keeping the van in operation for 10 weeks.

The Victoria Health Education Centre is a positive and well known institution in Victoria. Recently the city college program director for adult education classes called to express his appreciation for what the Centre was offering and stated that they do not want to offer anything in the city that would compete with Health Education Centre programs.

The regular staff and the volunteers working as a team have helped to establish this image to the glory of God. The telephone tape library volunteers, the health professional lecturers, the homemakers who demonstrate how it's done, the receptionists and servers whose inner spiritual life shines through and the board members who plan how best to keep the Adventist lifestyle before the public all cooperate in winning the hearts of the people.

Frequently are heard remarks like these from those enrolled in classes:

"What is it that makes you people so at peace?"

"You know, the best thing about this program is seeing you people who give it."

"I want to be as pure and clean looking as the people at the Health Education Centre. How do you get that way?"

"What is it that motivates your young people to stay with this way of life?"

"I'm ready for anything the Health Education Centre has to offer."

And so we see the results of the medical missionary work at the Health Education Centre: a blending of many of God's people giving a blended ministry, serving those in need.



One of the best known programs is the Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking, offered monthly at the Centre. School children are also taught the hazards of smoking. Ron Whitney, health educator and minister and executive director of the Centre holds programs for students in the schools and at the Centre. As many as 200 students have come to the Centre in one week for these programs.

The Health INFO Telephone Tape Library (opened in Victoria in 1975 and in Vancouver in 1976) is based on documented health information. It receives up to 5000 calls a month in the Victoria and Vancouver libraries. The Vancouver library has two toll-free lines that serve the entire province of British Columbia. Beginning in early 1978 a new faith library will be opened to the public phone lines.

The half hour program features interviews of prominent health and education professionals and government leaders in health-related areas. Each program emphasizes a different aspect of the Seventh-day Adventist lifestyle.





Jules Simon expressed the sentiment that "Liberty is never safe". In this connection have you ever heard the statement "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty"? For instance, what have we done about pending legislation that will possibly bring about a controlled Sunday for the entire province of British Columbia? Did you know that those who are opposed to joining a labor union because of personal religious convictions, may be granted exemption from membership, by a provision of the Labor Code known as Conscience Clause, but these same employees are compelled to support, financially, in the form of union dues the labor union which they cannot conscientiously be members of?

Freedom, what a beautiful word! Bondage, what a terrible experience! Stealthily like a thief in the night freedoms pass from us one by one. There are multitudes in our generation who are in bondage. More and more we hear the sound of people crying for freedom, their plight has reached the heart of our merciful God. The cause of freedom is the cause of God, but freedom is only a word until you have either come close to losing your independence or have lost it altogether.

Have you ever stopped to think that every department of the church would cease to function if religious liberty were taken away. Thank God for the liberties we enjoy, which enable us to work freely in promulgating the gospel of Jesus Christ. At the same time we are fully aware that Bible prophecy, (Daniel 12:1 & Revelation 13:11–18) has predicted a time in the near future, when these liberties we now delight in, will not longer be enjoyed by freedom-loving people.

- Give a very liberal offering in support of Liberty when it is taken in your church on January 21, 1978, so that we may achieve item number 2.
- Encourage your pastor and your church religious liberty representative to become personally acquainted with the Mayor, Alderman, Municipal Councillors and Pastors of other churches.

We covet your prayers during 1978 as we shall come to grips with the proposed Sunday legislation in our beautiful province of British Columbia.

Senior College Advisory Committee Meets

One hundred and fifty-four delegates, representing Canada coast-to-coast, met at Canadian Union College on Sunday, December 4, to consider the Senior College project voted by the Union Session in 1976. For many delegates this was the first time they had ever had the opportunity of visiting the campus. Several comments were heard about the beauty and suitability of the location, even though it was snow-covered at the time.

The new Physical Education complex, although not completely finished, is fully functional and some visitors were able to avail themselves of a "Physical Fitness Evaluation" on the special equipment provided for that purpose.

Dr. I. D. Higgins, Academic Dean, gave a report of first semester enrollments for the past seven years, which indicated a good increase for 1977–78. The report indicated that this term Alberta had the highest enrolment with 55 students, and Ontario was next highest with 37 students enrolled. The totals were:—

Reports from the industries indicated that the farm, Parkland Furniture, Parkland Color Press and Parkland Construction were performing well and making a contribution to the college in net profits and just as importantly, in student labor.

Mr. Jack Cookson, M.L.A. for the Lacombe area, spoke briefly of his own happy association with the college. He mentioned that several other M.L.A.'s had visited the campus and all were prepared to support the application for free-standing, degree-granting status as it was presented in caucus and in the legislature.

President Matthews advised that the brief for presentation to the Minister of Education was almost in its final stages. It should be presented before the end of the year, then it will be just a matter of time before it is considered by the legislature. Hopefully this will be during the spring sitting.

At a meeting of the Canadian Union Conference Executive Committee held on the following day an action was taken designating Sabbath, January 7, as a day of thanksgiving for the progress that has been made on the Senior College project, and of fasting and prayer for a favorable decision by the legislators of Alberta as they give consideration to amendments to the Universities Act which will permit the establishment of a Canadian Adventist University to serve the young people of Canada.

Voice of Prophecy Offerings Decline

A report from *Voice of Prophecy* headquarters shows that during the first 10 months of 1977, gifts from Canadian members and listeners totaled *one-sixth* less than during the same period of 1976.

This is a serious decline in income for the radio ministry of the church. If this trend continues, it will be necessary to begin dropping the *Voice of Prophecy* broadcast from some stations in Canada beginning in January. As many as 27 stations may have to be cancelled.

The goal for radio coverage in Canada is to have a primary signal for every local area. Up until three or four years ago, it was impossible to even come close to this goal. However, because of the liberality of members and other listeners across our country, the *Voice of Prophecy* has nearly reached the goal of full coverage. It would really be too bad if it were necessary to cut back now.

Unfortunately, a similar financial situation presently exists for the *Voice of Prophecy* in the United States, so it is impossible for the international head-quarters to subsidize the programs in Canada to a greater extent than is already being done.

As you perhaps know, every dollar given to the *Voice of Prophecy* by members and listeners in Canada goes to pay for radio time here or for follow-up materials (books, Bible lessons, radio logs, etc.) to be used within Canada. None of the administrative or general overhead expenses of the radio ministry are charged against the Canadian budget.

Gifts to balance this year's budget for Canadian radio time are needed before the end of December. Everyone is encouraged to prayerfully consider this matter and to help if it is possible.

All gifts from persons in Canada are acknowledged with a Canadian receipt that is good for tax-deduction purposes. Gifts may be sent to: *Voice of Prophecy*, Box 3800, Vancouver, British Columbia V6B 3Z1.


