Missionary Volunteer Week of Prayer March 11-18

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David Livingstone was lost in Africa. The owner of the *New York Herald*, James G. Bennett, wanted news of his whereabouts. He sent a telegram to one of his correspondents, Henry M. Stanley, who was located in Gibraltar; the telegram summoned the newspaper reporter to come to Paris. It was midnight when Stanley arrived and when he asked Mr. Bennett why he was summoned, the reply was brief: "Find Livingstone." The immediate response was, "How much money can you place at my disposal?" Bennett replied, "Never mind about the money; draw all you need, but find Livingstone." It took Stanley two years to prepare, but eventually he set out for Africa, and history records the dramatic meeting of stanley and Livingstone in Africa. God has sent a telegram to every young man and woman. The telegram can be paraphrased to read, "Find my world and win it back. Never mind about the expense, in time or in money or even in life itself, for I gave everything on Calvary's hill." Also the Lord declares, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." (Matthew 28:20)

The week of prayer has become an integral part of the church program. Weeks of prayer, as conducted in churches and schools, colleges and academies, bring tremendous spiritual revival to youth around the world. During these annual weeks, many decisions are made for Christ, His service, the remnant church, and the kingdom of heaven. Most of us can vividly remember the spiritual glow that accompanies weeks of prayer and we can speak with enthusiasm about these devotional experiences.

In order to properly understand the purpose of the week of prayer it would be well to consider the reasons why it was introduced. After careful study of the historical background of the week of prayer, Elder John F. Harris makes this conclusion:

"What later came to be called the 'week of prayer' grew out of a need, felt largely on the part of James and Ellen White, for the salvation of Adventist young people. To them, Bible lectures, prayer meetings, and church services were just not enough. They sensed the need for pressing the battle. There needed to be a time when a definite decision and commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ would be sought for and consummated. They believed in preaching sermons that would hold the interest of young people. They believed in making stirring appeals that would bring young men and women down to the front for prayer and re-commitment as well as conversion. They believed in seeking such commitment that would lead to baptism and a life of service dedicated to God and His church - the Seventh-day Adventist Church."

It is evident that the single objective of the youth week of prayer should be to lead the youth into a vital personal relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ.

Ontario Leads World in Literature Sales

The first and foremost objective of the Publishing Department is to win souls for the kingdom of God. The literature evangelist's work blends uniquely the winning of souls with sales. The amount in dollars worth of literature we have distributed in a particular area is the only accurate indication we have of how effective we are in spreading the gospel through the printed page in that part of God's vineyard assigned to us.

During the summer of 1977 the Ontario Conference hosted the largest student literature evangelist program in it's history as 125 students took to the field spreading the gospel through the printed page. This host of dedicated students delivered \$262,835.26 worth of truth-filled literature. Speaking of student literature programs, this is twice the total of any other union in North America. Of the 101 top students in all of North America 34 are from Ontario. In other words, one-third of the top students in all of North America are from one conference – Ontario. The record set by the students here represents a \$100,000 gain over the year before.

The overall literature evangelist program set an unprecedented pace in the history of Ontario and for the world. The faithful team of literature evangelists here delivered \$909,789.45 during 1977. This reveals an unprecedented gain of \$245,807.13 over the year before. This also represents a 37% gain over 1976. This tremendous record established by the literature evangelists of Ontario has made Ontario the leading conference in the world for sales during 1977.

Of course souls are the only true objective of the Publishing Department. Sales come as we are seeking those earnestly searching for truth. During 1977 71 baptisms resulted because of literature evangelist contacts. The objectives for 1978 are one million dollars in sales, one hundred baptisms, and that each literature evangelist secure a closer walk with his Master.

Health Ministry

REPORT ON U.S. DIETARY HABITS IS ISSUED BY SENATE COMMITTEE

A carefully researched report on U.S. dietary habits, the first of its kind, and stated to be *long overdue*, was issued in February, 1977 by a select committee of luminaries from the U.S. Senate. This document, "Dietary Goals for the United States," is available to the public from the U.S. Government Printing Office for 95 cents (specifics at the close of this article*). Every Adventist health worker should obtain and carefully read this 79 page booklet.

Special interest groups, notably sugar producers, meat packers and dairymen, vigorously opposed publication of the report since the data clearly shows that their products are linked with very common and serious health problems. "Too much fat, too much sugar and salt are linked directly to heart disease, cancer, stroke, obesity, and other killer diseases."

The dietary changes that have taken place in the past 50 years in this country represent as great a threat to public health as smoking, according to Senator George McGovern, Chairman of the committee. The senators expressed the hope that the report would stimulate action by government and industry. Senator Charles Percy stated that "without government and industry commitment to good nutrition the American people will continue to eat themselves to poor health."

Dr. Mark Hegsted, Professor of Nutrition, Harvard School of Public Health, worked closely with the committee during the preparation of the report. He commented "The question to be asked is not why should we change our diet, but rather, why not? What are the risks associated with eating less meat, less saturated fat, less cholesterol, less sugar, less salt, and more fruits, vegetables, unsaturated fats and cereal products, especially whole grain cereals? There are none that can be identified and important benefits can be expected."

The report goes on to suggest the following changes in food selection and preparation:

1. Increase consumption of fruits and vegetables and whole grains.

2. Decrease consumption of meat and

increase consumption of poultry and fish.

3. Decrease consumption of foods high in fat, and, partially substitute polyunsaturated fat for saturated fat.

4. Substitute non-fat milk for whole milk.

5. Decrease consumption of butterfat, eggs and other high cholesterol sources.

6. Decrease consumption of sugar and foods high in sugar content.

7. Decrease consumption of salt and foods high in salt content.

What a day we are living in! Who would have thought a few years ago that the day would come when the U.S. government would publish a report strongly urging a change in dietary habits toward the simple "health reform" diet recommended in the book *Counsels on Diet and Foods*! * Ask for "Dietary Goals for the U.S.". Brantford Members Promote No-Smoking Bylaw

January twenty-fourth this year marked an historic day in Brantford, when the Executive Committee of the city of Brantford voted in favor of the proposed city bylaw to regulate tobacco smoking in public areas. A similar bylaw has already been passed in Toronto and Ottawa, and approved in principle in Mississauga and Pembroke.

A dozen members from the Brantford church were present at the committee meeting including the pastor and first elder.

The City Council Executive meeting, which was televised, was a sequel to an open public meeting conducted by City Council last November, and also attended by our church members. It was because of our participation at this meeting that we were invited to attend the Executive meeting.

The public meeting, which took the form of a debate, was televised as an hour-long special. Several presentations were made at the meeting by various leaders in the community. Pastor Orpana outlined several reasons why smoking was spiritually and morally offensive. He quoted several Bible texts and used an interesting piece of apparatus to support the scientific aspects of the dangers of tobacco smoke. Brother van Dieman cited the world-wide awareness of the hazards of smoking including the official stands taken by the World Health Organization, the U.S. Surgeon-General, and the Ontario Ministry of Health. He said this was a straight-forward health issue, and the city has every right to protect the public against unnecessary pollution of the environment by people who wish to pursue a habit or addiction. He challenged those present to be honest with themselves and accept the bylaw. He offered information concerning the latest facts and figures concerning the hazards of smoking. The speakers in favor of the bylaw were loudly applauded and the meeting ended on a high note.

The audience in the gallery responded with applause when Alderman Art Stanbridge, admitted that he was a pipe smoker, but over the weekend had changed his view entirely and decided to support the rights of the non-smokers. He acknowledged the overwhelming evidence of the dangers of smoking which he had heard recently and realized that Council had a very responsible duty to perform in passing the bylaw.

Our church members were very pleased with the outcome of the Executive Council meeting, and it now appears that the city is only a step away from a no-smoking bylaw. The Brantford church members believe that the thousands of pieces of literature given out over the last few years and the Five-Day Plan to Stop Smoking held recently in Brantford have made many citizens aware of the harmful effects of smoking. We believe that men in high places will accept the truths which God has asked us to place in their hands.

There are millions of people around the world who need to hear the truths concerning tobacco smoking. As Adventist laymen we have a serious responsibility to alert our fellowmen to the warning given by Mrs. White that "tobacco is a slow, insidious, but most malignant poison. . ." *Ministry of Healing*, p. 215. Not only do we need to have our say in city council meetings, but we need to visit every home in our community with the message of life.

While the boys have been busy at their projects, the girls, under the direction of Mrs. Grace LaPierre, have been learning to crochet. They are presently learning to crochet bedspreads. They also hope to fulfill the requirements for an MV Crochet Honor.

Together, the girls and boys keep the wood for the furnace sawed, split and stored. Twice a week, they do general cleaning of the school and its premises.

We are thankful for the many donations that we have received in response to our call for help. We are also thankful for the time donated to the school by Mr. Dunning and Mrs. LaPierre in the Practical Arts Program and Mrs. Kathy Braman in the School Music Program.

I would like to see our elementary school become a model school. Thus, we solicit your prayers to attain this goal.




Thunder Bay students in sacred musical program under direction of Mrs. Kathy Braman.

Church members asking strangers for blood samples? That's right!

For the past two Sabbaths members of the Kendalwood church in Whitby have been going to the homes in the community doing a health survey. Interested individuals were later contacted and invited to the *Feeling Good Seminars in Total Living*, directed by Pastor David White, soon to be held in Whitby.

The first segment of this program, Heartbeat, was held Sunday, January 29, at the Henry Street Public High School in Whitby. This was well attended by 88 persons in all, with 65 of the 68 non-Adventists having had no previous association with our denomination. Heartbeat consists of taking a blood sample which will determine cholesterol and triglycerides, plus taking a heartbeat coronary health history. Height, weight and blood pressure are also considered. Obtaining this information were members from the Kendalwood church assisted by professional personnel. This program was greatly aided by a thoughtful media approach. An attractive, promotional folder, contemporary newspaper layouts, and an on-the-air interview program on radio station CKLB with Pastor David White, combined to create community interest.

The Feeling Good Program will be continuing through April, 1978 with special seminars on smoking, stress, diet, weight control, and physical fitness. More and more interest is being shown by persons who have never associated with the Seventh-day Adventists before. This series of seminars will culminate in a Keys to Health and Happiness Seminar, combining spiritual emphasis with a total approach to living, to be held at the Kendalwood church.

Radiant Living Seminars Begin in Vancouver

Vancouver, British Columbia, is western Canada's largest city. With over 1½ million people living within the metropolitan borders, Seventh-day Adventists have a special responsibility to warn this mighty city of the second coming of Jesus Christ.

Warning the inhabitants of great cities is the most complex and formidable challenge of Seventh-day Adventist evangelism. The competition of secularism almost shuts out the influence of the gospel, yet we have been promised that before Jesus comes again every person will be warned. As a movement of destiny, we have been given divine instruction in how to carry out this responsibility. In Scripture and Spirit of Prophecy, we are given key principles that if followed will result in victory for God's people. Ellen White wrote in 1901, "Our manner of working must be after God's order. The work that is done for God in our large cities must not be according to man's devising." Evangelism, p. 385. What are these principles and how would God have us meet the challenge of the cities?

The first principle of city evangelism is a revival and reformation among God's people. A revival that rekindles a life of unreserved commitment to the Holy Spirit's instruction through Scripture and Spirit of Prophecy. When our loyalty is given entirely to God, then He can truly use and guide us to save others.

The second key principle of city evangelism is a unity of the ministry and laity of the church to finish God's work. Each individual is to recognize his own personal responsibility to warn his neighborhood. There needs to be training and instruction so that each person can labor effectively at his post of duty.

The third principle of city evangelism is a union of the medical and gospel ministries. Our medical work is the opening right arm that allows the body of the gospel to enter into the experience of individuals. Each person is to be a medical missionary, bringing the message of total better living to their friends. Through personal experience in the principles of health, we are to go forth to meet the needs of a world expiring from the disease of sin.

Companies of workers are to unite and work together to meet the needs of the city — principle number four. "There should be companies organized and educated most thoroughly to work as nurses, as evangelists, as ministers, as canvassers, as gospel students, to perfect a character after the divine similitude." Uniting their individual talents, a company of workers can blend their talents for a stronger work. Many of these workers are to be volunteers and self-supporting. But just as Jesus had His company of twelve disciples working with Him, so companies are to unite to work the large cities.

Principle number five "is God's design that our people should locate outside the cities, and from these outposts warn the cities, and raise in them memorials for God." Just as Jesus led the multitude out of the villages and cities of Israel to the seaside and mountain to instruct and heal them, so we are to lead people from the wickedness of the city into the natural setting of God's creation.

To meet the challenge of evangelizing the Vancouver metropolitan area, the British Columbia Conference has called a team of workers to carry out these key principles of city evangelism. The Radiant Living Seminars team started their work in the Vancouver area this last September by beginning an evangelistic thrust in Surrey in co-operation with the Surrey and New Westminister churches. Under the direction of Brad Thorp, British Columbia Conference evangelist, team members Ted and Sharon Wasyliuk, Herb Poholka, Philip Khng and Hillair Thorp are currently preparing for an evangelistic series in Richmond. With the blessing of God, a church company will be formed and this community will have a strong light as a witness to God's truth.

Church School Founded on Faith

Unfortunately, Miss Riter, for health reasons, found it impossible to continue teaching and another general church meeting was called. A surprised congregation was informed that the school was to be closed because another teacher could not be found. People refused to give up their dream of a school; one summed it up thus, "The Lord has not led us this far only to close down". A solution had to be found and it was. Mrs. Mavis Oslund, one of the church members, consented to finish out the school year while her husband cared for their two preschool children.

The school is operating well and has good support from the church. To finance the operation of the school, the church adopted a 10 plus 10 system – 10% tithe and 10% church family budget to care for the school and other church activities.

"We Will Go With Our Young . . ."

In times of great crisis, when human lives are in jeopardy due to eventful calamities, foremost in the minds of people is the salvation of the children and youth. We have seen, we have read, we have heard, of experiences when individuals, families, or groups have risked their lives and possessions to save their youth from harm, starvation, and even death. These courageous acts of bravery performed to save the body, should be highly commended, but more important is the action whereby one is willing to give possessions, or a life, for the eternal spiritual salvation of their own young people or those of someone else.

We are aware of the multitudinous crises of our generation: pollution, energy dishonesty, permissiveness, population explosion, jealousy, hatred, war, plus the spiritual dilemma. We are aware of the tactics of Satan to confuse, overwhelm, deceive, and destroy the youth of the world through atheism, narcotics, pornography, mind-warping cinemas, and trashy literature. These are serious challenges and they must be met head-on by dramatic responses if the youth are to be saved from the diabolic assaults of the adversary of honesty and purity.

Biblical history records a period when the onslaught of Satan was directed toward the spiritual annihilation of the people of God; but Satan's strategy was thwarted by Godfearing, dedicated leaders supported by an overwhelming majority of men and women. Moses and Aaron, summoned before Pharaoh, were informed that the men could go to a desert retreat amd worship their God. The kings apparent act of benevolence was shrouded with a scheme to hold the youth as surety should the worshippers decide to escape the bondage of slavery. Pharaoh did not know the mind or understand the love of devoted parents or of dedicated leaders, for without hesitation and in full awareness of the overwhelming military might and the superstitious influence of ancient Egypt, Moses boldly answered: "We will go with our young and our old, with our sons and with our daughters ... will we go ..." (Ex. 10:9).

To our generation, Satan makes a similar offer. Parents and adults may worship as they desire, when and where, but the youth he seeks to hold as hostages, hoping that the church leaders and parents will consider it too big a price to pay or too big a risk to take for their salvation.

It must never be said by any Christian that the price of Christian education, Pathfinder clubs, youth rallies, camping activities, or youth organizations is too costly, too timeconsuming, or too involved. If we are to save our youth, it will take sacrifice and a full dedication to the proposition that "we will go with our young, . . . with our sons and with our daughters . .." through a world marred with the scars of sin to a new world of everlasting peace and happiness. By the grace of God, we will all be there.

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". . .that they may be called TREES OF RIGHTEOUSNESS, the planting of the Lord that He may be glorified." Isaiah 61:3.

The youth organization of the church can be likened to a tree.

- The roots are always grounded in The Word of God and the Spirit of Prophecy.
- The stem of the tree is the youth organization itself.
- The trunk of the tree reaches upward to God for power.
- The branches of the tree reach out in service to others.
- The color of the *leaves* and the *fruit* may vary from generation to generation.

The youth organization, no matter what its form, should always be leading young people nearer to the Lord Jesus. They will be reaching others with the faith of Jesus and presenting the truth for these times.

Experiences of an Adventist Collegiate Taskforce Worker During the Summer of 1977

This story happened in Conklin, Alberta which is a small Indian community of 300 people approximately twenty miles north of Fort McMurray. Ed Dejarlie wanted to hold a Vacation Bible School in Conklin and with the help of Darrell Kriesler and his plane, Linda Burtt, Holly Brown, Elizabeth Parent and myself, the task was arranged. Due to an unfortunate illness Brother Dejarlie was unable to accompany us as we left on July 31, 1977.

Prior to our arrival we had made arrangements to stay in a part of the school house; however, due to a breakdown in communications somewhere along the line, the lady who had the keys to the school was at a local festival in Fort McMurray and we had no place to stay.

A kindhearted man who was in charge of the Catholic church in the village opened his house to us. He gave up his own home leaving it totally to us.

Our next duty to ensure a successful Vacation Bible School was to advertise it in the town. We engaged in meeting the people face to face, personally inviting them to bring their children to the program.

Around 3:00 p.m. boys and girls started slowly wandering into the yard. They ranged in age from three to seventeen years. Even though they all enjoyed the stories of creation that we told and the games that we played, the prejudice seemed to be very strong. Brother Kriesler helped break that down by becoming friendly with some of the boys. Holly, Linda and Elizabeth also made new friends when craft time came around. The ice was broken for me personally when I was peacefully walking to the town's only store and was jumped by four of the boys who proceeded to successfully wrestle me to the ground. Although this was an unusual way to make friends, a friendship developed that shall last through eternity.

Some of the children had been smoking and drinking since they were three years of age. Their regular diet consisted mainly of potatoe chips and soft drinks. My close association with some of the boys enabled me to tell them of the disadvantages of smoking, and as a result of their respect for me, they quit these filthy habits. While we were in Conklin we met two young men who were serving as youth ministers for about three weeks. One was a Baptist and the other was a newborn Evangelical. The Evangelical was very interested in our faith. We explained the basis for our belief as best we could. We gave both ministers our addresses and a *Steps to Christ* before they left.

In a few days we received the keys to the school. The many friends we had made helped us to move in. After moving some of the older men asked us to play baseball with them, but as we were busy at the moment cleaning up we told them we would be out soon. They patiently stood waiting for us and did not start the game until we were ready. Later that night I took out a basketball and started making a couple of shots when one of the boys asked me if I would like a game. I didn't want to refuse because he was bigger than I was. After I had lost the game, he asked me if I wanted to go for a walk with him. Rocky was a big fellow and about six feet tall. As we walked along in the bush, he told me how he had quit grade eleven because everyone else did. He smoked only because everyone else did but he didn't drink because he didn't like the taste of alcohol. Rocky and I became good friends. I left him with the message of "the Blessed Hope" which he absorbed like a dry sponge.

We left Conklin on August 4, 1977, but I will always remember the friends I made there and hope we will meet again because we shared the "Blessed Hope" with them.

In closing a small quote from our favorite author, "not all can go as missionaries to foreign lands, but all can be home missionaries in their families and neighborhoods." *Testimonies*, Vol. 9 p. 30. Canada is our home! Let's make it our mission field by spreading God's love! Shah Pemberton


