

A Man, A Sale, A Soul

It was more than coincidence which caused Ragui Paoring of Spicer Memorial College in India to travel more than half way around the globe to canvass in Ontario last summer. It was more than happenstance when Ragui called on the home of Gary LaFlamme here in the City of Oshawa. The result was more than man's wisdom can understand or human effort produce. Here is what happened:

Ragui arrived in Ontario with a burning desire to share his faith with others. With a prayer on his lips and a song in his heart, he began his two-fold objective. First, he must obtain a scholarship in order to return to College but, secondly and most important of all, win souls for the Kingdom of God. He called at the home of Gary LaFlamme. 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New Literature Evangelists Forge Ahead in Ontario

A training school for 12 new literature evangelist recruits was conducted in Oshawa from February 20 to 24. The concentrated training program was conducted by Elder B. M. Isaac, Associate Publishing Director of the conference. We can only praise God and give glory to him for the wonders He has done. The morale runs high among our literature evangelist team here as a veritable stream of new recruits march to the front responding to the call of God. A special thanks is in order for Elder B. M. Isaac, for presenting top notch training material and a special welcome to 12 new recruits to our literature evangelist team.

The literature evangelists of Ontario continue to forge ahead claiming victory through the power of God. During the month of January we experienced a \$10,000 gain over January of last year. This represents a 38% increase. During February we experienced a \$12,000 gain which represents a 35% increase over

Big News from Our Publishing Houses

Printing orders totaling nearly a quarter million dollars have been assigned by Pacific Press to its subsidiary, Maracle Press. In addition to the production of 865,000 books the order represents a major change in the production of two magazines.

Continual printing of the new \$2.95 (about \$3.30 at current rates of exchange) English language *Signs* destined for Canadian subscribers will be handled at Maracle. The entire press run of *Oznake*, the Ukrainian *Signs*, will also be done in Canada. February press runs called for 27,000 and 2,900 magazines respectively.

Also included in the printing order is the production of 15,000 copies of the booklet *Three Hours to Live* and four Ellen White books. The White books, all in newsprint editions, include English language *Desire of Ages, Great Controversy*, and *Steps to Christ*. An additional 200,000 Spanish *Steps to Christ* will be printed.

Over a period of six or seven years, the current plan calls for the Pacific Press to supply enough work to assist Maracle Press in becoming a totally denominational publishing house doing a business of approximately \$2 million per year.

PACIFIC PRESS ADOPTS NEW LOGO

Seeking to better identify its mission, Pacific Press has adopted a new logo for its products.

The new design composed of a cross, a circle and the initials PP reflects the ongoing work of the church's largest publishing house while serving as a reminder of the suffering that naturally follows departure from Divine leading.

Ellen White had long warned that the printing of commercial work by Pacific Press was not in harmony with God's plans. But many of the warnings were passed over. Following the move from Oakland to Mountain View in 1904, the Press

was damaged by the San Francisco earthquake and then leveled a short time later by a raging fire.

C. H. Jones, general manager, declared, "We have been admonished by the earthquake and the fire. Let us not need the wind, but listen to the still small voice pleading, 'Do my work only.' "A non-commercial press was born from the ashes of that fire.

Composed of charred wood, the circle in the original design is a graphic reminder of those days of trial while symbolizing a gospel message that encompasses all people and languages of the world today. The cross signifies the commitment of proclaiming the message of salvation, the very reason Pacific Press exists. And in keeping with current trends the publishing house has shortened its informal name to Pacific Press (PP).

Also on the beach that day were some Seventh-day Adventist young people whose Christian behavior appealed to Larry's sense of propriety. Marilyn Hillier observed Larry's concern for a better way of life and invited him to write both for the Voice of Prophecy lessons and for books from the It Is Written, Oshawa office.

Within a few weeks, keen eyes at the It Is Written desk in Oshawa noticed that Larry had requested all the books available and had sent a generous donation. Things really moved fast then. The Newfoundland office was informed of the interest. Letters and phone calls revealed a growing enjoyment of spiritual things. About that time Larry visited Corner Brook for a professional institute, where he sought out Arthur Symonds and together they spent an evening comparing Scripture truths. A few weeks later,

Pastor Max Mercer visited Larry in Labrador and arrangements were made for him to be baptized during the Christmas vacation by George Lanto, pastor of the young people whose Christian witness bore fruit so soon.

The story hasn't ended yet. Deep Christian friendships are developing as Larry is enthusiastically witnessing in Labrador where he meets each Sabbath with others who love God's word including not only whites but Indians and Eskimos too. Winnipegosis

With the challenge to work for Christ in an assigned territory, the members of the Winnipegosis church met last August for a potluck; mapped out and assigned the territory, largely by families.

This division and assignment of territory brought about an electrifying effect on most of the members. The pastor challenged every member to move out for God, and several events have taken place since then.

There was a sense of direction during our Ingathering campaign. One sister, in a few days had visited every home in her territory and this example was followed by many others. There was a spirit of evangelism as many of the members made contacts for Bible studies.

Some members are involved in working with the "Bible Says" lessons from home to home. A few are giving out Signs of the Times and one family is visiting two schools and giving out Listen and other drug-related literature.

In the fall the church was blessed with the addition of four souls, Marvin Wells, David and Peter Baptiste, sons of the pastor, and Mabel Dewarle.

A church was organized in Dauphin on November 12, 1977 and the Dauphin church is, in many respects, part of the Winnipegosis Church Outreach Program. Our members have pledged themselves fully to finish the Lord's work.

Dauphin

November 12, 1977 was a very happy day for the few believers who gathered in Dauphin for the organization of the first S.D.A. church in that town of almost ten thousand.

It was a beautiful afternoon when Elder W. G. Soloniuk, president of the conference, presented a stirring message, urging those who were becoming a part of this new church to lift up the banner of Christ.

Plans for the organization of the church started shortly after Pastor Clarence Baptiste moved to Dauphin to pastor the Winnipegosis church, 38 miles away.

After much prayer and hard work,

God opened the way, and a hall was secured in which to meet. But God worked further and gave a more ideal place to worship. It happened in an interesting way. While making calls in town, Pastor Baptiste noticed a church on a corner street and sighed, "If only we could get that church for our services!" Noticing a car parked outside, he decided to investigate. Pastor Charles Lees of the Grace Bible Church was there and was happy to show him around. Pastor Baptiste told him he was hoping to hold services in town soon, as there were some members living there.

About two and a half weeks later, Pastor Lees called to say that he and his church board were wondering if we would like to buy the church as they were planning to build a larger one. After much discussion and prayer, it was decided to rent, with the option to buy.

So far, God has blessed our small church here in Dauphin. On January 14, 1978, Mrs. Marjory McKinnon, who made her decision for Christ after attending a seminar held in Yorkton, was baptized.

Although the membership is only 18, each week there are several visitors, making an average attendance of 30. Sabbath, January 21, was another special occasion when the Wilson family received their diplomas for successfully completing the "Bible Says" course. Since then, the Wilsons have been attending services regularly. Dozens of Bible studies are being held with the assistance of local elder, Harry Bryga in Dauphin.

Sandy Bay

Several other contacts were made in this community — Smoking Millie and "Time Pulls The Trigger" were shown at the only school and also at the Alcoholic Withdrawal Centre; the Catholic priest was given *Desire of Ages* and he invited us to return.

The North presents a real challenge and from the response that we experienced at this place we are assured a very warm welcome. So impressed were the leaders of the community that they indicated that they were going to approach the Provincial Government for help in sponsoring more Five-Day Plans in the North.



Brockville Church Organizes

During 1965 Pastor John Howard of Kingston and Justin Drieburg, a conference colporteur, laid the foundations in the Brockville area for another Adventist candle.

By early 1974 the number of area Seventh-day Adventists was large enough to warrant weekly gatherings in Brockville, as opposed to the fifty mile drive to the Kingston church.

Believers met for several months, in an upper room, at the home of Sister Jackie Dagenais. However, when average weekly attendance rose to over thirty, larger quarters were sought.

The Fellowship Hall of St. Peter's Anglican Church was rented. For the first time Brockville could have three divisions of Sabbath School. Even though acoustics left a lot to be desired, the members rejoiced.

May 24, 1975 the Brockville Company was officially organized in a ceremony performed by Pastor Earl Parchment, of the Ontario Conference, assisted by the Brockville-Kingston pastor, Andrew Mustard.

The Brockville company quickly became known for their concern and love for all humanity. Recipients of the baby layettes for indigent mothers and grateful graduates of Five-Day Plans testified that Brockville's Adventists cared.

Pastor Robert Correia arrived and during his stay further acquainted our community with practical Christianity. In a Community Services uniform, he visited schools with his dinosaur collection. Pastor Correia arranged and assisted with a Drug Abuse Seminar for local Girl Guides.

Brockville's official organization as a church took place in the Kingston church on February 18, 1978. Pastor Alfred Webb welcomed Elder E.C. Beck, Conference President.

In his message "God's Angel of Love", Elder Beck challenged Seventh-day Adventists to become angels spreading God's love to all men.

During the organization ceremony the 23 charter members of the Brockville

church were invited to sign a commemorative scroll, which will be preserved in the Conference office.

The first two signatures on the scroll were those of Patti and Tim Cove, a sister and brother, who had been baptized earlier in the day. Patti assists the Brockville Sabbath School in the Primary Division. Tim is a member of the Junior division.

The Ontario Conference presented the Brockville church with 25 engraved hymnals. Kingston members presented a beautiful visitor's book to the Brockville company.

Brother Claude Osborn, treasurer, informed fellow members of the approxi-

mately \$6,000.00 realized from the province-wide offering taken December 24 for the Brockville Church Building Fund.

The Kingston ladies invited everyone to share in a fellowship luncheon in the church's Pioneer Hall following the organization ceremonies.

The Dietary Department of Branson Hospital was represented at the planning sessions of the Ministry. To participate in performance, we again set up a display and information booth in the hospital lobby where visitors and staff alike were welcomed to view a film, have any questions regarding nutrition answered, pick up printed materials, or just browse about in the display area. For the children in particular, the Food Game provided a concrete way of teaching good eating habits.

chart, so as to assist staff to choose wisely and determine their caloric intake.

Approximately 1800 persons visited our booth. Among the comments of visitors were those from some church members who were reflecting on how modern science is now proving and accepting the facts of healthful living that have been given to us as a church through the Lord's Messenger, Mrs. E. The counselling program involves laymen in a joint ministry with pastors and physicians. A team effort is emerging! The great untapped resource of the church in North America is its many capable members trained in a simple, effective, natural means of helping others.

The counsellor program involves laymen not in just momentary contact witnessing, but in recurring significant heart-to-heart interpersonal relationships. These relationships are highly prized by those struggling through a crisis.

The participants are called by phone. They are visited in the home. They are

invited to dinner. They are made grateful by people who care. They ask questions. And the sharing of faith is not forced but proceeds naturally in answer to the questions they are asking.

The counselling program has done so much to revive the hearts of the counsellors in meaningful soul-winning that many pastors don't want to run a Five-Day Plan anymore without it.

Andrews University Offering April 15, 1978

Graham Glover - Arlen Higgens -Gary Hooper _ Donn Leatherman _ Guenther Stoehr - These are, more than just names. In the not-so-distant future you in the Canadian Union may become acquainted with them. Right now they are at Andrews University preparing to serve you as ministers.

In recent years conferences in the Canadian Union have sponsored a number of men such as these through the master of divinity program at the theological seminary at Andrews as part of the church-wide effort to train ministers at a professional level. At the present time these men and five others are enrolled and will bring their knowledge and skills to the Canadian Union after completing their nine-quarter program.

Since 1973 seminary students have cooperated with evangelists in soulwinning efforts in Halifax; Vancouver; Winnipeg; Corner Brook, Newfoundland; and Kelowna, British Columbia. Last summer seminary students assisted in 11 evangelistic efforts in the United States and England.

By continuing support of graduate programs at Andrews, the Seventh-day Adventist church shows its interest in providing a Christian setting where students can seek advanced knowledge with the religious perspective not found in secular education. Since 1973 Graduate School enrolment has increased 25 percent. Graduate programs now available include master of arts in teaching degrees in 15 areas, master of arts degrees in seven areas, master of music and master of business administration degrees, and doctor of education degrees in three areas. The seminary offers two master's and two doctoral programs.

The strength of a university lies not only in worthwhile curricula, a competent faculty, and good facilities, though. At its heart is a group of well-prepared, inquiring, committed students. For this reason Andrews offers financial help to qualified students from around the world through scholarship and endowment funds.

'It is imperative that scholarship funds be augmented to meet the increasing needs of students in the United States and the world field for financial assistance," says Dr. Joseph G. Smoot, president of Andrews. "Many of the students could not come to Andrews or continue their studies if funds were not available to assist them. The contribution that many are making as pastors, teachers, evangelists, and alumni here at home and overseas is a testimony for the students you have helped in the past."

Adventist Dentists Reach Out; NASAD More than Fraternity

Concerned about the difficulty Adventist students were having in entering accredited dental schools and continuing to keep the Sabbath, 10 Seventh-day Adventist dentists organized the National Association of Seventh-day Adventist Dentists (NASDAD) at the Michigan Camp Meeting at Grand Ledge in 1943.

Three more unable to attend are also listed as charter members of the group, which wrote its purposes into the Constitution and Bylaws:

- * to encourage a deep Christian experience through active participation in all church activities;
- * to foster missionary endeavor, proper care of needy patients, donations of professional time to hospitals and clinics;
- * to emphasize the missionary possibilities of dentistry as a profession.

By 1947 NASDAD had received official recognition from the American Dental Association and is now an official affiliate and listed in their bulletin, the only church-related group so acknowledged by the ADA.

Such achievement is understood by anyone attending a NASDAD meeting held annually four days prior to the ADA convention. Continuing education is always a prominent part, electronic surgery being the study of the 1977 Miami confab.

But more, NASDAD nurtures Christian growth—with Elder and Mrs. Kenneth Wood and A. Leroy Moore of La Vida Mission at the same meeting. And the witness of Christian music in the ADA—designated hotel has attracted more than one non-Adventist dentist to Sabbath services!

Of course, business and social events play a role, but even

these are conducted in harmony with Christ-centred goals.

As early as 1948, the need for a denominationally-owned dental school was stressed and supported by pledges of \$20,000 toward the project. When the Dental School was established at Loma Linda in 1952, it was not surprising that M. Webster Prince, an early NASDAD organizer, was invited to be the dean.

NASDAD influence is also credited with having a dental secretary at the General Conference medical department. Dr. Eldon Carman of Atlanta has held this position since 1972.

In yet a third area of influence, NASDAD is concentrating on the enlargement of a dental mission program both at home and abroad. As a part of the program abroad, NASDAD members have taken the responsibility of assisting the Inter-American Division with a dental clinic for the new Montemorelos University.

Such a funding program is being undertaken while NASDAD members are pledged to donate \$750,000 to the new Dental wing at Loma Linda, \$50,000 annually till the goal is reached. Most are Century Clubbers from LLU alumni for this project, giving \$100 annually toward the school.

But more than money, God needs men and women. And those members of the National Association of Seventh-day Adventist Dentists continue to give of themselves, too, in an almost staggering program of relief service overseas and mobile clinics in Mexico and Inter America.

Dentists not yet a part of NASDAD are invited to participate in their exciting Christian witness and to plan now for the 1978 convention in San Diego, California at the Vacation Village of Mission Bay, October 18—21

Nutritionist Defends Vegetarianism

Washington, D.C. — Dr. John A. Scharffenberg, professor of applied nutrition at the Seventh-day Adventist Loma Linda University, defended the nutritional merits of a vegetarian diet in a debate sponsored by the American Association for the Advancement of Science this week.

The debate, "The Question of Meat," took place at the AAAS Annual meeting. It pitted Dr. Scharffenberg against Dr. George V. Mann, professor of nutrition at Vanderbilt University.

Dr. Scharffenberg, a physician who also holds the master of public health degree from Harvard University, cited in his evidence a study of Seventh-day Adventist men in California as compared to men in the general population of that state. Roughly half of all Adventists are vegetarians, and all members abstain from pork and shellfish, as well as alcohol, tobacco, coffee and tea.

The meat-eating Adventist men, Dr. Scharffenberg said, experienced 64 percent of the mortality, or death, rate of the average population for a given age in the study. Those who ate only dairy and egg products (Lacto-ova vegetarians) had

only 40 percent mortality, and the strict vegetarians studied had a surprisingly low 23 percent mortality rate.

In another study comparing female Adventist students at Loma Linda University with their meat-eating counterparts at the University of Southern California, Dr. Scharffenberg said the Loma Linda women contracted only one-third the number of cases of breast cancer. He credited their partial vegetarian diet as a factor.

He added that meat has been linked to advancement of the aging process, kidney malfunction and salmonellosis. Meat is "carbohydrate deficient," he said, as well as low in calcium.

Two other spokesmen debated the economic and ethical considerations of a meatless diet. Richard Ling, president of the Meat Institute and former U.S. assistant secretary of agriculture, claimed that grazing land would go to waste in the agricultural system if animals were not raised on it. He further cited "valuable by-products" of livestock, including hides, bristles and 100 different kinds of medicine.

On the other side of the ethical and

economic issue, James Mason, a Connecticut attorney and executive vice president of Friends of Animals, said a "vegetarian outlook" should mark an advancing civilization as it learns to deal with the world, even as advances in race relations and the status of women have marked advancements in Western thought in recent years.




