Voice of Prophecy Bible School Reaching Canadians

More than 4,000 persons across Canada applied for Bible courses from the *Voice of Prophecy* during the first three months of this year, according to Elden Walter, director of the Bible School at the VOP.

Students include members of nearly every major denomination. A Baptist in St. John, New Brunswick, recalls that a woman called on the telephone with an invitation to enroll in the Bible correspondence course. In Regina, Saskatchewan, an Anglican heard the broadcast from KSL, Salt Lake City, and requested the *New Life* lessons that were advertised.

A 31-year-old Catholic woman in Stratford, Ontario, writes that someone came to her door asking for a gift for missions work. The person left a copy of the Ingathering brochure. On the back cover, the young woman read about the *New Life* lessons. She wrote for them and now says, "I find these guides very exciting and stimulating, and I am looking forward for the next series and especially the book, *Steps to Christ*."

The *Voice of Prophecy* now offers more than a dozen Bible correspondence courses in English, plus basic adult Bible courses in some 80 other languages and dialects. Among the non-English Bible courses that are of particular interest in Canada are French, German, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, Russian, Ukrainian and Vietnamese.

Graduates from the English-language courses last year numbered 10,011. There were 163 baptisms that can be directly attributed to *Voice of Prophecy* work in Canada.

Seventh-day Adventists are also encouraged to enroll in Bible courses from the church's radio broadcast. In fact, one course, *Prophetic Guidance*, is especially designed for study by members of the church and is intended to increase confidence in the Spirit of Prophecy writings. With this 24-lesson course, the student receives without cost a 192-page book containing articles relating to the life and ministry of Ellen G. White.

Bible courses are available for a wide range of ages and at

various levels of difficulty. Adult courses include *Focus on Living* (for beginners), *New Life*, *Daniel and Revelation* (advanced), and *Light of the World* (life of Christ). For young couples, there is the *Bright Horizons* course. *High Way Scenes* is offered for youth and *You Take the Wheel* for early youth.

Special courses in English include *God's Way* (for the deaf), *Israelite Heritage* (especially for Jewish people), and a Bible course in Braille for the blind.

In addition to the above courses which are free, the VOP offers at a subsidized price a set of 20 records and a workbook for children called *Storytime Adventures in the Life of Christ*. Also available at production cost are two sets of lessons on health: *It's Your World of Good Health* and *It's Your World of Good Food*.

Through radio broadcasts and Bible courses, the Adventist church is reaching people who might not be introduced to the third angel's message in any other way.

From a prisoner in Kingston, Ontario, came a letter saying that he had wondered how he could get a Bible study course. He began praying for the answer, and later tuned in the VOP on CKLC in Kingston. He says finding the program "at the time seemed like an accident, but now I know that God caused me to turn my radio on at the proper time and station".

This 27-year-old prisoner concludes, "I thank God for many things that He is doing for me, but I feel the most important one is the new look on life that I am getting with the *New Life* guides".

H. M. S. Richards, Jr., comments, "We are thrilled that God is using this ministry to touch the lives of people throughout Canada and around the world. We hope our fellow members will encourage more of their friends and neighbors to enroll in the Bible courses. A personal invitation to enroll, accompanied by person-to-person follow up, is one of the best methods to increase the effectiveness of the Bible School work."

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Policies on Admission To Canadian Union College

In response to numerous requests for clarification on programs and admissions at Canadian Union College, the following is presented as information to the Canadian constituency and prospective college students:

- (1) A four-year program terminating in a Bachelor of Theology degree with majors in Religion, Theology and Bible Instruction.
- (2) A two-year university transfer program leading to three year B.A. or B.Sc. (general) degrees, or to four-year B.A. or B.Sc. (Special or Honors) degrees, or
- (3) One and two-year pre-professional programs for transfer or admission to professional schools.

The four-year Theology degree program articulating with seminary studies at Andrews University, and the one and two-year pre-professional programs which either provide students with minimum admission requirements to professional schools such as dentistry and medicine, or which articulate with specific professional programs such as nursing, dental hygiene, dietetics, etc. at Loma Linda University, or engineering at Walla Walla College, are relatively well understood and will not be elaborated upon.

The three-year B.A. or B.Sc. (general or pass) degree is distinctly Canadian and meets the need of those students interested in a general education or who desire background for later professional training. Incidentally, it should be pointed out that because of the heavy competition for admission to schools of dentistry and medicine (including Loma Linda University) very few applicants with less than a three or four-year B.A. or B.Sc. degree are admitted. The three-year program consists of a minimum of fifteen full (two semester or year-long) courses or equivalent, including three and five courses in a principal subject area of concentration.

The four-year B.A. or B.Sc. (Special and Honors) degree programs consist of twenty full (two semester) courses and equivalent. The special degree is more flexible than the honors degree, yet requiring a greater degree of specialization in a subject area than is permitted in the general program; but allowing a wide range of study outside the one of specialization than in the honors program.

Admission to a Master's Degree program requires either a three or four-years Bachelor's Degree with at least second-class standing. The Master's Degree normally requires at least one year of study following a four-year Bachelor's Degree, and at least two years of additional study following a three-year Bachelor's Degree.

In the case of professional studies leading to teacher certification it must be pointed out that in some provinces such as Alberta, Manitoba, Nova Scotia, etc. professional courses in education may be taken either concurrently with or following completion of a first Bachelor's Degree culminating in a Bachelor of Education degree. In Ontario, admission to a teacher education program requires the prior completion of a three or four-year Bachelor's Degree. The holder of a three-year degree would meet the academic and certification requisites for the Type B certificate following a year of professional studies. Holders of a four-year Bachelor's Degree with a specified number of courses in one or two subject areas would qualify for a Type A certificate upon completion of a year of Professional studies.

Admission Requirements to College Programs

The policies regulating admission to college programs at Canadian Union College are formulated with the intent of maintaining academic standards which (1) are uniformly those of statutory or accredited institutions of higher learning in Canada and (2) assure *transfer* to other colleges and universities, or admission to graduate or professional schools without loss of time or credit. This assumes, of course, that credits to be transferred are in courses appropriate to the programs or schools to which transfer or admission is sought. They are stated hereunder.

I. Admission to Programs Leading to the B.Th. Degree

Since the programs leading to the B.Th. Degree are structured to articulate with subsequent graduate programs of study offered by the Andrews University Theological Seminary and other S.D.A. colleges, the admission requirements are generally those of other S.D.A. colleges and universities.

For Regular Students: The normal admission requirement is

- (a) A High School (Grade 12) Diploma, or
- (b) A Senior Matriculation Certificate or
- (c) An equivalent evidence of satisfactory completion of secondary school studies.

II. Admission to Programs Leading to the B.A., B.Sc. (General, Special or Honors) Degree

Since successful completion of these programs constitute the basis for transfer or admission to faculties, and schools of graduate studies or professional schools of Canadian universities (and incidentally to colleges and universities in the United States), the admission requirements are uniformly stipulated by Canadian universities.

For Regular Students. The following Canadian certificates are ordinarily required for admission:

- (a) British Columbia — Grade 12 with an average of C or better.
- (b) Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba — Grade 12 senior matriculation.
- (c) Ontario — Grade 13 (Year 5).
- (d) Quebec — Year 1 of the C.E.G.E.P. General or Collegial programs.
- (e) Nova Scotia — Grade 12 in the university-preparatory program.
- (f) New Brunswick — Grade 12 in the Regular program.
- (g) Prince Edward Island — First year of University of P.E.I.
- (h) Newfoundland — First year of Memorial University.

Alternate Admission.

Non-Matriculated Students Students who lack requirements for regular admission may accrue entrance to degree programs by:

- (a) Completing successfully five courses in the University Preparatory program, or
- (b) Writing and attaining an average score of 500 with no mark below 400 in the College Entrance Examination Board (C.E.E.B.) Scholastic Aptitude Tests (verbal and mathematical) and three specified Achievement Tests, or
- (c) (For B.Th. degree applicants only) writing the G.E.D. Tests and attaining an average score of 50 with no mark lower than 45.

Yukon Frontier Evangelism

The Yukon is steeped in mining history. It was gold in 1898. It is estimated that originally 60,000 men braved the hazards of Chilkoot Pass to rush for gold. For two years they packed the wharfs of Seattle, begging for passage north. They were oblivious to blisters, cramped muscles and heavy loads. All that mattered was gold—along the Yukon River and its tributaries. Today over 23,000 people live in this vast territory of 207,000 square miles, and we must give them the true gold of the Word.

The Yukon is one of North America's last frontiers, and a newly opened mission field for the Seventh-day Adventist church. For more than a decade isolated members have been staking out claims for the heavenly King, and now it is time to work those claims. The church has designated the Yukon as one of the two special Frontier Evangelism projects to receive help from Sabbath School Investment in North America for 1978.

Of the fifteen to twenty thousand men who reached Dawson City in search of gold in 1898, one-third fled within six weeks. They were too late! They had come to claim their reward, only to find it claimed already.

At this time Dawson was the largest Canadian city west of Winnipeg. It boasted a telephone system, running water, steam heat and elaborate hotels, theaters, and dance halls where you could pay your bills with gold dust. But as suddenly as they came, 8,000 people left the Paris of the North, disappointed and emptyhanded. The rush was over.

For the church today, however, the rush is just beginning, and Dawson City is one of many outlying districts in the Yukon to which you can help bring the Three Angels' Messages.

The Yukon refuses to be thrown aside with wornout gold pans. Wilderness retreats, fantastic scenery, and business opportunities once again beckon men north. There are still gold nuggets here—men and women, boys and girls for whom Jesus died.

Now is the time to move forward with an outreach program. We need your help to pursue evangelistic methods that will bring the love of Jesus to the people of the Yukon.

We are so grateful for the small band of believers in Whitehorse and in other scattered areas. In numerous ways they are gallantly attempting to spread our beautiful message. Our people are entering into a number of seed-sowing, witnessing programs preparing for a major evangelistic crusade

in Whitehorse this year. We distributed 3,000 *Steps to Christ* last Christmas in the city. Immediate Bible studies resulted. One lady exclaimed, "I read this book many years ago, and have tried and tried to purchase another copy. It is a miracle that you brought it to me just now."

We have had wonderful openings. In January my husband received a phone call from the principal of the public junior high school requesting that he help in an anti-smoking program for the students on a regular basis. The school has given \$200 toward the purchase of temperance films for use in this program. With the added generosity of our Whitehorse members and the British Columbia Conference we have just now been able to purchase the whole set of temperance films for the Yukon Territory.

In the Yukon alcoholism is a serious problem. The Yukon Correctional Institute is crowded with those sentenced for impaired driving as well as other misdemeanors. To reach them our group was asked to conduct a worship service once a month in the prison. After the very first meeting several inmates expressed appreciation for the film, songs, and message. We want to continue with our present Prison Band, and hopefully begin a hospital Sunshine Band in the near future.

Our believers meet every Sabbath in a room available from the school. Faithful members such as the Tom Laws occasionally fly in to meet with us, coming 125 miles, sometimes in very cold weather. They, too are witnessing where they live at Ross River; there Tom is a heavy equipment mechanic.

We are eagerly looking forward to the visit of Maranatha Flights who are planning a building fly-in in June. Because of virtually endless daylight during that time of year, three shifts will rotate. Through wide press coverage the community of Whitehorse will be prepared for home calls by Maranatha members and the continuing effort of six student volunteers from Union College who plan to devote their summer months to visitation and Bible study.

Also, a beautiful dream has just come true. Thanks to Dr. Gary Kirk and other friends in Southern California the British Columbia Conference now operates a Cessna 180 in the expanding Yukon frontier. Days of travel can now be cut to short hours, and contacts can be made with isolated villages for visitation, Five-Day Plans, Vacation Bible Schools, and various types of witnessing. Your Investment will help us to keep our mission aviation program off the ground.

Of every Investment dollar raised for the Sabbath School twenty-five cents will be set aside for Frontier Evangelism and large city evangelism. The North American portion of these funds gathered during 1978 will be equally divided between new work in the Yukon and the needs among the Appalachian mountain people.

The Yukon River is called the River of Gold. Let us all invest heavily to transport weary, anxious men from the shores of the River of Gold to the banks of the River of Life. Let us sacrifice to see discouraged, disappointed wanderers walk with joy to the stream and drink of its pure waters.

Changes in Personnel at Canadian Union College

A number of personnel changes are taking place at Canadian Union College in preparation for the 1978-79 school year. Up to now, ten individuals have accepted calls to work at C.U.C. or to assume new positions on campus.

Dr. Lynn Callender will be the Vice-president for Academic Affairs. He received his B.Th. Degree from Walla Walla College in 1945, his M.Ed. from Temple University in Philadelphia in 1958, and his Ed.D. from Arizona State University in 1968. Dr. Callender began his career teaching in grades 5-8 at Boise Seventh-day Adventist School and then served at Gem State Academy, Sandia View Academy, Pacific Union College, Thunderbird Academy, and Walla Walla College before joining the faculty of Eastern Washington State University.

Miss Karen Clayton will be the women's Physical Education Instructor. She received her B.A. in Physical Education from W.W.C. in June, 1978. She has had experience as a swimming instructor and as a day-camp coordinator.

Mr. Nyren Compton will be the Assistant Dean of Men and Coach of the C.U.C. Olympix Gymnastic Team. He received his B.A. in Theology from C.U.C. in May, 1978.

Elder Douglas Devnich will be joining the Theology Department. He has a B.A. in Theology from C.U.C. in 1963, an M.A. in Religious Education from Andrews University in 1964, and expects to defend his doctoral dissertation this summer and receive the Ed.D. in Religious Education from A.U. in August. Elder Devnich has been pastor of the Lacombe church for the past two years and has also worked in the Saskatchewan Conference, in California as youth pastor of the La Sierra church, in Alberta as pastor of the Calgary church, and in the Kansas Conference before returning to Alberta.

Dr. William Hughes will be joining the faculty as an Instructor in Biology. He received his Ph.D. in Biology from Loma Linda University in June, 1978, an M.A. in Biology from P.U.C. in 1974, and a B.A. from L.L.U. in 1973. Dr. Hughes has served as an instructor of extension courses for L.L.U. in field paleontology and paleoecology and has held teaching and research assistantships while at L.L.U.

Mr. Ralph Janes will be Registrar and Chairman of the High School Division. He received a B.A. in Business Administra-

tion from Atlantic Union College in 1960 and an M.A. in School Administration from A.U. in 1972. He has worked as principal of Pontiac Junior Academy in Michigan, Schaber Memorial Junior Academy in New Brunswick, and Toronto Junior Academy, and as Treasurer and Educational Superintendent of the Newfoundland Conference. His wife will also be teaching in the high school.

Miss Beverly Matiko will be an Instructor in English and Speech. She received a B.A. with major in English and Communications from A.U. in 1977 and an M.A. in English from A.U. in June, 1978.

Mr. Bernard Skoretz will become the Accountant for C.U.C. He has a B.S. in Business Administration and Religion from Union College in 1962. He has worked for the Home Health Education Office in Oshawa, at the Book and Bible House in the Manitoba-Saskatchewan Conference, and as administrator for the conference-owned nursing homes in Winnipeg.

Miss Caroline Wiebe will become the Assistant Dean of Women. She received an M.A. in Guidance and Counseling from A.U. in 1977. She has been teaching church school in Oliver, B.C. and has also worked for the Province of Manitoba in social work.

George Vandeman Receives Doctorate

George Edward Vandeman received an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Andrews University at the June 4, commencement. He has been the speaker on the *It Is Written* TV program for more than 20 years.

Also receiving honorary doctorates from Andrews University were Josephine Cunningham Edwards for "her dedication to Christian missions. . .the inspiration as a speaker and writer she has given to thousands" and Charles E. Bradford in recognition of his "contributions to church leadership. . .and dedication to evangelism".

Vandeman's ministerial career began in the Indiana Conference as an evangelist in 1938. He received his B.A. at Emmanuel Missionary College in 1942; his M.A. in speech from Michigan University in 1946. In 1943 he began to teach in the Theology Department at Emmanuel Missionary College.

Vandeman served in the Ministerial

Department of the General Conference from 1948-1952, then established the New Gallery Center in London, England and was its director for 2½ years.

The *It Is Written* TV program is seen on 60 stations in the U.S., 23 in Canada, 24 in Australia and Bermuda. Many of his scripts have been translated into French by Georges Hermans in Montreal, Quebec. Georges Hermans does the same program in French, called *Il Est Ecrit*.

Vandeman has written many books, such as *A Day to Remember*, *Planet in Rebellion*. Total circulation of his books exceeds five million.

Vandeman and George Knowles launched a new type of follow-up in 1975. This was the Revelation Seminar. This intensive Bible study program has become popular. More than 180 seminars have been conducted with approximately 160,000 people in attendance.

Vandeman is beginning another round of Seminars in September which will

include Canada. This time he will be in Yellowknife September 28, Victoria, B.C. September 30, Vancouver, October 1, Prince George October 3, Kelowna October 5.

I would urge you to plan to bring a friend to these seminars if you live within driving distance. You and your friends will be thrilled.

Sixteen students were awarded degrees during the 71st graduation exercises of Canadian Union College. Dr. Delmer Holbrook, President of Home Study Institute, was the commencement speaker. Mr. Jack Cookson, MLA from the Lacombe area, spoke briefly to the audience and brought greetings from Premier Lougheed and news of current developments concerning C.U.C.'s request for degree-granting status. He indicated that it was being considered individually by all the members in the Legislative Assembly and final word should be available before the next college graduation.

Eight of the graduates received their degrees in religion and of these six have accepted calls to work in the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada. The remaining members of the graduating class will be continuing their education at other institutions. Two of the religion graduates will be pursuing post-graduate degrees. Ontario School Evaluation

In May, 1978, under the direction of George Unger, superintendent of schools, three Ontario schools were evaluated—Toronto Junior Academy, College Park Elementary and Grandview S.D.A. School (Hamilton) which is also a junior academy. To our knowledge, these were the first schools ever to be evaluated in the Ontario Conference. The program was a learning experience for the schools' staff, the boards, and the members of the visiting committees.

Toronto Junior Academy, with an enrollment of over 300 students, is the largest junior academy operated by the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada. It is supported by numerous churches in the Metro Toronto area. The Greater Toronto Seventh-day Adventist School Board, chaired by Brother Frank Juriansz, is responsible for the operations of T.J.A. as well as three fast-growing elementary schools. More elementary schools are anticipated in the future.

The College Park Elementary school serves the churches of the Oshawa area. It is one of our larger elementary schools in Canada and has an enrollment of over 170 students. In the past, the school has been active in sending S.D.A. magazines to Africa. The school's mission project has now expanded and soon the principal, Mr. Robert Prouty, and his family, will also be sent to Africa.

The Grandview school, serving the churches in the Hamilton area, has increased considerably in enrollment in the past few years. Grade 10 has been added at the beginning of this school year, 1977-78. Classes are presently being held in a rented public school which is situated on the outskirts of the city. Students have taken an active part in the churches' witnessing programs. One grade 8 stu-

Health Ministry – “Eating – The Supreme Test”

G. D. Strunk, *Director Adventist Health Ministries*

We can overcome any other problem in our life if we can control appetite, because:

1. We must exercise moderation rather than abstinence with regard to food. This requires control.
2. The bonds of habit, culture and pleasure are stronger than principle to many minds.

A habit is hard to break because it takes so little energy of mind and will to follow a habit. It takes exertion of energy to make a decision. Example: It is easier to put the margarine, mayonnaise with all their fat calories on the table than it is to decide to leave them in the refrigerator.

We are fearful of being different.

Much eating is done more for pleasure than for health or sanctification. If spreads, dressings, treats, desserts, flavorings, and even entrees are chosen more on taste than on nourishment and health then it is time to adopt a more noble standard for our bodies.

Our bodies deserve the best. Satan sees

to it that society does not promote the best. The vast array of candy counters, ice cream stands, smoke shops, convenience foods, late evening dining restaurants, hamburger quick stops, as well as counter after counter in the super market which an Adventist must pass by are testimony that we must war against powers of darkness even as we seek our daily bread.

3. Others use food instead of exercise as a tranquilizer when they are tense. At the same time it becomes a temporary stimulant like coffee to whip up exhausted nerves. Food is used in place of a cigaret to stimulate the system yet providing it an “apparent” calm.
4. Food is used as security. It brings reminiscence of mother who fed us when we cried as an infant. And in our insecure world we grasp for food even running to get in line to be sure we get ours rather than trusting that God will provide for our needs.
5. Others use food as a weapon, gorging and even fattening themselves to spite

parents or spouse, while others use food as love, letting it be the reward for good deeds done, or letting it be medicine for the little child who scraped his knee rather than a kiss or tender touch.

Food is powerful! It is used to fatten livestock for slaughter and mankind for the same. Yet it can be used to minister health, healing and happiness when used wisely and sparingly. It is designed to taste delicious with natural flavors so subtle and tantalizing as to defy description with earthly vocabulary. No wonder those who learn to control their appetite can overcome every other sin problem.

And no wonder that God has provided Divine power to reinforce our decisions and the exertion of our own will in resisting the old ways and adopting the better ways of eating. This is not something He will do for us. This is a privilege He had left for us to do for ourselves with His aid. (See *Counsels on Diet and Foods*, pg. 32).

Policies on Admission to C.U.C.— Cont. from p. 3

Transfer Students: Students who have attended other accredited post-secondary institutions may be admitted to regular standing if general admission requirements to this college are met, and if a minimum average scholarship record of C has been achieved on all college work attempted.

Conditional Students: Applicants may be granted conditional admission if they lack no more than two subjects for obtaining a high school diploma (in the case of applicants to the B.Th. programs only) or for obtaining high school matriculation standing. Such students will be permitted to take a partial college load while concurrently making up the high school deficiency. Admission is regularized upon successful removal of deficiencies.

Admission from Ontario Grade 12 (Year 4): Although most students enter a university in Ontario from Grade 13 (Year 5) outstanding Grade 12 (Year 4) of Phase 5 students may be considered for selective admission on the following criteria:

1. Secondary School Graduation Diploma (Grade 12—Year 4) completed with high academic standing (normally an overall average of at least 80% or the equivalent, with no mark less than 75% or the equivalent. (The inclusion of two Year 5 credits achieved simultaneously with the completion of Year 4 with similar high academic standing is advantageous).
2. Fulfillment of the prerequisites for courses and programs in which the student wishes to enroll. For e.g. credit in BIO 450 is pre-requisite for university courses in Biology as credit in CHO 450 for the first-year university course in Chemistry, etc. Please note that credit in Mathematics

at Year 5 level (MAF 550) is strongly recommended for students entering Chemistry or Physics and required for students entering Mathematics.

3. Obtain a recommendation from the school attended,

Year 4 students offered admission on the above basis take the same first-year university courses as all freshmen, and there are no preliminary courses given.

Advanced Standing

From Another College or University. Advanced standing may be granted to applicants for admission who have completed some university work at another recognized college or university with a minimum mark of 66% (C grade). Advanced standing is used to reduce the length of the program the student will take at Canadian Union College. The granting of such credit shall be subject to the following additional provisions.

- (a) Credit will not be allowed for any course completed in fulfillment of the basic requirements for university admission. Credit may be allowed for any additional courses completed concurrently.
- (b) Credit transferred from another college or university is evaluated and accepted only after the student has successfully completed a minimum of 12 semester credits at Canadian Union College.

From Ontario Grade 13 (year 5). For Application towards the B.Th. degree programs only, students completing the Ontario Grade 13 (Year 5) Honors Graduation Diploma may be granted up to 32 (thirty-two) semester hours for appropriate Year 5 Phase 5 credits presented with a mark of 66% or

better. Credits so granted will be applied towards general or elective requirements for graduation, *but not towards major or minor requirements.*

Credit by Special Assessment. Although no advanced standing for Ontario Grade 13 (Year 5) credits are granted in the form of university credits for application towards undergraduate degree requirements by universities in Canada, some do allow students to seek credit in certain specified courses without actually registering in and taking courses, if they can demonstrate an acceptable level of mastery of the course content. The procedures whereby a student seeks credit in a course by this non-traditional route is known as *Credit by Special Assessment.*

Departments at Canadian Union College in consultation with the Academic Dean determine which, if any, of their course credits may be earned by special assessment, and the conditions a student must satisfy in order to have his application approved. Students with Ontario Grade 13 credits and others who wish to seek credit by assessment should direct

their applications for such privileges to the academic Dean.

Deferred Advanced Standing.

Some colleges and universities in the United States (e.g. Andrews University) grant a limited number of credits in advanced standing for Ontario Grade 13 (Year 5) credits presented. Students with these credits who find it necessary or desirable to transfer to these institutions after having completed a year or two of the undergraduate program at C.U.C. may, while transferring university credits earned at C.U.C., request and receive from the receiving institution advanced standing for Grade 13 credits retroactively. This may be done in accordance with their current policies provided no duplication is involved.

On the basis of the admissions policy and the length of Canadian undergraduate degree programs described above, the chart which follows gives a comparison of the number of years required to complete an undergraduate degree in Canada and at Andrews University upon admission and following completion of Ontario Grade 13 (Year 5) studies:

Adventist Editors Meet To Sharpen Their Pencils

The ten union paper editors in North America were among the 40 editors who met recently in Colorado to exchange their views on many editorial subjects.

The four-day convention (May 30 to June 3), sponsored by the General Conference Publishing Department, brought together the managers of all three publishing houses, their book editors, and the editors of the ten well-known church-produced magazines—*Listen, Life and Health, Signs, Liberty, These Times, Message, Guide, Ministry, Insight*, and the *Adventist Review*.

Attention was focused on the technical aspects of producing more attractive publications, the relationship between author and editor, as well as how to capture the reader's eye of today's media-besieged society.

The delegates were housed at Glacier View Ranch, at the 9500 ft. level where snow fell twice during the council. The daily schedule found the participants listening to position papers which outlined an editor's professionalism, and suggestions why he should broaden his background information subjectwise. One panel discussion emphasized how to reach minority groups. Specific workshops and select groups huddled daily to unify their respective editorial fellowships.

The sessions's special guest was Mr. Ric Cox, senior editor of the *Reader's Digest*. Mr. Cox took the group step by step through the condensing process—a skill applied to articles taken from other magazines the *Digest* plans to publish in its own.

Earlier, all had been given a copy of Kitty O'Neil's life story—The Fastest Woman on Earth—as printed originally in the *Saturday Evening Post*. In removing at least 250 lines from that article, the Adventist editors were attempting to pack the most information into the shortest possible space—the predominate objective of the *Digest*.

The last time these church editors held a similar session was in 1974. However, the need to sharpen one's writing skill, produce better books, and upgrade the church's missionary journals, may bring the group together on an annual basis, hereafter.
