




First tree at CUC, 1916



The Alberta Legislative Assembly is in the final stages of consideration of C.U.C.'s petition for independent degree granting status. According to Dr. Hohol, Alberta's Minister of Advanced Education, the government considers C.U.C.'s request "one of our department's top priority items".

We're excited! Our campus is reflecting that future. Our recently completed Physical-Fitness Complex is just one of our current changes. The new campus master plan is awaiting approval from the regional planning commission.

SENIOR COLLEGE STATUS REPORT

- 1. Board action at Blackstrap, Sask. to establish a senior college at College Heights, April, 1975.
- Preliminary proposal submitted to Dr. A. E. Hohol, Minister of Advanced Education, November, 1975.
- Dr. Hohol visits Loma Linda University and Pacific Union College as part of SDA college system study, July, 1976.
- 4. Dr. Neal Clark, Director of College Programs, Alberta Advanced Education appointed by Dr. Hohol to assist CUC in preparing petition, October, 1976.
- 5. December, 1977, final petition submitted to Minister.
- 6. Government Caucus Education Committee visits CUC, April 4, 1978.
- During question period in House, April 12, 1978, Dr. Hohol says degree-granting status for CUC is one of half-dozen top priorities for this legislative session.
- 8. Jack Cookson, Member of Legislative Assembly, during Commencement, May 21, 1978, reports that Assembly will take action on the petition probably during the fall session and certainly no later than the spring session.

The Committee of 100 is a group of CUC supporters who have pledged to contribute \$500 a year for a minimum period of three years.

The purpose of the Committee of 100, which was organized in 1973, is to help in planning and promoting the development of the college, to provide scholarships, to assist in building physical facilities, and to develop industries for student labor.

The most recent involvement of the Committee of 100 has been on the Physical-Fitness Complex. Of the nearly \$800,000 required so far to build and equip the complex, nearly \$500,000 have been arranged for or contributed by the committee.


