Robert H. Pierson Resigns Neal C. Wilson Elected President Of The General Conference

Robert H. Pierson resigned Monday, October 16 during the 1978 Annual Council in Washington, D.C. He stated that this was done for health reasons on the advice of his doctors.

Elder Pierson has served the church for many years in North America, India, Inter-America and Trans-Africa, prior to his election in 1966 as General Conference President of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

On October 17, Neal C. Wilson, Vice President, North American Division was chosen to lead the world church as President of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

Elder Wilson received his education at Vincent Hill School, India, Pacific Union College, California and the Theological Seminary, Andrews University, Michigan.

In Poona, India he began his denominational service as an accountant and he has served in various capacities in India as well as the Middle East Division. In 1959 Elder Wilson returned to North America and after two years in the Central California Conference, he joined the Columbia Union as Departmental Secretary and then as President. Since 1966 Elder Wilson has served as General Conference Vice-President for North America.

His book *Return of the Jews* has been used extensively by the Arab League throughout the Middle East and while there he negotiated to open the Adventist work in several areas.

Elder Wilson and his wife Elinor (nee Neumann) have two children, Norman and Shirley (Mrs. John Anderson).

At the close of the devotional message presented by J. R. Spangler to Annual Council delegates, Monday morning, October 16, Robert H. Pierson announced that after prayerful consideration he had decided to accept the advice of physicians to give up his work as president of the General Conference. As might be expected, the audience was shocked. Few had known that during the past year Elder Pierson had been subject to transient ischemic attacks when under extraordinary pressure. During the attacks numbness developed on his left side. Doctors warned that unless he was relieved of his responsibilities, the risk of a stroke would be high.

After announcing his decision to retire, Elder Pierson made a solemn appeal to church leaders and members, urging that they do all in their power to maintain the distinctiveness of the Advent Movement and resist the trend toward worldliness in the church.

Elder Pierson's message to the council

There come times in our experience when we have to make decisions that we would prefer not to make—decisions that cut deep into one's heart and that have far-reaching effects. Last Sabbath morning before we went to Sabbath school,

after much prayer and agonizing, Mrs. Pierson and I made such a decision.

Eight years of service in emerging, exploding Africa with all of its pressures and perplexities and 12-and-one-half years of happy, but problem- and stress-filled, years in Washington have taken their toll. Our physicians tell us we must shift our burdens to younger shoulders. We had hoped we could complete our term of service in 1980 at Dallas, but apparently the Lord has other plans for us and for the church. In harmony with medical counsel we plan to leave Washington for a few weeks' rest and then retire January 3, 1979. We are sorry not to be

able to fill some appointments we had looked forward to filling, but arrangements will be made to care for these.

As soon as we understood what the future held I spoke with Elder Franz and Elder Emmerson. Last evening I had the vice-presidents of the General Conference and the division presidents with me, and I conveyed to them the decision of the doctors.

It's harvest time, brethren, and it's 1,000 (baptisms)-a-day time.

This has not been an easy decision for Mrs. Pierson and me to make. We love our work. We love the Advent workers and members around the world. Every one of you is precious to us. I want to express my deepest appreciation to all of you—world leaders and General Conference office staff alike—for all that you have done to make 12-and-a-half wonderful years for Mrs. Pierson and me here in Washington and around the world where we have traveled. You have been an inspiration and an encouragement to both of us.

This is not goodbye this morning. We will be with you for a few more weeks. In the meantime, let us go right ahead with our work as usual. There is yet much to be done at this Annual Council. We have no time to lose. We have a work to finish, a work of preparation to be effected in every life in preparation for the return of our Lord—in our day! Yes, brethren and sisters, it *must* be in our day!

My pen, my voice, as long as God gives me strength, will be dedicated to this one all-consuming passion! We solicit an interest in your prayers, and may God bless and keep every one of you.

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Thoughts On Church Schools

Each week we hear mission reports of struggles overseas to open schools, to keep them open and to adequately equip them. We hear of students who suffer persecution to go to our schools, who spend everything they have to be able to go. We praise the Lord that these schools are able to keep going because we know that many souls are won to the Lord through them. We believe in this great work of education.

Why then, why, are 50% of S.D.A. children in public schools? Why, when we recognize that Christian education saves souls? We recognize that Christian education overseas is very necessary and right, but what about here at home as well?

I'm sure you've heard the gamut of excuses given by many for not sending their children to church schools. Three of these reasons are: (1) Public schools give a better level of education. (2) "I went to public school and it didn't hurt me a bit." (3) It's a strengthening experience to be an example to the world.

Do public schools give a better level of education? No. I have taught in both the public school and the church school and the answer is no, academically. Of course, we mustn't forget that true education is the harmonious development of the physical, mental and spiritual powers, not just the mental.** The public school does develop these three powers; but is the spiritual power developed in quite the way most S.D.A. parents would like?

Another argument often heard is, "I went to public school and it didn't hurt me a bit". The speaker may well be a pillar of the S.D.A. church, so what is the answer to this argument? We could say very quickly that while it may not have hurt, it certainly didn't help. The child who goes to public school misses the experience of being taught with Christian and particularly S.D.A. ideals intertwined with all aspects of his school life, not just in religion classes. But I doubt very much if the child you send to public school will escape unscathed. Harm in the public school does not always take the form of alcohol, drugs, and promiscuity. There are many subtler forms as well. What about the personable young teacher your child admires so much? One day his teacher, his example, casually says, "How could any intelligent person believe in creation?" Or maybe it's the total lack of social life. Your child twiddles his thumbs while his pals go to Thursday night movies, Friday night pajama parties and Saturday night dances. He can't even discuss the Saturday morning cartoons with his friends. Where does your child learn how to mingle with ease in a social setting with his peers?

Now let us turn for a moment to some of the more sensational aspects of public school life. The public school of yesteryear, with respect and discipline an integral part, is not always so easily found these days. As a teacher in a public school classroom here in Canada, I have been sworn at. I have had a twelve-year-old girl sob to me that her former boyfriend was telling other boys that she slept around. A friend of mine told me of her experiences in an Ontario high school within the last ten years. She personally held the heads of students nauseated by drugs in school washrooms and wondered each day if her locker would be used as a safe storage place for drugs despite her constant refusals. Are these the kind of companions you want for your child?

"It's a strengthening experience to be an example to the world." Really? Do you as a grown adult tend to frequent areas where your lifestyle and beliefs are constantly under attack? Don't you try to find people who are sympathetic to your ideals for your companions? And yet some would send their child to a place where their religious beliefs may often be ridiculed, where their dress and deportment may set them miserably apart. Ellen G. White didn't believe it was a strengthening experience, for she wrote, "Let the youth who are forming character be kept away from places where they would have to mingle with a great company of unbelievers."-*Testimonies* Vol. 8 p. 225. She further writes that parents cannot always expect to keep their children in the faith only by living a godly life at home. "Whether or not our youth who have received wise instruction and training from godly parents will continue to be sanctified through the truth depends largely upon the influence that, after leaving their homes, they meet among those to whom they look for Christian instruction." *Testimonies* Vol. 8 p. 226.

What do you want for your child? Would you like to have your child taught by teachers who believe as you do in the great God of the universe and His Son, the Saviour of the world? To have companions who live not for the current rock group but for Jesus Christ? To not have to worry about a little something slipped into his chocolate milk or whether this year's track meet will be held on Saturday or not?

True education is the harmonious development of the spiritual, physical and mental powers. Your child will get an education in all three at the public school, too, but will it be exactly what you had in mind? The education we do our best to obtain for children in the mission field is also needed for our children.

Health Ministry – “Taste of Nature”

Many church members have said, “We would like to put on a cooking school but we don’t know how”.

It was to meet that kind of need that the “Taste of Nature Cooking School Manual” was developed. It is complete with organization instructions, complete lectures, recipes, devotional and public relations materials and participant magazines to hand out to the people. So, even if a person has never done a cooking school before, he should be able to do so by following the instructions.

The new manual is not written to replace cooking schools already in process, although it may certainly supplement programs that have already been created by courageous individuals. After having followed this manual a few times some persons will be able to write their

own. “Taste of Nature” has six complete programs, so it does not exhaust the topic of vegetarian cooking. Eventually there will be six more. These six can be offered over and over again without fear of repetition to the community. Instructor’s Kits are available through either your Conference health secretary or through Concerned Communications, Box 700, Arroyo Grande, California 93420.

A word about cooking schools. Our own church members need them. But it is usually more successful to present a program for the community and the church at the same time.

A cooking school should not be an expense to the local church. A reasonable charge of \$10.00 per family covers the cost of the Instructor’s Kit plus handout materials and samples. A registration fee

helps people appreciate the value of what they are receiving, and charging per family rather than per person encourages husbands and children to come also. We are ministering to the whole family. “Cooking schools should be established, and house-to-house instruction should be given in the art of cooking wholesome food.” *Testimonies* Vol. 9, p. 161.

The lecture material and the recipes are in harmony with the nutrition goals of Canada and the recently recommended U.S. dietary goals, as well as the Spirit of Prophecy. Care has been taken to give to the public food preparations that truly help to prevent heart disease, cancer and other degenerative diseases while at the same time being practical, convenient and economical. It is important, however, that recipes be read and followed to preserve this integrity.

The first one they had was in Yellowknife on September 28, at which 30 people were present. Report From The Radio, Television and Film Center

North American Broadcasters Visit Adventist Media Center

Lonnie Melashenko To Appear on *It Is Written*

Adding a stimulating new dimension to the *It Is Written* international telecast, with George Vandeman as speaker/director, Lonnie Melashenko, associate director of *It Is Written*, will appear on the program in a supportive role.

Beginning with the production of twelve new programs in August, Melashenko is making the book and gift offers, formerly made by Elder Vandeman, at the close of each program.

According to David L. Jones, production manager of the *It Is Written* telecast, the program is now covering 45% of television homes in the United States, 50% of Canadian television homes, and 80% of Australian television homes, potentially covering about 40 million television homes on a worldwide basis, as of September 25.

"Plans are soon to be unveiled," reports Elder Vandeman, "for what we hope can be the complete saturation of all North America."

An average of 28 to 38 new programs are produced yearly. The next production period is slated for late November when an additional twelve programs will be videotaped.

They toured the three buildings now completed of the proposed five-building complex and observed different phases of radio and television productions.

Divided into small groups, each section was led by an experienced tour guide, and as each group visited the production studio, Pastor Vandeman told them of the *It Is Written* telecast, its history, plans for the future, and soul-winning results.

New Medical Program Seeks Applicants

LOMA LINDA — The first year of a physician's assistant training program is now under way at Loma Linda University, and already they are looking for new applicants for the 79-80 school year beginning in June.

The concept of physician's assistants grew from the 1960's when soldiers with medic training from the Vietnam war returned home. It was felt by some that their medical training shouldn't be wasted, so some of them were put to work assisting doctors around the country. The idea spread and soon insitutions were training people specifically for this task.

As the occupation is currently practiced, physician's assistants are expected to improve physicians' services by performing time consuming medical tasks, tradionally performed by licensed physicians. Each physician's assistant's tasks vary, but almost all include taking detailed medical histories, performing complete physical examinations, and perform-

ing, or else assisting in routine laboratory and screening techniques.

They are also expected to perform routine therapeutic procedures such as injections, immunizations and sutures on superficial wounds. Depending on the setting, they may instruct and counsel patients or assist the physicians in a hospital setting.

Applicants must have completed college courses in biology, chemistry, microbiology, physics, mathematics, anatomy and physiology, sociology, and psychology. A minimum of 96 quarter hours from an accredited two or four year college and a minimum of 2000 hours direct patient care experience, as well as acceptable SAT test scores are also required.

CRBF Representative Interviewed on Radio

As a result of what he terms "uncommitted service", a special representative of the Christian Record Braille Foundation (CRBF) to New York City, was recently interviewed on In Touch Networks, the first full-time radio reading and information service for the blind and handicapped in metropolitan New York.

This past summer Pastor William M. Moors, the special CRBF representative to New York City who is affiliated with Metro Ministries, learned about In Touch Networks and volunteered to read for them as his schedule allowed.

Because he was willing to read for the network without any obligation on their part to publicize the CRBF, the manager invited Moors to be interviewed on the closed-circuit network. The interview was subsequently broadcast over two commercial radio stations.

When he first volunteered to read, he told the manager he was an Adventist minister.

"What do you expect us to do for you if you read for us?" queried the manager.

"Absolutely nothing," Moors replied.

"That's the strongest persuasion of

all," said the manager who then asked Moors for the interview.

During the half-hour interview, Moors told the listeners about the free services offered by the CRBF which include secular and sacred literature and records, and summer camps. He also shared his philosophy of dealing with blind persons.

"I told them that sighted persons have to realize that blind persons are human beings too, and should be treated the same as everybody else keeping in mind the heavy emotional trauma of blindness," Moors says.

Pointing out the difference between the other agencies for the blind in New York City and the CRBF, Moors emphasized his round-the-clock availability to make personal visitations.

Several blind persons who listened to the interview contacted Moors, and In Touch Networks has discussed the possibility of broadcasting a weekly talk show hosted by Moors which would deal with the everyday problems faced by the estimated 100,000 blind and visually handicapped persons living in the nation's largest city.

Dental Students Lend a Hand

LOMA LINDA—What could have been two weeks of "fun in the sun" or a chance to earn some money, was instead an opportunity for 45 students from the Loma Linda University School of Dentistry's class of 1980 to give of themselves.

These students donated two weeks of a five-week summer break to help build a church in the southern California community of Vista, where a group of Samoan believers were renting a Methodist church.

Wiggs Wake, an Adventist architect from Ventura, drew up plans, including a sanctuary to seat 280, five Sabbath School rooms, a church office, and a baptistry. The complex covers 8,000 feet.

Meanwhile, in Loma Linda last winter, three Class of 1980 students began preparations for this summer's task. Mark Carpenter coordinated the activities. Jeff Bartley acted as contractor and Joe Wisniewski oversaw the electrical aspect of the construction. Together they were able to acquire building materials at reduced rates or as donations.

In June, work on the foundation and brick walls was begun. Although still in school, some students were able to break away and drive the hour and a half to Vista to help church members and professional masons in building the structural shell.

Workdays began at 6 a.m. and usually didn't end until 9 p.m. Church members pitched in during their free time, instructors from the School of Dentistry took

time off to help, and local conference administrators donated time as well.

Considered by local folks a unique way to build a church, reporters from several newspapers and television covered the project.

Because some of the dental students had never experienced working in construction, the class was divided by ability. Those with experience in particular areas of construction took on a number of inexperienced students and trained them.

By the end of the first week, they were practically pros, according to the student contractor.

By the end of the two-week period, the church was nearly completed. "It was more than just planning an outing or some other activity. They really had to work together to accomplish this. We may see more projects like this stemming from the School of Dentistry in the future," says Bob Sutton, faculty sponsor for the class. Scot Roskelley
