

Health Ministry — Eat It Raw Or Cook It?

I am frequently asked if the enzymes in plants are destroyed by cooking and should we not, therefore, eat our food raw in order to assimilate this "life" of the plant.

This question represents a misunderstanding of the nature of enzymes, their role and the process of digestion. I'm afraid that it also represents some misinformation that has been circulated by raw-foods promoters, in an effort to explain the "protective quality" of raw foods.

Every type of plant and animal manufactures its own unique enzymes that it will use by and within its own body. We do not eat enzymes in order to create our own enzymes.

Enzymes are simple to complex proteins within a plant or animal that facilitate necessary biochemical reactions at low temperatures. They serve as catalysts. But while the enzymes of plants play a vital role in the life and growth of the plant, when they are taken into our bodies they are treated like any other protein molecule ingested. They lose their identity as enzymes and are simply another form of protein. When they arrive in the stomach where they are attacked by the hydrochloric acid they are deactivated as an enzyme just as they are deactivated by cooking.

Therefore, so far as enzymes are concerned, it makes no difference whether they are cooked or eaten raw. They are simply part of the plant's total protein content.

As a matter of fact, most foods are more nutritious, more digestible and safer when properly cooked than when eaten raw. Nearly all the vitamins and minerals are locked within the cell walls. The cell walls are composed of cellulose. Cellulose is not digestible by human digestive systems. In order for the nutrition to be released, the cell wall must be ruptured through chewing, cooking or mechanically as in a blender. Because chewing is not as effective as cooking, cooked carrots may yield 70% more Vitamin A and other elements than raw carrots. Some fresh fruits cannot be tolerated by infants but when the fruit is cooked no ill effects appear.

There may be some benefits from eating raw foods, but it is easy to make some misleading assumptions. Some of the primary health benefits often overlooked are: 1) Many foods eaten raw are more filling than when cooked so that a person does not suffer the effects of overeating. 2) Raw foods usually require more chewing than cooked foods, again helping to prevent overeating and allowing time for salivary activity. 3) Oftentimes those who begin emphasizing raw foods in the diet are, at the same time, making many other changes that may contribute more to their improved health than the raw foods. The raw foods get the credit but properly prepared and eaten cooked foods, along with the other changes, might have produced the same or better results.

Incidentally, roasting nuts does not harden the oils. In order to harden or saturate or hydrogenate oils they must be heated in the presence of a catalyst such as nickel and have hydrogen bubbled into it. This does not occur in the roasting process.

Raw foods do provide a variety of flavor, texture and appetizing combinations and should not be discouraged in most normal diets.

And there is something more to ripe fruit plucked straight from the tree and eaten in all its freshness than just nutrition, as nutrition is usually defined. What could be better than a fully ripened Niagara peach straight from the tree, unless it was a second fully ripened Niagara peach straight from the tree.



A Church For Sherwood Park

The Seventh-day Adventist church in Sherwood Park Alberta is in the midst of one of the most significant undertakings in its two-year history. In early September ground was broken for a new church building. It is planned that the sanctuary will eventually accommodate a congregation of 250. As well provision is being made to accommodate the spiritual needs of the residents of the Sherwood Park Nursing Home which is immediately adjacent to the new church site. The plans call for an enclosed ramp to join the nursing home to the church.

The church congregation, which now numbers 40, is currently meeting in the nursing home. The adult Sabbath School and the Sabbath Morning Worship Services are conducted in the basement multi-purpose area. The childrens Sabbath School divisions meet throughout the institution. As you can well appreciate these settings are less than ideal. It is with genuine enthusiasm that the division leaders especially look forward to the new church.

The new building makes provision for a 1600 square foot fellowship area in the basement and adjacent to it is a multipurpose kitchen and Dorcas facility. In addition there are four large classrooms in the basement to accommodate the children's divisions.

The construction project is under the direction of Verne Langille, a well known Seventh-day Adventist contractor from the Maritimes. The construction has been somewhat hampered by the extremely wet weather that has been experienced in Alberta this fall but satisfactory progress is now being made. It is hoped that the building can be closed in before freeze-up so that interior finishing can continue during the winter. Occupancy is anticipated for early February 1979.

Community Services Van Registers 5,000 In Vancouver

During the summer months a concentrated nine-week program with the Community Services Van operating at major shopping and community centres in the Vancouver area was coordinated by Joan Harter, Director of the Health Education Centres, Vancouver Region. From August 19 — September 4 the Van was stationed on the Pacific National Exhibition grounds, serving the public daily except Sabbaths. In the fourteen working days 2,437 people registered.

"It was a privilege to be able not only to listen as many told me of their personal problems with drinking and smoking, but to be able to assist them with information as to where they could receive help," stated hostess Grace Pang, who is preparing to be a dental assistant on completion of her education.

On the last day of the Pacific National Exhibition over 300 registered. Over 150 spiritual guidelines were requested and thousands of pieces of literature were given out.

Cornerstone Laying At Kingsway Pioneer Home

It was an overcast dreary day for an outdoor ceremony, but just a few hours before the program was to begin the rain stopped and the sun even broke through the thick clouds for a few minutes at a time.

The occasion was the cornerstone laying ceremony for the Kingsway Pioneer Home for senior citizens in Oshawa on October 26, 1978.

Consisting of 80 self-contained units, 39 of the units will be bachelor quarters with a combination living/bedroom; while 41 of the units will be one bedroom suites.

For many years the members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Ontario have been working toward the realization of a senior citizens residence. The first action recorded on the minutes was that of November 13, 1966, which read, "To authorize R. A. Matthews and available members of the Executive Committee to make a study of the proposed Senior Citizens Residence and Nursing Home to be placed on the Kingsway College property near Townline Road."

After this study the attention of the committee turned toward establishing a Nursing Home in Oshawa. The many obstacles confronting the committee prevented further development at that time. In 1973 the committee asked Mr. Salt and Mr. Dinning, former Oshawa residents now owning and operating nursing homes in California, to give serious study to establishing a Senior Citizen's Residence.

On April 23, 1974, it was voted to approve sponsorship of a Senior Citizen's Residence in Oshawa.

Another committee was set up on March 30, 1975 to give further consideration to a home for senior citizens. The Senior Citizens' Residence was incorporated to become Kingsway Pioneer Home, Inc. The building committee under the chairmanship of Ray Matthews and support of the Ontario Conference of the Seventh-day Adventist Church, began working on the development of the present project in August of 1976.

Toronto Japanese Church Celebrates Tenth Anniversary

トロント日系セブンスデードベンチスト教会 就会十週年記念 祝賀会 1978年10月21日

On October 21, the tenth anniversary of the Toronto Japanese Seventh-day Adventist Church was held. Elder E. C. Beck's greetings from the conference were translated for the benefit of those who understood no English by Pastor Koei Aka. A number of musical selections were rendered and a history of the Toronto Japanese Seventh-day Adventist Church was given by Brother Hideo Okamura and is quoted below—

In fulfilment of the Words, "This gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations;. . . "the evangelistic work for Japanese Canadians was begun 42 years ago in 1936. Pastor Kumaji Inouye of the Seattle Japanese Seventh-day Adventist Church, who now is at rest with the hope of the Resurrection Morning, was called by the British Columbia Conference to start evangelistic work in the Vancouver area. In those days, the Seventh-day Adventist Church was not well known by the public, and as a result, the work was very hard. However, after about seven years of seed sowing 15 Japanese people were baptized into the Adventist Church.

In 1942, with the outbreak of the 2nd World War, all Canadians of Japanese ancestry living along the Pacific coast were ordered to voluntarily evacuate at least 100 miles from the coast or go to one of the Government relocation camps. At that time, many of the church members moved east to Ontario.

Because of this disruption, the Light of Truth seemed to dim for a while, but after the War, the Light regained its brightness. So, it was in 1950 that several people gathered together at the home of our church member residing on Bathurst St. and held Sabbath School during which they studied the Bible without the guidance of a pastor.

Some members from Hamilton joined this group, swelling the number. The private home became too small for meetings, so the group rented space in the Ukrainian Seventh-day Adventist Church on College Street in order to hold services on Sabbath afternoons.

In March, 1952, with the help of Pastor Ichiro Shimomura, a graduate of Emmanuel Missionary College, fullfledged evangelism was begun among Japanese Canadians. On August 9, that same year, the Toronto Japanese Seventh-day Adventist Church was organized with 16 charter members.

In February, 1955, Pastor Shigeru Aso of the Denver, Colorado, Japanese Seventh-day Adventist Church was called to hold an evangelistic series. He caused quite a sensation among the Japanese people in Toronto and was instrumental in a rich harvest of 15 souls at the end of the effort, doubling the membership. In August the same year, Pastor Aso started a radio program in Denver in the Japanese language called "The Good Tiding". This program was broadcast in Toronto and gained a substantial audience of Japanese listeners for eight years. In May, 1959, when Pastor Shimomura went to the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary for further study, Pastor Aso was called to take pastoral responsibilities. here. And the work continued strongly under his direction.

It was in August, 1967, that Pastor Aso accepted the call from the Chicago Japanese Seventh-day Adventist Church and was replaced by Pastor Hiroshi Shibata who came from Japan. Under Pastor Shibata's leadership, in 1968, the present church building was purchased from the Yugoslavian Seventh-day Adventist Church.

When five year pledges were honored by the end of 1972, the church was dedicated with happiness and joy on May 12, 1973, with the help of Elder Phillip Moores who was the Ontario Conference president.

In September, 1971, when Pastor Shibata took a leave of absence to study at Andrews University, his place was taken

Ontario — First Conference In North America To Reach One Million Dollars

During the past fiscal year from June, 1977 to June of this year, the Literature Evangelist team of the Ontario Conference passed another milestone in its experience. During that period of time the Ontario Conference was the first to deliver over one million dollars worth of literature in the North American Division. The exact total was \$1,288,871.89. Although the success of a Literature Evangelist program is often determined by the value of books sold, yet the true goal of the Literature Evangelist is to win souls for the kingdom of God. During this same period of time over one hundred souls were baptized into Christ and His Church through Literature Evangelist contacts.

The Literature Evangelist team in Ontario now numbers approximately 50 regular and part-time colporteurs. This number was swelled to over 150 as student literature evangelists took to the field for the summer. This courageous team of literature evangelists has undertaken the goal of delivering over one million dollars worth of literature during the current year of 1978. The figure now stands at over 850,000 dollars in sales. It





Family Life Workshop At Andrews University

The Family Life Workshop for 1978 met at Andrews University September 11 to 21. More than 100 people enrolled in the workshop which is jointly sponsored by the university and the Home and Family Service of the General Conference.

The sessions are designed to train people in the concepts and methods of organizing a church centred family life education program.

The workshops were begun at Andrews in 1975 by Drs. John and Millie Youngberg of the education department. Dr. Delmer Holbrook and his wife, Betty, from the General Conference joined them the following year.

Lectures, discussions, films and group projects are among the learning exercises employed in the sessions.

Noted Adventist author Reuben Hilde lectured on child training and discipline, while Andrews' Dr. R. C. Smith presented a discussion of trends in families and Loma Linda's Alberta Mazat discussed the different stages of a marriage.

The evangelical family life organization known as Family Concern was represented by Norman Stolpe and Larry

Simcox. An inter-denominational group, Family Concern, was founded by J. Allan Petersen.

Dr. Robert A. Williams, dean of Andrews' School of Graduate Studies, dealt with problems encountered in counseling. He said he has found no substitute for prayer in overcoming problems or in helping others to overcome theirs.

Other sessions covered such topics as parent-child relationships and family finance.

The Family Life Workshop has become one of the most successful special courses offered on the Andrews campus, according to Dr. Rudolf E. Klimes, director of special courses.

The number of participants in special courses during 1978 more than doubled when compared to the previous year, says Dr. Klimes. Almost 1,600 people enrolled in a seminar or workshop this year compared to less than 800 last year. More than 2,600 credit hours were taken on both undergraduate and graduate levels.

sure that she knew that he was a prophet for she was a Phoenician woman and quite likely was unacquainted with Israel's seer.

"The coming of Elijah on the very day when the widow feared that she must give up the struggle to sustain life, tested to the utmost her faith in the power of the living God to provide for her necessities. But even in her dire extremity, she bore witness to her faith by a compliance with the request of the stranger who was asking her to share her last morsel with him.

"No greater test of faith than this could have been required." *Prophets and Kings* p. 13.

Giving is synonymous with Christianity for it was giving that sent the Creator from heaven to become earth's Saviour. He gave His life for a degenerate, unrepentant and unthankful race.

"The plan of redemption was laid in sacrifice,—a sacrifice so broad and deep and high that it is immeasurable. Christ gave all for us, and those who receive Christ will be ready to sacrifice all for the sake of their Redeemer. The thought of His honor and glory will come before anything else.

"If we love Jesus, we shall love to live for Him, to present our thank offerings to Him, to labor for Him. The very labor will be light. For His sake we shall covet pain and toil and sacrifice. We shall sympathize with His longing for the salvation of men. We shall feel the same tender craving for souls that He has felt.

"This is the religion of Christ. Anything short of it is a deception." *Christian Service* p. 197.

Love for God and the sacrifice made by heaven in giving Jesus must motivate our stewardship.

Service rendered, or gifts offered that are not motivated by love are vain and unacceptable to God. Yet gifts of love that flow from the heart of the born again Christian rise like sweet incense to God's throne.

"By their good works, Christ's followers are to bring glory, not to themselves, but to Him through whose grace and power they have wrought. It is through the Holy Spirit that every good work is accomplished, and the Spirit is given to glorify, not the receiver but the Giver. When the light of Christ is shining in the soul, the lips will be filled with praise and thanksgiving to God." *Christian Service* pp. 195, 196.

Thankfulness begets stewardship and stewardship stimulates the spirit of thank-fulness.

We are approaching World Stewardship Day (December 9). As we reflect on God's mercies during the year that will soon close, let us reflect also on our stewardship and our commitment to our Creator and our thankfulness to God.




