While attending a Board meeting last August, a Scripture was quoted that took on new meaning for me. Though I had used the text, now somehow it made a more effective impression on me. Its message might also influence you, in fact it could well serve as a gem thought for the new year, so I share the text with you: "Looking for and hastening unto the coming of the day of God." II Peter 3:12, R.S.V. I wish every member of the church would accept this text as a personal motto or key thought for 1979.

Two words are prominent in our text - LOOKING and HASTENING. The word LOOKING implies eager anticipation, while hastening means fervently desiring and working toward achieving. Have you ever spent a day in total darkness? Perhaps a week? It is a difficult, trying experience, for you cannot come and go as you please, you cannot read, you cannot see anything - all is darkness. How pitiful that there are blind people all around us. To be spiritually blind is even more pathetic. How many there are who either will not or cannot look, when it comes to eternal matters. Our text challenges us to look to that which is the most important future event. The thought is that we should eagerly look for Jesus to come, as well as to do something to hasten His return. Inspiration tells us: "It is the privilege of every Christian not only to look for but to hasten the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." Christ's Object Lessons, p. 69.

All through the Bible we have God pictured as looking for man, endeavoring to win him back. Our text teaches that we, too, are to look. While there is much to attract our attention in these confused, uncertain times, one hope should keep us looking heavenward.

Here are a few startling examples of looking in the Bible:

 Genesis 3:6 — Eve looked and saw the forbidden fruit which was pleasant to her eyes. Her look led to transgression, which plunged the world into sin, misery and death.

- Genesis 19:26 Lot's wife "looked back", and she turned into a pillar of salt.
- 3. Luke 10:32 The Levite came, and looked at the wounded traveller, but walked by on the other side.
- 4. Hebrews 11:10 Abraham "looked for a city. . .whose builder and maker is God."
- 5. Luke 22:61 ". . .the Lord turned, and looked upon Peter."

There are some things we are admonished to look at, and not at others, for example:

- Philippians 2:4 "Look not every man on his own things."
 Hebrews 12:2 "Looking unto Jesus the author and
- Hebrews 12:2 "Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith."
- 3. Titus 2:13 "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of. . .our Saviour Jesus Christ."
- 4. Luke 21:28 "...look up...for your redemption draweth nigh."

It is now time for us to look for Jesus to return. However, notice this warning: "Many who profess to be looking for the speedy return of Christ are becoming conformed to this world.

.Many of these professed Christians dress, talk and act like the world. . .Their conversation is not in heaven, but on worldly things. . .The way to heaven is rugged. Briers and thorns are in the way; but we can with cheerfulness tread the rough pathway, knowing that Jesus the King of glory, once trod it before us." *Sons and Daughters of God*, p. 352.

After confessing and forsaking our sins we can eagerly await our Saviour's return, then devote ourselves to sharing the gospel. The King's business requireth haste. I Samuel 21:8, and "The great day of the Lord. . .hasteth greatly." Zephaniah 1:14.

May the New Year find us "looking for and hastening unto the coming of the day of God."

This Christmas and holiday season. . . May we be more concerned about:

- Being clothed in the Robe of Righteousness than, what shall I wear?
- Eating of "The Bread of Life" more than, what shall I eat?
- Drinking from "Springs of Living Water" more than, what shall I drink?

Then we shall have a blessed Christmas and a Happy New Year that will extend into

lasting happiness and God's great eternity.



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Church Growth in Canada

Evangelism explosion means church growth! We in Canada have seen our church grow but not as rapidly as we would like it to grow. During our Union Committee meeting in October much time was spent on how our work in Canada could be strengthened and expanded.

Growth objectives for our churches were voted, as follows:

1. To emphasize Revival and Reformation in all Sabbath services and prayer meetings during the month of December 1978.

2. To launch the Evangelistic Outreach for the year by holding a special New Year's Day program or a special day of prayer on Sabbath, January 6, 1979. (Suggested program included)

3. To insure that by the end of 1978 every church family will have a personal mission territory and launch into an active training and soul-winning program in 1979.

4. To provide assistance through the conference to each church to develop long-range Growth Objectives, to set goals and to make plans for each year commencing with 1979.

5. To set a Growth Objective which will challenge each church to win and hold members, and result in a minimum of 8% growth throughout the church in Canada.

6. To establish evaluation procedures in each conference to review the progress of each department and church in meeting its Growth Objectives.

7. To reduce to a minimum all special gatherings, councils, transfers of workers and building programs during 1979, thus making the maximum of time and money available for the winning of souls.

The next step after voting the objectives for 1979 was to study how these "Growth Objectives" could be reached! It was recommended that some of the suggestions which were made be printed in the MESSENGER so that each member in the Adventist family could be involved in implementing some of these methods in his or her church or territory.

The following are two suggested ways of implementing the Church Growth concepts; from the Ontario Ministerial Secretary, Elder Bornstein and the other from the Canadian Union Lay Activities Director, Lewis Shipowick.

From the Ontario Ministerial Secretary _

I. President

- a. Have a church growth seminar for worker's meeting.
 b. Distribute the book "Your Church Can Grow" by Peter Wagner.
- c. Have $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ hour plans conference with all pastors.
 - 1. Ask them to describe their church growth plans for the coming year with the Ministerial Secretary.
- d. Set a percentage growth goal for the conference.
- e. Continue to promote whenever possible.

11. Ministerial Secretary

- a. Cooperate in all the above as listed for president.
- b. Follow through after pastor's plan conferences.
- c. Have diagnostic clinics for all conference churches. III. Pastors
 - a. Evangelistic program for the church.
 - 1. Know where our converts come from.

- 2. Plan for results.
- 3. Train more people for evangelism.
- 4. Incorporate new converts into the church.
- 5. Utilize multiple channels of ministry.
- 6. Specialize what works best with my church.
- b. Set my own personal objective for the growth of my church and Sabbath School.
 - 1. Prepare preliminary plans.
- c. Discuss objectives and methods for growth with church board.
 - 1. Appoint sub committee to study.
 - 2. Appoint steering committee to direct and coordinate sub committee actions.
 - Develop a program through this mechanism for the growth in the church.
- d. Have a church growth Diagnostic Clinic.
 - Be sure that sub committee and steering committees are directed properly.
- e. Have church board meeting on church growth plans.
 - 1. Receive sub committee and steering committee recommendations to vote program.
 - 2. Vote to have a church business meeting to present board recommendations.
- f. Have church business meeting present board recommendations.
- g. Implement the program.

From the Lay Activities and Sabbath School Department-

- 1. Every family would have a mission territory.
- 2. Every member would have on-the-job training by Pastors, Elders, Literature Evangelists, etc.
- 3. Have goals for souls.
- 4. Each Sabbath School would be an evangelistic in-reach and out-reach unit with a band leader.
- 5. Give suggestive avenues of approach in mission territory for each month of the year.
- 6, Use V.B.S., Branch Sabbath Schools and Community Bible Hours for special outreaches for children.
- Have weekly reports of successful soul-winning encounters in the Sabbath School class and the most outstanding experience be shared with the entire church during the ten minute missionary service.
- 8. Plan for two reaping meetings yearly (fall and spring) one by the Pastor and the other by laymen.
- 9. The 11:00 a.m. service on the first Sabbath of the month be conducted by band leader (who may be an elder) and his evangelistic S.S. class.
- Encourage prospective and newly baptized members to become active witnesses for God with on-the-job training.
- Have an Interest Coordinator to gather all interests and in close co-operation with the Pastor and Lay Band leaders see that all interests are systematically followed up.
- 12. Make Ingathering one of the greatest outreach programs of the church by involving the total membership with the main Ingathering objectives kept in mind of contact with every home for Christ.

Suggested Outline For January 6, 1979– Day of Prayer and Fellowship

We should approach January 6th as a day of thanksgiving for past blessings and to ask and to seek the blessings of heaven on all of our activities for 1979.

Pastors should have a definite program to present to the whole church on January 6th. However, it would be well to involve your whole church (or at least your church officers) in the drawing up of this program.

In drawing up the program, we would suggest that time be given to a review of past achievements. Then we should launch into the plans and objectives for 1979 (and the future) to enable our churches to grow under the blessings of the Lord. We would further suggest that study be given by each church as to how to reach the 8% growth objectives as voted by the Union Committee and other objectives set by the local conference.

Enclosed is a suggested outline for January 6th. We have also included a suggested outline that could be followed on New Year's Eve.

9:30 Sabbath School divisions as usual with lesson study at the beginning of the program.

10:00-10:45 Children to come up into sanctuary to present a program similar to the 13th Sabbath program - only geared to evangelism. All lower divisions to participate. Reports on 1978 activities and blessings.

11:00-12:00	Lower divisions will have the eleven o'clock hour and present plans and objectives for 1979,	
	everything being centered around the 8% growth objective. (This would also be a good time to have church schools participate.)	
12:00-1:30	Agape Feast - Fellowship Dinner.	
1:30-2:30	Pastor & Elders to present their plans and objectives	
2:30-3:00	Review of past blessings	
3:00-3:15	Break – recess	
3:15-4:00	Commitments for 1979 program

Fasting

January 6 has been sanctified as a day of fasting for Seventh-day Adventists in preparation for this year's evangelistic thrust. In order to make such a day effectual we need to approach this practice intelligently.

There are some unacceptable reasons for fasting.

Fasting in Protest. (Hunger Strikes) This is merely an adult tantrum which presumes upon the mercy of the person being opposed. It is a passive resistance designed to infuriate sympathizers. It is wholly unchristian as a means to an end even if the end were honorable. Isaiah 58:4

To Lose Weight. Total abstinence from food over several days as a means of losing weight is unwise even though one may enjoy a state of euphoria in the process. Often more vital tissue of muscle, organs and connective tissue is lost than fat. Fat loss, not just weight loss, should be the objective. Too many die a sudden death when in a total fast to make it a wise procedure unless under medical supervision. It also does not teach one how to eat when food habits are resumed.

Self Mortification. To grovel in the dust degrades the image of God. Isaiah 58:3,5. Humility is to be obtained by beholding the beauty of Christ which does at once give to man a sense of his unworthiness while elevating him to the dignity of a son of God.

And there are some acceptable reasons for fasting.

Seeking For Light and Wisdom. "Fasting and fervent prayer to God have moved the Lord to unlock His treasures of truth to their understanding." *Testimonies*, Vol. 2, p. 650.

"When the time shall come, in the providence of God, for the world to be tested upon the truth for that time, minds will be exercised by His Spirit to search the Scriptures, even with fasting and with prayer, until link after link is searched out, and united in a perfect chain." *Testimonies*, Vol. 2, p. 292.

Please notice that fasting is for the purpose of supporting prayer and study. Wisdom does not automatically follow going without food.

Heart Cleansing and Confession. "Fasting and prayer ... are a means of cleansing the heart and promoting a receptive frame of mind." *Counsels on Diet and Foods*, pp. 187,188.

When Under Temptation. "When Christ was the most fiercely beset by temptation He ate nothing." *Testimonies*, Vol. 2, p. 202.

Overcoming Disease. "Intemperate eating is often the cause of sickness, and what nature most needs is to be relieved of the undue burden that has been placed upon her. In many cases of sickness, the very best remedy is for the patient to fast for a meal or two, that the overworked organs of digestion may have an opportunity to rest." *Counsels on Diet and Foods*, p. 189.



Developing Appetite for Plain Food. "They need not expect to relish at first food so different from that which they have been indulging themselves to eat. If they cannot at first enjoy plain food, they should fast until they can." *Counsels on Health*, p. 148, *Counsels on Diet and Foods*, p. 190.

Our bodies are designed to be healthy, holy, happy. It is usually what we put into them that makes them become unhealthy, unholy, and unhappy; improper food habits, improper thinking habits, and improper experiences. What the body needs is temporary relief from food and artificial stimulation and it will by its own recuperative ability become well.

With this foundation how best can we fast to make fasting profitable? There are many ways to legitimately fast. You choose that which is best for you.

Skip a Meal or Two or a Whole Day. However, one should *not* skip breakfast and dinner and then eat supper. This may be more harmful than no fasting at all. Even though some follow this practice routinely, it is not in their best interests for optimum health. If only one or two meals are to be missed it should be supper first and dinner second. Breakfast should be the last to go.

Fruit Diet For a Few Days. This we are told is especially helpful to brain workers. It may prove too cathartic for some to be practical. If you cannot stray far from the washroom you'd better find another form of fasting.

Abstemious Diet For 1–2 Months. "The true fasting which should be recommended to all, is abstinence from every stimulating kind of food, and the proper use of wholesome simple food, which God has provided in abundance." *Counsels on Diet and Foods*, p. 188.

This is a Daniel's fast. Those who regularly live like this will experience the least benefit from other fasting techniques because they are already living at a high level of diet management.

Abstinence From Food a Day or Two/Week is better then medicine to many. These days need not necessarily be in sequence. The elderly and the children should be careful not to carry total abstinence to an extreme.

Always With Water. A liberal use of warm water inside and outside is highly recommended when abstaining from food completely. It will help relieve hunger. Exercising will also relieve the feeling of hunger.

These principles may help you select the type of fast you wish to follow in preparation for January 6. Ever remember that simply going without food does not make us wiser, or nicer, or healthier, or closer to God unless we really want to be.



Adventist Radio Television Services Gets Green Light from Ontario Conference Committee

The Ontario Conference Committee made what could very well be one of the most significant historical decisions that has ever been made by that Committee at its meeting on November 19. The Committee gave the green light to the Adventist Radio-Television Service Board to proceed with the development of a fully equipped media centre for the Adventist Church in Ontario. This media centre would consist of a professional 2-camera color studio capable of producing video productions that would meet the highest specifications of television stations in Canada. It would also contain a top broadcast-quality audio studio capable of producing radio programs and master tapes for long playing records.

Many of our members, if not all, are aware of the present studio now operated in the Multi-lingual Centre (Portuguese Church) in downtown Toronto. In this studio many Portuguese and Italian programs have been produced to be aired on City Television. Hundreds of people have been baptized as a result of this telecast. One of the first converts was Isobel Santos. From the time of her conversion to Christ and union with the church she has been active in witnessing for Jesus. Her voice has been used in a wonderful way. Later, many of her family members were baptized and are now members of the Portuguese church.

Now, in Kitchener, approximately 50 Portuguese people are meeting together on Sabbath to study this wonderful truth. These people have been watching the Portuguese telecast by Pastor Henry Feyerabend every Sunday. Some of them have already begun to pay tithe, and have requested membership in the church. We are looking forward to the second Ontario Portuguese Church being organized in Kitchener early in 1979.

Elder Antonio Bueno has been the speaker on the Italian *Voice of Hope* broadcast on City TV for the last two years. This program too was produced in the facilities at the Portuguese Seventhday Adventist Church.

Presently, this studio has equipment valued at approximately \$250,000, however, in todays competitive television world, more sophisticated equipment is needed to do the job properly, and to make it possible for English television programs to be produced as well. In fact, such a media centre would have many uses, such as the continued preparation of ethnic telecasts and the production of English telecasts, national or local, with facilities available to Adventist broadcasters at low cost. This would make it possible for Adventist ministers from ethnic as well as English churches, to tape professionally produced television programs to be used on cable television systems in Ontario and all over Canada. The studio would also make it possible to produce effective advertising for our evangelists across Canada. The audio portion of the studio would be improved so that high quality radio programs could be prepared by our pastors. Public service announcements could be produced for television and radio. Many of these could be aired free of charge on larger television stations. There are many uses that such a studio could be put to. For this project additional funds will be needed. \$300,000 is needed to upgrade the existing facilities to the required specifications. Pastor Frank McMiller has been asked to work together with Elder Feyerabend to contact many of our members in Ontario and other parts of Canada and the United States to help raise the additional funds and make it possible for this studio to be equipped with first rate equipment over a period of five years.

There will be no public fund-raising campaigns for this project. Elder Feyerabend and Frank McMiller will be contacting Adventists and non-Adventists alike to invite them to become supporting members of the Adventist Radio and Television Service. If 500 people in Ontario, and 500 more across Canada and the United States would give just \$10.00 a month for five years the project would be a reality!

The Ontario Conference Administration feels that the constituency should be informed of the action of the Conference Committee so that when Elder Feyerabend or Frank McMiller contact you, you will have an understanding of the purpose of their visit. Elder Feyerabend will continue his strong evangelistic work among the Portuguese, as well as English people, while he works on developing this studio. The primary objective and purpose is to give the gospel of Jesus Christ to the thousands who would not hear except via television and radio. Have you ever wondered how we can reach the thousands who live in the high rise apartments of the large cities of our land? We believe that through television and radio it can be done! By having the facilities to produce these top quality programs at a cost that we can afford we will hasten the spreading of God's message.

ONTARIO LAY ADVISORY COUNCIL MEETS

Thirty-two lay advisory representatives met with administrative and departmental leaders on November 5 in the Kingsway College Chapel in Oshawa to discuss issues effecting church members in Ontario. Following a short devotional by Elder Beck, president of the Ontario Conference, the representatives were welcomed by Brother Basil van Dieman, chairman of the Lay Advisory Committee.

Departmental highlights were given and of special interest was the ministerial departments 10% growth objective for the conference and the 7 point strategic plan for its accomplishment. Church members in Ontario will be hearing more about this.

A number of actions were taken and these recommendations will be presented to the Conference Committee at their next regular meeting. The next Lay Advisory Council will be held on February 11, 1979.

What an Ingathering Experience!

The Bible study was set for 6:30 p.m. Monday, but no one answered as I knocked on the door. Thinking that they might be home soon I returned to my car to wait.

In the car I noticed a few extra Ingathering pamphlets and decided to do a few houses across the street while I waited for the Bible study. COMMUNITY SERVICES VAN BRINGS AID TO FLOODED TERRACE

Hundreds of people were driven out of their homes by severe flooding in the Terrace area. The flooding was a result of 8–10 inches of rain which fell in four days. This was amplified by the fact that the nearby mountain ranges had a very high freezing level, which produced a massive run-off, elevating the streams and gulleys far over their normal limits, washing out both the highway and railroad in many places.

One of the smaller rivers – the Nass, reached very high water levels and practically destroyed all the contents in the dwellings of the whole village.

The government flew food supplies into these isolated communities by helicopter. The only communication in most of the flooded areas was via radio and aircraft as both the rail and highway links were severed for almost one week.

The government estimated that approximately \$25,000,000.00 in damage was done. Included in this was the experience of 58 families in the Terrace area who were flooded out. When water comes up about 6 feet high in a home, there is not too much by way of clothing and soft goods that are salvageable. Current reports are that the Provincial and Federal government will reimburse the people for all damage suffered.

However, by the time the government reimburses the people, weeks will have gone by. It is in this breach that Seventhday Adventist Community Services enter.

The highway opened to traffic on Friday, and our Van went through the following day with materials for those flooded out.

In addition to the materials supplied by our Community Service Centres and Dorcas Societies, out of our emergency funds we purchased about \$1,000.00 worth of blankets and quilts. Insofar as several days elapsed between the flood damage and opening the highway, the local relief agencies in Terrace aided with what supplies they had. We went with our Van to an Indian village which had received no help, apart from the food which the government had flown in. We were not able to go directly to the village as the Nass River was flooded and not safe to cross. The Indian representatives supplied a large power boat which we filled with the prepackaged goods. This they ferried across the river. The goods were taken to the village office where they were judiciously distributed to the families remaining and some kept in reserve for those returning to their homes.

The 4-wheel-drive unit and trailer then returned to Terrace where final checks were made on those who suffered flood damage. A small reserve was left for the Terrace Community Services and the Van returned to its place of origin.

We feel deeply grateful that this privilege of helping in a small way was extended to us. By reports coming in we understand that there was real appreciation in the communities served, and that the name Seventh-day Adventist Community Services and the word "Ingathering" has a definite connotation now.

We think many thanks should also be expressed for the fine work and effort put in by the ladies of our Welfare work. In fact, more goods were packaged than the Van was capable of loading.

Another positive side-light growing out of this experience is the formation of a Conference-wide storage area for similar needs in the future.

Considering the interest rate now charged by lending institutions, it is a great saving for our expanding churches and newly organized churches to be able to borrow from the Revolving Fund at $8\frac{1}{2}$ %. It can mean a saving of 5% or even more.

Adventist Heritage makes generous use of illustrations, some of which have never before been published. The articles contain many interesting topics surrounding the denomination's history, and the reader will discover many little known and delightful facts to enhance his knowledge of the subject.

Many church leaders and historians have praised the publication for making

Adventist history come alive so vividly. As Kenneth H. Wood, editor of the *Review and Herald* states, "Adventist Heritage is a window into the past that helps provide a good perspective on the present and the future . . . It is the only magazine devoted specifically to providing these insights, and I highly recommend it to every Seventh-day Adventist."

Included in the Winter 1978 issue is a cumulative index which is invaluable as a research tool. Every article has been referenced and cross-referenced in order to make the articles appearing in Adventist Heritage more easily accessible to the researcher.



THE CHRISTIAN AND TEMPTATION by Ruth Jaeger Buntain

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


uation ethics? What do you do with temptations that seem too strong to overcome? These are only a few of the questions the author, who has written many books of a practical nature, answers.




