The Bible Kindergarten

"The Bible kindergarten has done a good work. It is no easy exercise, but it is doing good. . . . This is a large field to cultivate. Let his work be carried on. . . . After the morning lessons, on pleasant days, teachers and children take a long walk. . . and a short lesson from nature is given." Evangelism p. 583, 584.

As early as 1899 Ellen G. White penned these words in commendation of the week-day kindergartens at camp meetings in Australia. She indicated at other times that they should be extended past camp meeting so that the children might continue receiving precious truths from the Bible and nature.

"The work of education and training should commence with the babyhood of the child; for then the mind is the most impressible, and the lessons given are remembered" Child Guidance p. 26.

But how do you begin a kindergarten? Most churches or school boards find themselves at a loss when faced with this question. Fortunately, our Adventist educators have foreseen the demand for preschool education, and have been studying the problem for several years already. The General Conference Department of Education authorized the preparation of a complete manual for the operation of kindergartens. This document, written by Joan Summers in cooperation with Joan Barrows and Sharon Chamberlain, was published in the fall of 1978 and is entitled God, Creation and Me. It may be ordered through the General Conference Department of Education for \$15 per copy plus postage.

Kindergarten is not, as some suppose, merely a babysitting service. Kindergarten is purposely designed to provide the child with experiences which will develop his mind in such a way that his formal schooling later will come more easily. In the field of Language Arts there are listening, speaking, and reading activities. This is not to say that children are to read in kindergarten. They are only given the tools necessary to learn the skill more quickly in first grade. In preschool they learn to listen attentively and discriminatingly, to distinguish between different shapes, to match identical letters, to express themselves clearly when speaking to others.

Mathematics at this level consists of developing ideas and vocabulary. Children become familiar with weights, measures, time, sequence of days, sequence of numbers, geometrical shapes, and money, among other things.

"Too much importance cannot be placed on the early training of children. The lessons that the child learns during the first seven years of life have more to do with forming his character than all that it learns in future years" Child Guidance p. 193.

The curriculum continues with nature-science, creative arts, music, social studies, and Christian living. This well balanced course of study combines instruction and play in just the sort of way described by Sister White. Many parents mistakenly believe that Divine inspiration dictates that a child should be left untaught until age eight or older. Nothing could be further from the truth. A careful study of both Scriptures and E. G. White

"The early training of children is a subject that all should carefully study. We need to make the education of our children a business, for their salvation depends largely upon the education given them in childhood" Child Guidance p. 27

writings will reveal that "Education begins as soon as a child is capable of forming an idea" Child Guidance p. 26. Mrs. White was opposed to sending a sixor seven-year-old child to the schools of her day. There the little ones sat on high benches, feet dangling, and learned Latin phrases by the stern discipline of the rod. Recess was short and school days were long. The Bible kindergarten, with its combination of play and learning through experience in nature and the Scriptures. was recognized by Mrs. White as one of the best ways of teaching very young minds truths vital to their future happiness and salvation.

"Lifestyle"

During recent weeks we have been conducting a pilot Health Ministry program in the Oshawa, Ontario area called "Lifestyle". The program enrolled about 100 persons from the community and 70 from the church. A statistical and strategy report will follow at another time. But this report was suggested to be of interest now.

Dr. Archie King asked one of his patients, Mrs. A. Mulder, a registered nurse at the Oshawa General Hospital, to give an opinion of the program and to share what benefits she has derived from attending. Her letter follows.

Canadians are overweight, underexercised, and assaulted by numerous ailments that stem from our overall lack of good health habits. Finally if we admit it, we grope around for some help.

One day in the mail I received a pamphlet, and one of the articles that interested me was one on Heartbeat. This is a Community Health Interest Survey, co-ordinated by Adventist Health Ministries.

I attended the Heartbeat sessions which is a screening program to determine your coronary risk factors. It included:

- —A blood test to determine cholesterol and triglyceride levels.
- -A blood pressure evaluation.
- -An analysis of your coronary health history.

Since this was a free community service I had nothing to lose but 30 minutes of my time, and I had a very great deal to gain. On attending the second session we received the test results and the recommended programs. Since my cholesterol level was elevated 300mg/dI, and I was overweight, the recommended programs were as follows:

- -weight control
- -stress control
- -Nutrition Seminar for heart disease
- -physical fitness

So it was I attended their program on Lifestyle. Lifestyle includes:

- -The 10 evening Fitness & Food Seminar
- -The 10-Day Stress Control Clinic
- -The vital principles of weight management
- -For smokers, the 5-Day Plan To Stop Smoking

This was a package for the entire family, there being no restrictions on the number in the family. The cost per family was \$30. My husband became interested, and along with myself and my mother, we attended Lifestyle.

The first evening was on stress which was held on Monday nights. We found that the pressures of day-to-day living need not intimidate us. We learned coping techniques that make it more possible to survive in this highly complex and demanding world,

The second evening was on Fitness & Food. In the weight management we were given a Fit Test. This was put

on by the Ontario government's Fit Test van. The University of Toronto's professional staff of physiologists and health educators take you through a comprehensive fitness evaluation that also includes personal consultation. The assessment involves a cardio-vascular fitness test with electrocardiogram monitoring, the measurement of percent body fat, flexibility, lung function, muscle strength and endurance, blood pressure, height and weight. We received a basic exercise program suited to our needs and likes.

We have incorporated this the last three or four weeks now, and we have noted a profound change in our lifestyle. We are less tired and noted a sense of well-being. And we have noticed more of a balance in our emotions. We get more thrill out of living, have a more positive attitude, as well as the loss of weight!

We have learned details about the use of exercise, fresh air and water, rest, recreation and eating habits. This will result in a healthier and longer life span.

In the Weight Management and Food Seminar we are becoming more and more convinced of the value of a vegetarian diet and are becoming stronger advocates for it.

The adequacy of a diet containing little or no meat was put to the test in Denmark during World War I. The Danish people came through the war with improved health and lowered death rates. Norway went through a similar experience during World War II. From 1940 to 1945 their consumption of animal foods was drastically cut, and the use of cereals, potatoes, and other vegetables was increased. Deaths from circulatory disease were considerably fewer during this period of time. With the end of the war, however, the people returned to their prewar diet and the death rate promptly rose to prewar levels. There has been an increasing amount of scientific evidence that greasy meats, junk foods, coffee, sweets, alcohol, and cigarettes are major contributors to the high death rate from heart disease and stroke, today's greatest killers.

By checking a person's heart action, blood chemistry, exercise patterns, eating, drinking, and smoking habits (and a few other things) specialists can now predict serious disease years before they occur. What's more important, they can tell you specific ways to avoid these diseases — if you're willing to change some of your habits. The first thing a person has to do is to WANT to change. And you can drastically alter the odds in your favor.

How you live, hour by hour, day by day, more than anything will determine what will kill you and when. I think that we have had for several years, for example, the information about whole grains. We have had for years the knowledge about exercise and its beneficial effects. The

New Churches — New Schools

In Canada the Seventh-day Adventist Church is growing. With growth comes new challenges. Somewhat as a growing child needs larger shoes and larger clothes, a larger bed to sleep in, so the church needs new churches and new schools. But here is where the analogy breaks down. The church is not to be put to sleep in a larger bed. It is time for the church to awake as that great and glorious day approaches — the coming of our Saviour.

But while we work and wait for that day, we have to occupy, so new churches and new schools have to be built.

At a Union Conference Executive Committee Meeting held at Canadian Union College, Lacombe, March 26, 1979, guidelines for the construction and purchase of church buildings and school buildings in Canada were adopted. To acquaint church members with these guidelines the MESSENGER will carry a series of three articles. This is No. 1 and it has to do with General Guidelines, which are as follows:

 (a) No organization of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada should begin construction upon a building project or the purchase of an existing structure before the building plans and the financial plan have been studied and approval given by the Union Committee. This applies to any project of \$35,000 and above. Donated labor and materials are to be counted when evaluating the overall cost. (Sometimes \$35,000 cash can develop into a church worth \$70,000 or more.)

- (b) Project plans are to be approved by the building organization's committee or governing board and its parent organization before being forwarded to the Canadian Union Conference for consideration by the Building Committee and the Executive Committee.
- (c) At least one copy of the financial plan is needed, and when the proposed project has reached that stage where the local conference has authorized the project, then the "Canadian Union Conference Building Program Application" should be filed with the Union office.

Any church group contemplating the construction of a church or a school should get in touch with the local conference or the Canadian Union Conference for a copy of this form. Also by writing to your local conference or to the Canadian Union Conference you may receive free a little book giving detailed guidelines for those who are considering building a new church or school.

Seventh-day Adventist schools in the Maritimes are established for the purpose of helping the children of the church to identify as sons and daughters of God. The following educational goals as outlined in the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada Education Code book are subscribed to by the church schools of the Maritime Conference.

1. Spiritual: The child

- Studies the Bible and the Spirit of Prophecy in the spirit of the learner and reads them for personal communion, guidance, and information.
- b. Chooses Christ as his personal Saviour and accepts as his own the principles of Christian living as taught by the Seventh-day Adventist Church.
- Enjoys a deeper, richer Christian experience and has a better understanding of God and the plan of salvation.

2. Social: The child

- Enjoys associations with others and cooperates harmoniously with them in common enterprises.
- Considers opinions of others, chooses what is right and stands for principle.
- Understands other people, their needs, and ways of life. Discovers that mutual sharing of responsibilities and ideas brings satisfaction.
- d. Dedicates his life to service for Christ.

3. Physical: The child

- a. Understands his own body and how to care for it.
- b. Develops and maintains good physical and mental health.
- Cooperates in community plans for more healthful living.

4. Mental: The child

- a. Thinks effectively and constructively in dealing with both intellectual and practical problems.
- Develops his capabilities and reaches the highest possible competence in fundamental skills, understandings, and appreciations.

Investment Silver

When Elder Howard our Conference Sabbath School Director asked me how long I had continued with my particular Investment Project, I thought a moment and then I realized that it had been 15 years since I had first extracted silver from the fixer bath collected from various X-ray departments around town. I work in the field of X-ray and most people are really not aware that one of the ingredients on an X-ray or photographic film is silver. In the course of processing a film, the silver that is in the emultion is deposited in the fixer. There are several ways that you can recover the silver from the fixer bath, but the method I chose to use was the electrolysis method. This silver that is deposited on the metal plate is sold to one of the metal companies. It is interesting to note that this silver that I've been able to recover for Investment, is 98% pure. At todays silver prices the metal is very precious. Silver is difficult to come by and the price of silver, along with gold and other precious metals, is going up all the time, so I feel that I've been very fortunate indeed in my Investment project and I'm sure that the Lord has had a hand in the way things have gone. I was able to get half an ounce of silver from every gallon of fixer. At approximately \$7.00 an ounce, this amounted to a considerable amount of money.

Now, not all the money I get goes to Investment. I split it 50/50 with individuals I collect it from. My expenses are almost negligible but I do deduct them before I give my Investment. The Lord had been good to me in my project this year and with His help, I've been able to raise approximately \$500.00.

Elder Howard asked me how much I received the first year of my Investment project — 15 years ago. I don't recall exactly how much I received, but I do remember that the price of silver was about .40 and ounce. As I think back, I realize how the Lord has blessed this project over the years. I'm so happy that He is able to use me in this Investment Project and I hope that it might give others some ideas so that they also can Invest for the Master.




Truro Baptism

Delegates from 11 of the 12 higher education institutions of the church in North America met for an intensive four-day schedule of programsharing and discussion of issues facing young Adventists today. Included were delegates from Canadian Union College and Kettering College of Medical Arts, who had not been able to attend AIA conventions recently.

Major actions taken by the delegates at the convention included reorganization of the AIA's financial structure, voting AIA membership in the American Student Association, creation of an AIA Alumni Association, and increasing dues paid by member colleges to cover rising costs for the AIA. The delegates also went on record as favoring a joint convention in 1980 with ASPA, the Adventist Student Press Association, and expanding the AIA's services to eventually include the more than sixty Adventist colleges outside North America.

Rob Schwindt, a junior Mental Health major from Columbia Union College, was elected as the new AIA President, and will assume his duties in early June. In a separate action, delegates also voted to accept Columbia Union College's offer to host the 1980 convention.
