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A Handbook For Lay Evangelists

We all like to hear cheering experiences about the progress of what we call the "work" of God. And when the word "progress" is mentioned, our first thought is about increases in membership and baptisms.

In what parts of the world is the work of God growing the most rapidly? We could mention Inter-America, South America, Africa and the Philippines, among others. And then a question comes to mind. Why are there so many baptisms in these areas? The answer is certainly that in those places our church members are deeply involved in sharing their faith, multiplying personal contacts and giving Bible studies in the homes of the people. And then-here is another secret of their success-a number of laywomen are holding public evangelistic meetings.

Now let's avoid a misunderstanding. A lay evangelistic campaign does not always mean an attendance of 80, 100, 200 or 500 people. A successful campaign may have an attendance of only two or three Adventists, 10 to 20 friends and neighbors-people with whom these two or three members have had contact.

To be a lay evangelist, it is not necessary to spend months and years training as a preacher and an orator. One needs only to:

- (1) Live in close communion with his God.
- (2) Know his Bible.
- (3) Get from his pastor a minimum of training on how to make a call and how to preach successfully.
- (4) Have faith, the courage to start, and perseverance to keep going.

One day a layman came to visit me in my office. At the time I was president of the French West Indies in the Guyana Mission. He told me that the Lord had spoken to him and told him to hold an evangelistic campaign.

He sold a piece of land in order to rent a hall that seated 100 and to buy a piano. I told him, "But brother, in the town where you are planning to present these meetings we have no Adventists. Did you first visit the people in their homes? Are you engaged in giving dozens of Bible studies? Are you sure that people will attend your meetings?" Our good brother smiled and said, "But pastor, you are forgetting something. The town where I intend to hold the meetings is where I was born. I know everyone and everyone knows me. They all will want to come and listen to me. Attendance will be no problem!" "Well," I said, "you realize that you are not following the blueprint and plans of the church. I wish you success and will pray for you, but-" We prayed together and he left.

After spending a lot of money on advertising, the first meeting was held. A dozen people attended. At the second meeting there were eight people; and the third, four. At the fourth, his wife and daughter were present-no one else. The wife was to usher the people in and the daughter played the piano. Our lay evangelist asked what he should do. The wife said, "See, I told you you shouldn't spend your money this way. You were too bold. Why did you not start more humbly?" The daughter said, "Father, I heard you as you were practising your sermon for tonight in your bedroom the other day. It is a good message. Let's pray together and, father, go ahead and preach." "Thank you," said the father. They prayed and he started his sermon. He preached with power, full of God's Spirit, to a hall with only two seats occupied.

A man passing on the sidewalk heard a few words. He looked through the back windows and didn't see anyone. He came back and looked through the door and

saw the preacher and two ladies. Looking closer, he smiled and said to himself. "Well, not too much success. The two listeners are his wife and daughter." Then suddenly something the preacher said struck his heart and he stood outside against the wall listening.

Our brother and his wife and daughter didn't know he was there. At the end of the sermon the preacher made a call, as he was supposed to do, and asked the people to raise their hand, manifesting in this way their decision. Outside on the sidewalk the man shamelessly raised his hand and suddenly realizing what he was doing brought his hand down and said to himself, "I am ridiculous." Then he heard the preacher announce the next meeting. He decided to attend. He came, bringing three people. A week later 13 were present, then 20, 25, 30.

Yes, God performed a miracle. About a year later it was my privilege to baptize 13 people-the first souls won in this town as the result of the evangelistic campaign of this courageous and persevering lay preacher. Among the 13 was the man who had stopped on the sidewalk, his wife, two of his children, his brother, his brother's wife and one child.

This lay evangelist walked with God. He knew his Bible. He trained himself by reading and praying, with much seriousness and repetition. He had the courage to start and even to preach to empty chairs. He persevered and the Lord blessed him. In this town today we have a church of over 100 members.

A Measurable Blind Spot

This article is not for wide distribution among non-S.D.A.s!

At the recent Ontario Conference Camp Meetings, about 200 Seventh-day Adventists were screened by Fit-Test; a mobile fitness testing van sponsored by the Ministry of Culture and Recreation. The test measures strength, flexibility, percent body fat, Forced Vital Capacity (a lung function test) and especially an electro-cardiogram-monitored step test to examine certain heart responses under exercise conditions. We didn't do too well!

The norm or standard for the test is 1,000 persons taken at random from Toronto. We did not compare well! The individuals being tested either did quite well as if they had been caring for themselves or they did quite poorly as if they had been neglecting themselves. There were very few who were average. And there were more below average among the females than above average.

Now isn't that interesting especially for Seventh-day Adventists. I thought we always showed well when compared to the average population. That depends on the kind of test being run.

The health reform emphasis for so many years has been diet, diet. So that if blood tests are taken Seventh-day Adventists run lower cholesterol and triglyceride readings and have a lower heart attack rate than the average. They also experience less cancer that is related to diet. This has brought favorable recognition to Seventh-day Adventists for their longer life and less sickness.

There are some factors other than diet of course that contribute to their well being such as trust in God and an orderly life.

But the counsel, the inspired instruction, the requirement, the command to exercise regularly has been strangely and perhaps deliberately ignored. And our blind spot is statistically and measurably evident when tested for physical fitness. Admittedly a camp meeting audience may not represent a true cross section of Seventh-day Adventists. But if we were to take tests that compared their nutrition benefits with the general population, they would compare favorably so it is obvious they are overlooking the exercise requirement, especially if they are below the general population. This is more so with the female population than with the male population.

Does the Lord really place that much emphasis on this subject?

Please notice that EXERCISE is listed in *Ministry of Healing*, page 127, among the eight natural remedies along

with diet, trust in God, air and others. Then to leave us without doubt we are told:

"The health cannot be preserved unless some portion of each day is given to muscular exertion in the open air." Fundamentals of Christian Education, p. 146.

Notice the words "each day" and "open air". Usually we find time to eat and to sleep each day and to make money as many days as possible because we see the necessity. Could it be that we eat and sleep and make money because we feel the need to and not because God says to. But since we don't feel the need to exercise we don't exercise even though God says to. Those who obey God and maintain an exercise program daily for a few years are the first to feel the need of exercise when they miss it just as much as missing eating or sleeping. . .and more than making money because it gives them a freedom from stress known only by those who exercise.

It's possible that we don't recognize invalidism. We may consider an invalid someone who is confined to bed or wheel chair. But many are invalids when it comes to climbing a hill or performing heavy physical taxation. The effect from such morbid conditions of body on the brain and spiritual life will be declared in the judgement for exercise is a religious duty.

"The chief if not the only reason why many become invalids is that the blood does not circulate freely, and the changes in the vital fluid, which are necessary to life and health, do not take place. They have not given their bodies exercise nor their lungs food, which is pure, fresh air; therefore it is impossible for the blood to be vitalized, and it pursues its course sluggishly through the system. The more we exercise, the better will be the circulation of the blood. More people die for want of exercise than through overfatigue; very many more rust out than wear out. Those who accustom themselves to proper exercise in the open air will generally have a good and vigorous circulation. We are more dependent upon the air we breathe than upon the food we eat. Men and women, young and old, who desire health, and who would enjoy active life, should remember that they cannot have these without a good circulation. Whatever their business and inclinations, they should make up their minds to exercise in the open air as much as they can. They should feel it a religious duty to overcome the conditions of health which have kept them confined indoors, deprived of exercise in the open air." Testimonies, Vol. 2, p. 525, 526.

Where Have The Fathers Gone?

How much time do fathers spend with their sons? A group of 300 seventh- and eighth-grade boys logged accurately the time their fathers actually spent with them over a two week period. The majority of them only saw dad at the dinner table. Some never saw their father for days at a time. In this particular sample the average time father and son were alone together for an entire week was 7½ minutes! (1)

Where have the fathers gone? They have gone many places. But what concerns us here is that they have gone out of the everyday involved lives of their children.

Books on motherhood and child rearing abound, but until recently there have been scarcely any books available on fatherhood. Biller and Meredith in their book Father Power point out that more than 10 percent-about 8 million-of the children in the United States live in fatherless homes at a given time. Three times this number are fatherless for a significant part of their childhood. In some ghettos more than 50 percent of the children are fatherless. However, the most widespread problem is father neglect where fathers live with their families but have lost close, regular contact with their children, (2)

A father and his young son were walking through the woods. In places the terrain was open and the little fellow ran ahead or found his own way around obstacles. But after awhile they came to a place where there was considerable undergrowth of brush and blackberry bushes. The boy had missed the path and soon found himself entangled. "Daddy, my legs are getting scratched!" Dad lifted him out of his plight and said, "Son, take my hand and step where I step." Within a few minutes they had crossed the thorny place and arrived where they were going. In life happy is the child who when his "legs are getting scratched" can find quidance and support from a wise father. Such a father doesn't just tell the child what to do but models in his own life the better way and can say, "Here son, step where I step." A strong warm father model in childhood can save children from many of the thorns of the way.

Father Deprivation and Offspring Adjustment

Psychiatrist Irving Bieber of the New York Medical College who with his colleagues ran a nine-year study of homosexuals undergoing psychotherapy, declares that he has never interviewed a homosexual who had a close and warm relationship with his father.(3) Psychologist Henry B. Biller says that studies of the family backgrounds of both male and female homosexuals uncover a very high occurrence of father-deprivation. (4)

Biller and Meredith point out that father presence or involvement tends to have positive effects on their daughters' relationships with boys. Girls deprived of a father because of divorce are more likely to become "boy-crazy" as they mistakenly seek appreciation from a father figure. Girls whose fathers have died may tend to avoid boys. (5)

A lack of father involvement with the child tends to decrease the child's analytical ability and his ability for productive thinking (translating great plans into appropriate action). (6)

Certainly there are some wonderful fatherless or father-neglected families where sons and daughters have been successfully reared to form happy well-adjusted homes of their own. However, this task is made so much easier and more delightful when father is a strong, dynamic figure in the everyday life of the children.

The Father's Role

The spirit of prophecy years ago gave us sound considered guidance on how to prevent a myriad of problems which today are associated with low father image. In 1905 Ellen G. White wrote: "The father should enforce in his family the sterner virtues,-energy, integrity, honesty, patience, courage, diligence, and practical usefulness. And what he requires of his children he himself should practice, illustrating these virtues in his own manly bearing." But assertiveness is not enough, for the statement goes on to say: "Combine affection with authority, kindness and sympathy with firm restraint. Give some of your leisure hours to your children; become acquainted with them; associate with them in their work and in

their sports, and win their confidence. Cultivate friendship with them, especially with your sons. In this way you will be a strong influence for good." (7)

A study among Seventh-day Adventist families has found that the greater the encouraging role of the father, the lesser the negative roles of the children. This inverse relationship was not nearly so strong when comparing the encouraging role of the mother with the negative roles of the children. In other words, in the sample studied, father encouragement, when moderate and not overdone, was of premium value in family interaction. (8)

Fun Fatherhood

Fathers who take initiative in developing "familiness" enjoy a variety of relationship activities with their sons and daughters. One father who travels considerably takes his sons with him on his business trips. A truck driver has as his traveling companion a different child each week during summer vacation time. These children begin to see the world and the world of their father as well.

In one home a visitor might hear father singing—"Don't sit under the apple tree with anyone else but me," as he and the 4-year-old daughter crouch under the make-believe apple tree (the grand piano). Hide and seek, a bumpy camel ride on dad's back, special stories with all kinds of strange sound effects, are part of this daughter's exciting childhood. Father is a very important person in her life.

One father and teen-age daughter have a close relationship in their physical fitness program. Not only do they play tennis together but football as well. Sunday afternoon is their special afternoon together. Sometimes they watch their favorite ball game on TV. During the commercial time they rush outside to kick a few balls and throw a few passes. In the evening father, mother and daughter talk naturally about spiritual concerns and at times join in a lively discussion on politics.

A ride to the junk yard looking for parts to be used on the old jalopy is an important event for one son. Soon four legs are seen from under the old car as they work together on "their" project of

Maranatha - Nelson Project - Fast Progress

Coming from as far away as Takoma Park, Maryland, and Carson City, Nevada, as well as many points in British Columbia and Washington, some 70 volunteers helped Nelson Seventh-day Adventists accomplish a task that would otherwise have taken years.

"It was only in February of this year that the two-acre property was purchased; and since then it's been an active time for our small congregation," reports Pastor Zinner. Plans were drawn up and approved by committees and government officials. Excavation and progress was steady until June 17 and 18 when dozens of volunteers swarmed in to assist in the erection of the new Nelson Seventh-day Adventist Church.

On the first day alone of the "Maranatha Workbee", the four main walls were erected as well as construction of 50 trusses. The next day the trusses were put into place on the roof. The third day the roof was put on — fast progress.

In mid-May one local resident was a bit skeptical upon noticing a sign announcing the official opening for June 30, but as the Big Day was approaching, he became excited and convinced that it could happen. And true it was as over 125 individuals gathered for special all-day services on June 30 to commemorate the official opening.

Assisting Pastor Zinner and the local congregation were: Glen Maxson, president of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in B.C.; and W. W. Rogers, president of "Maranatha" and building development director for the S.D.A. Church in B.C.

On site a fully functional kitchen served as headquarters for the four full-time volunteer cooks. Meals were served three times daily in a large circus tent to the 30 or 40 volunteer workers.

All was made possible by the faith of the local congregation and donations, most of the lumber being supplied by Jacobson Brothers Lumber of Williams Lake; over 4,000 board feet of cedar siding from Starline Cedar Mills of Lac La Hache; much of the paint donated by Glidden Paint Company of Vancouver and Irving Toombs, painting contractor of Prince George; approximately \$1,000,00 worth of cereals, flours, and pasta products from Rogers Wholesale Foods of Armstrong, B.C.; much of the electrical supplies donated by Max's Electric of Salmon Arm; as well as numerous donations of funds and supplies by other individuals and companies, including assistance from many local firms.



Dear friends in Canada.

I realize time flies everywhere, but it seems it's been racing by with the speed of light in this country. We've been here for almost two years.

In January we flew south to Australia for a five week holiday. It was the peak of summer down-under so we enjoyed swimming on a few of the hundreds, yes thousands of miles of white sandy ocean beaches. We are so grateful for God's leading, and the kind generosity of one of our Australian surgeons who provided us with a lovely camper van.

During the past month the highlands have seen a lot of tribal fighting. The people seem to look for things to fight about. To them its like a good old football game back home. No fooling! If a white man drives along a road (the natives love to fight near or across a road) both sides will stop shooting and chat with the driver. Then when he is past they resume the battle. They all fight with bows and arrows and spears - all made of wood. Many are killed - but many more are wounded. There have been several tribal battles near here, and the wounded were brought in by truck loads. We worked day and night at a new game called "Hunt the Arrow". We extracted arrows from heads, arms, chests, legs and abdomens.

I want to especially thank all our dear folk who've been knitting bandages. They're a real blessing and so very much appreciated. Also, thanks for all the parcels, donations and prayers. How I wish I were a journalist or author to portray the tremendous needs of these dear people, but I'm no writer — so will just continue to pray to God our Wonderful Heavenly Father, "Who is able to





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
