"Good News"

"If only the Romanoffs could come!" This was the sentiment expressed by the ARTS staff as they planned a rally with H.M.S. Richards as special guest and speaker. Ever since Isabel Santos, soloist with the Romanoff Chorus and Orchestra, became a member of the Adventist church, she had been witnessing to her friends the Romanoffs. When she brought them to the studio, Pastor Feyerabend asked if they would help out in the coming rally. They accepted and a new experience was born — for them and for ARTS. It was at one of these meetings that a phrase in a sermon by H.M.S. Richards inspired Mrs. Lesia Romanoff to write the music and lyrics to a happy new song: "Good News When Jesus Comes Again." In the months that followed, other hymns poured from her pen, and her husband arranged these inspirational songs for male voice and harp, prepared a group to record them, and donated the compositions and recordings to ARTS. These will be available in a long playing record the proceeds of which will go the ARTS ministries.

For Ivan Romanoff in Canada, it all started back in the "dirty thirties," with "16 Men and a Harp." This national radio broadcast, carried by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, won its way into the hearts of thousands of Canadians. An outstanding personality and virtuoso, Ivan Romanoff began his career as a young boy excelling in ability at choral arranging. He is a gold medalist violinist, and has an intriguing talent in composition and conducting. From his hand has come an endless variety of arranging concepts that have buoyed the spirits of Canadians for many years. Throughout the fifties, during a strong wave of immigration in Canada, Romanoff and his chorus touched the lives of newcomers to Canada presenting international music in over forty-four languages. Many will remember his programming under such names as "Songs of My People," "Continental Holiday," "Continental Rhapsody," and "The Music of Ivan Romanoff." Two and one-half years of study in composition and conducting at the distinguished Academy of Musical Arts in Prague further developed the genius of this prolific musician. But after fifty years of successfully entertaining millions with secular folk music, this year, 1980, Ivan Romanoff returned to a style of ten male voices backed by the incomparable strains of harp accompaniment—but in a different idiom: a selection of sacred songs.

And from where did these melodies and lyrics come? None other than his favourite song-writer and partner, Mrs. Lesia Zubrack



Romanoff. She too began her career as a child, writing songs as fast as they would come to her. One soon begins to appreciate her talent in rendering songs that linger in the mind, catchy tunes and words that become a part of you. She studied violin for 15 years. While attending the University of Saskatchewan, she received a scholarship and entered the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto. During this time she did script writing for radio and television. Mrs. Romanoff has said that melodies have always held more prominence for her than lyrics, but she truly believes that the Lord gave her a special inspiration for the words and the music of

these new songs. The rare talent of these two outstanding musicians has been blended to create a new long play album, "Good News from Ivan and Lesia Romanoff," with eleven unique songs.

A gift of love to Seventh-day Adventists everywhere, these extraordinary selections have been granted to ARTS with world-wide copyrights for the purpose of helping to establish our media ministry in Canada. The Romanoffs have put their hearts into this project. So involved was Mr. Romanoff in the experience that even a chronic case of the flu could not prevent his arranging the music while in his bed. The Romanoffs have expressed the sentiment that this is some of the finest music in their career.

Pictured below with the Romanoffs is Erica Goodman, Canada's top harpist. She is the daughter of the Hyman Goodman, who served for many years as Concert Master of the Toronto Symphonic Orchestra, and was often seen as a musician with the Romanoff orchestra. Though her father is now located in Los Angeles and is playing in the David Rose and Percy Faith orchestras, Erica remains in Canada to establish her musical career. Her expertise on the harp is quickly noticeable as she masterfully handles the challenging arrangements created by Mr. Romanoff.

“No nation has ever been able to survive the breakdown of the family. Nations survive military defeats, depression, famines, fire, floods, governmental changes, but when the homes break down, so do the schools, the churches, the government and everything else that is worthwhile.” So said Edward R. Gibbons, English historian and author of the monumental *Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire*. The searching question is: How are our homes? Can we improve them? Or is it already too late?

It is too late for many secular homes. Enid was recently taking classes at a local community college. The teacher posed this question: “What shall we do? The family is dead. Marriage is no longer succeeding. Single parents are frustrated, breaking up and beating their children. What is the solution in our modern society today?”

The following suggestions were offered by class members, ages 20-35:

1. “Everybody get high and not care.
2. Do away with marriage. Stay together as long as you can without hard feelings.
3. Teach children to relate just to you, since your mate may disappear anytime.
4. Take the children away from parents as soon as possible after birth, and organize day-care centres.
5. Learn to live without friends or relatives. Stop fooling yourself. **Nobody cares!**”

Nobody cares? God cares!

The family unit is no accident! It was created to be a blessing. It was designed by

God to fulfill human needs. “The Christian home is to be an object lesson, illustrating the excellence of the true principles of life.” E.G. White, *Adventist Home*, p. 31

Marriage is not so much finding the right person as *being* the right person. And you cannot be the right person without Christ’s presence in you. There are many who say: “I’ll know when I’m ready for marriage;—When I have a good job,—When I finish my education,—When I discover the most beautiful girl.” No, the only thing that qualifies you for marriage is Christ in you. He noticed with a rush of unaccustomed sentiment that the sunlight was touching with brilliant sheen the silver hair of his wife who sat opposite him knitting. Later he confessed that he almost told her he loved her, something he hadn’t told her for years. But the sun soon set, the wind grew chilly, and he was saved from the embarrassment!

Take time to communicate daily with your life-partner. Take ten to fifteen minutes a day together talking about something other than bills, or what you have to do next. Communication is a two-way street—listen as well as talk. Try to understand each other’s feelings and frustrations. Agree to disagree without being disagreeable.

To Spice or Not to Spice?

Smokers characteristically use pepper and other highly spiced condiments with their food in order to stimulate their partially distorted sense of taste and smell. Within a few days of stopping smoking these senses rejuvenate and they can, for the first time in many years, begin to taste the subtle flavours of food. This rejuvenation process can continue to progress as articles which numb these senses are discontinued from the diet.

Because of the instruction given to Seventh-day Adventists to eliminate spicy and irritating substances from their diet they are in a

position to enjoy the privilege of eating, with all its delightful aromas and savoury flavours, more than those who do not have this instruction. It's been surprising to me to see how quickly new Seventh-day Adventists pick up this information and begin educating their tastes to enjoy the distinctive flavours that God has imparted to each different item of food.

They also learn to enhance the flavour of vegetables and roasts and loaves with herbs rather than spices. Herbs are usually grown in the temperate climates of the earth and are

composed of leaves rather than stem or seeds, although a few of the latter may be found. Spices, on the other hand, are grown in the tropic and sub-tropical areas of the earth and are usually made from the bark or seed of the plant.

To help us know these substances a little better I am listing the spices which can be injurious, especially with continued use. A list of sweet herbs that are not irritating to the system and can be used for seasoning is also listed.

HARMFUL

Irritating, stimulating, harmful

Cayenne pepper (or chili powder or capsicum)	Capsaicin, reflex increase in blood pressure, decrease in blood serum protein
Horse-radish	
Mustard	Allyl isothiocyanate, pungent, irritating, increases blood pressure
Pepper	(black or white) Piperidine, increases blood pressure, irregularities of heart beat, drug effect on brain, damages stomach

Strongly aromatic, irritating

Cloves	Eugenol
Ginger	Borneol, also increases blood pressure
Paprika	(Hungarian)

Slightly Irritating

Allspice	Eugenol, irritant to stomach. 60-75% of the volatile oil

The above list illustrates another area where you cannot always trust the remedies being circulated in health-food-store-literature. You will read such things as "cayenne pepper is an excellent substance with which to gargle or to take as a heart regulator." Or, "it's good for colds and sore throats." It may have the appearance of such because of its shock and irritating nature to the epithelial tissue. It creates a burning reaction which is exactly what a spice does throughout the whole system. This is not to its credit, but to its recommendation to be discontinued. The

cancer research department in the London Hospital, Medical College of London, in 1952, demonstrated that by feeding rats chili (cayenne pepper or capsicum), 54% of the rats developed tumors of the liver, while those on the basic diet developed no tumors.

Most of the spices are known to irritate, if not destroy, the mucous membrane barrier in the stomach and in the small and large intestines. This makes one vulnerable to ulcers or instant inflammation of these organs of digestion.

God has been extremely merciful in warn-

ing His people in advance so that they might avoid the degenerative effects of using such things that bring on a morbid condition to the bodies of so many in society. Notice what He said through His messenger as far back as 1890:

"Spices at first irritate the tender coating of the stomach, but finally destroy the natural sensitiveness of this delicate membrane. The blood becomes fevered, the animal propensities are aroused, while the moral and intellectual powers are

Overwhelming Needs in Montemorelos

Montemorelos University graduated its first class in the School of Medicine in June, 1979. Very few of the readers will realize what this has meant. The generation which started the Loma Linda University is no more with us, but some of the older Adventist members, still living, will remember the impact which medical education began to make on the work of the Seventh-day Adventist Church during the early days.

These students still have two years of training before they enter the active class of workers. But, it is a real milestone for this school to finally deliver 25 graduates. The School of Medicine draws students from 33 countries around the world. However, most of them come from the Inter-American Division, and of course from Mexico itself. Applications are considered from the world field among Adventist members. 16% do not belong to this church.

Montemorelos received university status on May 5, 1973, after operating as a small co-educational preparatory school for 49 years (37 years on this piece of property). This change of status permitted the school to offer advanced degrees in Medicine and Theology plus twelve other specialty fields of the educational sciences. The University was also granted permission to start a School of Dentistry.

Of all degrees permitted, the one which generated the most interest has been the School of Medicine. To conceive the vision, appoint officers, write aims and purposes, collect faculty, and produce the completed medical student has not been only a challenge, but a large undertaking. Mrs. Holm and I have worked in four of the world continents since graduating from our Alma Mater (LLU class of '52) but this is by far the most challenging and rewarding experience we have had. It has been said that to provide a

man with food will probably save his life, but to teach him how to grow it for himself, will affect his whole community. This is the goal of Adventist Missions.

Today Montemorelos Campus has been transformed from a two-teacher school in the days of the 30's and the 40's to a modern campus with a completed multi-million dollar building program. All of these beginnings are well covered in reports from the *Review* and other church papers.

Development has top priority at the fledgling University. Mario Collins, a Latin-American born U.S. citizen is working with students, university personnel, and also with the Mexican Foundations and business concerns to develop interest in the school's

aggressive capital improvement plan. The Seventh-day Adventist Church, through its various departments, is also assisting in the developing. The first phase of the next six-year development program calls for finishing and equipping the new medical centre, scheduled for completion in 1980.

We want the readers of the *Messenger* to know that the overflow offering on the Thirteenth Sabbath of March 29, 1980 will help in Montemorelos. We appeal to you and your friends for special consideration toward our goals. The church youth of Inter-America are looking to the Adventist World for help now. Needs are almost overwhelming, but we know your hearts are generous. May God bless all of you.

weakened, and become servants to the baser passions. The mother should study to set a simple yet nutritious diet before her family." *Counsels on Diet and Foods*, p. 341

As a church we take a strong stand against liquor, coffee and tea because of their stimulating and corresponding depressant effects which ultimately have their effect upon the formation of character. Spices have a parallel effect.

"Condiments and spices used in the preparation of food for the table aid in digestion in the same way that tea, coffee, and liquor are supposed to help the labouring man perform his tasks. After the immediate effects are gone, they drop as correspondingly below par as they were elevated above par by these stimulating substances. The system is weakened. The blood is contaminated, and the inflammation is the sure result." *Counsels on Diet and Foods*, p. 339

The person who has learned to purify his diet will relish with greater zeal the flavours God has placed there even more than he did the more stimulating diet.

"Right physical habits promote mental superiority. Intellectual power, physical strength, and longevity depend upon immutable laws. There is no happen-so, no chance, about this matter. Nature's God will not interfere to preserve men from the consequences of violating nature's laws." *Counsels on Diet and Foods*, p. 29

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
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OBITUARIES



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


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Dr. Edgar Latimer discusses the past providential experiences with Pastor Henry Feyerabend.

media. After many unsuccessful visits to the television stations, an offer was made for a contract consisting of 13 five-minute programs at the price of \$4,000.00. Feyerabend, feeling that this was an open door, signed the contract. But where would the money come from? As he made his way back to the meeting hall his mind was in turmoil. But as he opened that day's mail there was an unexpected letter from Dr. Edgar Latimer of Massachusetts, with a cheque for \$1,000.00.

In 1972 a small team of workers arrived in Toronto with the purpose of reaching the thousands of Portuguese living in this city. Pastor Henry Feyerabend, with the help of Bible workers Tracy Bravo and her parents, began to knock on doors, but the going was rough. The response was not only negative but even hostile. At that time there were no Portuguese telecasts in Toronto, and the team often discussed the dream of reaching the homes through this powerful

This was the needed sign to move ahead. Who could know that this would be the first contribution to start a major television ministry on its way?

From 1972-1975 the Portuguese church grew from 12 to 300 members, a majority of the contacts being made through television. A stately old building was purchased in the downtown area, and this building became the headquarters for the television ministry housing the studios, and it also became an evangelistic centre for the ethnic people of Toronto.

Many highly influential people from the Portuguese community were reached by the telecasts, and are now contributing their talents to the ARTS ministries. Isabel Santos, a well-known singer and recording artist dedicated her talents to the Lord. Her husband, Joe, who is an expert finish carpenter, is constantly involved in the work of the studio.

After the founding of the Portuguese work in Toronto, the Lord began to open doors to other communities. Via the CN Tower, signals were reaching Portuguese families in such places as Oshawa, Brampton and Kitchener. But was anyone watching? Several ambitious lay people wanted this question answered. Manuel Pereira, his brother and Joe and Isabel Santos began visiting homes in the area surrounding the Kitchener Adventist Church and to their delight found a number of families eager to study the scriptures. Some had been viewers of the telecast for years. After attending evangelistic meetings, many made a decision to be baptized. The happy group pictured here is a tribute to the importance of the media in reaching people for God.

Humberto Carvalho was an atheist at the time of Isabel's baptism. He was invited to use his creative talents helping to produce the telecasts. Isabel not only prayed for him constantly, but continued to witness to him, and he and his wife finally committed themselves to Christ. Humberto is now a manager of a bank, and through him loans were made available to purchase modern equipment for the studios.

“God knew a hundred years ago that you needed this place. Even though it is a hundred years old, it was built for television.” These were the words of George Vandeman as he stepped into the room in the Portuguese church that would later become the studio. For a number of years that room served us well. Many messages were prepared within those walls. How often groups of people were found on their knees on the floor of this studio. A number of decisions for Christ were made in that sacred spot.

The time came when that room could no longer meet the demands that were being thrust upon it. As set material began to grow, the floor space was no longer adequate. There were other problems. It was almost impossible to keep the sounds of the busy downtown traffic out of the studio, security was becoming a problem, and the old building not being made to house all of the electronic equipment was becoming a fire hazard.

On January 15 we received the keys to our new building at 5000 Dufferin Street. In this quiet vicinity the Lord had an ideal situation for us. It was a unique setting, with adequate office space, a place to build our much-needed dressing rooms, an area for the building and storage of sets, adequate audio and video control rooms, and a large studio with high ceilings and a drive-in door.




The set area measuring approximately 50' x 100' x 20' affords one of the largest studio sets in the country.

In the words of one of them, "There is no finer studio in all of Toronto." We praise the Lord for what He has done. Certainly we are entering into a day of great opportunities.

23,000,000 people live in this country of ours. In contemplating the challenge to complete God's work in our nation, most will agree that sheer electronic machinery alone will never win the world and prepare them for the coming crisis. It will be accomplished by a people who are "alive" with the love of God and humbly and courteously reach out to bless the lives of others.

The thirty thousand Adventists in Canada have an enormous task, and that's where television comes in. Through this medium hundreds of thousands can be reached simultaneously.

The tremulous times in which we live are beckoning many Adventists to reconsider their personal commitment of preparing themselves and others for the hastening day of the Lord.

Since the time a little more than a year ago, when ARTS was trying to establish its new identity as a Canadian church-owned media ministry, it has been thrilling to see the growing response of hundreds of members catching the vision of a finished work.

To this date, ARTS has been an almost totally self-supporting entity. It is the church members across this great country who are causing this work to flourish. Little help has been available from Conference or Union funds . . . and yet the Lord has provided His church with a TV production facility that is second to none. Nearly three-quarters of a million dollars in assets include the latest in modern video

equipment available.

One tenth of the Canadian Adventist membership could liquidate the remaining debt on the equipment in one year if they would only contribute \$10.00 a month. We live by faith from day to day trusting that what the Lord has diligently built over the last eight years, He will protect and prosper through the liberality of His people.

For the staff at ARTS it is a joy to show many visiting brethren the new centre and tell them of the Lord's providences in its development. As our people have seen it with their own eyes, they have been delighted and have responded in specific ways. But we thank God also for many who have given freely of their means though they may not be close to the developing project. Take the Sankeys for instance. Challenged by the vision of a Canadian-owned TV ministry and its impact for advancing our distinctive Adventist message, this young farmer and his dad committed a certain portion of their crop last fall to establish such a ministry. It is their belief that such an outreach in Canada can be easily supported if many Seventh-day Adventists would plan a monthly contribution on a continuing basis as they are doing for other church projects. With this in mind, it is their plan that as the Lord continues to bless them, they will provide \$1000 per month for

Adventist Radio and Television Services.

Then there are Lee and Lola McMiller from Tyner, Saskatchewan! They drove to Ontario to assist in the arduous task of relocating the studio. After both contributing many hours of labour, they now-depart for their home in the West. But they are leaving behind the vehicle in which they came. Awakening in the middle of the night several weeks ago, the thought came, "We should give this vehicle to ARTS—they could use a small truck for transporting equipment and advertising the name of ARTS on their various missions." The next morning the two of them made a decision. ARTS was to fall heir to a new Ford Courier truck. Plans are already being made for its wise use as a mobile unit for portable camera operations in gathering valuable illustration footage for the telecasts. Such a gift reflects the concern that the McMillers and others like them have for finishing God's work on earth.

Some may not be able to give large sums of money, but like the widow's mite, a cheerful gift can receive a mighty blessing from God. One recent letter (below) that came to the office revealed the giver's wonderful understanding of this principle.
