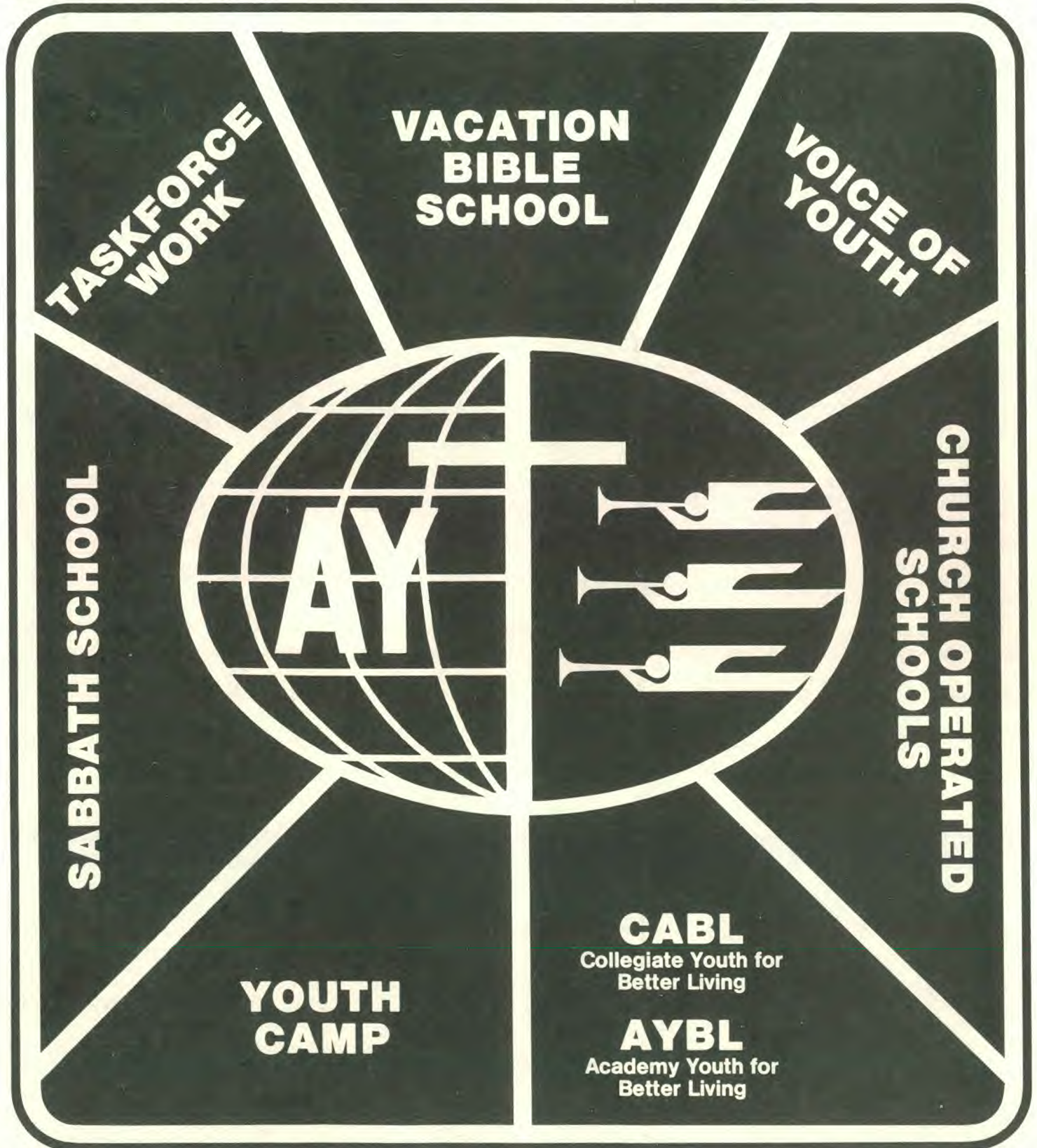


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Youth Evangelism

To define evangelism we could use just two words, "reaching" and "holding." The Random House dictionary says Evangelism is the preaching of the Gospel and refers to another form of the word, Evangelicalism which means "adherence to the principles or doctrines." Thus we have the reaching aspect of the preaching, and the holding aspect, or the adherence to what has been preached. Youth Evangelism is a product of the combination of those two meanings of Evangelism.

In the book *Evangelism*, by Ellen G. White, we find "churches are raised up and left to go down while new fields are being entered. Now these churches are raised up in much cost and labor and in means and then neglected and allowed to ravel out." *Evangelism*, p. 323. We have many Youth Evangelistic programs within our ranks that seldom receive their proper recognition. There is a feeling that unless a person is constantly reaching he is not doing evangelistic work. When in reality reaching is only half of the Evangelistic responsibility. The

other half is the holding aspect. Now we can readily see that there is the danger we might concentrate on only half when we really need an Evangelistic balance. Holding is just as important as reaching. However, many of our holding programs can become tools for reaching out. The faithful leaders in the youth Sabbath School, V.B.S., Pathfinders, Church Schools, sometime get very discouraged because they are not looked upon as being Evangelistic. In reality they are involved in the highest forms of Evangelism. True they have strong connotations in the holding aspect but also they lend themselves to a very positive blend of the full Evangelistic picture. Many new people are attracted to our church through a well-run church school and an appealing Sabbath School. Not to leave out the positive effects of a spiritually-oriented youth camp and a strong, vibrant Pathfinder Club. Some of the strongest ties these organizations within our organization have, is when they can see positive results directly contributed by reaching the families and neighbours that come within their sphere

of influence. Reaching and holding are closely related and in a positive Christian setting cannot be separated. True some are more effective in one than the other. However, as members of the body of Christ, we need to coordinate the functions so greater results can be realized.

"Christ's method alone will give true success in reaching the people. The Saviour mingled with men as one who desired their good. He showed His sympathy for them, ministered to their needs and won their confidence. Then He bade them 'Follow me.'" *Christian Service*, p. 119

Eternal values have a lasting quality when they are learned during a fun time. What better time of fun and Evangelism than at youth camp. Every church should plan and insure that each of their youth be enrolled in the youth Evangelism of a camping program this summer. Be Ye Separate

Anthropologists trace the current "Health Food Movement" to a coalescence of three influences. (Jerome, 1980.)

1. Rachel Carson's *The Silent Spring* 1962, which aroused a concern for the quality of contemporary foods, their nutritional quality and their safety;
2. the consumer rights movement with consumers taking responsibility for their own health and simultaneously looking at food as preventive medicine; and
3. an empathy with far Eastern cultures, a carry over from the so-called Hippie Movement and anti-Vietnam War protests.

Sociologists see the trend as more than a fad, but rather as a permanent social revitalization movement. The "Health Food Movement" has a vegetarian emphasis mostly for spiritual reasons but it capitalized on the correlation of heart disease, cancer and other degenerative diseases with a flesh diet to foster its vegetarian emphasis. The vegetarianism of the Trappist Monks, the Hindu Brahmins and Seventh-day Adventists, the major vegetarian communities in North America, is not considered a part of the contemporary "Health Food Movement." Should we be glad or disappointed at our disassociation?

Rejoice, for our ways are not their ways. Nor do we wish to be confused with their ways or by their ways. We believe in natural foods processed as little as possible, but for different reasons (I hope!). They believe in a mystical quality in foods. e.g. Some eat their foods raw in order to get the "life energy" contained in uncooked foods. Some eat sprouts in order to get the "growth force" from them. Eating energetic foods makes the eater energetic. Eating "balanced" foods (balanced for yin and yang, positive and negative forces) provides a balanced soul and psyche.

When I have pressed for some explanation of the "life force" in raw foods the only identification I have received so far is "enzymes." If we eat foods raw they say we will get its enzymes. But this reflects a lack of knowledge about food chemistry and digestion. (See *Messenger*, November 16, 1978).

The "mystical" quality in foods reminds me of the "mystical" quality in air. It's called "prana." Prana is not the oxygen, the nitrogen or any other substance known to science. It is contained in the space between the molecules of air. The "science" of breathing prana is known as prana yama. It was really prana that God breathed into Adam at creation. If you learn how to breathe correctly you can take in prana into the various organs of the body, revitalize them and thus perpetuate life indefinitely. Unfortunately the man who wrote the book on prana yama did not master his "science" and has now expired, but not before selling many of his books to those seeking a mystical substance "that surely must be present in nature."

Most of their vegetarianism is associated with yoga, meditation and various types of prayer. This type of diet is supposed to facilitate the disassociation of the soul from the body to identify with cosmic consciousness. Most eastern religions seek release from the body. Seventh-day Adventists realize that no soul exists separate from the body. They therefore see the health of the body as a contribution to the health of the mind with which we love God. We seek not release but integration of our body, mind and soul which in essence are one. They are inseparable absolutely.

"The members of one station of the 'Holy Brotherhood,' a neo-Catholic order with a heavy emphasis on occult study, suggested that a health food diet was necessary in order to keep one's body well and active in the service of God. They also said that a vegetarian diet was the most spiritually purifying. They themselves, however, eat meat three times a week, in order to keep their 'spiritual vibrations' down to the level of the 'common man' so they can communicate with him in their missionary work. If they were to become vegetarian, they believe, such a rarefied aura would exude from them that potential converts would be frightened away." (Jerome, 1980, p. 337)

A profit motive is very apparent in its vitamin motif and its "organic" motif which permeates their literature, lectures and discipline. Their network of health food stores and restaurants has been termed a "vegetable net."

Much more could be written if space allowed about the Babylonish confusion that exists in the relationship of spiritual life to health habits, the misinformation that is believed about food and health and about theology in this movement. It is obviously another one of Satan's counterfeits. Almost every important reform that needs to be made in health and religion has been made by some organization or movement, but with serious erroneous religious or health information. The reform is good but the reason is wrong and thus God and His truth are not glorified. And the attractions of what God has to offer have been usurped.

What is our task? To mount a movement armed with truth in practice that will reclaim the reforms as God's domain. There is room for many natural food stores and restaurants, lectures and programs where God's truth, both physical and spiritual, can be seen as clearly separate and higher from the confusion of Babylon.

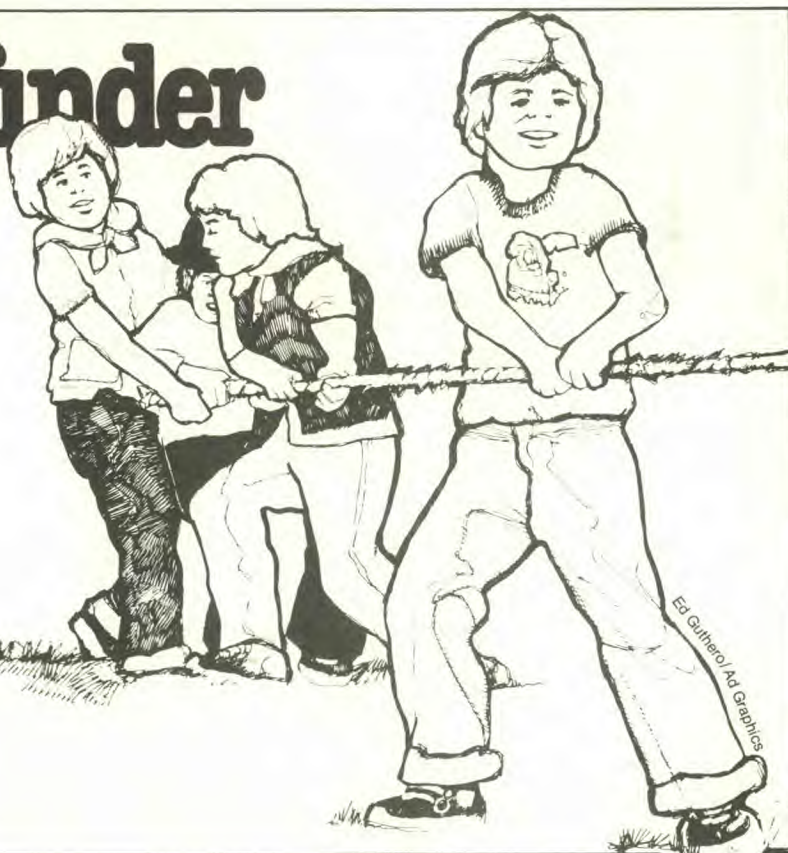

Freedom of Choice – A Two-Way Street

The greatest gift God gave to man in the beginning was the freedom of choice. It is true that at creation man also received the gift of stewardship and world dominion. However, a steward must make decisions and to make decisions one must have the free exercise of choice. Of course, God could have produced Adam as a type of celestial computer. He could have programmed him to do exactly what He wished Him to do. But this would have been contrary to God's very nature—God is love. God never coerces or forces the will.

As a continual reminder of this freedom of choice, this greatest of all gifts, God placed a tree in the centre of the garden. Through the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil, Adam exercised his freedom of choice. He could choose to obey or disobey God. Through the tree he could demonstrate his loyalty or express his preference for another master.

Adam chose. He gambled with his senses. He listened to the serpent—another master. And death, the inevitable penalty of sin, fell upon the human race.

The result of Adam's choice should have been the end of the road for man. But something happened. God's only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, stepped in and said, "I voluntarily choose to give my life for the life of man—condemned as it is." This act of divine love restored to fallen man the priceless freedom of choice.

Today the cross of Jesus Christ guarantees to every man, woman and child the privilege of standing where Adam stood when he came from the hand of his Creator—with the power of choice. Man can once again choose eternal life or eternal death. He can choose to accept or to reject the atonement Christ made for his

sins. No one can ever say that God is unjust or unfair. If a man separates himself from God, his Source of life, it is of his own election.

But freedom is not a call to irresponsibility—to do as we please—to obey our sinful natures. Freedom is a two-way street. True freedom leads to a mature reasoned response to God on the part of man. Paul says:

"... offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God—which is your spiritual worship." Romans 12:1 NIV

In a special sense, freewill offerings also symbolize our response to God—the use of this free exercise of choice given twice to us by God.

"Voluntary offerings and the tithe constitute the revenue of the Lord's work. Of the means entrusted to man, God claims a certain portion,—the tenth."

"The plan of redemption was entirely voluntary on the part of our Redeemer, and it is the purpose of Christ that ALL our benevolence should be freewill offerings." E.G. White, Testimonies, Vol. 3, p. 413

"He leaves all free to say whether or not they will give more than this." E.G. White, Acts of the Apostles, p. 74

What a privilege for you to exercise freedom of choice through your freewill offerings! To choose *how much* of your income you will systematically give back to God. To experience the joy of deciding *where* you will invest the means you have dedicated to Him. To *distribute* these freewill offerings between local, conference and world needs. Do not relinquish this privilege to anyone! This is your God-given right!

As a church we must be on guard against

efforts of manipulation and coercion commonly used today. Systematic compulsion must not be confused with systematic benevolence. We are told that:

"It were better not to give at all than to give grudgingly; for if we impart of our means when we have not the spirit to give freely, we mock God." E.G. White, Counsels on Stewardship, p. 199

Many are at a loss as to what they should give. They say: "Please tell me Pastor, how much I am supposed to give to the Lord . . . You make the decision for me." But no man, no church, no pastor can make that kind of decision for you. A steward is a manager of what God entrusts to him. A steward to remain a steward, must learn to *exercise his own freedom of choice*. Certainly the church has the privilege and responsibility to communicate its objectives and certain minimum needs, but the final decision to give or not to give—to give more or to give less—is left up to the individual. Our response to God in freewill offerings is a part of the free exercise given to us by God.

"Let each one do just as he has purposed in his heart; not grudgingly or under compulsion; for God loves a cheerful giver." II Corinthians 9:7 NASB

Freedom is a two-way street. God made us free-moral agents. Jesus Christ died on the cross to guarantee to us this freedom. But the way we use freedom is our own stewardship responsibility. What will be our decision? Our actions more than our words demonstrate conclusively what we wish to do with this greatest gift God gave to man—the freedom of choice.

Ottawa Members Witness Through Cooking School and Evangelistic Meetings

The Ottawa Seventh-day Adventist Church sponsored its tenth vegetarian cooking school in five years, from March 31 to April 10, in the home economics class room of a local high school. There were twenty-two registrants from the community and church, plus observers.

Each student had an opportunity to prepare one of six dishes a night from recipes using no eggs or dairy products.

At the end of each evening the students tried each other's dishes, plus numerous other samples prepared for them. The food was set out in an attractive manner to show students the variety of ways that wholesome food could be prepared. Class members took home what they had prepared, and tested these new dishes on their families.

An excellent set of over two hundred recipes was issued to each student, giving many delicious entrees, breads, vegetable dishes, breakfast ideas and desserts. These recipes were compiled by Cheryl Dunn and Laurie Lenhardt.

Lectures were given by Dr. John Coombs, Health Consultant; George Brewer, a long-time vegetarian; Edward Dunn, nutritionist; and Kerry Friesen, health enthusiast. The main thrust of each lecture was to encourage students to control their physical, mental and spiritual well-being through a more healthful lifestyle.

The program, presented in a professional manner, was directed and organized by Cheryl and Edward Dunn of the Ottawa Church, assisted by Laurie Lenhardt of the Oshawa Church.

CUC SECRETARIAL STUDENT SHARES SUCCESSES

The following letter, written April 24, 1980, by Irene Stevens tells how her secretarial/bookkeeping training at Canadian Union College qualified her not only to obtain a valuable position, but also to be awarded early promotions and salary increases.

The letter was written to Mrs. Louise Rea, Assistant Professor of Secretarial Science at Canadian Union College.



Dear Mrs. Rea:

I guess its about time that I write you and send the information that you requested. I will just write a few sentences in point-form stating the facts and you can take it from there.

- (1) Why I went to CUC as opposed to any other college? Because it is the only college that I know of that offers employment to students so they can pay for their education as they go along.
- (2) How my year at CUC prepared me for my present job? I am now employed at Clark, Davidson & Co., Certified General Accountants in Vernon, B.C. My duties are typing financial statements; typing letters; answering the phone; general office duties including filing; preparing journals of cash disbursements as well as the complete bookkeeping for several of our clients. I am in charge of doing all the data processing for 5 different clients and I have been doing income tax returns. I first learned to type at CUC and so that prepared me for the typing aspect of my job. I took a class on bookkeeping at CUC as well as Business Machines. Without these two classes I would not have the job that I have today. My boss wanted someone who knew bookkeeping and who could operate the calculator efficiently. This training also helped me in learning to use the Datacorder which I use to do the data-processing. I was working as a secretary while I was taking my training at CUC and so I gained some experience in the secretarial field as well.

Without spending the year at CUC I could not have had my present job as soon as I did. I would advise the one-year secretarial program to any student who is interested in going to work as soon as possible and earning a reasonable wage.

I was employed by Clark, Davidson & Co. in September 1979 and in January 1980 I received a promotion from Secretary to Bookkeeper, and a new secretary was hired. As well as the promotion I received a raise in pay and my own office in which to work.

I hope this is what you wanted. I had a nice trip back from CUC and I enjoyed the time I spent at the College very much.

The weather here is just beautiful. It is hot and sunny almost every day. There are alot of flowers up now and already the blossoms are falling off the apple trees. I guess I better get back to work. I would enjoy hearing from you again sometime.
