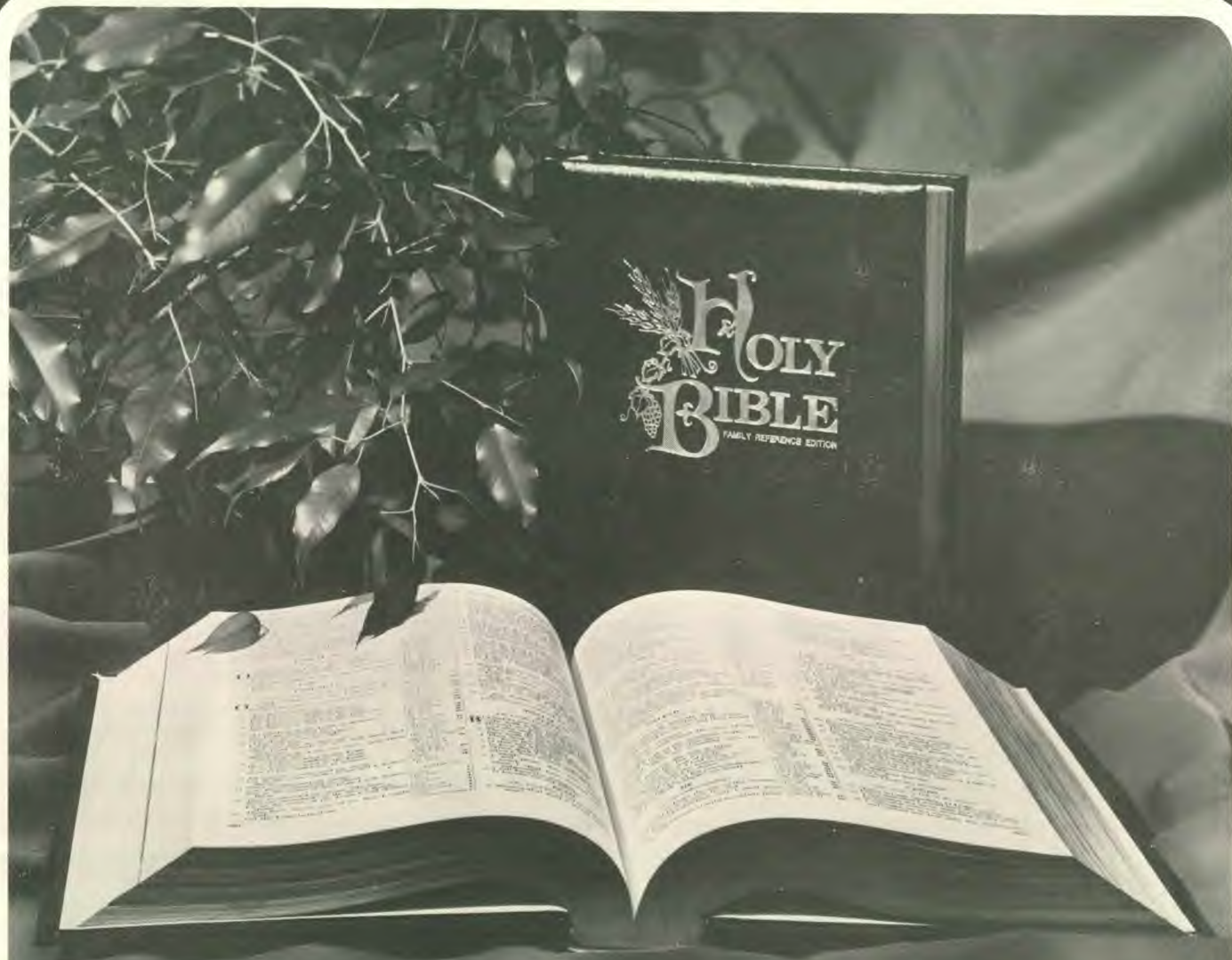

Speak The Word Only!

"By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; and all the host of them by the breath of his mouth . . . For he spake, and it was done; he commanded, and it stood fast." Psalm 33:6, 9

"And God said, let there be light; and there was light." Genesis 1:3

Over and over the description of creation repeats, "And God said." And what were the results of such declarations? "And it was so."

Since creation was accomplished by the speaking of God, John describes the Creator as "The Word."

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God . . . All things were made by him; and without him was not anything made that was made." John 1:1, 3 Verse 14 makes it plain that this person called "The Word" was Christ.

When Jesus, "The Word," walked this earth as a human, His word still had most unusual power. Remember the centurion whose servant was so ill? He explained to Jesus that he was not worthy for Jesus to come to his house, but he said, "Speak the word only, and my servant shall be healed." Matthew 8:8

And the Bible explains that the servant, miles away, "was healed in the selfsame hour."

To the young man who was dead Jesus said, "Young man, I say unto thee, Arise." Luke 7:14. And he came to life.

To Lazarus, dead in the tomb, He said, "Lazarus, come forth." John 11:43

To the palsied man let down through the roof, He said, "Thy sins be forgiven thee."

When Jesus was questioned about His authority to forgive sins, He responded by again speaking to the crippled man "Arise, take up thy bed, and go unto thine house." Matthew 9:2, 6

To the wind and the waves in the storm on Galilee, He again spoke, "Peace be still." Mark 4:39

Repeatedly the spoken words of Jesus, The Word, produced the results that were commanded.

Jesus utilized the written Word with the same results. Do you recall how He repeatedly referred to the Scriptures of the Old Testament in His discussion with Satan in the wilderness? See Luke 4:4, 8, 12.

The written Word still possesses the same power today as in the days of Jesus.

"In every command and in every promise of the word of God is the power, the very life of God, by which the command may be fulfilled and the promise realized." *Christ's Object Lessons*, p. 38

"The same power that Christ exercised when He walked visibly among men is in His word. It was by His word that Jesus healed disease and cast out demons; by His word He stilled the sea, and raised the dead; and the people bore witness that His word was with power. He spoke the word of God, as He had spoken to all the prophets and teachers of the old Testament. The whole Bible is a manifestation of Christ.

"The Scriptures are to be received as God's word to us, not written merely, but spoken. When the afflicted ones came to Christ, He beheld not only those who asked for help, but all who throughout the ages should come to Him in like need and with like

faith. When He said to the paralytic, 'Son, be of good cheer; thy sins be forgiven thee,' when He said to the woman of Capernaum, 'Daughter, be of good comfort; thy faith hath made thee whole; go in peace,' He spoke to other afflicted, sin-burdened ones who should seek His help.

"So with all the promises of God's word. In them He is speaking to us individually, speaking as directly as if we could listen to His voice. It is in these promises that Christ communicates to us His grace and power. They are leaves from that tree which is 'for the healing of the nations.' Received, assimilated, they are to be the strength of the character, the inspiration and sustenance of the life. Nothing else can have such healing power. Nothing besides can impart the courage and faith, which give vital energy to the whole being." *Ministry of Healing*, p. 122

Is it any wonder that Paul describes the Word like this: "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword . . ." Hebrews 4:12

Perhaps the psalmist described the effectiveness of The Word most beautifully when he sang, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee." Psalm 119:11

Oh, what an exalted privilege is ours to have the precious Word of God! How wonderful it is to know and believe the amazing power in the simple words "And God said." "And it was so." O friend, it is as effective today as at creation; if you will but take Him at His Word.

Canadians Volunteer Service at Mwami Adventist Hospital, Zambia, Africa

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert D. Goertzen, members of the Grand Forks SDA Church, returned home after 12 months of volunteer service at Mwami Adventist Hospital and Leprosarium, on May 15.

Mr. Goertzen worked as a carpenter and builder and Mrs. Goertzen besides helping her husband, assisted with some physiotherapy instruction in the hospital, cared for visitors, and spent two afternoons a week working in the hospital store.

Besides the Goertzens several other Canadians have assisted in a similar manner during the past months. Bill and Edith White spent 3 months giving carpentry skills to the projects during 1979, as volunteers from Victoria, B.C.

Mr. and Mrs. Lorne Peterson, with their two sons Vern and Kirk, are presently at Mwami as Special Service workers. They came from C.U.C. and are spending their love and devotion as relatively new members

of the Adventist family, in the most practical way possible.

Medical Director, Dr. Jack Hoehn, is from Vancouver Island by birth, and he and his wife, Deanne, left for Africa from Calgary, Alberta back in 1973. At Mwami since 1977, he joins Sister Ruth Rowe also from British Columbia, as Canadians at Mwami. Son of Dr. Gus and Olive Hoehn, he carries on a second generation of Medical Missions in Africa, from Canada.

"There is so much work for any man or woman with practical skills, that I wish more of our people would be willing to contribute personally to mission work, as volunteer workers," he stated explaining that this usually means the volunteer pays for his own transportation to and from the field, while often a small living allowance and accommodations are provided for the duration of the stay. A three month stay is the minimum useful time, while longer stays from 1 year

and more often can be worked out to mutual benefit of both the mission and the worker.

Contact regarding specific needs can be made with personal acquaintances in any of the developing world mission fields, or general offers of assistance can be sent to the Secretariat of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, who assist in fitting needs to the abilities of those volunteering their service to the Lord.

Our Canadian members continue with a record of earnest support for God's work both at home and abroad, not only with their systematic benevolence, but also by personal participation in the Lord's program of love and mercy to a suffering world.

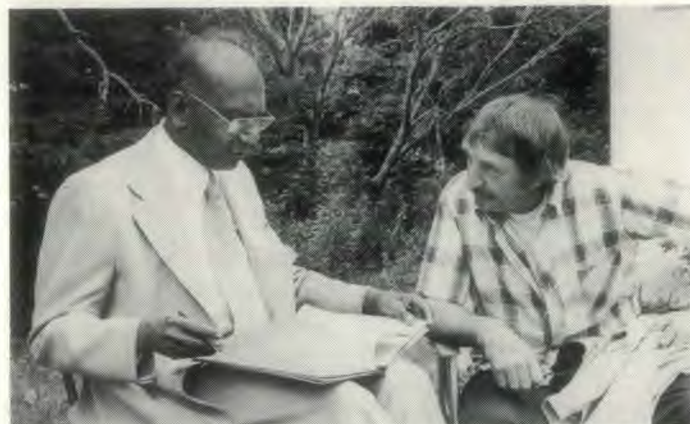

Health Ministries' Lifestyle Participants Baptized

In February of 1979 a multi-dimensional health program named *Lifestyle* was conducted by Elder Strunk and the staff and members of the College Park Church. The program emphasized a balance of exercise, nutrition, stress management and faith in God. Because of the interest manifested by the participants a *Spiritual Lifestyle* was designed to follow the health emphasis.

Spiritual Lifestyle continued to meet once a week for over a year, during which time The Three Angels' Messages and more were covered. During July and August only one meeting was held. Participants drove down from their cottages and set other activities aside in order not to miss the once-a-month program in the summer. After a year of attending meetings every Tuesday night, those persons who are now baptized attend even the Wednesday night prayer meeting faithfully. Fifty-two persons registered for this program, and forty-one stopped smoking. Pastor Coleman sent out a letter each week for five weeks as a follow-up which leads to a vegetarian supper at the church. This leads to regular contacts with Bible studies.

The manager of the local community Cable TV Station in town attended one of the programs. Even though he smoked 2 packs of

cigarettes each day for many years, today he is a non-smoker.

Assisting in the programs were Dr. Graham Wood and Pastor Eric Juriansz, and others from the church. The Hamilton Wentworth Lung Association made us five hundred folders at no cost to us. The 5-Day Plan to Stop Smoking, when properly conducted, can be a missionary outreach for the church.

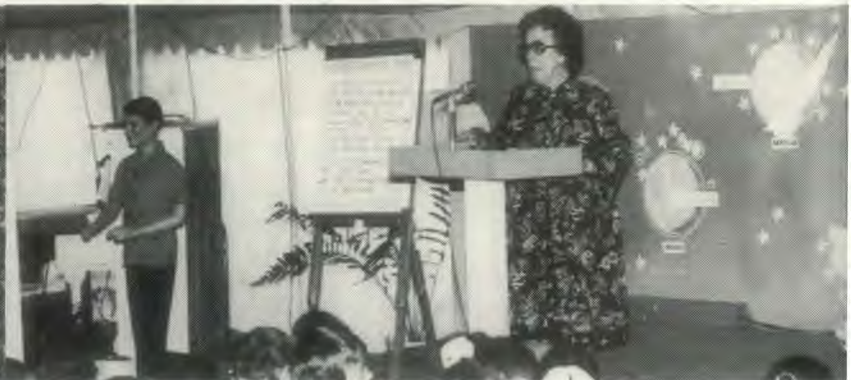

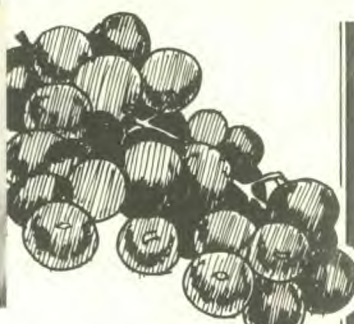
Mr. and Mrs. Brown received a going-away present from their friends at the St. Thomas Church.

kitchen korner

The unusually versatile protein from wheat, was almost certainly first used in the Orient—most likely by the creative Chinese. Oriental gluten today is as yet unrivalled by anything created in the western world, at least in my opinion.

The health food industry in America has introduced gluten-based products in a variety of tasty dishes, which are very convenient. However, with an eye to the food budget, one can make gluten-based dishes at home, which are full of flavor, and can be as varied as there are numbers of cooks.

Basic Gluten Recipe

- | | |
|--|---------------------------------|
| *3½ cups pure gluten flour | ½ cup yeast flakes (food yeast) |
| ½ cup white or whole wheat flour | 2 Tbsp. onion powder |
| (whole wheat flour makes gluten more tender) | 1 Tbsp. garlic powder |
| ½ cup soy flour | Shake of thyme |

*If gluten flour is 80% or not pure gluten flour, use 4¼ cups of gluten flour, omit the white or whole flour, and cut the soy flour to ¼ cup.

Mix separately: 3 cups cold water ½ cup soya sauce

Method

Pour dry ingredients into liquid mixture. Mix together quickly, and thoroughly. Roll gluten into two sausage rolls. Can be simmered in broth as rolls, or sliced into cutlets, and simmered that way.

Broth

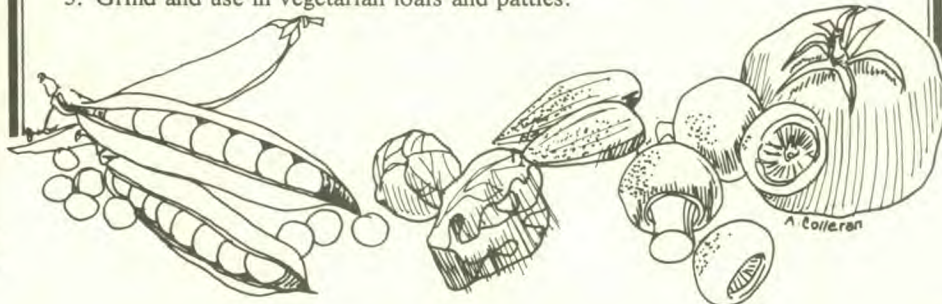

| 3 quarts boiling water | 2 cups tomato juice |
| 1 cup soya sauce | ¼ tsp. thyme |
| ½ cup yeast flakes (Food yeast) | ¼ tsp. bay leaf |
| 1 cup chopped onion | |

Method

Bring broth to boil. When it is boiling very hard, drop cutlets one by one into the broth where it is boiling the hardest. Do not allow the broth to discontinue boiling while adding the cutlets. Stir occasionally, to separate cutlets. Continue to boil over lower heat for 1½ hours, until cutlets are cooked. Store covered in the refrigerator, or freeze in airtight containers.

Serving Suggestions:

1. Dip gluten in breading meal, and brown on both sides. It can be served plain or with a gravy, with tomato sauce and onions, mushroom sauce and onions or a sweet and sour sauce.
2. Cut in chunks, and add to a vegetable stew or pot pie.
3. Grind and use in vegetarian loafs and patties.

Kingsway College Constructs Industrial Arts Building

Construction is under way for the new Industrial Arts Building on the Kingsway College campus. The 9,500 sq. foot building will house two classrooms, a large vocational shop, and the Maintenance Department.

The plans for this building were drawn up by the 1980 grade twelve Building & Construction class, taught by Mr. Clarence Biesenthal. The class also participated in a good share of the surveying on the site. Student labour was also used in preparation for and the pouring of the footings.

The new building will be located between the College Woodwork and the College Redwood factories. The construction of the building includes block walls with a finished split-ribbed block on the exterior. A pre-fabricated hollow concrete ceiling-roof combination will top the structure, negating the extra expense and labour of a steel supported roof with a separate dropped ceiling. The cost of the building is estimated at \$150,000.00.

The projected close-in date has been slated for September with the finishing work being completed

in November. The painting, wiring, plumbing, and final touches will then be done mostly by classes and student help.

With the addition of this new building, the Industrial Arts programme has been expanded to meet more areas of student interest. Classes offered will include woodworking, drafting, electricity, welding, electronics, power mechanics, auto mechanics, auto body working, and plumbing for a total of ten possible credits.
