

# Fire Destroys Barn and Cattle At Canadian Union College

Approximately ninety head of dairy cattle, and most of the dairy complex, were destroyed by fire at Canadian Union College during the night of January 8. Also destroyed were several pieces of heavy equipment including the tractor, front-end loader and a silage wagon. Business manager, Cliff Patterson, estimates the total loss at approximately

\$750,000.00. The cattle, barn and contents were insured, but not nearly enough to replace them.

With the assistance of faculty members and students into the early morning hours, Erling Grovet and his assistant Mel Dury, were able to save forty-two head of dairy cattle, and thirty calves and take them to

nearby farms where they will be cared for until other arrangements can be made.

## Share a Positive Lifestyle

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# Darren Lloyd Michael

## 1923 - 1981

Darren Lloyd Michael was born August 15, 1923 in the northern India hill town of Simla, then known as United Provinces of British India, and died early the morning of Wednesday, January 7, 1981 in Oshawa, Ontario, Canada. He had suffered a massive heart attack in October, 1980 and never again regained consciousness.

At the time of his birth, Darren's father was a missionary with the Southern Asia Division and served them as assistant treasurer of the Division office. Elder T.J. Michael originally came to India as a British Army officer and became an Adventist while in India.

Darren attended elementary school at Vincent Hill in northern India in sight of the great Himalyan Mountain range. One of his classmates there was Neal C. Wilson, whose father at that time was president of the Southern Asia Division.

After Darren completed one year of high school at Vincent Hill, he accompanied his parents to England and then to America during an extended furlough for the family, then on to Shenandoah Valley Academy where he completed his secondary education. His undergraduate degree is from Atlantic Union College, South Lancaster, Massachusetts where he graduated with a Bachelor of Theology degree in 1946.

He later attended the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary, now affiliated with Andrews University in Michigan, where he received a master's degree in religion.

During his academy years in Virginia, he met Marilyn Ruth West, originally from Baltimore, Maryland. The friendship developed and grew and on June 27, 1943 they were married in Baltimore, Md. From this union has come five children and one foster son. They have seven grandchildren.

After graduation Darren received an invitation from the Ontario-Quebec Conference to serve as a ministerial worker. He served churches in St. Catharines, Niagara Falls, Welland, Kingston, and Windsor. He was

ordained to the gospel ministry in 1950 in Oshawa, Ontario.

While Elder Michael served as a pastor and district leader, he took a deep interest in community affairs and public relations in general. In 1952 the Canadian Union Conference asked him to join the staff as director of public relations and secretary of the religious liberty department. He became a Canadian citizen in 1953.

Elder Michael took a particular interest in the legal aspects of church work. He quickly noted the need for a Seventh-day Adventist lawyer to handle the legal affairs of the many facets of church work—publishing, educational, medical, as well as administrative.

With the blessing and support of the Canadian Union Conference executive committee, he began the study of law at the Osgoode Hall Law school in Toronto. He managed to keep up with his law studies as well as his work in the union conference as well as take care of a growing family. He graduated on June 25, 1964 with the LL.B. degree.

He was employed as a Barrister/Solicitor by Ricketts, Farley, and Lowndes from April, 1966 to June 30, 1975. He was then admitted as a partner in the firm on July 1, 1975 and remained as such until the formation of Ricketts, Jewell, Angus, and Michael on July 2, 1977. As one of the original founding partners of this new firm, he was responsible for the firm's Oshawa office along with a partner, David Thomas. He was called to the Ontario Bar on March 25, 1966.

The list of his involvement in community and church affairs is long and complex, much too long to enumerate at this point. I was personally very pleased with his continuing association with and activity for the Seventh-day Adventist denomination. He continued as director of the Department of Public Affairs of the Canadian Union Conference until the time of his death. He was a consulting editor for two journals of the denomination: JD, a journal for Adventist lawyers, and

Liberty, a magazine of religious freedom published by the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. He was a member of three law organizations.

He was a member of the Union Conference executive committee, a trustee of Kingsway College, a solicitor for Kingsway Pioneer Homes, Inc., and has been listed in Who's Who in Religion since 1975.

He has been connected at one time or another with the Rotary Club of Oshawa, the Durham Region Children's Aid Society, the Oshawa Chamber of Commerce, the Westmount Kiwanis Club, the Oshawa Red Cross Society, the Oshawa and District Historical Society, and the Toronto Chapter of the National Religious Publicity Council.

I tried to keep up with all of these activities even though I was thousands of miles away in mission service in Singapore. The one item that impressed me the most was the news that came to me in a clipping of an Oshawa newspaper dated January 5, 1980 when it announced that Darren Michael had been named as a Queen's Counsel. I was even more impressed when he explained on long-distance telephone the full significance of this rare honour.

Our beloved Darren leaves to mourn his wife, Marilyn; six children: John Collin Michael, of Watson Lake, Yukon; Joan Skwarchuk, of Bradford, Ontario; Janice Cheryl Fenton, of Oshawa, Ontario; Jeannine Teter, of Chattanooga, Tenn.; James Michael, of Oshawa, Ontario; and Dale Fessenden, of Calistoga, California, a foster son; seven grandchildren, Jodi, Jill, Matthew, Daryl, Robyn, Ricky, and Geoffrey; his father, Thomas John Michael, of Yucaipa, Calif., now 85 years of age; a brother, Radner Colin Michael, of Ventura, Calif., and a host of friends and fellow workers around the world.

Frankly I would like to live next door to Darren and Marilyn, or at least on the same street, when we get to heaven and my Lord makes all things new. To Marilyn and each of the children, and other family members, I want to say that while we cannot answer all the "whys" that flood our minds, yet you should know that the Lord loves you, that we

love you, and that the Holy Spirit has been commissioned to minister to you, to bring comfort, and to help you to look beyond the agony and loneliness and sorrow of today to the time when all tears will be wiped away, and death will be swallowed up in victory.

# The Gift of Faith

One of the most refreshing experiences concerning a gift of faith comes from the Bible. You will recall the time that a little boy had his mother prepare him a lunch because he wanted to go hear Jesus speak. Maybe his mother sent that sack lunch without his request, knowing that he would get very hungry about 2:00 in the afternoon! We are not sure about that, but we do know that Jesus, in his kind, loving way, understood that all the people present were hungry. He wanted to provide for their physical needs as well as their spiritual needs.

Andrew had found the boy with the lunch. He had five little loaves and two small fish. Knowing little boys, it seems to me that he could have said something like this when Andrew told him that Jesus needed his lunch: "First let me take out two loaves and one small fish for myself, and then you can take the remainder to Jesus." However, it seems that he willingly, and without one thought of himself, gave his complete lunch to Jesus as a gift. He did not expect anything



in return. He did not ask: "What's in this for me?" It was a gift of faith. From the Biblical record (John 6:5-14) we find no indication that the young lad asked any question or made any hesitation. He gave his lunch, expecting to go hungry, but he was rewarded with more than five loaves and two fish himself, and thousands of others were well fed also.

Jesus is still looking for boys and girls, and men and women, who are willing to give what they have without hesitation or question. When the gift for God's cause is a willing gift of faith, the blessing of heaven will multiply it, and souls will be saved for eternity.

The smallest sum given cheerfully as the result of self-denial is of more value in the sight of God than the offerings of those who could give thousands and yet feel no lack. *Counsels on Stewardship, p. 178*

That little lunch, given so willingly by that small boy, will always remain as an example for us of unselfish giving. And even more important, it will remain as an everlasting lesson to us of how Jesus can turn a small gift of faith into a great shower of blessing. Let's follow the example and experience the blessing.

"The subject of health reform has been presented in the churches; but the light has not been heartily received. The selfish, health-destroying indulgences of men and women have counteracted the influence of the message that is to prepare a people for the great day of God. If the churches expect strength, they must live the truth which God has given them. If the members of our churches disregard the light on this subject, they will reap the sure result in both spiritual and physical degeneracy. And the influence of these older church members will leaven those newly come to the faith. The Lord does not now work to bring many souls into the truth, because of the church members who have never been converted and those who were once converted but who have backslidden. What influence would these unconsecrated members have on new converts?"

Would they not make of no effect the God-given message which His people are to bear?

"Let all examine their own practices to see if they are not indulging in that which is a positive injury to them. Let them dispense with every unhealthful gratification in eating and drinking. Some go to distant countries to seek a better climate; but wherever they may be, the stomach creates for them a malarious atmosphere. They bring upon themselves suffering that no one can alleviate. Let them bring their daily practice into harmony with nature's laws; and by doing as well as believing, an atmosphere may be created about both soul and body that will be a savor of life unto life."<sup>3</sup>

## Alumni Participate on C.U.C. Campus

A service of prayer and praise celebrated in churches throughout Canada, Sabbath, November 29, 1980 gave recognition to God's special guidance in opening the way for a senior Adventist College in Canada. In addition to thanking God for this further evidence of His strength in behalf of His people, divine guidance was sought in the development of degree programs on the Canadian Union College campus.

In opening the service at CUC, the Honourable Jack Cookson, MLA for Lacombe and an Alberta cabinet minister, reiterated the intention of the Alberta government that degree programs be offered at Canadian Union College. He spoke with enthusiasm of his government's desire for Canadian Union College to grow and fulfill its goals as a Seventh-day Adventist Christian College. He said, "The Premier of Alberta is not only aware of your aims but wants you to strengthen your programs and add new courses including a nurses training program."

Alumni, gathered on the hilltop for their annual Homecoming, participated in the event. During the 11:00 a.m. praise service, LeRoy J. Leiske, a graduate of 1940 and now general manager of the Pacific Press, emphasized that Canadian Union College is an evangelistic centre for the saving and training of our youth. The main prayer was offered by Lloyd L. Reile, a 1935 graduate, now the College's Board Chairman.

**"If you get the broadcast license Dan, you'll owe me something!"**


**"How much?"**



# kitchen korer

The nutty flavour of garbanzos is a pleasant addition to a great variety of dishes. They are nice either hot or cold, they can be used as a main dish, or are tasty in salads.

Garbanzos are rich in protein, complex carbohydrates, B vitamins and trace minerals. Canned garbanzos are easily purchased in some parts of our country, but the rest of us have to rely on the dried variety. Dried garbanzos are somewhat difficult to cook to a soft texture without a pressure cooker.

If you are using dried garbanzos, sort them carefully for husks, stones or dirt. Wash thoroughly. If pressure cooking, cover the garbanzos with about double the water and bring up to pressure. Then turn the heat off and allow to set on the stove for 20 minutes to ½ hour. The garbanzos will be cooked in that period of time. If you would like them softer, bring them up to pressure one more time. This yields a very soft garbanzo and there is no danger of the pressure cooker valve becoming plugged.

If you haven't a pressure cooker, the best results are obtained by soaking the garbanzos overnight. In the morning drain on several thicknesses of paper or towel. Place loosely on a tray and quick freeze. Store in cartons in the freezer.

To cook: Add 2 cups of frozen garbanzos to 2 cups of rapidly boiling water. Use a kettle that is large enough to prevent boiling over. Cover and boil briskly for an hour or more to obtain the desired texture.

A meal including garbanzo stew always brings squeals of delight from the members of my family. This recipe served with yams or winter squash and a tossed salad makes an easy but delicious meal.

### Garbanzo Stew

- 6 cups water
- 2 cups cooked garbanzos
- 1 cup soy chicken bits (dried TVP). We like this addition, but it is optional and not included in the nutritional calculations.
- 1-10 oz. can whole mushrooms (1¼ cups fresh mushrooms)
- 2 medium potatoes
- 2 medium carrots
- 1 onion
- 3 Tbsp. McKay's chicken style seasoning

#### Method:

Combine all ingredients in a large kettle (about 3½ to 4 quart). Bring to a boil and top with your favourite dumplings. By the time the dumplings are cooked, the stew will be also. Serves 4.

## My Favourite Dumplings

- 1¼ cup unbleached white flour
- ½ cup whole wheat flour
- ¼ cup wheat germ
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. salt (scant)
- 3 Tbsp. oil
- ¾ cup milk

### Method:

Combine dry ingredients, add oil and milk, and mix thoroughly. Drop in small spoonfuls onto the boiling stew. Cook 10 minutes with the lid off and then 10 minutes with the lid on tightly. Turn the heat down so that the stew is still boiling, but minimizing the spatter. Serves 4. Nutrients per serving: (Dumplings only) Calories - 310, Protein - 9.3, Iron - 2.2

An alternate way to serve this stew, which is also very good, is to thicken the water used in the stew with 4 Tbsp. flour. Put into a casserole, cook until partially done, then top with mashed potatoes and bake for ½ hour at 375°. Nutrients per serving (stew only without mashed potatoes or dumplings): Calories - 260, Protein - 13 gms., Iron - 4.4 gms.
