Disaster and Famine Relief — You Can HELP!

To the Third World Nations, an Albertan is more than a big hat and a handshake at the Calgary Stampede. Here in Canada, our SAWS Canada organization has appreciated so much the help that the Alberta government has given to Third World countries. Last year, over \$6 million was distributed through the different non-governmental organizations, of which SAWS is one. We have been able to receive funding from the Alberta government, matching the money dollar for dollar, that has been raised for International Development Aid through the various agencies of our church, including the Disaster and Famine Relief Offering taken among all of our churches each year in May. The money that is raised in this way has been matched dollar for dollar, making the one dollar two; and then the Federal government of Canada has matched that, making the two dollars four. We can really see how the gifts have multiplied and been used in the furtherance of development aid in the developing countries of the Third World.

Nutritional packages of food have been sent to the countries of Zaire and Zambia. A nutritional package is now being formulated to be sent to Upper Volta. Quoting from a newspaper article in Zambia, it states that the "gift of food was a measure of goodwill from the people of Alberta." Elder Henri

Marais, the former president of the Zambia Union goes on to say in this interview that "the donation was meant to ease Zambia's food shortages which have been brought about as a result of the country's committment to free the suffering masses of Southern Africa." He also added, "What is most amazing is that the Province of Alberta with its vigorous aid program gives more to help the needy of the world than do all the rest of the Canadian provinces put together, and indeed, some of the wealthy Commonwealth countries."

We certainly are happy here in Canada to realize that our people wish to help the needy in various places. We even believe that the economic boom that this province is participating in may be partially due to the fact that God blesses those who are sharing and caring in regard to the needy.

Not only are the funds that have been received used for nutritional food packages to the various countries, but we have been

able to help in a Better Living Centre, in a program of agriculture, a dental clinic and sent funds to purchase radio equipment for use in a hospital and clinics.

Over \$56,000 has been received to provide a pure water system, and funds for wells and

We as a church have truly been blessed in having a world-wide organization which allows the funding from the various governments to flow to these projects and thus help the people in developing countries around the world.

During the past four years, we have received \$205,265.00 from the Federal government and \$226,173.93 from the Alberta government. This year, when we take up our offering on May 9, let us really make this an extra-ordinary offering, realizing that our funds are multiplying. We do not know how long before the end of time this provision and generosity of our governments will continue, so while we still have time, let us really make this a sacrificial offering, that the suffering millions around the world might have an opportunity of seeing Christianity at work in a practical way.

A Saving Plan

Recently I read of family that had an income of well over \$40,000 per year and yet were deeply in debt. Could it be possible that someone with that amount of income would still not have enough to live on nor have some left to save every month?

The human tendency is to live to the very edge, or even beyond our income. It seems so easy for our wants to be always just a little more than our income, no matter how big that income may be. In this age of increased material goods, we need to ask the Lord to help us separate our wants from our needs. The inspired counsel of Ellen G. White indicates that we should have a savings plan. No matter how high or low our income, some amount should be set aside each week, or month, in savings for emergency or special need. On several occasions individuals or families were counselled to save:

You might today have had a capital of

means to use in case of emergency, and to aid the cause of God, if you have economized as you should. Every week a portion of your wages should be reserved, and in no case touched, unless suffering actual want, or to render back to the Giver in offerings to God . . . Letter 5, 1877.

To another family, she gave this counsel concerning a savings account:

Every week you should lay by in some secure place five or ten dollars not to be used up unless in case of sickness. With economy you may place something at interest. With wise management you can save something after paying your debts. Letter 49, 1884.

Many well-meaning Christian people misunderstand the teaching of God's word and the Spirit of Prophecy concerning economy and saving. Jesus demonstrated and taught economy by His life and actions. After feeding the 5,000 He instructed his disciples and others who may have been assisting, to gather up what was left that nothing be wasted. They ended up with twelve baskets full of fragments. It is a good plan to save and to be careful in spending and in the use we make of what God has given us to manage.

In giving counsel to the Thessalonian Christians, Paul spoke words on this subject that will help us today.

Let it be your ambition to keep calm and look after your own business, and to work with your hands, as we ordered you; so that you command the respect of those outside your own number, and at the same time may never be in want. N.E.B., I Thess. 4:11.

Revolving Fund Builds Churches

As of this writing, the Canadian Union Revolving Fund has loans out to fifty-five churches, church schools and other institutions across Canada assisting them in their building programs. Twenty-one other churches have had loans and have repaid them. Seven churches are waiting to receive assistance.

A few years ago, the leaders of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada felt the need to try to provide funds to help those churches and institutions within Canada that have a building project in their plans. When such building programs are begun, rare indeed is the church that does not have to borrow money. As a result of the many projects planned and under way, permission was granted to begin what is known as the Revolving Fund.

The Revolving Fund is a plan approved by the General Conference, whereby our people may deposit money in the Canadian Union Revolving Fund, and it is then available for churches and institutions within Canada to borrow for building projects. The Revolving Fund loans money at a rate of interest much less than our churches would have to pay if they were to go to a commercial lending office. At the same time, the fund pays a depositor less interest than he would be able to receive at a bank or other such firm. At the present time, the Revolving Fund pays interest to depositors at 8½% while it loans these funds to the churches at 9½%.

This plan was begun in the Canadian Union in 1976, and at the end of the year 1980 our people had invested the amount of \$2,800,000 in this fund. All of these funds have been loaned out to help construct churches, schools and other types of buildings within Canada. I believe that these results show that our people approve of this plan and that they are pleased to know that they are helping some group to save money in their building program.

A while back, we had a few requests from members wanting to know if we could, by any chance, raise these interest rates because of the higher rates of interest they could receive if they were to deposit their money in banks, etc. While we can understand the thinking behind such requests, we feel that it would be defeating the real purpose of the Revolving Fund if we were to raise our interest rates at this time. In the book *Counsels on Stewardship*, p. 283, we read:

Those members to whom the Lord has given means can invest their money in the cause without interest or at a low rate of interest, and by their free will offerings they can help to support the work.

This is the basis upon which the Revolving Fund works. Our people want to see their money working now, and this is one plan where their money is doing a tremendous work. Some churches would not be able to build if it were not for this policy of loaning money at a lower rate of interest.

In recent weeks we have had many requests from church organizations to borrow

All of us feel we want to see progress and growth in our church's membership. The accomplishment of this, however, seems to elude many congregations year after year. If we are members of such churches we are inclined to ask ourselves why. Certainly the others in our church family appear to be committed and friendly Christians. Their love for their church and what it stands for is as genuine as our own. It is hard to understand why the membership hasn't grown. Perhaps the reason for your lack of growth can be traced to a need of an aim, a goal, for your church's growth. "Success in any line demands a definite aim. He who would achieve true success . . . must keep steadily in view the aim worthy of his endeavor." Education, p. 262.

Those who have made a careful study of why churches grow say that goals can be an important factor on the road to growth for a congregation. The church must want to grow, it must have a goal, and it must be willing to

pay the price.

The fact that relatively few churches set goals for growth is an evidence that they are not as serious about wanting to grow as they say they are. We are something like an overweight friend who is always talking about getting more exercise and going on a diet, but year after year he stays about the same. Many say they want to see their church grow, but it remains the same year after year. Why? They have failed to set bold goals and then do whatever is necessary to attain them.

Dr. C. Peter Wagner, a leader in the church growth movement, has said that the chief deterrent to creative, courageous goal setting on the part of a leader is timidity. Not to have goals is a comfortable policy. With no goals it is impossible to fail. No one wants to fail, and some have convinced themselves that failure can be avoided by aiming at nothing. "But," he continues, "it seems that these timid souls have overlooked the fact that while their system disallows failure, it also disallows success."

There is another way of sliding over the challenge the Spirit of Prophecy has given us to take aim, or to set goals. We can have goals, but we may put them so low that there is no risk in meeting our objective. This approach is fail-safe. It is like the marksman who shoots a bullet into the wall, then draws the target around the bullet hole. This may

fool some people, but it does not fool the Lord. It shows a lack of faith in what God can do for us in His work.

Anything done for the Lord involves taking a risk and exercising faith. In a parable, Jesus told of a businessman who gave his employees the responsibility of investing some of his capital for him. To one he gave five talents, to another two talents, and to a third one talent. A talent was \$1,000 in silver, and it had much more in buying power then than now. The employer then went away on a business trip. When he returned he called them in to give a report of their stewardship of his funds.

Two were reckoned as "good and faithful" servants. They brought 100% return on their money. Even by today's standards that would be considered commendable. The third employee, however, was indifferent. He had buried his talent, and his master deemed him "wicked and lazy." He should have at least put the money in the bank at interest. (Matt. 25:27)

It is clear that God wants us to be bold, to take risks for Him. If we bury our talents in the sand and have no goal except to avoid failure, we may save ourselves a struggle and strenuous effort, but we will also find the procedure is self-defeating.

your books, I would like to order, today, a large number of them to distribute to friends and family." Alberta.

"I enjoy listening to your messages, backed up by Scripture. I am involved in Bible studies and find your words helpful... My study now is the book of Genesis, and know the book Tying Down the Sun will help... Those who have held public evangelistic meetings understand the meaning of all this. They have experienced the pressure of risk in the Lord's work. They also know that they must "get out on the limb" for God, and that when they do God gets out on the limb with them. There is a budget involved in the crusade, the advertising, the recruitment of helpers, the other preparations, and all these proclaim that they are taking aim for God, they are setting their sights on progress in the Kingdom of God.

Robert Schuller is pastor of the Garden Grove Community Church in a Los Angeles suburb. Since its founding by Dr. Schuller in 1955, it has grown an average of 500% per decade. The church now has a membership of over 8,000. In his book Your Church Has Real Possibilities, he describes in fascinating detail the secrets of his success. Pastor Schuller had to overcome a deep fear of failure in order to begin setting goals that would stimulate growth. One day his attention was drawn to a slogan printed across the top of a wall calendar: "I'd rather attempt to do something great and fail than attempt to do nothing and succeed." The truth of this concept burned into his heart and it became one of the motivating forces that produced the now well-known philosophy he has called "possibility thinking."

Possibility thinking is what the Bible calls faith. Jesus used one parable after another to get men to believe God for great things and He promised that mountains of difficulty would be removed if we do. We can, through faith, reach seemingly unattainable goals. "If you have faith as a grain of mustard seed" (Matt. 17:20) is the first requirement. You will do very little for God unless you dream great dreams and set challenging, but realistic, goals for their accomplishment.

Without faith it is impossible to please God, Without faith it is also impossible to grow churches. Call it "possibility thinking" or goal-setting, or whatever else you like, but faith is a prerequisite for your church's growth. In fact, it is indispensable.

Eating Between Meals Shortens Life

One of the most significant research projects of this century in the field of health was reported by Belloc and Breslow in Preventive Medicine, August 1972¹. Their study revealed that the level of health which an individual enjoys is dependent upon the simple health practices followed from day to day.

The same study group has been followed for 9½ years, and it has revealed that the same simple health practices followed day by day are, when taken collectively, the most significant contributors to longer life than anything else yet discovered. There are other single factor contributors to early mortality or longevity being recognized in other studies; such things as, smoking being the most significant contributor to early death while vegetarianism and organization of behaviour, and an active social life are the better predictors of long life.

Let's take a look at the results of these studies because they represent good research. They are quotable. They vindicate God's simple suggestions to good health.

In the first study, an effort to determine the relationship of physical health status to health practices, a physical health spectrum was developed describing five levels of health: 1. disability, 2. chronic conditions, 3. impairments, 4. symptoms, and 5. energy level. 6,928 adults were categorized according to this health spectrum in relationship to their following seven simple health practices as follows: sleeping, eating breakfast, eating between meals, physical activity, alcoholic beverage consumption, smoking.

The recommended health practices as a result of this study are: 1. get not less than 7 and not more than 8 hours sleep a night, 2. eat breakfast almost every day, 3. eat between meals rarely or never, 4. for men weight not less than 5% under and not more than 19.99% over ideal weight, for women weigh not less than 5% under and not more than 9.99% over ideal weight, 5. often engage in active sports, swim or take long walks, or often garden or do physical exercises, 6. drink none or not more than 2 drinks of alcohol at one time and 7. never smoke cigarettes.

Now we're coming to the exciting part and what makes this study so significant. The graph below illustrates the conclusions of the researchers, namely that each of these good health practices was significant by itself.

There was no one thing that made the person who did it better or worse than all the others. In the words of the researchers themselves:

"Regular meals, adequate sleep, near average weight, physical activity and avoidance of smoking and excessive drinking were all positively related to health. There was no common factor substantially underlying the association between physical health status and the habits of daily life that were studied. Each individual one is significant." This means that getting adequate exercise is as important as not smoking. This means that eating breakfast regularly is as important as not drinking excessive alcohol. Getting the right hours of sleep is as important as being the correct weight. Each one of these habits is significant and their effects are cumulative. As each one is added the health improves measurably.


In the graph below the lower the line is on the scale the fewer poor health indices are present, or the better is one's health. The left-hand scale (vertical axis) is a special statistical technique which need not be interpreted in order to appreciate the placement of one line relative to another. RIDIT means "Relative to an Identified Distribution" which was established by a previous study. The important thing is that high values indicate poor

physical health, low values indicate good physical health. And to what degree? An individual who follows all seven of these good health practices is physiologically the same age as someone 30 years younger who follows none to 2 of them.

It's not at all unusual to find someone who follows none of these recommendations. They don't sleep adequately or they sleep far too much. They skip breakfast. They eat any time. They're either extremely thin or very much over weight. They never seek exercise. And they drink and smoke.

Now comes the second exciting observation that could not have been made 10 years ago. These health practices are not only related to morbidity; they are also related to mortality (death rate) to a striking degree. This study was done on adults. The average length of life of an adult white male has increased only four years from 1900-1970, yet look at what these simple practices can do. The average age at death of those following 0-3 practices is 67; that's age 45 + 22years. The average age at death of those following 4-5 practices was 73; that's a gain of 6 years, and of those following 6-7 practices the average age at death was 78. That's a gain of 11 years of life over those practicing 0-3.2


