The Controversial Sale

In December, 1981, I was introduced into a family home by the means of a lead card. During my presentation, both husband and wife were very much interested in the *Bible Story* set. In concluding my canvass, I appealed for a decision to buy the books. The wife said "yes" first, but the husband objected strongly.

I left my books and began to analyze the objections. I spoke with the husband. He was sincere. He told me that his salary was not adequate enough to pay for the books. He could not find the money though he appreciated them and understood their value.

As they were both smoking a total of three packs a day, I spoke to them about the influence that this bad habit has on their health and their children's health. They both agreed that they had to quit smoking. I told them about our Five Day Plan to Stop Smoking and led them to understand that the

money saved on cigarettes could pay off the books in 2 and one-half months, but we could extend the time to seven months. At the end of my diagnosis and my prescription to solve the problem, the same answer came back. Yes and no. But the yes of the wife could not be confirmed by a down payment.

Not wanting to create division in the family, I decided to give them a Bible study. The subject on the second coming of Christ was highly appreciated. When I left, they asked me to come back and we fixed an appointment date. I also left them my display of the Bible Story set. The next week, at the appointed time, I came back but the house was closed and again the same time the following week. I waited two weeks and came back another time. I found the family home and I gave my second Bible study. In leaving, I left two pamphlets of Amazing Facts—one on food, the other on the Sabbath. On my

next call, I found the wife convinced of the message on meat and she had quit smoking. She was also convinced of the seventh-day Sabbath and she decided to keep it holy.

As of now, she has not purchased the *Bible Story* set but did buy a Bible with a study guide. We have just shared the sixth lesson and she has started to pay tithe and is coming to church each Sabbath with her children. She has not yet been baptized but is sharing her new faith with her husband and with friends. I thank the Lord for this controversial decision. If the sale was made immediately, I could have missed this opportunity to give a Bible study and lead this family to Christ.

My prayer is that the Lord will lead literature evangelists to see in each customer a soul to be saved.





Weight Control - Part IV

Conclusion - The Hard Part



The physiology of weight control is simple. It is – Eat Less! Exercise More! Or to describe it more technically, Calorie Intake minus (activity plus basalmetobolic rate) equals plus or minus Calorie Balance. I – (BMR + ACT.) = \pm C.B. That's the physiological core of any successful weight control programme. But physiology is not the problem!

Psychology is the problem! One's state of mind which controls the eating and exercising activity is the problem. Some say that not even psychology is the problem – spirituality is the problem! If we're spiritually strong we can control our appetites and our energy expenditure!

Relegating blame and responsibility to any one category of the human experience is an oversimplification. We know too well that the emotional, mental, spiritual, physical and social dimensions of man are not discrete entities. We separate them strictly for academic purposes. They are so interrelated as to be impossible to tease apart. Therefore, let's look at it academically for a moment and try to see some of this complexity that makes up the psychological and spiritual dimension of weight control for herein does lie the mainspring of our behaviour.

Imaging

Weight management requires a change in one's mental image. One must begin to "think thin." And this image must be cherished! Buy a suit or a dress into which you can realistically fit within a period of time and then work toward that end. Learn to identify with slim models and reject all symbols of portliness. As long as we accept approvingly an obese image and identify with those of like profile, it will be almost impossible to effect a change.

Let me give one illustration of imaging. It happens to both men and women. When they are young they may be very slender. As they pass through their teens they take on a look of maturity. As the years progress they begin to increase in weight, maybe only 4, 5 or 10 pounds a year. Gradually they get thicker and thicker. When younger they identified with teenage slenderness and others who

looked like them. They might have wished to retain that teenage slenderness. But as they grew older they had to abandon the image of "slender," or else they would have been unable to maintain their own sense of integrity. So they cast about in their mind for another image (person) with whom to identify; other individuals of their age who have put on more weight and look like them. By the time they reach 40 some of them have become quite heavy and thick. They've changed clothes sizes a number of times and they will soon be identifiable as middle-aged; not by their silver hair, but by their thick-set condition. "Lots of middle-aged people are thickly set, all over," so in our minds it becomes acceptable. "We're just like our parents, our relatives and maybe 'all the rest' of those of like nationality." No, not all the rest! Most of the rest perhaps, but not all! You can remain slim! But slim has to become an ideal, it must become an image that is to be cherished and sacrificed for.

From an Adventist point of view I think it's worth asking, "If Jesus could have grown to be old would he have grown fat like Eli or would he have remained lean, strong and stately, with that firm erect bearing with which mankind was endowed from creation?"

Strength of Will

It is not fair to say of someone who cannot control his appetite that he is weak-willed, that he has no strength of resolve. He or she may have a weakness in one area, but that does not make them weak-willed. There may be other areas of their human experience in which it is impossible to get them to compromise; not from stubbornness but from a highly developed sense of moral value. But there is a chink in the armor somewhere — what's causing it?

Addiction

Food has been used to control the states of arousal in body and mind. This is its addictive feature. When feeling fatigued, dull or even exhausted, especially at the end of a hard day, the neurophysiology of eating food arouses the person. We become more aware, alert, and we like that sensation. The same thing happens in smoking cigarettes or in viewing exciting television. We manipulate our states of arousal with these activities.

On the other hand, when an individual is too aroused so that he is nervous, upset or excited he may use food to reduce that state of arousal so that he enjoys a calming effect, a sense of relief. Again he is using food like



nicotine. Light smoking may produce a stimulating arousal, but excessive nicotine from heavy smoking has the opposite effect and may lower the sense of arousal giving the sensation of calming one's nerves.

Symbolic Associations

Most probably the problem with food behaviour is one of symbolic associations. From the time of infancy food has been used for more than nourishment. It has been used to reward good behaviour. Food has been used to comfort hurt feelings or a scratched knee with, "Here, eat this – you'll feel better." Food has been associated with all kinds of pleasure: parties, dining out, special holidays, picnics, family get-togethers.

We have barely touched the surface of this complex mechanism. But the associations of food are probably the most ensnaring and/or reinforcing components of food behaviour in weight management. To alter one's eating habits, whether by refusing to eat between meals, or refusing to eat as much, or of certain items, is a threat to our pleasure, our memories of happiness, our state of alertness, our sense of well-being, our security. We may not be able to describe what's happening to us but we can't stand the threat. The sense of losing all these associations so tied up with our identity of who we are can be so painful to the psyche as to undermine every effort of controlling food behaviour.

It points out the need to have something to take their place. To remove a lifetime of dependency requires something very worthwhile as a substitute behaviour, as a new image, as a new ideal. It requires almost a supernatural conversion for such changes to be permanent.

Big Decisions

One question that must be faced at the beginning of any weight control effort is, "Is it worth the sacrifice? How badly do I really wish to be slim? Unless that decision is firmly and finally made the person will be everlastingly miserable while on the programme, feeling the loss of what he has given up and not being sufficiently certain of what he is going to gain. He may be better off fat and content than slim and emotionally miserable. But on the other hand, is he fat and content, or is he fat and miserable and won't be content until he is slim? These are the big decisions that have to be made.

And they must be made more than once. Once having made them the most important

The Ministry of Small Groups

Fidel Castro, leader of the Communist revolution in Cuba, said, "I began my revolution with eighty-two men. If I had to do it again I would do it with ten or fifteen men, and absolute faith. It does not matter how small you are, providing you have faith and a plan of action." It is clear that this successful revolutionary saw the potential influence and effectiveness of a small group of people who are fully dedicated to working together towards the accomplishment of a goal.

Today a great deal is being said about the ministry of small groups in churches everywhere, and to be a member of a small group is very much in vogue. Churches are using small groups for Bible study, for spiritual growth, for mutual care within the Body of Christ of one member for another, and for the purpose of accomplishing some special work or church task together.

The idea is not new to Seventh-day Adventists. Within the Adventist Church we have followed this method of accomplishing things, and we call these small groups committees. Sometimes we define them and set them up as officers' councils. Take our Sabbath School and Youth officers' councils, for example. Under the operation of a small group of Christians, plans are laid and programs prepared that are a fundamental part of the onward progress of the organizations they have been asked to foster, and we have often seen how a small group of people who gather together and share the same goals and interests can accomplish much in the Lord's service. Jesus used this method. Mark records, "And he appointed twelve, to be with him, and to be sent out to preach and have authority to cast out demons," (3:14, 15 R.S.V.) and so it was that in the company of a small, close group Jesus chose to reveal Himself more fully. Peter, James and John were present at His Transfiguration. The twelve shared the Last Supper. The three were with Him again in Gethsemane.

It is important that we do not lose the impact of this fact that our Saviour, within the structure of a small group, concentrated on the training of twelve men. They appeared to have only ordinary abilities. There was a whole world to reach and save, yet He spent most of His ministry working closely with this little group. This was His method of teaching these men how to love one another and how to pass on the good news of God's love to others. If we miss the significance of

the twelve, we will be missing what can become in many an Adventist church today a way of revitalizing the entire congregation.

Let us go a step further. In its infancy the early Christian church WAS these small groups who gathered to share with one another the intimate things the Holy Spirit worked out within their lives. To be a Christian was to belong to a fellowship of believers who had great things to accomplish and needed one another's support to get them done. They had a common life centered in Christ. They banded together to talk about Him, to listen to His Spirit speak to them, to read from the Bible, to ponder the letters of their leaders, and to eat together the bread of communion at His table. They had His promise that where two or three of them were gathered together in His name, there He would be in their midst. They believed His promise, and they felt His Presence. God did great things through them. This was also true of the early pioneers of the Remnant Church.

Consider the fact that only small bands of early Adventists met together after the Great Disappointment of 1844, and yet it was from these small groups that the Seventh-day Adventist Church grew so rapidly in its formative years. Now that our numbers have grown to larger proportions, many Adventist leaders believe that this still would be a wise way for us to organize our church membership. Note these words from the book Evangelism: "The formation of small companies as a basis of Christian effort is a plan that has been presented before me by One who cannot err. If there is a large number in the church, let the members be formed into small companies, to work not only for the church members but for unbelievers also." Evangelism, p. 115.

It is around this small group concept that Faith Action Advance is being organized in the North American Division. In essence it means the division of our Sabbath School into classes; and if the classes are very large, it means the division of these classes into small groups of from eight to twelve. This strategy would be designed for the purpose of facilitating a wide variety of soul-winning and other mission projects. Let us not forget that the testimony of Scripture and the Spirit of Prophecy, the record of history, and the witness of our contemporaries makes it very clear that spiritual renewal and the growth of the church can come when a nucleus of

believers responds to Christ in depth and when God's people have intimate fellowship with one another.

The Holy Spirit works with revolutionary power when small companies of Christians reach new levels of closeness and activity, and when they respond to His inner promptings in obedience and faith. If your church's Sabbath School is not fully organized along these lines as yet, why not begin praying that God will open the way soon for this to be done? "In our churches let companies be formed for service. In the Lord's work there are to be no idlers. Let different ones unite in labor as fishers of men. Let them seek to gather souls from the corruption of the world into the saving purity of Christ's love." Evangelism, p. 115. Further details and materials as to how this may be done successfully are available through the Faith Action Advance Committee of the Canadian Union.

strategy to maintaining them is to renew the decision daily. I can't overstress this too much! ! Every day, at the beginning of the day, before the temptations of food or anything else hits, the battle must be won in the quiet audience chamber with the Lord. The decisions of how to behave and that, "yes, it is worth it!" must be made early. To wait until later in the day when faced with temptation and then try to decide if it is worth it or try to recollect the reasons for good behaviour is setting up oneself for failure. One must actually become overly aware, super conscious of the temptations to be faced for the day so that he is on guard. Otherwise he will be nearly overcome before he even recognizes he is being tempted.

There is so much to say and so little space to say it in. We try to have fun in our battle of the bulge because most people who attempt to fight fat fail. If we were too serious they would live in constant self-condemnation. But yet, weight control cannot be relegated as unimportant. It is important for our level of health and length of life and a clear conscience. We've not really discussed the morality of obesity, we have simply discussed the problems and techniques of those who wish to change their profile. And in Part IV we have looked at the real heart of the matter. It seems to me an exercise in futility to manipulate diet and exercise until we have come to terms with the issues raised in this article.

Conference Presidents Report to the Canadian Union Conference Committee

Carney and the Conference Committee. They plan to add another full time evangelist making two full time and one half-time evangelists. This will add to the "1000 Days of Reaping" evangelistic thrust. Plans are also under discussion to reap the harvest from the Destiny TV program with an evangelistic crusade in Toronto. Evangelism is the priority item in Ontario.

C.A. Sabot – Quebec has a large French population. This is the greatest challenge in Canada. The members, in two pre-session meetings, suggested an increase in offerings and budgets to evangelism. Two large crusades are planned for Montreal and a lay training program is planned. The members are supporting evangelism.

G.E. Maxson – Vern Snow and lots and lots of white snow arrived in Prince George, B.C. at the same time for an evangelistic crusade. The spirits were not dampened and




L.G. Lowe – The economy in the Maritimes is depressed but not the Church. The new nursing home in St. John, N.B. is doing well and is a model operation under Wayne Bullock. Sandy Lake Academy is doing well and is operating without a deficit. Baptisms in 1981 reached 182. The goal for 1982 is 175 with enthusiasm to pass 1981. Evangelism is advancing in the Maritimes.

G. Gray – In the absence of the President, Don MacIvor, the treasurer, Gordon Gray, reported. Evangelism is on the "up." The Regina church has many new faces as a result of Pastor Hossack's crusade. He is now in Moose Jaw with five pastors who are in training. More than 60 non-Adventists are attending the crusade. Brother Gray sat beside a non-Adventist couple. They asked, "Have you been here before?" "No," he answered. "They are tremendous. You better not miss anymore," they admonished him. There is a revival of evangelism in the Manitoba-Saskatchewan Conference.

H.S. Larsen – Alberta is moving ahead in a unified plan of evangelism. The Conference goal for baptisms is 10% of membership, or 599 for 1982. Nearly all pastors are holding Daniel and Revelation seminars in preparation for evangelistic crusades. New churches are being started in Lacombe, Clyde and Fort Vermillion. A new church building is being planned for Red Deer. Everyone is excited about evangelism.

G. Karst – Newfoundland and Labrador have set a goal of 10% increase for the "1000 Days of Reaping" or reaching a membership of 1000 in the "1000 Days of Reaping." September 25 has been set as the target date for all pastors to begin an evangelistic crusade. They have an optimistic outlook for 1982.





Secular Campus Ministries

The North American Division Annual Council, 1981, approved partial funding for five secular university campus ministers. After they received and evaluated requests from the Unions, they made their choice. The Maritime Conference of the Canadian Union was among the five chosen to participate in this specialized ministry with its challenges in reaching not only secular students, but an increasing number of our own Seventh-day Adventist students, on the secular campus. (Pastor and Mrs. Ladd Dunfield are leading out in the program on the Fredericton university campus and will tell their story in our next issue.) In a continuing series of articles on secular campus ministries, we will take a look at the work that is being done in this area by the Church. Our first article, contributed by Pastor Al Keiser, will acquaint you with the basic philosophy of this ministry.

Very few evangelistic fields suffer such neglect, yet demonstrate more promise than secular college campuses. Other religions and denominations are decades ahead of Adventists by having already established permanent presences on or near many secular campuses. Furthermore, cults and other fanciful fads recognize the flowering needs of college students as fertile ground for developing their own religions. And well they should.

Not only are there such great numbers of college students, but many are looking for a philosophy of life, particularly in the last two years of college and graduate school. What is needed from Adventists is an organized program to reach this potential.

Let's look at some practical ways to accomplish this. Currently one church in California has hired its own youth pastor to work solely with the college campus near its church. The advantage of this approach is that after friendship has been established and nurtured, there is quick identification with a local congregation, especially since a permanent presence (the church) already is near the campus providing some access and community identification.

Another method that has proven successful is occupancy of a large house adjacent to the campus with the purpose of providing a community centre for college students as well as a dormitory situation for a few Adventist young people, who though not fulltime students, are placed there to make friends on the campus. A couple, chosen because of their ability to communicate well with the college students, function as mother and father of the house. Advantages of this program include a home-like atmosphere. establishment of a permanent presence, which is not a church, very close to the campus, and greater opportunity for Seventhday Adventist students to work at evangelism. This method probably produces the best results. The Mormons use a slight modification of this model with considerable success.

A third method, currently practiced in the

North Pacific Union, is to hire a man (in this case on the Union level) to visit and organize Seventh-day Adventist students already attending the secular colleges. This alternative has been successfully used by Campus Crusade, an international, interdenominational Christian organization, set up specifically to evangelize secular campuses. An advantage of this method is that less money is needed, while still permitting each campus to have an organization.

Of course, each alternative has disadvantages; no program is perfect. In the first case, it's unlikely a church will be close enough to a campus to give easy access and identification. College students often have limited means of transportation and always have limited funds. Distance is a significant factor. The second method has the disadvantage of requiring more money and more properly qualified personnel. The third method suffers from lack of supervision.

These models, or variations thereof, not only can be, but are waiting to be, set up by innovative people with a burden for the hearts of the young. Of a certainty, Adventists are going to have to meet the challenge of the secular campus, not only for the sake of evangelism, but also to retain their own youth. With the rising costs of Seventh-day Adventist education, many more of our own students are choosing to be educated in secular schools, whose costs are considerably lower due to public financing. Adequate support programs need to be established for these students. College students are often lonely and idealistic; ours is a message of hope. We have much to offer, if we will.

Summers have long warm days and cool nights. The warm weather turns the surrounding mountain alpines into paradises.


Sarnia Church Outreach

Friday would be soon enough, she told herself. She could wait until after the craft sale. Still something told her that she shouldn't wait. She looked at the piece of paper with Mrs. Fisher's name on it. She didn't know that part of town too well. Finally she turned to her husband and asked him if he'd drive her.

They pulled up in front of the Fisher house and Eva May got out.

"I won't be long," she told her husband. When Mrs. Fisher learned who Eva May was, she could hardly believe it. "You are an answer to prayer," she said. She'd just received a letter from Faith for Today informing her that a representative would be by to visit her in a couple of days,

"I didn't really think you would come in time."

"What do you mean?" Eva May asked.
"Today I decided to take my life," she said. "In fact, I was thinking about doing it just when the doorbell rang.

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
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
