

What better news could people across Canada hear than the good news of the gospel? And that is just what 40 percent of the country's population has the opportunity of hearing every night on the CKO All-News Radio Network.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church's radio ministry, the Voice of Prophecy, has been heard five nights a week on the seven CKO stations since May 26, 1980. During these three years, many listeners have come to understand the Bible better. They have written for booklets to read and Bible courses to study. They have learned that the Adventist Church cares about their lives.

This summer, the CKO Network reviewed all its programming, its charges, and its positioning in the marketplace. For over a month the Voice of Prophecy awaited a decision: Would its daily programs be allowed to continue on the network? And if so, at what cost?

Yes, said network officials, the VOP could continue its broadcasts. But the cost would increase by 29 percent. At the

persons live?

You see, the budget does not include funds to care for such a large increase in the cost of broadcast time. The depressed economy has already caused a drop in income that has forced the VOP to cancel nine stations in Canada this year.

Consider these points:

1. The VOP must either remain on all the CKO Network stations or go off the air on all. The seven stations can only be bought as a complete package. Together they cover Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, London, Calgary, Edmonton and Vancou-All are 100,000-watt FM stations except the one in Montreal.

2. If the VOP does go off CKO, it is unlikely that it will get back on in the future. The all-news format does not allow for much religious programming. That means, of course, that the VOP stands out in listeners' minds.

3. Other stations are not available to properly cover the seven large cities and

same time. CKO noted that its audience had increased by 21 percent, so the cost for reaching each actual listener is not much more than before.

The challenge now comes to Seventhday Adventist members across Canada; Shall the gospel messages of hope and love continue on the seven CKO stations that together serve areas where 10,000;000 surrounding areas that CKO reaches. "In fact," says H.M.S. Richards, Jr., "we tried for years to get the daily broadcast on the air in Canada's cities as well as smaller communities. It was virtually impossible to find any available time to purchase for the Monday through Friday programs. Getting on CKO three years ago was an

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THE CHALLENGE OF PROVIDING COLLEGE EDUCATION IN CANADA

"Bill 48" is the title of a recent amendment to Alberta's University Act. It provides for the establishment of an Accreditation Board which will determine criteria for accrediting university-level programs offered by private colleges in Alberta. This legislation is good news. It also challenges the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada and each individual member. "Should we, and will we, provide expanding college educational opportunities in Canada" now become real questions which must be resolved. We now have opportunity to operate Canadian Union College under traditional church standards and lifestyle, and at the same time, provide valid degrees in a number of programs when the college maintains, in the judgment of an accrediting board, acceptable standards in facilities, equipment, staff and financial support.

The opportunity to confer recognized degrees is now ours. The ball is now in our court. The youth of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada will have opportunity to receive valid degrees in various academic areas at an S.D.A. college in Canada just as soon as we develop and finance proper programs, library, labora-

tories and equipment

The Church, you and I as individual members and through conference support, are challenged to demonstrate faith and trust in our youth, in God's leadership, and in our determination to provide funds for the operation of senior college programs.

Other church-operated colleges in Alberta are completing multi-million dollar fund raising programs to make certain that they will be able to meet accreditation standards. We cannot do less. Our library is growing but needs further development. Various buildings are old and require considerable improvement. Space, laboratories and equipment are needed for the sciences. All buildings and the grounds need continued maintenance. Equipment must be maintained or replaced. The list could go on.

At this point in time, it is difficult to fund even the high priority items. Priority is being given to completing payment for Lakeview Hall, the ladies' greatly needed new residence, and for the new furniture factory which provides work for many students whereby they earn about \$200,000 a year to assist in tuition. The Board and college administration are committed to operating without further indebtedness. Much has been done to restrict spending. Further major development in either building or programs will not proceed until present financial obligations are met and funds are in hand for new projects.

Therefore, even with the door of opportunity open for granting various degrees, Canadian Union College will remain exactly where it is until additional funds are available. By God's grace, our individual and collective commitment to Christian education, and our financial support of it, will assure our youth that their desire for a Christian college education will be met in Canada.

The question is sometimes asked, "Do we need a senior college in Canada?" In answering that question, the following points are to be considered:

- Increasingly difficult immigration restrictions for church personnel as well as for students.
- 2. The loss of Canadian leadership to places outside of Canada.
- The needs of the Church in overseas areas where Canadians may enter more readily than citizens of other countries.
- The escalating cost of Christian education outside of Canada due to unfavourable exchange rates.

Yes, a senior college is needed.

Some may still ask, "Can and will the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada finance its own senior college?"

I believe that the answer again is "Yes". The Christian education program of the Church is blessed by God. We are God's people. We will indeed be responsible stewards of the children and youth, and of the monies which have been entrusted to us by God. And God's kingdom will be advanced in Canada.

Let us consider a final question in view of the present "open door" for the development of a senior, degree-granting college in Canada. This is a question which you and I must ask and answer within our own hearts. "What is my personal, active commitment to developing and financing our Church's senior college?"

Legislation Opens Door

Recent Alberta legislation has created a historic first for private colleges within the province - including Canadian Union College. The new legislation, titled Bill 48, is an amendment to the Universities Act. It authorizes the establishment of an accreditation Board, the first in Canada. This Board, which will be composed of four members from Alberta universities, four members from private colleges and four members from the public, plus a chairman (appointed by the Minister of Higher Education), will be empowered to set minimum standards of accreditation of individual college programs. When a private college, which has been affiliated with an Alberta university has met the minimum criteria, the Board will recommend to the Minister of Advanced Education that accreditation be granted to those programs. The minister is then free to make his own decision to grant or not to grant accreditation. When accreditation is granted, the private college will be allowed to grant its own degrees for those accredited programs.

This legislation is, in many respects a tribute to the efforts of Dr. Neville Matthews who, until recently, was the president of Canadian Union College. Following the 1976 decision of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada to advance CUC to senior college status, Dr. Matthews diligently sought legislation to make this possible. The results of his untiring efforts and capable leadership is eloquently represented by the passage of Bill 48.

Committee of 100 Challenges Alumni

At its Annual Meeting held July 3, 1983, the Committee of 100 agreed to assist the College in financing the renovations to the education building as its second official project. The total cost of the renovations, including furnishings, is estimated to be \$150,000.

Committee members were of the opinion that this project was a priority item in the development of the College.

With approximately one-third of the College enrollment majoring in Education, this would be the first program presented to the Accreditation Board for approval, and we need to make sure that CUC has the facilities to meet the Board's requirements

The Committee of 100 has pledged \$30,000 towards this project, in addition, the Committee has offered to match donations made by Alumni dollar for dollar. With this matching challenge along with the BECA matching challenge your investment in your College could be tripled.

What a fantastic opportunity to invest in Christian education. Canada has never before been able to provide its own teachers for its church schools. Now it can!

Adventists Find Friends At The World Council of Churches

For the first time in history, Canada was the host country for the World Council of Churches. Meeting once every seven years, the Sixth Assembly found unique challenges on the campus of the University of British Columbia, July 24 to August 10.

Firstly, a small contingent of radical religious Fundamentalists gained unwarranted media attention in opposing the WCC as marxist and destructively liberal. Secondly, the overwhelming subject of attention in the discussions focused on the recent international development in nuclear-arms escalation. In its conclusive recommendations, the WCC roundly condemned all efforts in all the world to use the "madness" of nuclear threat to gain political ends.

Another preoccupation of the World Council was in the direction of many injustices suffered by the peoples of the world. Hunger, racism, sexism, violence and political oppression held prominence in discussions, speeches and recommendations. Unquestionably, member churches have assumed the prerogative of the Christian Faith to speak forcefully to Governments in these matters. Repeatedly, the concept giving rise to the Church's asserted entanglement in sociopolitical matters was affirmed.

Principally, it is declared that the Christian Church does not fulfill its commission unless it involves itself in the real world to combat the evil in it. As one speaker opined, "To celebrate life you have to address the problem of death. It is not responsible to speak in theological platitudes if you do not involve yourself with the real problems of life."

A more adequate analysis of the theological and prophetic implications of the subject-matter of the WCC is to appear in the *Adventist Review* and the *Ministry* magazine. We will not endeavour here to duplicate those observations.

For the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada, despite differences of theological perspective, the Vancouver event provided a most unusual and special opportunity for selected representatives of the Church to establish and strengthen friendships with many fellow Christian Church leaders from around the world.

Joining together as observer/visitors at the WCC were Dr. B.B. Beach, Director of Public Affairs for the General Conference of S.D.A.; Dr. William Johnsson, Editor of the Adventist Review; Dr. Russell Staples, Professor at Andrews University; Dr. Neville Matthews, Representative for the General Conference to the United Nations; Elder Kenneth Holland, Editor of These Times Magazine; Dr. Douglas Devnich, Director of Public Affairs for the S.D.A. Church in Canada.

On one evening of the 18-day session, the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada, in cooperation with the General Conference of S.D.A. hosted a highlyprofiled dinner in order to meet approximately 25 Christian clergymen on common ground. Dr. Beach effectively spoke the welcome to these guests of ours at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in downtown Vancouver. He said, "Although you have responsibilities in connection with the Council, all the more we appreciate your willingness to spend time so that we may enjoy your fellowship during the simple meal of Christian fellowship. As Seventhday Adventists we are honoured by the

Colleagues, Former Students, Friends Honour E. Monteith on His 75th Birthday

More than 200 people gathered in the Legion Hall in St. Thomas on Sunday, August 14th to pay tribute to Ernest Monteith on the occasion of his 75th birthday.

Mr. Monteith dedicated 45 years of his life to the training of young people, many of whom attended the reception. He recalled that during his first year of teaching at the age of 19, he overhead a stage whisper from a group of students as he appeared unexpectedly, "Here comes old man Monteith"!

Mr. Monteith began his teaching career in Morriston, Ontario, and then transferred to St. Ann's where he met his wife, Margery Comfort, who played the piano for his Christmas concert, which were always considered noteworthy occasions.

From St. Ann's he moved to Beaver Dams, and then to Hamilton where he taught for 15½ years.

In 1946 the family moved to Oshawa and he served as registrar and language teacher for six years at Oshawa Missionary College, now known as Kingsway College.

The last 20 years of his teaching career were spent at the Essex High School (1952–1972), where he began by teaching history. When the enrollment reached the point where it was advisable to appoint department heads, he was asked to be chairman of the History Department. Then, as time passed, and the need for guidance and counselling arose, he chaired that department from 1963 until his retirement in 1972.

However, years before there was a Guidance and Counselling Department at the Essex High School, Mr. Monteith served in that capacity unofficially, and one of those beneficiaries paid tribute to him at the dinner. During the years 1952-1954 there was a young lad sitting in on history classes, but dreaming of sports. In fact for him school was a waste of time, except as it pertained to sports. Now it so happened that just at this time the school principal asked Mr. Monteith to be responsible for the school paper, a large portion of which was devoted to sports. There wasn't much Mr. Monteith didn't know about history - but there wasn't much he did know about sports. Fortunately one of his fellow teachers came to his aid and suggested that he ask Ralph Mellanby to assist him with the sports section, as Ralph lived for sports. Mr. Monteith lost no time in speaking to Ralph telling him that he felt he had many more talents than just sports, and that he should seriously consider some of them, for instance,

writing might be one. The next day when teacher and pupil again met, Mr. Monteith casually asked Ralph if he would help him with the sports section of the school paper. That was the beginning of Ralph Mellanby's career in sports, and he is now widely known throughout the Dominion as the producer of the program *Hockey Night in Canada*.

Not only has Mr. Monteith taught history, he has also compiled it, serving as the official historian of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada. Over the years he has spent many thousands of hours in research and writing of the early beginnings, and later progress of the Church in Canada. This mimeographed manuscript is often referred to by conference workers and laity alike, and is now in the process of being produced in book form.

Besides the church history, he has produced a history of the Monteith ancestral tree which is now in its third revision and publication.

Three brothers and a sister were in attendance at the dinner, the sister, Mrs. Aileen Thorpe, taking full responsibility for the sumptuous sit-down dinner.

The able Master of Ceremonies was Mark Monteith, younger grandson and son of Arnold and Jane Monteith of Weston, who were also in attendance. The elder grandson John was present, but granddaughter Kathy, married and living in the States, was unable to attend.

Mrs. Monteith predeceased her hus-

Mr. Monteith was given a standing ovation by the many relatives, friends, former students and associate teachers who had come to pay him honour.

75th Anniversary for Calgary Central Church

The Calgary Central Church congregation swarmed in size with about 800 members, past and present, attending the all day program to mark the church's 75 years in the city.

Baptisms, a parade of nations, inspiring music, sound preaching and a play performed by the youth all contributed to the Sabbath services, June 25; celebrating and giving thanks to the Lord for long years of prosperity.

Entitled "From the Four Corners of the World to Calgary, and From Calgary to the Four Corners of the World," the program was a testimony of God's guiding Spirit which has led the congregation from its small beginnings in 1908. The primary and junior divisions, in the march of missions, represented the many missionary efforts that members have made from a church whose pioneers had migrated

from all points of the globe.

Dr. D. Devnich, preaching from Luke 14:25–33, neatly summarized the church's mission to Calgary, accenting our commitment to the gospel and the sacrifice it requires.

"You cannot plow new ground by looking backwards," he said. He reminded us of our responsibility to progress in the work of God and called us to "lift our view view to the future."

"I think this anniversary is a time to reflect and discover that we have only just begun," he said. He warmly praised the church audience for its productive growth and its understanding that the work of God is not accomplished by might or power, but by the Spirit of the Lord.

Explaining that the greatest work for the church is yet ahead of us, Pastor Devnich spoke of the early disciples and protestant reformers whose motive and attitude, easily discerned by Christ, actuated Christian zeal and promoted growth.

"To follow Christ into the future requires much more than being a spectator," he said. "We must set self aside to make room for the work of the Holy Spirit, as it is only in this work that we can rise to the limits."

He spoke of self-service as a badge of loyalty to Satan, and self-sacrifice as a crown of loyalty to the Son of God. In describing this moment as a "subtle test", he concluded with a reminder of the church's present responsibility.

A Piece of Pork Doesn't Defile — Or Does It? Part II

In Part 1 of this discussion I gave examples of two separate families who under different circumstances ate pork and then asked the question, "Were they defiled thereby?"

I suggested that the distinction between clean and unclean was primarily to protect God's people from disease and that the possibility of contracting disease is to a large extent dose related. This suggests that a very limited exposure to unclean meats is not likely to produce disease and that a person is not thereby defiled. Such a position is reasonable, is logical based upon the stated assumptions, and is more rational than superstitious. But it may conceal some greater liabilities.

We must first determine what is meant by "defile". Please accept my apologies for the brevity of this part of the discussion. Definitions could occupy an entire article. In Part 1 my sentence structure in paragraphs 2 and 5 implied that defile meant disqualified from heaven. The backdrop of both the Old and New Testaments is eternal life or eternal loss. A threat of loss hangs over our every behaviour. We therefore tend to think in ultimates, and leave little room for intermediate variations from the ideal.

To be made unclean or to be defiled is a serious matter. It is a state for which reparation must be made or it may threaten our eternal security. But that which is either clean or unclean does not in and of itself qualify or disqualify one from heaven. That is why Jesus said, "Not what enters into the mouth defiles the man, but what proceeds out of the mouth, this defiles the man." Matt. 15:11–20, NAS. But the behavioural and character effects and/or results of what enters into the mouth may very well disqualify one.

Now notice the seriousness with which I treat the subject of health. When Noah made himself drunk following the flood his resultant behaviour was sinful and a dishonour to God. He was defiled! Yet he was still eventually saved. When human beings make themselves sick through abusing the body by whatever means, they likewise dishonour God's temple and they are guilty of sin, for "It is a sin to be sick", Counsels on Health, p. 37. They are defiled. I am afraid most of us take illness far too lightly, considering it to be a mere quirk of fate, an accident of nature rather than the result of our own neglect

or abuse or carelessness. In the vast majority of cases we owe God and our fellowman an apology and a confession both for the hardship we bring on man and the misrepresentation we bring upon the efficacy of God's power to provide the fullness of health (life) He has promised us here and now. Yet we are still eventually saved.

So what about our two couples who ate pork chops and bacon and eggs? Did they defile themselves? Not hardly! (Unless the worms were still alive in the pieces they got.) The first couple were actually celebrating the death of the old life and the entering into the new. They did not lament the loss of pork chops. It may not be the way that you and I would choose to celebrate, but all of us have some strange ways of expressing ourselves that are looked upon with lamenting humour by our pitying Heavenly Father. Psa. 103. And the second couple were not defiled either. They were trying to find some way to express their confusion, their protest, their plaintive cry. It was momentary and foolish, but not evil. The variations from the norm are wide for those just beginning the pathway.

It takes time and practice for the various requirements of God to settle in until they become a conviction, a conviction with knowledge and experience. When a conviction with knowledge and experience is present and then an individual behaves contrarily, he violates his conscience and commits sin. Some people grow rapidly but others take years before an adequate understanding of Sabbath keeping, of diet, of tithing, of gracious speech become matters of intelligent faith. At this mature stage to refrain from eating unclean meat or anything which is not healthful becomes a matter of principle, a matter of honour to God. It is something to uphold, to stand for, for all the reasons that have been learned and enjoyed in the past. It is now religious loyalty and a firmer motivation rather than a health principle only.

Well, since it is a matter of principle, what about a possible transcending principle of survival? Is it alright to eat unclean meat if one is starving? That question was asked of two different religious instructors in one of our colleges. Based on the principles of health, i.e. that it would be

more healthful to survive than to die of starvation, one instructor said, "If the pig stood between me and death, I would eat the pig." The other instructor acting on the principle of "God said not to" said, "By no means would I eat that which is unclean."

The above question may be more hypothetical and its answers conjectural than real for without some specific examples of individuals having to choose between eating unclean meat and starvation, we may only be constructing special situations. For Christians who keep the Sabbath and observe His dietary restrictions, God has a remarkable way of preserving them from these kinds of tests. Do you know of even one who has faced it?

What about eating crackers or bread made with lard rather than vegetable shortening. Does that defile? My own personal feeling and I must emphasize that is is only a personal feeling, is that it would probably do little to no injury and thus no defilement. But where does such a course end. By far the greater danger is that an individual who does it even once finds it easier to do it a second time and then a third. There is something very untrustworthy about the human mind and how it can justify its behaviour to soon confirm a habit out of a single deed. Then if after awhile injury does accrue from the use of that which God has forbidden, when was the individual defiled? By the first bite or by the thirtysecond bite when he became ill. Probably the safest answer is a spiritual answer. He became defiled at the "point the individual disdainfully disregarded God's commandment."

There is a physical and spiritual principle underlying all God's laws. It is not superstition to carefully and prayerfully obey every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God. For they were written for our welfare to bring happiness and harmony into our bodies, our homes and the kingdom of heaven.

Nothing I have said should allow one to be careless about what he buys or eats even if he reasoned that the risk of one bite would not defile. Instead our health should be treated with the holy reverence that God's temple deserves. At the same time we should be extremely tolerant of what others buy and eat just as God is with us and our imperfections.

Over 9,000 copies of **The Winner** were purchased by churches, Pathfinder clubs, and individuals to hand out to trick-or-treaters in 1982.



Tractor Air Lifted to Pitcairn Island

It's not easy to deliver anything to Pitcairn Island in the South Pacific. But when the item is a 22,000-pound D-4 Caterpillar tractor, the difficulty becomes very nearly an impossibility.

There is no harbour on the three-square-mile island that is home to 50 descendants of the *HMS Bounty* mutineers. Ships stay a mile offshore, while islanders ferry cargo in 8-foot by 38-foot motorized longboats. Strong waves often crash along the unprotected, narrow, shallow landing. This year's tropical storms have been worse than usual. Rough water forced a longboat to remain at sea for three days during a delivery in May. The

keel of the boat hit a rock and cracked, and several 55-gallon barrels of diesel fuel were lost overboard.

So when the British government decided to replace Pitcairn's ailing Caterpillar, an alternative mode of delivery was sought.

The last of May, the New Zealand Air Force sent a C-130 cargo plane on a special mission. As the plane circled Pitcairn at an altitude of 1,000 feet, two crates were dropped. One housed the tractor and was suspended by six 100-foot parachutes. The other, under two similar parachutes, contained the canopy and blade for the 11-ton earthmover.

Maintenance of roads, especially the one to the ship landing point, is the major use for the tractor. It will also clear brush for garden areas.

News of the airdrop was transmitted via ham radio to the Voice of Prophecy Amateur Radio Club station, K6DTT, by Tom Christian, chief radio officer on Pitcairn.
