rene Coon is her name – she is a General Conference auditor, and it is her duty to "audit the books" of the Canadian Union. Husband Roger labours on behalf of the White Estate in Washington.

Now sometimes auditors are perceived to work with cold precision, always calculating, and sometimes a bit "Scroogey"! But that is not our Irene! With a twinkle in her eye, and a smile tugging at the corner of her mouth, she goes about her duties happily, with earnestness and warm precision.

It's that kindly bit of warmth and caring that she radiates to all of us when she comes to audit in the office.

Oh yes – that bumper sticker of hers – "Have you hugged your auditor today?" No – we didn't, but we all do love and appreciate our Irene!

My mind began to think about the local conference audits which have just been completed – from Newfoundland to British Columbia. Laymen, such as George Morgan in St. John's, Sister A. Dupuis in Quebec, Wilfred James from Winnipeg, and Dr. Reuben Matiko from Vancouver Island joined our pastors and administrators as they all gathered together from place to place and expectantly asked "How was the year-end – did the books balance?" "Was the cash flow sufficient?" "Do we have the proper working capital?"

But now - for each of us - here is a different type of audit. We may wish to

audit ourselves! Do you ask "How come?"

Well, recently, Elder Bill Scales of the Ministerial Association in Washington, was studying "Caring Church Concepts" with the elders and pastors in the British Columbia Conference.

It was he who told us of one of our dear brethren who decided to visit ("audit") 18 different Adventist churches on 18 consecutive Sabbaths. He wished to determine what the churches were really like.

Were the members really warm and friendly and caring? Those were the "audit" questions, and he used the following point system:

10 points for a smile from another worshipper.

10 points for being greeted by someone other than another visitor.

100 points for the exchanging of names.

200 points for an invitation to remain to worship and to come again.

1,000 points for being introduced to another member.

2,000 points for an invitation to meet the pastor.

Now how do you think this "audit" went? The "auditor's" report indicated that 11 of the 18 churches earned fewer than 100 points. Five had less than 200 points.

Now that particular "auditor" concluded that the doctrines were Biblical, the singing was inspirational, and the sermon was uplifting. He also concluded that no one really cared that he was there, therefore, he wasn't very anxious to return the second time.


Now here are two key questions upon which you may reflect:

LDER THEODORE CARCICH SAT IN HIS STUDY in his home in Colton, Washington, and pondered the unusually fervent response to his latest sermon. He had preached in several churches on the Middle East in prophecy and had made an urgent appeal to get right with the Lord. Judgement Day is coming, he had pointed out.

As union president and vice president of the General Conference, Carcich had spoken on prophecy many times, but this message was different, it seemed. "Everybody ought to hear it," people said. "It has the old Advent ring!" "Can't you do something to

get the word out!"

Suddenly Carcich sat bolt upright in his chair. I know what I'll do, he said to himself, I'll reshape it and send it to our missionary journal. That way our church members as well as hundreds of thousands of non-Adventists will read it.

And so "The Article That Had to Be Written" came into being. It will appear in the May issue of SIGNS OF THE TIMES.

Twenty-five times in her book Counsels to Writers and Editors, Ellen White pleads for our writers to concentrate on messages that warn people of the coming judgement. Tell them, she says, the Judgement Day is upon us. Write about the prophetic signs of the times; appeal to them not only to avoid hell but, more importantly, not to miss out on the good things God has prepared for them that love Him!

In his sermon, which he entitled "All Eyes East," Carcich writes, "Bible prophecy declares that some power or nation in the eastern Mediterranean area will precipitate the worldwide disaster that is coming by impulsively lashing out against others. No one can predict with certainty whether the aggressor will be Muslim, Christian, or Jewish." He referrred to Daniel 11:44 and 45 and Daniel 12:1.

There may be some church members who feel that articles such as this one by



Elder Carcich no longer will be read by the general public. "They are not interested. People are too secular or humanistic; they're all wrapped up in their own affairs." However, we must never forget that as long as probation lasts, the Holy Spirit will be at work to strike certain chords in the heart of every human who reads.

1. As editor of SIGNS OF THE TIMES I can know for sure that our readers' basic needs will never be totally met by social improvement or material influence. This is true around the world and in every culture. Jesus said, "A man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." Luke

2. I know there is an essential emptiness in every life without Christ. All humanity keeps crying for something, something they cannot identify. Give a person a million dollars - it does not satisfy. Or give him every form of sexuality; that too never satisfies the deep longing inside that keeps crying for satisfaction. People are empty without God.

Tolstoi put it right when he said, "There is a God-shaped vacuum in every life that only God can fill" When we proclaim the gospel in SIGNS OF THE TIMES we are talking directly to that emptiness. The reader has a built in receptivity to the message of the Cross, because Christ alone fills the

3. I know that our readers experience loneliness. Some have called it cosmic loneliness. When you get right down to it, it is the loneliness for God.

4. I know that every reader has a sense of guilt. This is perhaps the most universal of all human experiences, and it is devastating. The head of a mental institution said, "I would release half of my patients if I could but find a way they could be rid of their sense of guilt." This is what the cross is all

5. I know that every reader shares the common fear of death. We do not like to talk about death in our generation. But death is real. In many parts of the world you can turn on television and see famous people who have been dead for some years; they look alive, but they're dead.

Somehow television, especially in western society, has cushioned death. Yet the spectre is always there. The subtle fear cannot be silenced. But here is the glorious news: Our Lord came to nullify death. In His own death and resurrection He made three things inoperative: sin, death, and hell. That is the message of the cross. That is the message of SIGNS OF THE TIMES.

Thank God "The Article That Had to Be Written" was written. And God will inspire other writers in 1984 to produce powerful messages. Every month throughout the year such messages will come from the pens of our dedicated writers.

THE RELIGIOUS and social mood of North America drastically changed immediately after November 20, 1983.

That momentous night was the epochal time of the showing of the classic TV movie – The Day After. History books will soon say that November 20, 1983 was the watershed of doom and gloom turned into optimism. The millions who were



shock-treated with unbelievable depictions of nuclear vaporizations of life and objects awakened the next day bewildered but angry and ready to fight back against the tyranny of the madness of nuclear militarization and the prospect of the annihilation of humanity. Thinking people were ready now to find a view of the future that is positive and not self-defeating.

Extensive mood swings are a symptom of an emotional disorder. While the optimist may applaud the new social syndrome, there is reason to be cautious. It is not uncommon in individual psychosomatic disorders that in the upswing, erratic behaviour may be manifested. The reaction against the horrible idea of Orwellian totalitarianism coupled with potential

nuclear holocaust may yet emerge as another kind of well-reasoned mind and soul domination.

The year 1984 began with announcements from various quarters that "this is the Year of Transition." Keeping pace, a new series of "intensive conclaves" began on the campus of the University of Toronto. Under the heading of "The Transformation of Human Consciousness" a distinguished cultural historian and futurist, William Irwin Thompson, began discussions concerning the necessity of society to move out of our modern world system into the "new planetary culture." In short, that means preparing for a new world order. Understanding what that means will come about

only by "globalism" – a world-wide consciousness that man is capable of pulling out of the crises of terrorism and social breakdown toward establishing a sane, peaceful, sustainable global society. Or, as another futurist has said, "There is no solution other than to re-invent the world."

While in attendance at the opening session of the noted conclaves, I learned that the impetus for this think-action series comes from an organization entitled – The World Future Society. This association is of worldwide ambit and boasts of its capacity to bring about a "new global consciousness." It proposes to facilitate a transition from the present crises of the world into a positive future with Toronto as the centre of communication for the world.

The World Future Society claims that present day world economics have failed and the contemporary structures in society are no longer relevant. It agrees with B.F. Skinner who recently opined in the Science Digest, "The world now has 4.5 billion people. We really are running out of essential things: water, air, crucial energy and materials. We are polluting the environment and facing the real danger of a nuclear holocaust." But, Skinner believes these things could be corrected by active resolve and a change – "of governments and religions" and a "redesign of cultural practices."

There could be no philosophy with stronger appeal to the mind of the '80's than this. When a man is down at the bottom he has no where to look but up. Unfortunately in this case, man's upward look is not seeing God; he is seeing more of himself. In fact, during the presentations of the opening session of the Toronto conclave on futurism, speakers claimed that religion which bases its view of the future on Biblical cataclysm is to be denigraded as negative to the objects of futurism. Fundamentalist religion is regarded as antagonistic toward the new global consciousness. The new world order will consist of a natural fusion of science and religion, but there will be no room for a so-called prophetic dénouement - an end of the world.

It struck me with force, the intellectuals and religionists of today do not allow for the second coming of Jesus Christ as the resolution to this world's chaos. I felt strongly uncomfortable upon realizing that the Adventist belief concerning the Advent of Jesus is even now regarded as mythological. In structuring the new culture, a believer in the apocalypse of the Bible will be viewed as an enemy of essential futurism.

If Christ is not to become the King of Kings and Lord of Lords; in the new world order, who shall be the head? (A stimulating question indeed, for alort minded Seventh-day Adventists.)

At times it has been felt by Canadian Seventh-day Adventists that the dramatic elements of end-time prophecies will take place "somewhere else" let us say: U.S.A. It may well be that thought-leaders in

Canada's proudest city may lead the way in forwarding mankind's last struggle toward establishing a "world empire" without God's order of things. Perhaps we should read again; "And in the days of those kings the God of heaven will set up a kingdom which shall never be destroyed, nor shall its sovereignty be left to another people. It shall break in pieces all these kingdoms and bring them to an end, and it shall stand lorever." (Daniel 2:44).

In 113,320 hours of house to house missionary work, they sold books at a value of \$1,753,331.68. Besides this, they gave away 65,017 pieces of free literature. This alone shows that many homes were contacted throughout the year. Most of all, we

In the early morning hours of Friday, August 26, 1983, four of us arrived at the Whitehorse church after having spent the previous day canvassing at Watson Lake, where we stopped enroute from the Queen Charlotte Islands to Whitehorse. Other Literature Evangelists who had travelled to Whitehorse from the lower mainland and other points were already settled in the church basement, which was to be our home for the next week.

After Friday preparations and a beautiful Sabbath fellowship with the Whitehorse

church members, a large number of the B.C. Literature Evangelists began a group canvass on Sunday, August 28th, dividing into pairs and working their respective areas. During the week, the Lord richly blessed our efforts with many Bible studies, uplifting experiences, and sales totaling \$13,018.00. As we visited from door to door, many of the Whitehorse residents expressed their appreciation of the pastor and church members for their community outreach programs, such as 5-Day Plans, etc.

Following a week of many hours canvassing and the joy of Christian fellowship, all but four of the literature evangelists travelled home to work in their regular territories. The four of us who stayed behind moved from the church to the home of the members, where they shared their home with us and treated us like part of the family. We then looked forward to the adventure and privilege of being flown into the outlying areas by Pastor Les Anderson to continue our mission of leaving Christian literature and seeking out those individuals who have a spiritual interest. Our first flight was to be to Teslin, Y.T., but due to the weather, we turned south to Atlin, B.C., where the airstrip is about two miles from the village with no regular transportation available. The Lord took care of this problem by sending along a man in a pickup truck. We later learned he was the chief of the local Indian band. By the end of the day, most of the books we had brought with us had been sold. Before darkness descended, we straggled back to the airstrip with muscles tired from walking, and hearts joyful from the success of reaching out to people with Christian literature. Soon the

Conference airplane piloted by Pastor Anderson landed, at which time Pastor Anderson was introduced to one of the customers who had given Ron Nelson a ride back. We bade farewell to him, climbed into the plane and took off in the twilight for Whitehorse.

During the ensuing days and weeks this was our general daily program, as we visited other villages and towns such as Mayo, Elsa, Dawson City, Ross River, Faro, Teslin and Haines Junction. In some of these villages, Christian literature exceeding \$1,000.00 was left in one day. At times kind residents of the community would give us accommodations when we stayed more than one day. Other days, when the weather did not permit flying, we worked in and around Whitehorse, where we continued to be blessed with sales and experiences.

When the time came, there was an eagerness to return home, and a certainty that we would long remember the kindness shown us by the people of the Yukon. The plan was for us to be flown home, but due to poor weather conditions, we were faced with a bus trip taking the better part of three days. This trip in itself was of the Lord's leading. Two of the people whom I had canvassed were travelling part of the way, and we had several opportunities to witness and leave literature with people travelling on the bus.

Since arriving home, I have received a letter from a customer in one of the villages, thanking me for my visit and for selling her the books. She has asked me to continue praying for her and to keep in touch with her by letter. It is my wish that all my brothers and sisters in Christ might experience the warmth of Christian love and fellowship through reaching out to those around them.



T WAS THE SECOND MONTH of the school's first year of operation. The new building, though not yet finished, was already in use. There were still doors to be hung; walls needed painting; the building was not yet winterized; and the floors were bare concrete.

The school day was about to close, the students had completed their custodial duties, and the choking dust that resulted from sweeping the raw concrete floor was settling as the teacher and students bowed their heads for the benediction on their school day together. One young girl, experiencing church school for the first time, prayed, "Thank you, God, for this wonderful school."

As a church we can offer the same prayer of thanks for the 1,238 elementary schools and academies in North America. These schools can offer spiritual safety and a balanced education to the children and youth of our church. They are not only to be "cities of refuge" - shielding from the unwholesome, unhealthful elements so prevalent in our world today - but they also teach

Biblical truth and afford to each student the privilege and opportunity of knowing Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour.

The Scriptures, daily worship, and a sense of self-worth are the spiritual core and centre of Seventh-day Adventist schools. While the human element and efforts of Satan are ever present, they are identified as foreign and are dealt with lovingly and prayerfully. In Seventh-day Adventist schools students are taught to pray, to respect the sacredness of life, and are challenged to help finish God's work on earth.

Living the life of Jesus can be difficult. Although an excellent academic program is a priority, the development of a Christlike character counts most. These goals complement each other and can be achieved through the grace of a loving Saviour. The influence of the Holy Spirit is to be cherished in each classroom. "We cannot afford to separate spiritual from intellectual training." Counsels to Parents and Teachers, p. 167.

While discipline is considered to be the number one problem in public education today, that is not the situation in Seventhday Adventist schools. Furthermore, discipline in a Christian school has a unique philosophical base and is not punitive. Built upon the concept of love, Christian discipline endeavours to teach self-discipline and selfcontrol. It enhances the development of character. By so doing, it has and will continue to furnish the church with men and women qualified to act in positions of leader-

To be a Christian, according to the Scriptures, is not merely to accept a set of doctrines but to become a doer of the Word - to become one with Christ, serving God and one's fellowman.

We, as parents and as church members, have been commissioned by our Lord to be responsible and accountable for the children He has given us. We are not only to feed, clothe and love them, but also to provide for their educaiton and spiritual needs as well. "Nothing is of greater importance than the education of our children and young people. The church should arouse and manifest a deep interest in this work;. . . . " Counsels to Parents and Teachers, p. 165.

The supportive role of the Christian teacher and the school's distinctive curriculum complement the work of the parent and the efforts of the pastor and Sabbath School. "The Lord would use the church school as an aid to the parents in educating and preparing their children for this time before us." Counsels to Parents and Teachers, p. 167. To utilize the schools of the church is to enhance and support the work that is to be accomplished in the home and church.

Just as public education is one of the fundamental supports of a democratic society, so Christian education is a foundation for the Christian society. Our world today needs skilled craftsmen and competent professionals, but more importantly, it needs spiritually committed individuals - disciples of Christ.

Providing the kind of education that fits young Christians to take their place in society requires a tremendous investment on the part of parents and churches. It has and always will require sacrifice. There is no such thing as "cheap grace" or "uncommitted discipleship."

As with Christ, it demands our all - all that we have and all that we are. In an increasingly materialistic society, we must determine to preserve the spiritual heritage

To ignore or neglect the educational duty placed upon us will not only affect our temporal status but our eternal welfare as well.

"The beauty and virtue of the word of God have a transforming influence upon mind and character; the sparks of heavenly love will fall upon the hearts of the children as an inspiration. We may bring hundreds and thousands of children to Christ if we will work for them." Counsels to Parents and Teachers, p. 172.

This year on Education Day, let us afford our children the benefits and advantages of a truly Christian education.

"Give, and it Shall be Given Unto You"

xcitement about the Pan American Youth Congress is spreading every day. This great youth gathering will be held in Mexico City during Dec. 18-22, 1984. It will include youth, youth leaders and delegatesat-large from three world divisions; South America, Inter America and North America.

The Canadian Union will be represented at the Congress by 160 young people chosen as delegates by their local churches. Each conference in Canada has been allocated the number of delegates it can send based on conference membership. The breakdown according to conference is as follows.

Not every church in Canada will be able to send a delegate because we have many more churches than the number of delegates allocated to us. Each conference youth committee will determine which churches are chosen to send delegates. The names of the candidates from the churches need to be sent to the local conference youth department as soon as possible, if this has not already been done.

The local church and the delegate share the responsibility of raising the funds to finance the cost of sending the delegate to the congress. The total cost for each delegate will vary according to the cost of travel from the Canadian city from which the delegate will fly. The delegate registration fee and hotel cost while in Mexico City will be as outlined below:

One meal per day as well as transportation to the convention centre and back to the hotel is included in the delegate fee. The exact air fare and total cost for each delegate will be determined by each conference.

Those delegates who elect to do so, will go four days early to Mexico City and associate with other young people in Mexico in certain types of youth outreach, literature distribution, visiting churches, sharing soul winning ways with other youth from Inter and South America.

The additional cost for those who go for 11 days instead of 7 days will be only the minimum hotel and food cost. If you are fortunate enough to be chosen as a delegate, check with your conference youth director about the additional benefits of participating in the longer time and the youth outreach programs. Local Churches To Select Education Secretaries

by J.D. Victor Fitch, Director Office of Education, Canadian Union Conference

The Canadian Union Conference K-12 Board of Education, in its November meeting, voted to encourage all churches to follow the 1979 General Conference Annual Council action by selecting a local church Education Secretary. This position should not be confused with that of the Home and School Leader or the School Board. The Home and School Leader's duties are to provide a liaison between parents and teachers. Their primary aim and function is parent education. The School Board, on the other hand, is charged with the responsibility of operating the school in harmony with denominational guidelines and the interests and desires of the school constituency. It is suggested that the local church Education Secretary be a member of the Home and School Executive, as well as a member of the local School Board.

Some of the suggested functions of the

local Education Secretary are as follows:

- 1. Keep a written record of all children and young people in the church. The Union Office of Education is currently developing a form to be used to assist in keeping active and current information on each person.
- 2. Cooperate with the pastor, parents, and church members in helping to remove any obstacle which could keep a student from attending church school.
- 3. Cooperate with the church pastor and/or other church leaders in educating church members concerning the benefits of Christian education and the necessity of providing church school education for all the youth who desire it.
- 4. Promote Christian education by working with the pastor in planning the yearly Education Day program, and by vigorously promoting financial aid to needy and worthy students.
- 5. Promote the concept that Christian education begins at infancy in the home, and encourage the proud parents of a new baby to begin to plan immediately for the education of the
- 6. Pray constantly for the children and youth of our church, since they will be its future leaders.

It is our sincere prayer that the full implementation of this program will result in ever-increasing support for Christian education and that all of the children and youth may experience the blessings of attending a Christian school.
