## Speaking of Books

### God and Man in History

The title page calls it "A Study in the Christian Understanding of History." The author draws upon a background of more than 30 years of study and teaching in the field. The result is an outstanding treatise which places

historical development in its proper perspective as it relates to divine direction.

The book is divided into two parts. The first is a discussion and analysis of the various human philosophies which have been dominant in world thought during the past few centuries—rationalism, humanism, and communism, to name a few.

The second part deals with God's involvement in history, His methods of dealing with men and nations, and the relation of human and divine natures in historical development.

Current historical literature reveals a significant lack of any material emphasizing the spiritual foundation of history. Economic, cultural, and political aspects are explored minutely, while the greatest force is ignored. The author's goal is to acknowledge this force, study it, and apply his findings to the contemporary manifestations of history.

The Christian student of history accepts as a basis for his study the overall divine plan leading to an ultimate theological goal. He also recognizes that there are human goals which may be contrary to God's plan, but which God will ultimately conform to fit into His design.

Doctor Shankel has been a college president, dean, and professor of history for over 30 years. He is one of the most eminently qualified men in this denomination to present this subject to the public. *God and Man in History* will be welcomed by teachers, students, and interested intellectuals.

### A Recipe from the Worthington Kitchen

This is a new item that we might use from time to time in the REAPER if we think it is helpful to our readers. Diet is an important part of our lives. Our health and religious influence are affected by the proper use we make of the foods we use each day. May we each one try to only take into our bodies those foods that will help us in our daily progress up the Christian path.

#### GOLDEN CHICKEN CROQUETTES

12 ounces Vegetarian Entree, Chicken Style Slices, ground  
1/4 cup celery, finely chopped.  
2 Tablespoons parsley, finely chopped  
1 1/2 Tablespoons butter or margarine  
3 Tablespoons flour  
1 cup milk  
1 Tablespoon minced onions  
3/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup rice, cooked and chilled  
1/4 cup corn flake crumbs  
*Coating*  
1 egg  
1/4 cup milk  
1 cup corn flake crumbs

Mix together "chicken," celery, and parsley.

Make a thick cream sauce of butter, flour, milk, onions, and seasonings. Add rice, corn flake crumbs, and "chicken" mix to sauce, blend well. Spread thick layers in shallow pans. Cool slightly; cover and chill thoroughly. After chilling, make croquettes.

Combine egg with milk and beat thoroughly. Coat croquettes first with egg mixture, then with crumbs. Fry in deep fat (360°). Bake in oven for 15 minutes to be certain it is cooked through. Serve with tartar sauce or Loma Linda GRAVY QUIK, mushroom or country style. Serves 10-12.
