YOUNG PEOPLE'S DAY IN THE LAKE UNION CONFERENCE.

FOR some years God has been calling upon us as a people to educate, train, and assist our young people in organizing and entering his work. So far we have neglected his call. He says this neglect is a "grievous offense" to him. We claim to believe the advent message is to go to the world in this generation; yet we have neglected to put in operation one of the powerful agencies for accomplishing this work. He says, "With such an army of workers as our youth, rightly trained, might furnish, how soon the message of a crucified, risen, and soon-coming Saviour might be carried to the whole world!" (Education," p 271)

What results have followed Our neglect to heed the call of God? Instead of an army of youth carrying the advent message to the world, we have seen and are seeing, an army of our youth becoming weary of the truth, and going to the world to become servants of Satan. How many tears have been shed; how many agonizing prayers have been offered for these straying lambs of the fold, by their Adventist parents, the dear Lord and recording angel only know. The question will be asked, "Does not God hear those parents' prayers?" Certainly; but how can he do all for the wandering youth he desires, when we refuse to "arouse from" our "lethargy, and see what manner of service is demanded?" He says, "Very much has been lost to the cause of God by lack of attention to the young."

That we may study and better understand the Lord's requirements, it has been decided to set apart Sabbath, Dec. 2, as Young People's Day, to be observed by all churches in the Lake Union Conference. Appropiate readings have been prepared and will be sent to the churches, accompanied by a program, with suggestive topics to be considered; also instruction for carrying out the program. The elder, Sabbath-school superintendent, with the church school teacher and leader of the Y. P. S., should constitute a committee of arrangements to have charge of the day's service. Let them commence at once to pray and plan for the success of the meeting. As soon as possible, arrange to have the young people take a prominent part in the meeting. Remember, much depends upon consecration and prayer.

The blessing of God will rest upon us as we humble our hearts before him and seek for wisdom and help to discharge our long neglected duties.

May God grant that this service

THE BIBLE STUDY.

THE Bible studies are the golden threads running all through our school work.

We are told by God's servant that students should be rooted and grounded in-divine truth, that their attention should not be called to the assertions of men, but to the Word of God. This is the purpose of our Bible instructor. Prayerfully and patiently we are being led. step by step, to the Fountain of Living Waters. May God create in each a thirsting, may he give us each a desire to drink deeply.

There are six divisions of Bible

study in the school. The fourth division is devoted to the study of Doctrinal Bible. Some doctrinal point of faith is taken up for study. Each day from fifteen to twenty questions with corresponding texts are assigned for study the following day. During the recitation the subject is thoroughly discussed pro and con.

The objections which we must meet as we give these truths to the people are presented, and we are shown the best way to meet these objections with a "thus saith the Lord." Sometimes a day is spent in the study of one subject, sometimes a week, and even two. Our reviews are covered by Bible readings, talks, and papers prepared by the student upon the subject previously studied by the class.

Though the recitation period is necessarily short and the class large, consisting of thirty-four, much is accomplished. It is intrnsely interesting, and in our minds thoughts of eternal value are imbedded. Our present subject is that of the Judgment. We have just concluded the study of The Ministry of Angels.

We realize that the Bible study should be the strongest part in the curriculum of our school. God is wonderfully blessing in the effort to make it so.

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An informal meeting was held on Sunday afternoon, both with the old canvassers and those who are interested in this most important work, and contemplate taking it up next summer.

Brother Blosser emphasized the importance of forming our plans, as far as practicable, even this early in the school year; for by so doing we shall be enabled to work with a definite purpose in view during the time that will intervene before the vacation season opens.

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BROTHER C. E. WE'KS, Field Secretary of the Ohio Conference, was called to Mt. Vernon to attend a meeting of conference labores last Wednesday, and has since then spent a few days at the College, where his smiling face is always welcome.
