CAMP-MEETING QUOTATIONS From the Testimonies

THE camp-meeting is one of the most important agencies in our work. It is one of the most effective methods of arresting the attention of the people, and reaching all classes.

WE need to understand in regard to the division of labor, and how each part of the work is carried forward. Each one should understand the part he is to act, that there may be harmony of plan and of labor in the combined work of all.

THE Lord has instructed us that the camp-meeting is one of the most important instrumentalities for the accomplishment of this work.

God has committed to our hands a most sacred work, and we need to meet together to receive instruction, that we may be fitted to perform this work. We need to understand what part we shall individually be called upon to act in building up the cause of God in the earth, in vindicating God's holy law and in lifting up the Saviour as "The Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world."

We need to meet together and receive the divine touch that we may understand our work in the home. Parents need to understand how they may send forth from the sanctuary of the home their sons and daughters so trained and educated that they will be fitted to shine as lights in the world.

EVERY camp-meeting should be an object-lesson of neatness, order, and good taste. -We must give special regard to economy, and must avoid display; but everything connected with the grounds should be neat and tidy. Taste and tact do much to attract. And in all our work we should present the discipline of organization and order.

Ir is important that the mem-

bers of our churches should attend our camp-meetings. The enemies of truth are many; and because our numbers are few, we should present as strong a front as possible. Individually you need the benefits of the meeting, and God calls upon you to number one in the ranks of truth.

THERE is something for every one to do. Every soul that believes the truth is to stand in his lot and place, saying, "Here am I, send me." By engaging in work at the camp-meeting, all may be learning how to work successfully in their home churches.

In our camp-meeting services there should be singing and instrumental music. Musical instruments were used in religious services in ancient times. The worshipers praised God upon harp and cymbal, and music should have its place in our services.—Testimonies, Vol. 6.

A SECOND JEWISH TRACT

ANOTHER tract has been published for distribution among the Jews. God greatly blessed the circulation of the first one, so that in a little over one year there were distributed over four million pages of it in this land, as well as in other lands. It has set a number of the Jews to thinking, and we have received many letters from different parts of

the land relative to it. Calls have come for it as far as Macedonia, and Jews everywhere have had their prejudices broken down.

It is certainly remarkable to think of a Jew asking and begging of a Christian for something more to read on the lines of Christianity. This is a miracle; for not many years ago the Jews would burn and tear everything they could get their hands on that was Christian or taught of Christianity. THE Rev. Father Drummond, S. J., of the St. Boniface Catholic College, gives views on the principles of Sunday street cars. He also tells us where the Sunday institution came from.

He says: "I certainly think we ought to have Sunday cars, and I have never heard a good reason against their use, although I have read many lofty opinions of contempt for those who share my opinion; but this does not constitute a reason.

"Where Sunday cars are in use people do use them very largely to attend church, and besides rational amusement is not at all against the spirit of the Lord's day as instituted and organized by the Catholic church. All the rest of the Christian world, which takes its observance of the first day of the week from the Catholic church alone, has no right to dictate to us as to which way we shall observe the Sabbath."—Winnipeg Telegram, Apr. 13, '06.


OUR WORK AND WORKERS

DEAR WELCOME VISITOR: I will write you a few lines concerning the debate that has taken place here the past week.
