THE OHIO GONFERENGE

RESOLUTIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Adopted at the Forty-sixth Annual Conference of Ohio

Your Committee on Plans would respectfully submit the following partial report:—

Whereas, The Columbia Union Conference recommends that each conference provide for the more thorough work with our literature, by enlisting the services of all our numbers in the distribution of periodicals, tracts, trade and forty per cent. books, and—

Whereas, The Columbia Union Conference recommends the appointing of a Field Missionary Secretary—

Therefore, we recommend that this conference elect a Field Missionary Secretary whose duties shall be the supervision in the field of the circulation of periodicals, tracts, trade and forty per cent, books; also, the selection, instruction and direction of the workers, the holding of institutes in the interest of home missionary work; the organization of home missionary work; the increasing of the clubs of our papers and the sale of literature provided especially for home workers; and auditing librarians' books.

Whereas, The Constitution makes no provision for this department—

Therefore, we recommend that the constitution be amended to provide for this department.

Whereas, The General Conference recommended that our connection with the Lake Union Conference be severed, and that we unite with the Columbia Union Conference for the strengthening of the work, therefore—

Resolved, That we express ourselves as being in harmony with the plan suggested, and that we approve of the steps taken by the Conference Committee toward this end, and—

We would therefore respectfully request that the Lake Union Conference grant us release from our present union conference relations that we may assume the new union conference re-

lations, as recommended by the General Conference.

Whereas, The officers of our churches hold positions of great responsibility, therefore be it—

Resolved, That we encourage the holding of institutes where church officers may be instructed more fully in their important duties.

Whereas, The Scriptures teach that the tithe is reserved for the gospel ministry, and—

Whereas, It is evident from the tithes reported by different conferences that our funds for mission fields would be largely increased if full tithes were paid by all the members in our conferences, therefore—

Resolved, That we urge our church officers to make most earnest efforts to secure the payment of a full tithe in their respective churches. And to preserve order and harmony of action in all our churches, and, that due credit may be given to the church—

We recommend and urge that all members pay their tithes and offerings to their respective churches.

Whereas, Eternal vigilance is the price of religious liberty, and as the enemy knows no rest, the issue before us demands earnest effort—

Therefore, In order to render the cause more efficient service we recommend the selection of a Religious Liberty Secretary in each church whose duty shall be to watch local developments, take charge of the circulation of petitions, and rendering such services as may be required in this department.

Whereas, The Ohio Conference now becomes a part of the Columbia Union Conference, and,—

Whereas, The Columbia Union Conference has taken steps toward making the Mount Vernon College the Union Conference school—

Therefore we recommend that the College Board of Trustees take such steps as will place the institution under the ownership and control of the Columbia Union Conference.

Whereas, Arrangements have been made between the Columbia Union Conference Committee and the Ohio Conference whereby the Welcome Visitor becomes the official organ of the Columbia Union Conference, therefore—

We recommend that the WELCOME VISITOR be placed under the owner-ship and control of the Columbia Union Conference.

We recommend that the Constitution be changed as follows:—

In Article V, Section A, and Article VII, Section 6, the words Missionary Secretary be stricken out, and the words Tract Society Secretary be inserted. In Article V. Section A, and Article VII, Section 8, the words Field Secretary be stricken out, and the words Field Missionary Agent be inserted.

That Article VII, Section 7, be stricken out and the following be inserted in its stead:—

It shall be the duty of the Medical Missionary Secretary-

- (a.) To have charge of the medical missionary department of this Conference.
- (b.) To give lectures and instruction on the principles of healthful living and care of the sick, combining medical missionary work with giving the gospel message.

Whereas, The rapidly advancing Message is continually increasing its financial demands upon us, therefore in order to give greater strength and permanence to the support of our foreign missionary work,—

We recommend that in all our churches, we encourage, not only a faithful payment of the tithe, but also the laying by of a sum not less than ten cents per week by each member, for the support of this work.

Whereas, Our Lord has instructed that no sanitarium should be established independent of the church, be it—

Resolved, That such sanitariums in Onio as-

- (1.) Are owned and operated exclusively by Seventh-day Adventists—
- (2.) Are conducted in harmony with the Ohio Conference and pay their tithe in such a manner that it will go through the Ohio Conference treasury, be recognized by the Ohio Seventh-day Adventist Conference as self supporting medical missionary institutions, and a part of the medical missionary department of the Conference, on the following conditions:—

- (a.) The Conference is to be consulted concerning their business policy.
- (b.) The Conference is in no manner to be held responsible for the financial success or for debts incurred by the institution.
- (c.) The Conference is to have supervision over the religious work of the said institutions.

That the self-supporting medical missionary workers in Ohio may be brought into close union with those in charge of our Conference work, be it—

Resolved, That such persons as are connected with the active work of recognized sanitariums, who—

- (a.) Are graduated physicians or nurses.—
- (b.) Are in harmony with all points of our faith,—
- (c.) Are, in the judgment of the Conference Committee, worthy of such recognition.—
- (d.) Do not hold other Conference credentials or license—

Be recognized as medical missionary workers, and granted self-supporting Medical Missionary licenses and have the same privileges in participation in the work of our annual Conference sessions as are granted other Conference laborers.

OUR CALL TO SERVICE

WANTED! Young men and young women who are sound in the faith, and have tact and patience; who walk with God, and abstain from the very appearance of evil; who stand so closely connected with God, that they can be channels of light—in short, Christian young men and women—to enlist as soldiers to fight in the great conflict that is being waged between good and evil. Come and join the ranks for the right before you are compelled to fight on the side of the enemy.

Satan, the adversary of all good, is going about as a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour. When the plan of salvation had been carried out, and Satan realized that he was defeated, - his kingdom lost, and that he must die,-his efforts against Christ did not stop; but instead were greatly increased, and aimed at the followers of Christ. The greater part of the whole world, as yet, are not acquainted with the plots of this enemy. Have we not some noble youth, who, if need be, are willing to risk their lives to warn them? You will need to "put on the whole armor of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not with flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places. Wherefore take unto you the whole armor of God, . . . having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of righteousness; and your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God."

There is not one excuse for every young man and woman not joining this army; for all will not even need to leave home and friends, although it will be necessary for some to do so, and perhaps go to other lands. Some of our greatest warriors have been those right in their own homes. They may not have received worldly honors, but nevertheless the records kept in the book of remembrance will some day reveal what victories have been won.

We have a Captain who has never known defeat, and if we keep our eyes fixed upon him, and carry out his instructions carefully, we shall gain the victory in every battle.

There are many places through which the enemy may enter the land, and take possession, therefore we will all need to be guards. "The wicked watcheth the righteous and seeketh to slay him." "Watch ye therefore and pray always that ye may be accounted worthy to escape all these things that shall come to pass, and to stand before the Son of Man." If we do this, no guards will be found sleeping.

We know not what moment our names will be brought up for consideration. Shall we be found wide awake at our post of duty, or shall we be weighed in the balance and found wanting? That remains for each to decide for himself.

It is through a daily, living connection with God that we can be able to hold the fort. "Pray without ceasing." Pray for one another, for the effectual, fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much. Let us all fight the good fight of faith, and we shall come off victors.

WE welcome the VISITOR with joy. We are glad to read the Ohio reports, for at Springfield, wife and I were brought to a knowledge of the Third Angel's Message, in 1897. We are glad to send back a few crumbs of encouragement from our present field of labor.

Three have recently accepted the Message and united with the church; others are expecting to soon enter our ranks. We are holding Bible readings every night, and frequently during the day. In our Sunday night meetings we have been presenting the book of Revelation, and interest and attendance is on the increase. In our Sabbath meetings we have been studying the character of the remnant church. Our people show a decided interest.

The canvassing work among the colored is being carried forward by Sisters Jemerson, McGlocklin and Warnick. They are having some rich experiences, and through their efforts mang souls are receiving the light.

February 1 the writer ordained Brother Wallace Taylor as local elder. We were hoping for the presence of the president of the Conference, but pressing duties prevented him.

A few Sabbaths ago a brother took his stand for the truth under trying circumstances. His employer, for whom he has worked ten years, told him that if he kept the Sabbath he would get another man. When he informed his wife, she raged all night and burned his tracts, and in the morning threw all his shirts and collars into a tub of water, and hurled

his Bible down stairs. Not satisfied with that she packed his trunk and ordered him to leave. He tied his handkerchief about his neck, and came to the church in his working clothes—happy in obeying God. Many prayers ascended for his wife and employer, and the brother returned to his residence and was received with almost surprising kindness. The angels had visited his house. He is still pressing his way onward amid a volley of persecution.

Many of the city pastors are devoting special attention to our work, and are making the people "hope that they will confirm their word," yet the dear Lord is revealing more openings for the truth than we can fill, and the angels go before to soften hearts. Ps. 76: 10 and Isa. 59: 19 are daily fulfilled in this city.

This has been the most trying winter during our connection with the work. Yet we praise the Lord for the privilege of giving the Message and for its fruit. Rom. 8:28. With an allowance of eight dollars a weekthe very best our over-burdened Confenence can do-and eight in family, with a monthly rent nine dollars, you can see that we cannot provide the necessary clothing; but we praise the Lord for the experience and if funds give out we trust to find some way of carrying forward the work. We are of good courage, knowing that "the end is at hand." Jer. 12:5.

We are now raising funds for a house of worship. We hope to accomplish this task between now and the close of spring. We can build the house ourselves if we can secure the lot and material, which we hope to obtain inside of the \$1,000 mark. Who will place an offering in a monument for God and truth in this city-the capital of the State? Who will co-operate with the angels of God in this effort to save many of the colored race? The Lord says that this branch of the work has been neglected. Brethren, will you now give us the "crumbs from the table?" The Message is closing, and the signs plainly tell us that soon, VERY soon, Heb. 3:7 (margin) will be fulfilled. The intensity in every walk of life whispers in unmistaken tones in the ear of every Seventh-day Adventist, "Go out quickly into the highways and hedges." One soul is worth more than the world, and if we can get our building on foot, the workers' hands will be free to scatter the Message in other places. We expect to soon be placing 100 Signs in the hands of the people.

A new interest is opening at Martinsville, where Sister Jane Wooding is doing Bible work. The Spencer church recently had some additions. A cheering report also comes from the News Ferry work.

This class is easily approached with the truth for this time and with our publications. This is a city of about 12,000 inhabitants, and was entered last summer by Elder Charles Baierle. As a result of the tent effort, a company was raised to step out and accept the Message.

Sabbath meetings were commenced in a hall at the close of the tent season with a regular attendance of between fifty and seventy-five. The interest begun at this place has spread throughout the country districts and nearby towns, and many earnest appeals have come to Elder Baierle requesting him to come and hold meetings. The Lord has given many evidences of his approval and call to the work in this field, and the outlook is bright for a large number of commandment keepers to be gathered out to join God's remnant church.
