# CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

# Report of Ohio Conference Proceedings

PURSUANT to notice regularly given, the forty-seventh annual session of the Ohio Conference was held in Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 25-29, 1909, with the president, Elder H. H. Burkholder, presiding.

The first business meeting was called at 9 A. M., January 26. The roll-call showed one hundred ten delegates present, who, with the delegates-at-large, were seated.

Elders Geo. A. Irwin and Geo. B. Thompson being present, they were voted the privilege of taking part in the deliberations of the conference. Four new churches were admitted into the conference. An address of welcome by Elder C. T. Redfield, the pastor of the Columbus church, was responded to by Elder R. R. Kennedy.

The president delivered his annual address, which showed that the Lord's blessing has been with this conference during the past year.

It was voted that a committee of eight should be chosen from the floor, who, in connection with the conference committee, should nominate all committees. This committee of fifteen members made the following report:—

After due deliberation, the Committee on Nominations made the following report, which was accepted by considering each name separately: President, H. H. Burkholder; vicepresident, R. G. Patterson; secretary and treasurer, O. D. Stevens; tract society secretary, L. C. Mitchell; educational superintendent, Bessie E. Acton; educational secretary, Bessie E. Russell; field missionary secretary, E. R. Numbers; religious liberty secretary, A. C. Shannon; medical missionary secretary, Dr. H. M. Jump; custodian of conference property, G. C. Quillan. Executive committee, H. H. Burkholder, R. R. Kennedy, W. E. Beebe, C. T. Redfield, R. G. Patterson, M. V. Downing, A. C. Shannon. This committee was also chosen as the trustees of the Ohio Conference Association.

The Committee on Plans and Recommendations made the following report, which, after careful consideration, was adopted:—

"Whereas, The blessing of the Lord has been seen in our conference in the preservation of the lives of our laborers, and in maintaining unity in our work, and in adding a number of souls to our ranks; therefore,—

1. "Resolved, That in recognition of the care and love of our Heavenly Father, we individually consecrate ourselves more fully to his service, and as an expression of our thanksgiving, we arise and sing the doxology.

ogy. "Whereas, The special blessing of God is seen in the rapid growth of our work in foreign fields; and,—

"Whereas, More workers have been sent to labor in the 'regions beyond' during the last year than in any previous year in our history; and,—

"Whereas, To respond to the 'Macedonian cry,' which comes to us from all these lands, requires an increased outlay of funds; therefore,—

- 2. "Resolved, That we thank our Heavenly Father for his prospering hand in our foreign mission work, and that this work may be speedily finished in all lands, we consecrate ourselves and all we have to its promulgation; and be it further,—
- 3. "Resolved, That we urge our laborers and church officers to endeavor to raise in every church a sum for missions equal to ten cents a week for each member.

"Whereas, It is advisable that as far as possible a uniform plan for electing church officers be adopted; and.—

"Whereas, The lot system and secret ballot are not attended with good results; therefore,—

4. "Resolved, That we advise all churches to avoid such methods and adopt the committee plan.

"Whereas, The spirit of prophecy has said that, to a large degree, through our publishing work is to be accomplished the work of the angel of Revelation 18: 1, 2, 4, which we believe to be the angel of the 'loud cry;' and,—
"Whereas, Our ministers, Bible

Whereas, Our ministers, Bible workers, and church elders are looked to by all our people for advice as to what line of work they should be en-

gaged in; therefore,-

5. "We Recommend, That our conference workers and church elders encourage suitable persons to enter the canvassing work, and report their names and qualifications to the president of the conference, who in turn will place the matter in the hands of the state agent for further development.

"Whereas, We recognize the canvassing work as an important factor in awakening an interest; and,—

"Whereas, It is impossible for the canvasser to follow up such interest;

therefore,-

- 5. "Resolved, That our canvassers be encouraged to include lists of interested persons in their weekly reports to the state agent, who should send such names and addresses to the educational superintendent, who in turn may place them in the hands of Missionary Volunteers for missionary correspondence.
- "Whereas, Strong organizations in the religious and political world are combining, and seeking for the enactment of laws in both state and national legislatures upon religious questions, which are contrary to the principles enunciated by Jesus of Nazareth, and subversive of the pillar of religious liberty guaranteed to us by the fundamental law of the land; and,—
- "Whereas, We can see in these movements the formation of an image to the beast in fulfillment of the prophecy of Revelation, against which the warning of the third angel's message is to be directed; therefore,—
- 6. "Resolved, That we organize a strong, aggressive campaign in all our churches in the conference for the circulation of literature upon the principles of religious liberty, in order that the people may be educated upon the principles underlying this important question.
- 7. "Resolved, That the journal, Liberty, which is published in the interest of liberty for all, both civil and religious, be given a wide circulation.—
  - (a) By subscribing for it ourselves.(b) By pushing its sale by regular

(b) By pushing its sale by regular agents in the many cities of our conference.

- (c) By sending it to members of our state and national legislatures.
- (d) By taking a club in our churches, for sale and free distribution, in the vicinity of our various churches.
- 8. "Resolved, That religious liberty institutes be held in various parts of the conference for educating our people upon the principles of liberty, and planning for aggressive work in the interest of the circulation of literature upon this question.
- "Whereas, The Review and Herald is our 'most able minister,' and is filled each week with instruction which all our people should read; therefore,—
- 9. "Resolved, That we endeavor to place this most excellent journal in the home of each Sabbath-keeper in the state.
- "Whereas, The VISITOR is the organ of the Columbia Union Conference, and should be in the homes of all our people in the union; therefore,—
- 10. "Resolved, That we urge all our people to subscribe for the VISITOR, that they may be fully informed concerning the plans in our conference and in the union.
- "Whereas, There is great need in Ohio for a sanitarium that will fitly represent our denominational health principles; therefore,—
- 11. "Resolved, That we recommend that the conference committee consider plans for such an institution, provided safe, business-like plans can be devised for financing it.
- "Whereas, Our beloved brother, C. V. Hamer, has served the Ohio Conference as its secretary and treasurer; and,—
- "Whereas, Failing health has compelled him to retire from active labor; therefore,—
- 12. "Resolved, That we, the laborers and delegates to the Ohio Conference, assembled at Columbus, Ohio, in annual session, January 25-29, 1909, hereby express our appreciation of his faithfulness, our regret for the loss of his efficient services, and our sincere desire that it shall please our Heavenly Father to restore him to health and strength.
- "Appreciating the many kindnesses shown us and the great efforts put forth by our brethren and sisters of the Columbus church, and by their interested friends, in so pleasantly entertaining us and providing for our needs during our stay in their city; therefore,
- 13. "Resolved, That the laborers in the Ohio Conference, and the delegates to its annual session, held Jan-

uary 25-29, 1909, assure these good brethren of our appreciation of their efforts, and as a feeble expression of our gratitude, extend to them a vote of thanks.

The five-minute reports of the workers proved an interesting feature of the meeting. All are of good courage. Several other interesting reports were read, showing what was being done in the other departments of the conference, which space forbids giving at this time. The spirit of harmony manifested throughout the conference, illustrated the truthfulness of the words of the Psalmist, "Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

The closing service of the session was held on Thursday evening, January 28, when Elder Irwin delivered an impressive sermon on the advancement of the message in the "regions beyond," at the close of which Dr. H. M. Jump and F. H. Henderson were ordained to the gospel ministry, Elders George A. Irwin, George B. Thompson, and H. H. Burkholder officiating.

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# West Pennsylvania Conference Proceedings

The sixth annual session of the West Pennsylvania Conference convened at Clearfield, Pa. March 1-6, 1909. The business of the conference was arranged so as to give considerable time to the spiritual part of the meeting. The following committees were appointed by the chair:—

On plans and resolutions: W. F. Schwartz, Geo. B. Thompson, N. S. Ashton, I. G. Bigelow, I. N. Williams, J. W. Watt, and W. H. Green; on credentials and licenses: C. A. Scholl, J. W. Watt, Geo. B. Thompson, E. W. Durkee, F. H. Robbins; on nominations: F. O. Owens, F. H. Robbins, George West, Fred Shaw, A. V. Williams.

The following resolutions and plans were adopted:—

"Whereas, There are many evidences of divine blessing in the advancement of the third angel's message, and the remarkable way in which every opposition is coming to naught; and,—

"Whereas, We can see no visible evidences of God's displeasure in our conference, but, on the other hand, we feel that as individuals and as a conference God has blessed us in preserving unity in our conference and

in the conversion of many souls; therefore.-

1. "Resolved, That we express our heartfelt thanks and appreciation to our Heavenly Father as the source of all these blessings.

"In view of the efficient service rendered by Sister Fannie Fondersmith. now deceased, to the Sabbath-school work in this conference,-

2. "Resolved (1) That we as a conference do hereby express our deep appreciation for her faithful and untiring efforts in the work to which she dedicated her life; (2) that we send a letter from this conference to her family and loved ones in Pittsburg, expressing our appreciation of her services, and also our heartfelt sympathy in this their hour of sorrow.

"Whereas, The Lord has spoken through the testimonies of his spirit in regard to the rapid progress the message must make, and has said that it will be necessary to step fast in order to keep abreast with the message; and,-

"Whereas, The Review and Herald is without doubt the best channel through which we can keep in touch with the field at large, and the general progress of the message; therefore.-

3. "Resolved, That the ministers and church elders make a strong effort to place this good paper in every Seventh-day Adventist home in the conference.

"Whereas, THE COLUMBIA UNION VISITOR is not only a well edited and interesting paper, but it is designed to be a means by which our people can keep in touch with our union and local conferences, thus enlivening their interest in the work: and,-

"Whereas, A sufficient subscription list will be a means of defraying our quota of the expense of publishing the paper; therefore,-

4. "Resolved, That we urge our brethren of the West Pennsylvania Conference to subscribe for this paper.

"In view of the fact that both the Bible and the Testimonies teach us that it is our duty to give our children a Christian education,-

5. "Resolved. That we urge all our people in the conference to assist in carrying out the resolution passed at our last annual conference of paying a sum equal to two cents a week into the educational fund for the support of church-school teachers; and that all our ministers and conference workers and church elders be asked to asasist in this work by keeping the plan

continually before our respective churches and isolated Sabbath-keep-

"Whereas, The officers in our local churches occupy a responsible place and can do much to build up and develop the various lines of work if properly instructed; and,-

"Whereas, Many of our officers are in need of careful instruction as to how to perform their work; therefore,-

6. "Resolved, That a number of church officers' conventions be held in the conference during the year, and that we urge upon church elders and other officers the duty of attending these conventions as far as possible.

"Whereas, The Sabbath-school work is a strong factor in building up the message in our conference, and in order that this important branch of the work may be built up and strengthened; therefore,-

7. "We Recommend, (1) A most faithful study of the Sabbath-school lessons in the various divisions; (2) that we urge our people, especially teachers, to subscribe for the Sabbath-School Worker; (3) that conventions in the interest of the Sabbath-school work be held in the conference.

8. "We Recommend, That our Sabbath-schools give all of their donations to foreign missions, providing for the supplies for the Sabbathschool from other sources.

"W hereas, Mount Vernon College has become the school of the Columbia Union Conference; and,-

"Whereas, The College is doing a splendid work in the training of our young people for important places in the work; and,-

"Whereas, The College is in need of funds to make necessary repairs and to meet the indebtedness which has been incurred; therefore,-

9. "Resolved, That our conference approve of the plan suggested by the trustees of the College and executive committee of the Columbia Union Conference, that our people in the various conferences of the union raise a sum equal to one cent a day per member for the College, one-half of this sum to be used in cancelling its indebtedness, the remaining one-half to be used for making needed repairs.

"Whereas, The rapid progress of the work in the 'regions beyond' calls for an increase of funds to fill the many openings for labor, and push the message into new fields; therefóre,-

10. "Resolved, That we continue our efforts in behalf of this work, and endeayor to increase our gifts and offerings to missions to the amount of ten cents a week per member.

"Whereas, Rapid advancement has been made in this country toward circumscrbing the rights of conscience by those who are seeking to have our law making bodies commit themselves to a course of religious legislation; and,--

"W hereas, The magazine, Liberty, is the only periodical in the United States that stands for, and so nobly defends, the cause of religious liberty as exemplified in the complete separation of church and state; therefore,-

11. "Resolved, That we endeavor to place this magazine, and the good tracts dealing with the different phases of this subject which are sent out by the Religious Liberty Bureau, in the hands of as many of the people as possible, especially professional men, as lawyers, judges, and city officials.

"Whereas, God has spoken in regard to our denominational books, and has said that they are one of the means of leading the people to see the truth for the time, and that there should be many times the present number actively engaged in getting these books in the hands of the people; therefore,-

12. "Resolved, That all our workers put forth every effort to interest individuals to enter the canvassers' ranks.

"Whereas, There is a strong effort on behalf of the missionary department at the head of our work to interest people everywhere in a more earnest work with our forty per cent books; and,-

"Whereas, We know that this will stimulate our missionary societies and individuals to their own salvation and to the saving of many souls who are in the valley of decision; therefore,-

13. "Resolved, That as ministers and laborers of the West Pennsylvania Conference, we will co-operate with those at the head of our work in creating a more general interest among the laity; and that as members of the conference and laborers together with God, we will do all within our power to place books and tracts in the bands of friends and relatives, and all within our reach, either by selling or by giving them away.

"Whereas, Our hearts have been made sad by the death of another of our fellow-laborers, Bro. J. Q. Herreington, who for some sixteen years has faithfully sold and delivered the printed page, thus bringing the light of this message to many hearts; therefore,-

14. "Resolved, That while bowing in submission beneath the providence of God which has removed from our midst our brother, we consecrate our lives more fully to the finishing of this work; and further,—

15. "Resolved, That we extend to those who mourn their loss, our deepest sympathy in this hour of grief, and point them to the comfort and consolation found in the promises of our Saviour in 2 Cor. 1:2-4; 1 Thess. 4: 13-18; 1 Cor. 15:51-57.

16. "Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the relatives of our deceased brother.

"Whereas, Our periodicals are a great factor in reaching with the third angel's message thousands who can be reached in no other way; and.—

"Whereas, God has spoken definitely in regard to our work with the Signs of the Times, the Southern Watchman, and Life and Health; therefore,—

17. "Resolved, That we put forth every effort and use every means within our power to increase the circulation of these papers by clubs, by individual subscriptions, and by house-to-house work and street work.

"Whereas, We have been informed that the General Conference Bulletin will be printed again this year for the benefit of our people everywhere; and that an earnest effort is being made in all our conferences to get this important paper into every Seventh-day Adventist home; therefore.--

18. "Resolved, That we co-operate with our other conferences in giving the Bulletin for 1909 as wide a circulation as possible.

"Whereas, There are numerous calls for means to meet conference expenses other than that for which the tithe should be used; therefore,—

· 19. "Resolved, That the delegates of this conference instruct the conference committee to at once devise a means for raising a fund to meet these expenses."
