The reports from the different conferences of the Columbia Union indicate that God has greatly blessed the work within this territory. We have seen many victories, brethren, but now we must get ready to win this fall the greatest victory we have yet won.

Plans are being laid everywhere throughout the Union for our brethren to all

they put the automobile on its feet, and soon have it ready to start on its journey.

There are some tasks too big to be accomplished by any one person, but when all join together, and pull heartily at the same time, and at the same thing, the greatest of tasks can be accomplished. We ask our brethren especially to note the endeavor by striking all at once in the great Harvest Ingathering Week October 14-20. One brother said to me the other day, "At last I have learned a lesson. When I first started this Harvest Ingathering work, I went in for small amounts, and I got them. Now I have learned to ask people for big amounts, and I have found they will pay out big money just as well as little."

Year before last the Columbia Union collected in its Harvest Ingathering Work, \$8,000. Last fail, 1916, we organized the best we had ever been organized up to that date, and we started late. Someone prophesied we would not get much over the year before, possibly \$9,000. We act-

This year, 1917, we are organized better than we have ever been; there is a good spirit everywhere; God is stirring up the minds of all to work, and we are starting early. Brethren, how much shall we obtain from the good people of the world to hasten on the glorious Third Angel's Message? Shall we not all together say, \$25,000? I believe we can do it.

Pay careful attention to what is said in your church concerning the work of this week, concerning the leaflets, cards, etc., as equipment, concerning the date, and the early plans now being laid for all to start at once. With the blessing of God upon us, we are certain we shall hear ringing testimonies after the Special Har-

Another Opportunity for a Grand Work

The Harvest Ingathering Campaign has established itself as one of the most effective means of hastening the closing work and its importance becomes more apparent year by year. It has been a means of quickening the spiritual pulse of thousands who have gone to their neighbors and friends in the interest of the cause that we love. It has placed before millions an opportunity to become acquainted, with the progress of the Third Angel's Message. It has gathered in hundreds of thousands of dollars to support our work and workers in the foreign lands. It-calls to every believer in Ohio to do his part toward making the 1917 campaign far exceed the effort of any preceding year.

Last year we began late, but through thorough organization and earnest effort we used 40,000 papers and raised \$5200, whereas we gathered in but \$1400 the preceding year. Do you not think we can go far beyond that this year? Some have thought we might set a goal of \$10,000 for this year. The more conservative among us feel that the goal would better be placed at \$8,000. I believe that we can raise that amount for missions in Ohio this year from the public and I purpose to join you in the task. What do you say? One church raised a thousand dollars last year, and another much smaller church raised five hundred dollars. These churches will doubtless do much more this year, and there is no reason why several other churches can not come up to them.

I do hope for a stronger work to be done in our country churches. Let the villages and country districts be so districted that every church and company may report splendid returns at the close of the campaign. Why should any be excused? Children have been very successful in this work. The aged, the feeble, and the crippled have accomplished good results. The business men and the professional classes have done and can do their part. Shall we not have our entire forces engaged in this work this year with all plans well perfected for a united effort? Every conference worker is planning to devote a whole week to the Ingathering Campaign to aid in reaching and passing the goal if possible.

Through the home missionary department we shall aid just as far as possible in planning, organizing, and furnishing supplies. The week beginning Oct. 14, is set as Special Campaign week. That is the time for a united and definite effort, but there are those who can devote only evenings and Sundays to the work. For such and any others the work can continue even to the end of the year if necessary, but let us aim to do this work early, for the holiday season is not nearly so good a time. Let every church order a good supply of papers early in harmony with plans that will be submitted to you soon.

My prayer is that a great blessing may come to the cause in Ohio, as we faithfully discharge our duty in this important campaign.

The expression 'Harvest Ingathering' is coming to be a patent one with Seventh-day Adventists, and with the blessing of the Lord upon this, it has indeed come to be a harvest for foreign missions and a seed-sowing to the homeland, in that it informs the world of the great work that is being done in this old earth by the Seventh-day Anventists.

In this conference there has been a steady growth in the amount of funds raised by our people, and last year we raised \$3034.00, which was above our share of the \$25,000 Union Conference goal.

We all rejoiced in the good work that was done by those who went out with the Harvest Ingathering paper. There were a greater number of our people engaged in this campaign last year than ever before; and so far it has been reported that several have accepted the truth as a result of reading the Harvest Ingathering paper.

Waiting for Us

"A few weeks ago a fine looking man called at our mission station at Yeng Cheng in Honan Province, China. Brother O. J. Gibson, a graduate of Mount Vernon College, received him and tells his story. The man was a Jew by nationality, but a Mohammedan by birth. educated in Cairo. Thirty years ago, as he was leaving Egypt, someone presented him with a copy of the Holy Scriptures. with the result that the man accepted Christ. He has read the book through seventy-nine times, but evidently failed to find the text that calls for the observance of the first day of the week, as he is a careful observer of the seventh day Sabbath, keeping it from sunset to sunset."

Migrating to the province of Kansu in the far northwest of China, the man has raised up a church of two hundred adult Sabbath keeping Christians with a regular Sabbath attendance of four hundred.

For many years they have been praying that God would bring them in touch with the true church which follows the Bible. While returning from a trip to Singapore, this man purchased from a lady colporteur a copy of the Chinese "Signs of the Times," and to his joy saw that its teachings agreed with the Bible. Hence the trip to Yeng Cheng, with the result that he has requested us to send

missionaries to them, and he plans to attend the Yeng Cheng school this winter, although he is sixty-one years of age.

After passing our farthest out-post, he will have to travel thirty-five days to reach his home in far off Kansu—a province containing close to eleven million Mohammedans, the hardest of all people to reach.

Here is a providential opening. A people waiting and praying for us to come. How many such openings there are God only knows. To fail to do our full part as individuals or as a conference means to keep somebody waiting, means that souls will be lost while we are indifferent, burying our talents in earthly affairs.

An unknown Chinese lady colporteur, possibly illiterate, selling a copy of the "Signs" was the means of reaching these people. Her first knowledge of it may be when she meets that company from Kansu on the way to the New Jerusalem. If she had contented herself with the daily routine of home work, spent her spare time in tatting or tattling, and felt that she simply couldn't sell papers, this story would not be written.

How many waiting souls in the home land at our very door—how many perishing souls in the regions beyond may be saved, if each of us will throw ourselves whole-heartedly into this Ingathering campaign.

Brother, sister, God calls upon you to do your part. Your own soul's salvation is at stake, for "There are many that are first that shall be last, and last that shall be first."

Attempt Greater Things for God

"And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations, and then shall the end come." The spreading of this gospel by every means available, to hasten the coming kingdom is the great burden and joy of every true Seventh-day Adventist.

Our great Harvest Ingathering problem is, What plans for organization and effort will produce, with the blessing of God, the greatest returns for the support of this all-important work.

Last year our new plan of goal setting and districting territory had much to do with the establishing of our great precedent, \$126,000 for missions, when the goal set was only \$100,000. In the light of recent accomplishments in other lines, we feel that results far beyond what we have dared hope are possible with more thorough organization.

It has been suggested that we make a superhuman effort, enlisting abundant aid from the Divine, to raise our 1917 goal of \$25,000 in a mighty ONE-WEEK DRIVE, leaving the balance of the year to bring what it may by a continued steady effort.

By having a definite time set, we believe postponements can be largely avoided, and in case any are unable to work their territory, it can be assigned to others who are in position to care for it within the allotted time.

There is often a tendency to feel that nothing more can be done when our territory is worked. We believe that definite plans can be employed which will overcome such an idea. If the territory can be covered systematically during the one week, our members may then feel free to enter any territory and canvass friends, associates, and business acquaintances, often securing good contributions whether the original solicitor secured anything or not. We know of cases where individuals have been canvassed as many as four or five times, contributing something each time.

Last year the writer wrote six letters to relatives and friends, securing in return \$14.50. We believe this is one capable of producing infinite results if it can be systematically planned and encouraged.

From these and similar instances we are convinced that we are falling far short of the possibilities of our great Ingathering work. Shall we not go forward, "Attempting GREATER things for God, and expecting GREATER things of Him" than we have even dared dream in the past?

Concentration of Effort

There are greater results to be accomplished in concentration of effort in our work than we have ever dreamed. Uncle Sam sets his stakes to raise \$2,000,000,000,000 in a specified time; and when the last day of the period is reached, his fund is oversubscribed, by many millions. A colporteur starts out to make, with the blessing of the Lord, the greatest record ever made in the publishing work. The result,—the phenomenal report of eighty hours' service and \$859 worth of orders in a single week. A small church of

twenty-five members sets its goal at 1,000 "World War" placed in the homes of the people in one week,—result, 1,145 copies sold, amounting to \$318.

Why should we scatter our efforts in the Harvest Ingathering when most of us can do our bit in one week's time? The Home-Foreign Field--and Its Opportunities

Special Harvest Ingathering magazines are being issued this year in the following languages: French, German, Italian, Swedish, Danish-Norwegian, Bohemian, Roumanian, Russian, and Hungarian.

The foreign population in the Columbia Union Conference territory is 7,000,000. There are 1,806,267 in Pennsylvania; 1,024,393 in Ohio; 777,797 in New Jersey; 191,838 in Maryland; 57,638 in West Virginia; 45,000 in the District of Columbia; 37,943 in Virginia, and 25,873 in Delaware. Here is a ripe, fertile field for Harvest Ingathering and regular missionary endeavor.

The Lord has brought these needy souls to our shores, yea, to our very doors, that. we may teach them the Third Angel's. Message; and He bids us, "Go ye therefore and teach all (these) nations . . . to observe all things whatsoever I havecommanded you." Matthew 28:19,20. It is being demonstrated by those working among these foreign people, that they are easy to approach and that they respond more freely and liberally than dothe English speaking people. They arealways grateful to know that their English friends remember them and that they have a tract, paper, magazine, or book for them in their own language. Often they will give many times what is asked,... when they are told that it is for missions. and to help their own people in the old country. In soliciting for the Harvest. Ingathering work, if they should ask how much they should give, say, "A dollar, five dollars, anything you choose to give." Do not be afraid to ask for large amounts.

Sunday is the very best day to solicit from foreigners. The men usually receive their pay on Saturday, and one is apt to find them home on Sunday. It would be well if the members in the Columbia Union would set apart each Sunday to reach and teach them the truths for these last days. Come close to these people and study them and their needs. Visit them regularly, get acquainted with them, love them, and win them to Christ. Learn to salute them in their own language, and learn as many simple sentences as possible. Carry on an educational campaign among these people and when they return

Results of Organized Effort In India

In India previous to 1916 the work of the Harvest Ingathering was but lightly attempted. At best from \$100 to \$150 being collected in each year. In 1916 an organized effort was made, the papers arriving enough to make possible work in the Hill Station as well as the plains and In consequence \$1,000 were collected, all the papers were used, and the church members enthused with the knowjedge of the possibilities of the campaign For 1917 double the number of papers have been ordered for use, and definite organization for work perfected.

In one division the work in 1916 was practically completed in a fortnight; and with better organization, even this will doubtless be improved upon this year.
