### The Church and the School

We are told in the Spirit of Prophecy that the church has been organized on earth for missionary purposes. Over and over again this truth is repeated, doubtless that the church might be awakened to a sense of its responsibilities to the world; and at no time in history has that responsibility been more marked than at the present time.

As a people, our eyes are on the great mission fields of the world. We are sending our money to help spread the good news of salvation to those who are bound by superstition and ignorance. We are laying plans to see how our efforts can accomplish the most good. We are praying the Lord to send forth laborers into His harvest, and then place obstacles in His way to prevent Him from answering our prayers. Not intentionally, of course, do we do this; but by failing to study the principles underlying consistent missionary endeavors. The church in its anxiety for the salvation of the heathen, is too often guilty of neglecting those within its own doors, who, as a result, are lost to the cause of truth which we are so anxious to advance.

No individual conversant with the principles of military tactics would be guilty of advising the leader of an army to get very far away from his base of supplies, yet how often do we see a church that seems wholly to have forgotten the fact that true missionary work should first begin at home. The base of supplies for missionaries to the foreign fields must be kept well recruited. We look to our colleges to furnish the trained instruments for carrying on our work. The colleges look to both the academies and the elementary schools for its supply of youth to receive the necessary preparation for life's work. Is your church supplying any of these recruits? Is your church doing everything possible to see that a church school is doing its work of giving needful instruction to the children along lines of Christian education? No church has the true missionary spirit, if

in trying to advance the cause in the regions beyond, the children within its doors are neglected. (See Test. for the Church, Vol. 6, page 217.) God has seen the end from the beginning. He has given definite instruction as to just how His work is to be carried on. We are so slow to grasp the simple truths of God's plan in carrying out His purpose of warning the world of its doom. What might not be accomplished if we would be willing to walk in the way of the Lord's own choosing when we see how marvelous are the things that God hath wrought in spite of us!

It is time now to begin planning for next year's church school. The need for an effective system of church schools in the Columbia Union was never greater than now. Such a system can only be developed when the church comes to realize its responsibility in seeing that the children within its own doors are educated in such a way as to make it possible for them later to answer the definite call of God to go forth and spread the knowledge of a soon coming Saviour.

Let every church seriously consider the advisability of a school in 1919 - 20. We are ready to plan with you and counsel with you that wherever possible a thriving church school may be started to help carry out the instruction God has given to us regarding this missionary enterprise in our very midst.

### Akron Home Missionary Convention

Friday evening, May 2, the Akron Home Missionary Convention opened with a good attendance. The next morning the church was well filled, many visitors from the surrounding churches - - Ravenna, Alliance, Canton, and other places, being present. After an earnest spiritual meeting, eight candidates were buried in baptism by Elder F. H. Henderson, who is in charge of the work in this district,

In the afternoon, the regular convention program was continued. Sunday morning 27 volunteers formed into bands and went into various parts of the city among both English and foreign speaking people. As a result of the campaign, about \$49 worth of literature was sold in one hour's time. The testimony meeting which followed was filled with good experiences. Everyone seemed to be of good courage and 18 persons volunteered and were divided into two bands. The first band will work among the foreign speaking people every Sunday morning. The second band will work each Wednesday with the "World's Peace," the proceeds to go toward the church debt.

Elder Henderson will take personal supervision of the field work. He will also conduct a class each Sunday evening for those who wish to prepare to do Bible work. The class will be held before the regular preaching service. A good number are planning on joining the class.

Sunday afternoon Doctor Hilborn and Brother Borrowdale conducted a very practical demonstration, showing how to give simple treatments. From the interest manifested by all in attendance, it was evident that this part of the program was especially appreciated.

The excellent response by all to the call made revealed the fact that the laity have been educated in Missionary work which explains to some degree the splendid growth of this church.

The church was already taking a club of "Weekly Signs," but decided to add 21 more subscriptions.

Seven subscriptions were received for the "Review and Herald," which will put Ohio over the top.

The total sales of literature in cash and orders amounted to \$455. Throughout the convention we were favored with special music. The meetings were in charge of the following workers: Elder F. H. Henderson, Brethren J. I. Cassell, E. F. Hackman, O. S. Hershberger, E. R. Numbers and Miss Goldie Hixon.

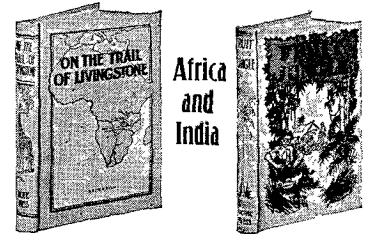
