Be enthusiastic. Enthusiasm is contagious. If you are intensely interested in "World Peace" yourself, you will reveal this interest in your words and in the manner in which you work and it will be reflected from your very countenance and those for whom you are laboring will unconsciously catch the spirit, and sale will follow in rapid succession.

Do not go out to see how much money you can make, but remember that there are those who date their conversion to the truth from the day that someone placed in their hands a 25 cent pamphlet.

How often do we hear our colporteurs tell how true they have found this to be. Just as soon as they have lost sight of the true object of their work and allowed their eyes to be fastened upon the dollar, their work has gone down; but when they began to pray for a burden for lost souls, and to labor not to get gain, but to catch men, God has verified His promise that angels would attend them in their work of mercy. And then only would they begin to realize true success. Almost invariably their sales are multiplied as the seeds of truth are thus sown.

The Virginia Camp-Meeting.

Our meeting was held this year in the beautiful hill city of Lynchburg. We had ideal weather every day of the meeting except one which was somewhat wet. The meeting was a success from the start. Everything went on with the greatest harmony.

A slight change was made from the usual camp-meeting program. The first meeting being held at eight o'clock. This change met with the approval of nearly all present. At these meetings the Spirit of God came very near, and hearts were melted and new decisions taken. The key note of victory was sounded and many took a new start for permanent victory in the Christian life. We expect to see many come up to the next camp-meeting still sounding the same note of victory over sin in the daily life.

Only two short business sessions of the Conference were held. These were made necessary by the legal requirements of the "Agency," but the opportunity was improved of receiving into the Conference three new churches that had been organized during the year. They were the Harrisonburg, the Mayberry and the Lynchburg No 2 churches. This last one was organized by Elder F. H. Robbins on the night before it was received into the Conference.

The speakers from outside the Conference were Elders C. S. Longacre, of Takoma Park, D. C., and F. H. Robbins, president of Columbia Union Conference. Elder Longacre gave some very timely sermons, which were much appreciated by those of the camp and by the attendance from the city, which increased from night to night.

One of the features of the meetings at night was the stereopticon views presented by Elder Robbins. They always drew a full tent with many seated around the outside.

We heard some very favorable comments upon the good singing which was led by Brother T. H. Bar-

ritt who came over from Ohio to help in this branch of the work. We would always be pleased to have Brother Barritt with us more; as his kindly, courteous ways are a real inspiration to Christian living.

Many testified that it was the best meeting they ever attended, and some of these people have been long in the Lord's service. This shows that we are in the time when God's people are receiving increasing showers of his blessings. May it always be so, and may the triumph note sounded at this meeting continue to swell till all shall join in the great victory song on the sea of glass.

Six new chemical fire extinguishers have been purchased for the Academy.



This paper was brought into existence by divine appointment. Seventy years ago Elder and Mrs. James White were living at Rocky Hill, Conn. While living there Elder White was impressed that it was his duty to write and publish the present truth. He was greatly encouraged and blessed as he decided to do this, but being penniless he thought it impossible to publish a paper, so became discouraged and gave up his plan.

Sister White was then shown in vision that he (Elder White) must walk out by faith and write and publish the present truth.

Seventy years ago in July the first number of the first paper was published. Those papers were directed to all whom it was thought would read them. When they were ready for mailing those sturdy, consecrated pioneers gathered around the little pile of papers, and with earnest prayers mingled with tears entreated that God's blessing might attend the silent messengers. Very soon letters came bringing means to publish the paper, and the good news of many souls embracing the truth.

save ourselves and them that hear us?

The book "World Peace" sets forth in a clear and strong manner the Bible teaching relative to present and everlasting peace. It tells us what we may expect from the Peace Conference and the League of Nations. It is the very book for this time, and desired when only the title is seen.

A few weeks ago, our tract society secretary, desiring to see this book widely circulated in this conference, sent a letter to the head of each family, calling their attention to the importance of owning and circulating it. Then the Home Missionary Secretary wrote a letter to the elders, asking them to take up this matter with the churches. I also visited most of the churches and asked that our people unite in the effort to place thousands of copies of the book in the homes of New Jersey. In every place, a response was given. Some of our churches have taken 1100 or more copies. One church of about ten members has taken 525. Orders have come in from isolated members, from members in the cities, and from churches to the amount of over 10,000 copies.

I was out one day with a sister in Newark. It was her first effort. That day she sold nineteen books and enjoyed it very much. While with another sister, we sold a book in each house for five houses running. While waiting a few minutes for a person one morning, I sold eight books—three in one house.

Here is word from the field:

"Yesterday three of us went out for about two hours and canvassed "World Peace" and sold nearly one-half our hundred, so I immediately ordered another hundred. We expect to sell them on through the summer as long as we can have territory. The Lord certainly does open the hearts of the people to receive them. They are very anxious to get the book."

Sure the distribution of this timely light must result in the salvation of many souls. I am glad that July 6-13 inclusive has been set apart as BIG WEEK with this book, and I feel that New Jersey, will, in addition to what she has already done, join the rest of the Union in this glorious effort.
