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The Canvassing Work

Perhaps there is no class of workers among us that meet with experiences more marked than our consecrated colporteurs as they engage in the sale of our truth-filled literature in house-to-house work. As this issue is to be devoted to the canvassing work, I will endeavor to put into this article a few gleanings from the correspondence from the field.

"How I sold my first book: I called at a house with the book 'Daniel and Revelation,' and was met by a sweet-faced, cheerful lady who listened attentively to my canvass. When I explained the colored plate that describes the color of the precious stones in the transparent walls of the city of God, she remarked, 'Now isn't that strange, Ed and I were talking about that last night. I will take your book.' We are promised that the angels of God will go before and prepare the way. was waiting for me with the right change when I delivered the book."

"While canvassing a few days ago I met a lady who had the book, 'Great Controversy,' for which I was securing orders. She also had 'Patriarchs and Prophets,' having secured both of them from our colporteurs. Seeing she had these precious volumes I was impressed to offer her 'Desire of Ages.' So I asked her if she would not like to read about the life of Christ by the same author. I then gave her a de-


scription of the book and told her it was the most spiritual book I ever read, the Bible excepted, and that it had done me so much good in my Christian experience that I wanted her to read it. I said in fact I had known of persons who were converted while reading it, I was sure it would prove a blessing to her home. While she was considering the matter I sent a short petition to the throne of grace. I saw the expression of her face gradu-

ally change and finally she said, 'Very well, you may bring it.'"

I could relate experience, but I know space will not permit. Just a few words from the "Manual for Canvassers":

"The canvassing work properly conducted is missionary work of the highest order, and it is as good and successful a method as can be employed for placing before the people the important truths for this time. . . . God has ordained the canvassing work as a means of presenting before the people the light contained in our books, and canvassers should be impressed with the import-

ance of bringing before the world, as fast as possible, the books necessary for their spiritual education and enlightenment. This is the very work the Lord desires his people to do at this time. All who consecrate themselves to God to work as canvassers are assisting to give the last message of warning to the world. We cannot too highly estimate this work, for were it not for the efforts of



the canvasser many would never hear the warning. The lost sheep of God's fold are scattered in every place, and the work that should be done for them is being neglected. From the light given me, I know that where there is one canvasser in the field there should be one hundred."

I am glad that this line of work is growing. Many are stirred at this time and are in an enquiring frame of mind. Our books are just what they need as they give the true solution of things, I know God will impress men and women to go into the highways and byways to invite them to the wedding feast of the King. All things are now ready. "Son, go work today."

Extracts From Our Colporteurs at the Front

GEORGE BUTLER

I feel thankful for the success the Lord has given me in the canyassing work since I left school. I believe that his presence has gone before me preparing the people to receive me kindly, and opening their hearts to receive the books which contain the closing message for this time.

I made my first delivery July 5-7, and found only one who refused to take the book, but as this was only a twenty-five cent one it did not unbalance me much, especially after having sold one 'Story of the Bottle" to a lady who had ordered a large book only. I firmly believe that the Lord's hand was in this for I know that I never could have done it of myself as this was my first experience in delivering. Since then I have been taking orders for a September delivery and have met with good success, especially this past week, having secured over \$50 in 48 hours.

I am beginning to feel right at home in the work, especially out in the country among the farmers, for whom I have great respect, having been a farmer all my life. It gives me much pleasure to have the opportunity of helping them after supper to draw in an extra load of hay, then after a good night's rest and a good farm breakfast, to succeed in securing an order for "Great Controversy." I especially enjoy helping milk the cows early in the morning which always produces an excellent appetite.

Twice this week I secured an order for "Great Controversy" in this way, one of which was the means of selling a "Story of the Bottle" in addition to the order.

My courage is good in the Lord, and by his grace I intend to stick to it and secure a scholarship in time to begin school the day it opens. To this end I would ask the prayers of God's people, believing that the Lord does hear and answer prayer, and that he will bless all efforts put forth for the furtherance of his cause in the earth.

Having read many encouraging accounts from the canvassing field in the MESSENGER lately, it occurs to me that my experiences may prove beneficial to some. I am so thankful that the Lord has permitted me to take up this line of work during the summer vacation, and feel greatly encouraged by the way he has helped me to place books in the homes of the people. I am canvassing with "Great Controversy" and taking "The World's Crisis" as a help.

Although I find many of our large books in the homes, yet the people are anxious to know how we look upon the present conditions in the world, and gladly receive our literature. At one home in particular the family was very anxious to do what is right and to know more about the Bible, so I traced the cardinal points of our belief through God's Word. They were greatly impressed by the method we adopt of explaining the Scriptures. I then wrote out a full study on the Sabbath question, and earefully explained the various texts upon which first-day keepers base their claim. We did not retire till midnight after talking for four hours, and again next morning many questions were asked. We must be cheerful and full of courage and go at the work as though we expected to get an order from every person we canvass. We must have a good description of our book, and be able to present it in an intelligent manner in a few words. I secured thirty-seven orders for "World's Crisis" in part of a day. I am of better courage now and look forward to doing better work in the future.
