The topics of Christ's Second Coming and the Millennium are live subjects here just now. The literature of Pastor Russel has been freely distributed to prepare for his visit. But he has now gone and many pulpits are reviewing his sermons. One prominent minister advertised the subject of Christ's Second Coming and then published his sermon. He took the extreme position that Christ's coming is only a spiritual, not a personal one. So these are opportunities for the seeds of truth to be sown and we are meeting many inquiries.

Truly the fields are white for the harvest and the Macedonian cry can be heard everywhere. Through the spirit of prophecy we understand that all who remain firm to the end will be in some way engaged in spreading the message. Reading as we do, from day to day, of the cheerful sacrifices being made in this great war, as a soldier of Jesus Christ in the canvassing field, I was led to look back over the past year's work. I wondered if my labor has been as zealously and cheerfully performed as the necessity demanded. How the dear Lord has blessed me, but I did not at the time recognize many of the blessings. How wonderfully the homes opened to me. One night in particular I had difficulty in finding a place to stay. It was a very cold night about ten o'clock, and the lights were being extinguished in the homes. I prayed that the Lord would help me, and looking up, noticed a light some distance ahead. I went toward it with confidence, knocked and was received kindly. After stating my business I was welcomed into the home. I had scarcely sat down when Mr. Watson began talking about the Bible, and though Mrs. Watson was not very well we sat talking till near midnight. They remarked how seldom they could find one who would talk about the Scriptures. In the morning I received an order for a "Daniel and Revelation" and a \$3.90 Bible. These I have since delivered. At another house after a faithful canvass I failed to get an order so showed "Best Stories," They decided to take one of these. In the meantime it was raining rather hard so I sheltered there a little while and made the most of my time explaining the prophecies. When I left and had gotten as far as the road the farmer came running after me, saying that on second thought he would take the "Daniel and Revelation" also. Thus the dear Lord tests our faith. At still another place after failing to get an order in the house I went out to the barn and easily secured an order for "Daniel and Revelation." Then when I was canvassing a house opposite the lady came over and ordered "Best Stories" also. At another place I had no sooner introduced myself than I was warmly welcomed and pressed to stay overnight, which I did. They were very poor and really unable to order a book, so I left with them later a set of Bible studies and linked them up with the Dresden church.

So I have found the way prepared before me. While I have often been very tired (not of the work however), I have also been very happy. I have also had a very pleasant delivery. What a wonderful opportunity we have in the canvassing work to give the message and help in the finishing of the work. Now is the time to labor. I long for a better training for it.
