Exeter

In harmony with the desire of our conference president I visited Exeter in the hope of reuniting the scattered company there. I at once arranged for a series of meetings and word was sent out to that effect. At the beginning the weather was very bad and also on the first Sabbath which hindered many coming from a distance. However the first Sunday evening we had a nice turn out which increased in number as the meetings progressed. On the following Friday night I spoke to an audience numbering thirty-eight and the interest was good. As a result of my short visit with these people one man decided to obey and has notified his employer of his intention. Two or three more were favorably impressed and I believe they will soon unite with us. Some of these young men are talking of going to our school. Some lived quite a distance away so I took the stage six miles into the country to visit with them in their homes. I found that the fields are white for the harvest. They desired me to conduct a series of meetings in that part. Wherever I go I find the Macedonian cry, "Come over and help us."

Exeter is a field where much labor has been bestowed years ago. Today it seems they are reawakening to the fact that this message is a reality. Altogether I was much encouraged, and feel that an effort put forth there would produce a church for our conference. I was impressed with their desire to push the Ingathering Signs. The fifty on hand were disposed of quickly so I ordered a hundred more, and I am satisfied that they will receive a fair average for each considering what has been done already. Another thing which impressed me greatly was their anxiety to have me stay over another day to instruct them on the tithing. This I did. I have always felt that when a person is anxious about giving the Lord his own, he means business. Here the Lord has material be can work with. To such he will say, "Thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." Surely there should be a greater giving up of our worldly possessions to the Lord. Our treasures should be in heaven in view of the fact that this old earth is soon to be destroyed.
