GENERAL ARTICLES.

A CANVASSER'S INSTITUTE.

We have decided to hold a canvasser's institute in connection with the general meeting at Boulder. Our object in holding this institute is that new and inexperienced persons may attend and prepare themselves for the work, and that those who have been in the work may better prepare to do efficient work for the Master.

We expect to have efficient help in attendance. Brother C. W. Hardesty, our Union Conference agent, will be with us. He has had years of experience in this line of work. A competent Bible teacher will also be present and conduct a series of Bible studies during the entire time. We need to understand the fundamental principles of this precious truth as well as a practical knowledge of how to sell the books which are so richly laden with the truth for this time. We hope and pray that the Lord will move upon the hearts of many of our dear people to improve this opportunity and enter this line of work which is so sadly in need of consecrated men and women to carry the last message of mercy to a lost world.

We expect the institute to be held in connection with the general meeting which will begin January 8th, and continue three weeks. The Boulder church has kindly agreed to board and room a number of persons free of cost if they will attend the institute and then enter the work and stand by it for at least three months. Truly this is a golden opportunity for all who expect to enter this line of work. O, may God move upon the hearts of his people to step in and do the work and win the crown. Let us one and all work while it is called to-day, for the night cometh when no man can G. Phillips. work.

SPECIAL COURSE FOR WORKERS.

For a number of years the Board of Managers of Union College has provided a brief training course for workers. A similar course has been provided for this year, beginning January 7 and closing March 3. The course this year will take the form of a Biblical institute for ministers, licentiates, Bible workers, city workers, canvassers and church officers.

In addition to the Bible there will be special classes arranged in the study of history, language, mathematics, drawing, reading, spelling, singing, hygiene and hydrotherapy. There will also be special topics considered; such as "The Spiritual Side of the Workers' Work," "The Work for Our Large Cities," "The Struggle Between Capital and Labor From the Standpoint of and Prophecy," History "Church Work," "Sabbath School Work," "Young People's Work," "Foreign Mission Work," "The Work of the Gospel Ministry," "Methods in the Canvassing Work," "Methods in the Bible Work."

Special pains have been taken to secure a strong force of competent instructors. A large attendance is expected, and the course of instruction will be such as will amply repay all for attndeing. The many appeals that come to us from the Foreign Mission Board and from conferences and institutions make it imperative that our schools make extra efforts to give a brief yet effective course of training for persons who are of sufficient age and experience to enter immediately into work in a public capacity.

A printed announcement will be sent to all the conference laborers and church elders, and a liberal supply to the state office in each conference. The announcement will give the particulars respecting the items of expense.

The tuition has been placed at one dollar and seventy-five cents per month, or three dollars per term. Should you board in the College Home the board alone will be just what you order on the European plan, probably from a dollar to a dollar and a half a week. Should you room in the college' your room, heat and light would be six dollars additional. Should you choose to room outside the College Home, it 'will be whatever you can secure.

All who expect to avail themselves of this course should communicate with your conference President, or some members of our conference committee.

It should be borne in mind that immediately at the close of this special course the Central Union Conference will convene in its biennial session. At this time a special rally will be made for the work of the International Publishing Association, and a strong effort should be made to enlist as many of those who speak the German and Scandinavian languages to attend this course, and go out with the foreign publications as soon as the conference is over.
