Through the influence of the W. C. T. U. the city marshal of Greeley served notices on the proprietors of the business houses, Saturday, June 2. The following significant notice appeared on one of our drug stores, Sunday, June 3:

NOTICE!

The city marshal was ordered by the W. C. T. U. to close all business houses on Sunday, therefore this store will remain closed till further notice, no matter how necessary it may be for the sick to have medicine. We positively and absolutely refuse to open our doors under any circumstances whatever, until the 'Ordinance' and whatever influence has caused its enforcement is annulled and condemned by public opinion or otherwise.

The other two drug stores were also closed, with similar notices posted on the doors. Cigar stands took advantage of the ordinance and procured a limited supply of provisions, thus apparently converting themselves into such establishments as are exempt from the "Blue Laws"

People seem very much aroused, and the W. C. T. U. has become suddenly conspicuous, especially as displayed upon sidewalks, etc.

May God arouse his servants who know the truth to show these people not only the inconsistency of religion by law, but its final result—persecution.

Field Lesson No. III. For Sabbath, June 23, 1906.

Religions of India.

BY PROF. J. L. SHAW.

India has been called the cradle of false religions. The three-most prominent are Hinduism, Mohammedanism and demon worship. In Burmah and Ceylon Buddhism prevails. Hinduism has more followers than all the other religions combined, numbering 207,640,416, or a little more than two-thirds of the population of all India.

The sacred books of Hinduism are the Vedas and Shasters. Vedas are said to be the oldest writings in the world except the Pentateuch. There are many good and wise sayings in these books, as well as many bad. The Hindu priests have told us that they believe there is one Supreme Being, but he is known to the people only through many manifestations, such as rivers (especially the River Ganges), mountains, birds, serpents, trees, etc. The gods and godesses number 33,000,000.

A leading characteristic of Hinduism is the caste system. The people were originally divided into four divisions called castes. The first included the priests, the second the soldiers, the third the husbandmen, and the fourth the servants. The number of divisions in the caste system has greatly increased until now there are many hundreds of classes. Below all are Pariahs, or outcast, and they are regarded as no better than dogs; in fact, that is what the name means.

The laws which control the caste system are rigid as well as curious. The Brahmin, who is a high caste, that allows the shadow of a lower caste to fall upon him while he is eating, must throw away his food and spit out what he has in his mouth. A high caste woman must not allow a low caste woman to touch her garments. Such an accident often happens on the crowded railway trains, and. many hard words follow from the high caste woman who, because of her pollution, dare not greet her children who come to meet her as she arrives at her home. She must first bathe herself and wash her clothes before entering her house and taking her children in her arms.

Caste is the curse of India. It is the great enemy of advancement and im-

provement, and is the soul and body of Hinduism. It is the outgrowth of pride, and nothing can break it down save the gospel of Christ.

Religions of India-Continued.

The second religion in India, so far as numbers are concerned, is Mohammedanism, whose followers numbered, in 1901, 62,458,661. Nearly one-third of all the Mohammedans in the world are in India. They came into India several centuries ago and made many converts by force of arms. Their religion is but little better than that of the Hindus, and they stand opposed to western civilization and stoutly oppose Christianity. They believe there is one god, and Mohammed is his prophet, and call the Koran their sacred book.

The demon worshipers include several sects. They believe the idols they worship are demons rather than gods. We have a mission among a tribe of demon worshipers, called the Santals. Our mission is located at Simultala, about 200 miles northwest of Calcuttae Brother Barlow is in charge and has an Industrial Bible School. Recently five young men in the school accepted the truth and were baptized. The Santals believe there are good and evil spirits. The good spirits,

they say, can only do them good, so they do not worship them, but worship and try to appease the evil spirits who may do them harm.

We quote the following from a letter recently received from Brother W. C. Hankins, Kulangsu, Amoy, China:

"We cannot tell you how much we anpreciate the effort that is being put forth by our young people in Colorado to help carry the good news of the soon coming Saviour to these hundreds of millions of people in Asia who are ignorant of him and his coming. And how glad I am to tell you that I never had a firmer faith in his soon coming than I have today. These Asiatic nations are waking up out of their long sleep, and are preparing for the battle of Armageddon. There are many indications that time is short, and one of them is the rapidity with which decisions are being made for or against the truth, and the rapidity with the knowledge of the truth is spreading throughout this country.

"I know you are anxious to know all about the worker you are supporting here with the birthday box offerings, but I can only give you a little idea of what a grand man he is. He was ordained a few weeks ago when Elder J. N. Anderson was here from Canton, and is, I believe, the only ordained Seventh-day Adventist Chinese preacher in China.

"He has the entire oversight of our native workers here and is very faithful in looking after the interests of the Lord's work. He is a man of education and perhaps has few, if any, superiors among his countrymen. He is known for miles around, and there are hundreds throughout this province who have become interested in the Sabbath question through hearing of his change. Many times he is busy till late in the night telling the "truth" to enquirers who come in from the interior to learn about this new doctrine. I hope you will all remember him in your prayers."
