#### GENERAL ARTICLES.

#### Some Encouraging Figures.

We are sure it will be a matter of encouragement to all to learn how the Lord has prospered the work of circulating our literature in the conference during the past few months.

We have heard from the faithful canvassers, and it may be a few figures from the office would be of interest.

For the months of July, August, September and October, 1906, the purchases of books and other literature by the Colorado Tract Society amounted to \$1,996,14. For the corresponding months of the preceeding year, the purchases

were \$1,002.77. Only about one-half as much as for the present year.

The sales for the same months in 1905 amounted to \$1,010.31, or \$7.54 more than the purchases. The sales for corresponding time in 1906 amounted to \$2,596.76, or \$600.62 more than the purchases. We certainly feel very grateful to God for his prospering hand, which has been with our canvassers and other workers, and for the spirit of courage and earnestness which has lead them to persevere and accomplish such splendid results under circumstances which were many times far from favorable.

## Lest We Forget.

Nearly everyone has had the pleasure of receiving a birthday present. Birthdays are looked forward to with pleasure by the children and many times by those who are older.

Doubtless we all feel pleased when our friends remember us on our birthdays with some token of affection or friendship. Now, we feel sure that it would please the Saviour if, when our birthday comes, we would remember him with some expression of our love and gratitude for his continued care.

We are supporting a number of very earnest, devoted native workers in foreign lands by our birthday offerings. We paid their wages for 1906 in the early part of the year. It will soon be 1907, and we still lack nearly one hundred dollars of having enough to pay the wages of our native workers for the coming year.

One brother just came in and left ten dollars, which is the price of a call that was given to the Lord for China last spring. Are there not others who could make, some gift or thank offering to the Lord? And are there not many who have been negligent in paying their

birthday offering who might hand it in before the end of the year, and thus supply the amount necessary to pay the native workers for the year to come?

#### The \$150.000 Fund.

Methinks I hear someone say, "My! what a lot of money, and what does the General Conference do with so much money?" Now, dear brother or sister, think of this great world with all its many people, speaking many languages, and they all must hear this closing message. I say closing message. Yes, this message known as the three-fold message of Rev. 14 is the last call to the wayward of this earth. Then, taking all the people. with all the languages, much money is required to carry the blessed news of a soon coming Lord. But, dear ones, what can we spend our money for that will bring greater returns?

- 7. That, for the present, Brother Meade MacGuire take the oversight of the work on Capitol Hill, Denver.
- 8. That the Colorado Young People's Convention be held at Boulder during the holidays, December 25-31 inclusive.


