My Dear Brethren and Sisters: We are rapidly approaching the great annual gathering of our people in this conference when they will come up from all parts of Colorado and New Mexico and meet in "Holy Convocation" to worship the Lord together and to hear of the progress of the cause in the vast territory embraced within our own conference border and to learn of its trials and triumphs throughout the whole world.

The Opening of the Campion School.

We are pleased to announce to our brethren and sisters that the conference school at Campion will begin about September 1. The definite date will be given later. The school board has been negotiating for some time to secure the services of a competent instructor to act as principal of the school, and while we are not prepared at this writing to make a definite announcement, we believe that we have secured one whose experience in educational work will warrant his success in connection with school work in Colorado. The following rates of tuition have been adopted: Grades one, two and three, \$1 per month; grades four and five, \$1.50 per month; grade six, \$2 per month; grades seven and eight, \$2.50 per month; grades nine and ten, \$3 per month; and grades eleven and twelve, \$3.50 per month. This tuition will be alike to students who

may live in the dormitory or those who may attend from the outside. In addition to this tuition rate there will be a charge of \$13 per month for those living in the school home. For this amount the home will furnish board, room, heat, light and a reasonable amount of laundry. All students living in the home will be required to perform from one to two hours of work per day as may be required. No remuneration will be made for this work. It is felt that this donated labor together with the moderate charge for board will no more than compensate the school for the student's expenses. No student under twelve years of age will be received into the school home. The school cannot assume the care and responsibility of students under this age.

The school catalogue is now being prepared. This will contain full information with reference to the school, rules, regulations, etc., and will be sent out free upon application. We are pleased to announce that work on the students' dormitory is progressing rapidly, and it will be ready for occupancy on day of opening. We earnestly trust that our brethren and sisters east of the range will rally to the support of the school. We confidentially believe this school will afford an excellent line of instruction for your sons and daughters, and we trust that many of our young men and women will make it their earnest purpose to enroll themselves among the charter students of this institution. Arrangements have been made for railroad rate on the certificate plan, one fare and a fifth for towns in the plains, one fare and a third for mountain towns; days for buying tickets, August 20-22, and August 29. Certificates good until September 5 for return. Rates the same for New Mexico. Let all of our people plan to come and bring your friends with you.

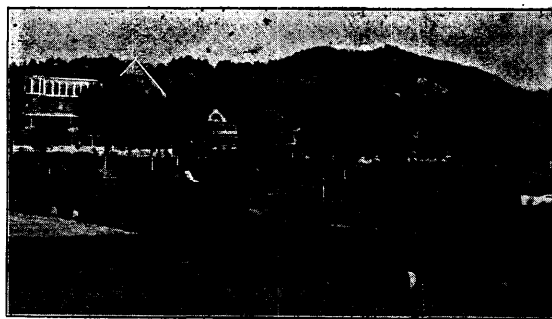
The publishers are very busy. In my fifteen years' experience in this message and work, I can say truthfully and with joy in my soul, that I have never seen
