
The canvassing work is still progressing. While some have dropped out, and others have entered school, still God is raising up others to take their places in the ranks that the good work may go on.

The Next General Donation-October 5.

Let us pray that the blessing of God may be with the workers who are giving their lives to the spread of the message among the colored people.
