Echoes from the Field.

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"Seek Ye First the Kingdom."

One of the most hopeful indications among our people as a whole, is their willingness to receive instruction on things pertaining to their duty to themselves, to their felowmen, and to God. As a people our attitude is: "Speak, Lord, for thy servant heareth!"

In counseling His children the Lord passes none by. From the individual occupying the highest position of honor and grave responsibilities in this message, down to the man and woman of one talent, to the eye of man obscure. God has sent forth "precept upon precept; line upon line; here a little, there a little," that all might become acquainted with His will as touching all things relating to life; and all this to the intent that we at last may hear from the lips of our Saviour, "Well done," and enter into the habitations of eternity.

In the Bible is found such instruction. In the Testimonies for the remnant are found the great principles of practical Christianity drawn out in detail. Among other things the Lord teaches us that we owe to Him a tenth of our income. We can ill afford to miss the blessing that comes to him who heeds the call: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse," for, of that blessing, God says: "There shall not be room enough to receive it!" Of such an experience the Psalmist exclaims: "My cup runneth over!" Truly, "to be spiritually minded is life and peace," and we are furthermore told that "if spiritually awake, the followers of Christ will hear in the income of every week, whether much or little, the voice of God and of conscience, with authority demanding the tithes, and offering due the Lord." Vol. 4, p. 474.

Again: "As laborers together with God, the officers of the church should be sound upon this plainly revealed question. The ministers themselves should be strict to carry out to the letletter the injunctions of God's word."

"Beware of covetousness," said Jesus. It is one of the sins which make the last days "perilous." The Master's solemn warning is, "Take heed to yourselves, lest at any time your hearts be over-charged with * * * cares of this life, and so that day come upon you unawares." "I saw that Satan bade his angels lay their snares especially for those who were looking for Christ's second appearing, and keeping all the commandments of God. Satan told his angels, 'Go, make the possessors of lands and money drunk with cares. * * * They may profess what they please, only make them care more for money than for the success of Christ's kingdom or the spread of the truths we hate." Early Writings, p. 128

"Especially should the minister keep himself free from every worldly entanglement, and bind himself to the Source of all power. * * * He should cut loose from everything that would in any way divert his mind from God and the great work for this time." Vol. 5, p. 531. "Ministers should have no separate interest aside from the great work of leading souls to the truth. Their energies are all needed here. They should not engage in * * * any business fiside from this one great work." Vol., p. 470.

As it is written, "Give attendance to reading, to exhortation, to doctrine * * Meditate upon these things; give thyself wholly to them." And again: "No man that warreth entangleth himself with the affairs of this life."

How solemn the call: "Brethren. God calls upon you, both ministers and laymen, to listen to His voice speaking to you in His word. Let His truth be received into the heart, that you may be spiritualized by its living, sanctifying power. Thèn let the distinct message for this time be sent from watchman to watchman on the walls of Zion." H. M. W., p. 24. W. A. THEO. MILLER.

The Demands of the Hour.

You will observe in the "Christian Liberty" department of the *Review*, of December 26, 1907, an article announcing that three Sunday bills have already been introduced into Congress. The text of these bills is given in the article. Two of these bills were introduced into the House of Representatives, and relate to the District of Columbia; the other was introduced into the Senate, and relates to the postoffice department. Three Sunday bills introduced into Congress at this early date should be a signal to every Seventh-Day Adventist to arouse to the demands of the hour.

We are preparing petition blanks and appropriate literature for use by our

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people in making their protest against these bills.

After examining the three Sunday bills referred to, we would urge that you commence at once to write your respective Senators and Representatives in Congress, protesting against the passage of these proposed measures. The letters should be short and courteous, but earnest. Ask the Lord to give you special help in writing.

We also wish to request you to write us a letter of introduction to any member of Congress with whom you are acquainted. This, we believe, would be a material help to us when interviewing them upon these important issues. K. C. RUSSELL.

Religious Liberty.

Work while the day lasts; the night cometh when no man can work. We little realize the earnest efforts put forth by the Natonal Reformers in our midst. At a recent night meeting of the Denver Christian Citizenship Union where the writer was present, the Sabbath issue was discussed by lawyers and uninisters.

The entire meeting was characterized by a most intense desire to secure civil legislation, to establish Sunday as a church Sabbath and also a civil Sabbath.

The speaker, who is a lawyer in this city, remarked, "This nation's laws are made for the majority, and our Seventh Day Keeping friends surely *must submit* in the matter of keeping Sunday.

In a folder which lies before me, prepared by the Rev. J. M. Wiley, I read the following:

"The right of the STATE to require reverence of the Lord's Day, rests on the authority of Christ as a Creator."

"There could be no freedom to worship, if the state did not prescribe cessation from labor."

"The law of rest for all, disobeyed, destroys the hope of rest for many."

Notice these statements: First; the majority must speak, and their word is to rule in matters of Sabbath keeping. Christ is declared to be on their side, but any school boy would tell you that Christ never advocated such a principle. If these men had been living in His day, their voices would have said: "Better one man die than the whole nation perish," as said the murderers of our Saviour.

God never prescribed Sunday as a day of rest. It rests solely on the authority of the power who thinks to change time and laws. And if anyone does not so rest it destroys the rest for all, they say. Then there has surely never been any real rest on Sunday, for since God created man on earth till now, there have been some faithful Sabbath keepers who kept, not Sunday, the first day, but Saturday, the seventh day, and this will be so till the end, for *some will not* worship the beast nor receive his mark.

And since our state has reached a time when its pastors advocate such measures, who cannot see the emblem of liberty trailing in the dust. One man, a pastor, advocated 'stronger measures. When told that the maximum fine for keeping open saloons on Sunday was \$500, he said: "THAT IS A GOOD FINE, BUT IT NEEDS AN ADDI-TIONAL CLAUSE TO PREVENT WORK AND FROM 18 MONTHS TO TWO YEARS IN PRISON." That is the method of one who professes to be a follower of Him, who said: "If any man hear my word and believe not, I Judge him not."

Brethren, let us arise and scatter this truth. Persecution will come. We can begin to see it now. Let us so acquit ourselves that when the time is fully here, our work is truly finished.
